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THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE THE DSO FOR THE HOLIDAYS SOUTH SINGERS PERFORM LANDMARK CONCERT

n mid-December, members of the Grosse Pointe South Choirs will reach a milestone that has been in the making for over 20 years. Dating back to 1994, students have been on stage with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra as they present "Home for the Holidays," and on Saturday, Dec. 17, they will perform their 100th concert with the DSO.

While singing at Orchestra Hall is a high honor, the joy of the season is the best part of the performance, says choral director Christopher Pratt. The choir will also perform Dec. 16 and 18 at Orchestra Hall for a total of six performances, and all choirs will perform at the Grosse Pointe Performing Arts Center on Dec. 8.

"For sure, it is the sharing of the

holiday spirit with thousands of people in the audience who come to enjoy the DSO's 'Home for the Holidays' pop series," he says.

This year's concerts will be under the direction of newly promoted DSO associate director, Michelle Merrill; in the past, students have had the privilege of standing before Leonard Sladkin, John Morris Russell, Thomas Wilkens, Michael Krajewski and Chelsea Tipton II. Pratt says that a variety of holiday favorites will be featured on the program, including: "O Holy Night," "We Wish You a Merry Christmas" and "Somewhere in My Memory."

"One hundred thirty students in grades 9 to 12 are part of the South choir program," says Pratt, who is assisted by Richard Wolf. "Students within the choir program are scheduled for each of the six shows."

Grosse Pointe South will share the stage with performers from Bloomfield Hills High School, a tradition that goes back to the early 2000s when the singers were attending the former Andover High School. Pratt's friend and colleague Jessica Riley directs those students. Thirty-five singers from each school will be on stage as an ensemble joining the DSO.

Steeped in tradition, each year has events to remember. In 2010, South performed its own annual "Santa Tap" with the orchestra, and in 2014, the high school directors took the stage at Orchestra Hall to conduct "Silent Night." This year should be no different. **P**



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ruler. A notebook. Some pencils. To most, these are the trivial supplies that mark the beginning of another school year. To Michael Marchiori and Wendy Ishmaku, however, these small items could be the impetus for a larger, intangible idea — fostering a passion for education in some of Detroit's less fortunate students.

"We want to inspire kids to pursue higher education and see the fun and value in learning," says Ishmaku, chief financial officer of Giving Pack, a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization with the primary goal of contributing to community success by providing supplies and resources to individuals in need. Ishmaku and fellow Grosse Pointe North High School alumnus and Giving Pack CEO Michael Marchiori founded



the organization in March 2016 after being inspired by their work with GPN's Freshman Assist, a high school student mentorship program. A GoFundMe campaign raised enough of the \$3,000 goal for Giving Pack to hold its first school supply distribution in September 2016 to the entire K-5 student body at Carleton Elementary School in Detroit.

"They were so appreciative, so excited to have us there and have these supplies," Ishmaku says. "One student tackled me to the ground with hugs. It was the most rewarding thing that's ever happened to me."

Each of Carleton's 350 students received a backpack filled with supplies and a new age-appropriate reading book. Giving Pack volunteers also included a handwritten note of encouragement and support to each student, with messages like "Be kind, be strong, be you! You rock!"

"The little kids who couldn't read yet were coming up to us asking us to read our notes to them," Ishmaku says. "It was really so exciting for them to have a note just for them." In return, each student returned the pair's notes with a thank you note of their own.

Ishmaku and Marchiori named the organization with the broader notion that Giving Pack may expand to include other forms of assistance, such as activity packs for hospital-bound children. Now university sophomores, the two also want to expand their team of volunteers to assist with donation requests, community outreach and awareness.




will be matched by the Stahl family and benefit MI DAV, Michigan's Disabled American Veterans, in support of local veterans and their families.


Rounding out the three-day fundraiser and celebration, Team STAHLS' and the Detroit Red Wings Alumni will face off at the St. Clair

"The eldest style of whiskey that came about was in the 1500s, which was Irish whiskey, followed by Scotch followed by bourbon, then Canadian whiskey came about," Tullio says. "The newest style of whiskey is Japanese whiskey which has become very popular."

Michael Kennedy, who owns Irish Coffee with his father John, explains how Tullio ended up recently at their business.

"Our (Canadian Club) rep asked me if I had heard of Dan Tullio. I said I had. She said he would be in town and would like to stop by for lunch. It turned into a bigger and bigger deal, and so we made it as fun as possible."

Tullio lists factors that lend to particular tastes of whiskey.

"The type of barrel you put it in, whether it's a new one or a used one, the length of the warehouse, the time in the barrel, all of these things you end up with a final taste profile," he says. That's why you've got so many different types for so many taste choices that consumers have.

"The government does not tell us a specific type or rational, so we have the flexibility of using a variety of different grains, therefore a variety of different brands."

Tullio sprung a pop quiz on the

room. "To be called an American bourbon, true or false: It's got

n Sept. 28, Starr Commonwealth representatives, families and former employees of the Children's Home of Detroit and residents at The Rivers gathered at The Rivers Grosse Pointe to open a time capsule buried on the grounds 66 years ago.

Mea Rutan, a representative from the Children's Home of Detroit and current Starr Commonwealth board member, spoke about the vision of the Children's Home, its neverending desire to offer care to children in need and the tragedy of its closing. "Our mission at the Children's Home of Detroit was saved during the 2008 crash by Starr," she says.

Starr Commonwealth merged with the closed Children's Home in 2009, and continues the legacy of serving children on the eastside of Metro Detroit through Starr Detroit Academy, a charter school in Harper Woods.

Richard Levin, CEO of The Rivers, had been caretaker of the time capsule since it was unearthed in 2010 during construction on The Rivers Grosse Pointe, the site of the former Children's Home. The time capsule was buried

on June 8, 1950, within the cornerstone of the administration building being laid for the Children's Home. Though some who attended the burial in 1950 were present and recalled a few of the items, no list of the buried items existed.

After several minutes of sawing through the copper

box, the time capsule was opened by Amy Reimann, Starr Commonwealth's corporate historian and major gift officer. The highly anticipated and well-preserved contents included a Bible, the 48-star United States of America flag, a Children's Home of Detroit brochure, several local newspapers (including

> headlines on President Truman and the indictment of Michigan scientists), a board of trustees list, photographs of construction, a publication on their first hundred years, a photograph of Margaret Langley Kanter, head of the board of trustees, and a letter penned by her.

> Kanter's granddaughter, Margie Garbanino, was present at the opening of the time capsule, as she was at its burial 66 years ago. Garbanino gasped as Reimann removed the final item from the box: a 1945 wheat penny that Garbanino had mischievously flipped into the box as a child, just as it was about to be sealed. "I didn't think it had made it in!" exclaimed Garbanino.

> Sniffles issued from every corner of the room during an emotional reading of Margaret Langley Kanter's 1950 letter about the mission and vision of the Children's Home of Detroit.

Elizabeth Carev, president and CEO of Starr Commonwealth, addressed the crowd and the letter, "One hundred and eighty years ago, a group of dedicated women in Detroit decided to care for our most vulnerable children. We are proud and privileged to carry on their legacy."

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

he holidays are fast approaching, and that means much hustle and bustle preparing for a joyous, happy,

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

Pneumonia

ough, fever and fatigue seem to abound during the winter time. Is it just a cold? The flu? Or pneumonia? Oftentimes, people come to see me when they are concerned that an infection has "gone into my chest."

Pneumonia is an infection of the lungs most often caused by bacteria but can sometimes be caused by viruses (e.g., the influenza virus) or even fungi. At greatest risk are people older than 65 and




younger than 5 years of age, people with chronic medical conditions like diabetes, kidney and heart disease and those who have asthma or who smoke.

Fortunately there are vaccines against common bacteria and viruses that cause pneumonia, and these are usually covered by insurance. The flu vaccine is strongly recommended for those at high risk of developing pneumonia, like asthmatics.

We also have two vaccines against a bacteria that is a common cause of pneumonia, streptococcus pneumoniae, called Pneumovax 23 and Prevnar 13. Prevnar 13 is recommended for all children beginning at age 2, as a series of 4 doses. Pneumovax 23 is given to high-risk children, such as those with severe asthma. diabetes or cochlear implants. For seniors age 65 and older, both vaccines are recommended, with Pneumovax 23 given approximately one year after Prevnar 13. Talk to your doctor if you received a "pneumonia vaccine" before age 65. Prevnar 13 can be given for people starting at age 50, but it is best to first discuss with your doctor and your insurance company as it may not be covered!

Painting fairy tale favorites into Grosse Pointe

en years ago, local artist Sara Dykstra answered the Grosse Pointe Library board's call for original artwork to decorate its Ewald branch. "I created a design for the children's room that included characters from children's literature," she says, "and I placed them in familiar Grosse Pointe locations."

The three oil-on-canvas panels took nearly three years from start to finish, and are now mounted on the walls of the children's story time room at Ewald.

On the largest panel, dozens of characters — all gleaned from children's literature — are placed in a book store, a candy shop, a jewelry store, a toy store, a clothing shop and a pet shop, much like stores found in the Village. More characters are depicted in the second panel, the Grosse Pointe War Memorial's gardens. The third panel's literary personalities are in Patterson Park.

"I put the characters in places that correlate with their stories," she says. "For example, the jewelry store has four fairy tale princes: Cinderella's prince, Snow White's prince, Sleeping Beauty's prince and The Frog Prince. All are at the counters, purchasing jewelry for their princesses. The seven dwarfs, if you remember, worked in diamond mines. They're the jewelry store salesmen, waiting on customers.

"The panels are a kind of 'I Spy' for kids," Dykstra says. "They can find familiar storybook friends."

She used people she knows as models for most of the characters. "The Fairy Godmother is my grandmother. My husband is in the jewelry store, buying something for Cinderella."

And Dykstra herself is in the War Memorial garden panel, as Cinderella, holding a glass slipper. In Patterson Park, Hans Brinker is shown as a younger version of her brother and he's skating with a younger version of Dykstra. Other family members are represented as are some neighbors, several teachers from South High School, and other Grosse Pointers.

In the Patterson Park panel, Charlotte, the spider protagonist of *Charlotte's Web*, dangles in front of Little Miss Muffet. Hansel and Gretel approach an elaborate gingerbread house. Paul Bunyon has just finished chopping down a tree.

Dykstra grew up in Grosse Pointe Farms, graduated


from Grosse Pointe South, then earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the Maryland Institute College of Art in Baltimore. "I studied all kinds of painting," she says, "but I focused on oil. I also spent six months studying in Aix-en-Provence, in southern France."

In 2003, she was commissioned to do a series of paintings for lecture halls at Dartmouth College's medical school. While working on the Ewald panels, she married Joseph Dwaihy, and when she finished, they moved back to the Dartmouth area, where she created a series of paintings for the pediatric intensive care unit at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center.

Dykstra and her husband moved to California in 2012. She earned a Master of Fine Arts degree from the California College of the Arts in San Francisco, where she now has her own studio.

"The work for each of my paintings begins with building a three dimensional set or a still life containing handmade forms," she says. "Using transparent materials such as cellophane, fabric, paper, glass and light, I sew, stain, paint, reflect and layer color with form. These abstract sets serve as the inspiration for my paintings and drawings."

She's currently working on a collection of blue paintings inspired by the color of the lapis lazuli stone. She and her husband are also looking for a publisher for a children's book he wrote and she illustrated titled, *The Quiet Conversation*. "It's about an elephant and a little girl, and the power of listening," she says.

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Know your numbers

work with a lot of people trying to get strong and lose weight. One of the things that I've been surprised at is many people don't weigh themselves on a daily basis. This seems to be especially true of women. Some of the reasons I've heard:

"I'll see my doctor in a couple of months." "I'll find out then." "My clothes are a lot looser." "I don't want to know; weighing myself is too traumatic."



I recommend

a good digital scale and weigh-in every day. Here's why:

Losing weight is a big picture project. You're going to experience fluctuations that depend on a host of circumstances. Gage your progress by monitoring your best average daily weight rather than worrying about a pound here or there. For example:


Let's say your goal is 130 lbs. and you weigh 150 lbs. Each morning, after a shower and before breakfast or coffee, weigh yourself. This is your Starting Weight, say in this case, 147.

Then weigh yourself at night; that's your Finish Weight; we'll call that 152, You have a 5-lbs. difference. Seeing what you weigh at the start of the day then after a day of intake and activity will help you adjust those factors so the range will start to decrease as your bottom and top numbers drop.

Eventually your start weight will be 135 and your finish weight might be 138, (3 lbs. range) because you've been doing a better job of monitoring your daily factors. Your goal is in sight.

Paying attention to those ranges is a better strategy to chart your true progress and take the stress and guilt out of "gaining a pound" when you were trying to "lose a pound."

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Let Nature Help Decorate for the Holidays

efore you head out to a store to buy holiday decorations, arm yourself with a little imagination and do some shopping in the garden first. Search your yard for potential clippings, particularly evergreen clippings and whole evergreen branches. Add some holly berries and pinecones to make easy and inexpensive displays.

One smart tip is to gather your clippings on a mild day in November. Place the cuttings, with a little sprinkle of water, in a large plastic bag to keep them fresh. Store the bag in the garage or a protected spot outdoors until you are ready to decorate.

Grosse Pointe resident Mary Ann Bury, owner of Deck The Halls, suggests using these items to enhance store-bought flowers: sprigs of hemlock, pine and holly. These three offer fullness to the bouquet, as well as holiday fragrance.

Evergreens can be gathered as a swag, tied with a festive bow and hung on a door or staircase banister. Another charming idea is to tie the swag on a rustic sled to be placed near an outside door or a neglected corner of a room.

The same greenery can be used in pots by the front door. Leave three-quarters of the potting soil in the planter and fill the top quarter with wet floral foam. Stick evergreens of different textures and colors into the foam, making sure some spill over the side of the planter. Tuck in some berries, pinecones and holiday ornaments to add interest. Insert any thin branches, such as curly willow or red dogwood, into the middle to add height.

If a live Christmas tree is purchased and some bottom branches need to be removed to allow for placement in the tree stand, these branches can also be used in the same manner, Bury adds.

read pudding is a dish that has been around for centuries. People didn't like to waste food, especially bread. So many dishes were invented by using stale bread. Once known as the "poor man's" pudding, bread pudding was popular with the lower class but has now gained a reputation as a popular comfort food.

Bread pudding may have originated out of food waste prevention, but it has evolved from simple leftover ingredients to luxurious ones such as gruyere cheese and bourbon. The best part about bread pudding is that with a basic recipe, anything is possible. Add ingredients

from the cupboard such as cereal, nuts, dried fruit or ice cream sauces.

Bread pudding is a nice dish to eat as we gather with our friends and family this Thanksgiving and Christmas season. Enjoy!

White Chocolate Bread Pudding *Serves 6*

Ingredients

- 6 egg yolks
- 1.5 cups sugar
- 4 cups cream

1 loaf of stale bread (if you don't have stale bread, cut bread into medium diced pieces and let dry overnight)
8 oz. white chocolate

Directions

- 1. Heat the cream to a boil
- 2. While cream is heating, in a separate bowl, whisk egg yolks and sugar together
- 3. When cream begins boiling, mix in the egg and sugar mixture until fully incorporated
- 4. Return to stove on low heat and whisk in white chocolate until all ingredients are mixed
- 5. Place in refrigerator
- 6. Preheat oven to 350 F
- 7. Once the custard is cool, toss the custard with dried bread, allowing it to fully hydrate the bread

- 8. Spray muffin tin with cooking spray and pack the tins with mixture
- 9. Bake in oven for 15 minutes
- 10. Rotate pan and bake for additional 15 minutes. Serve hot

Caramel Sauce

Ingredients 1/2 cup water



- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups cream
- ${\bf 1}$ peach diced in small pieces

Directions

- 1. Combine sugar and water in pot and heat. Sugar will melt and turn an amber color
- 2. Remove from heat and whisk in cream
- 3. Mix in peaches
- 4. Spoon over bread pudding and serve

Use caution while making sugar mixture and sauce. Can cause burns.





Guardianship

f you have minor children, one of the most important estate planning decisions is choosing a guardian in the event that the parents become deceased.





41ST ANNUAL GROSSE POINTE Santa Claus Parade



anta Claus is making his 41st visit to Grosse Pointe on the Friday after Thanksgiving to participate in the annual Grosse Pointe Santa Claus Parade! The event, says Grosse Pointe Chamber of Commerce President Jennifer Boettcher, got its start back in 1975 and was the brainchild of Beverly Leinwebber, who was president of the Grosse Pointe Village Association.

"Beverly's idea was to come up with an event that would kick off the holiday shopping season," Boettcher says. "The parade was a success from the very beginning. In fact, it got so successful that after a few years the Village Association hired a parade director to run the event."

Over the years there have been a couple of parade directors. This will be the fourth year that the Chamber of Commerce is at the helm.

"The Chamber decided to put on the parade after we heard that the association was looking for another organization to take over," Boettcher says. "This is a good fit for us and it helps promote the businesses of our members."

The original parade route started on Fisher Road, went to Kercheval and ended in the Village, Boettcher says. But since then the route has been modified to include the Hill.

"It's a good idea to tie the two shopping districts

together," Boettcher says. "I have to say that putting on the parade is a lot of work. It is funded by the Grosse Pointe Chamber Foundation. It's a 501(c)3 charitable organization, so contributions are tax deductible."

Boettcher says that while the Chamber runs the event, it's the volunteers who really put in the work that makes the parade possible. And they just don't work in November. We need help all year long to make the parade happen.

This year, there will be more than 40 floats and the theme is "Jingle Bells." The bands come from local schools, including some outside Grosse Pointe.

"Our business sponsors make floats," Boettcher says. "For example, Dr. Mary Sue Stonisch, who runs Faircourt Dental has a float called 'Big Smile' and there are people who are marching toothbrushes walking along the float."

Boettcher says that the local public safety departments also have people on hand who make the parade possible. They deserve the Chamber's thanks.

"They help set up the parade route and make the event safe," Boettcher says. "Sometimes people will forget there's a parade on Friday and try to cross Kercheval in their cars while the parade is going on. It's good to have public safety on hand for things like that."

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



Designated caregiver

n July, the state legislature passed a law to make hospital discharges easier for patients and their families. Called the Designated Caregiver Act, the law

mandates that the hospital provide easy-to-understand discharge information to a caregiver designated by the patient. "As soon as



patient's discharge, the hospital must attempt to consult with the lay caregiver to prepare the caregiver for the patient's postdischarge needs," according to the law firm Dykema.

While the law speaks to the role of family caregivers, the patient may designate a home care agency to provide post-discharge care and receive detailed instruction from the hospital.

Divine design graces St. Paul's new entrance

o commemorate its 135th anniversary, St. Paul On The Lake Catholic Church Altar Society commissioned Grosse Pointe Park resident Ann Baxter to create a stained glass window for the entrance to the church's gathering space.

Early in the design process, the group knew they made the right decision to hire Baxter.

"It was fascinating to watch her creative process," says Sue Davies, altar society president. "It's amazing that she didn't use a computer. She drew it completely by hand."

The altar society and Baxter knew they wanted to keep the message of the "Welcome Home" banner that Monsignor Patrick Halfpenny had placed in the entrance's original window a few years ago.

"I didn't want to obscure that message," Baxter says. "If the window's design was too simple, people would ignore it. If it was too busy, people would ignore it."





Baxter also wanted to make sure the new window would fit architecturally into the existing space.

"I wanted it to look likes it has always been there," she says.

During a visit to the church, the windows in the nave caught Baxter's attention.

"I saw these windows with a stunning color combination of amber, turquoise and pink. It had these beautiful flowers and scrolls, in addition to a bow which was a big part of it," Baxter says. "I knew I wanted to bring those elements into the new window."

Despite a few hiccups in procuring the materials, Baxter completed the project in time for the society's anniversary celebration held on September 15. After the Mass, the window was revealed to the monsignor for the first time. He immediately blessed it and Baxter who was touched by his gesture.

"The window is lovely, warm and inviting," Halfpenny says. "It sets just the right tone for anyone who might be coming for the first time, or after a time away."

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Spay or neuter your pet?

id you know that over six years, one unspayed female dog can lead to 67,000 puppies? In that same time, one female cat can lead to over

400,000 kittens! But overpopulation is only one reason that veterinarians encourage routine spaying and neutering of dogs and cats — there are many important health benefits as well.



Unspayed female dogs and cats are at a risk of about 1 in 4 of developing mammary tumors (breast cancer) during their lifetime. Spaying a dog before her first heat cycle (usually between 6-12 months of age) reduces the risk of these tumors to less than 1 percent. In cats, spaying reduces the risk of mammary tumors by 40-60 percent, and if done before 6 months of age, it reduces the risk of tumor development by 7 times. Both dogs and cats are also at risk of developing a very serious life-threatening infection called pyometra if they are not spayed. In this condition, the uterus fills with pus and can rupture causing a severe bacterial infection to spread throughout the body.

Unneutered male dogs and cats are at risk of testicular cancer, prostate issues, and behavioral issues such as aggression and inappropriate urination. This is in addition to the much higher likelihood of running away in search of finding a mate.

Be sure to talk to your veterinarian about the benefits of spaying and neutering to determine if it is the right decision for your pet.
