Cain was a native Detroiter educated in Detroit Public Schools who went on to become a newspaper writer, public relations executive and a columnist. She also enjoyed tutoring children in the Detroit Public Schools.

Among her many awards, she was honored posthumously with the Detroit Public Relations Society of America Hall of Fame Award in 2014 for significant contribution to her profession and the community.

She was married to the late Charles C. Cain, who worked at the Associated Press. The couple had seven children, several of whom followed their parents into the field of ournalism.

Cain enjoyed telling the story of Fleurette first to her children and then to her six grandchildren.

The Conservancy invited her to share a manuscript of the story during an R3 session in 2011. Cain died three months later, but her daughters, Carol Cain and Nancy Cain, return to the riverfront regularly to read the story during R3.

## Money down the drain

e all know that water bills in our area can be somewhat pricey and even

more so if you aren't keeping up with them when they

are due.

There are certain things that you can do to keep this expense at bay and not having you pay more than is necessary.



Whether you


are an owner paying for your tenants or if you are a tenant paying your own water, paying them on time is key. The amount in late payments can be avoided if, like any other utility bill, it is received by the city before the due date. Late payments are large and a percentage of the entire bill if the amount owed is growing and growing the late payment is also growing and growing.

Make your water bill a priority and get it to a zero balance as soon as possible to avoid costly fees. If your water is not paid, one of two things can happen depending on which Grosse Pointe you reside in.

The first is having your water shut off, with you having to pay the past due balance and a reconnect fee before you see water flowing again. The second is having it roll onto your property taxes with another fee added, a large fee.

If you are an owner of properties and your tenants are responsible for their own water, watch the balance online or by following up with your city. If you are a tenant responsible for the water usage at your home, keep up with it, late fees are never fun.




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### ANNUAL HOLIDAY PARTY FOR FOOTBALL AND SMILES

## The basics on Hepatitis A

epatitis A is a highly contagious liver infection caused by the hepatitis A virus (HAV). HAV is one of several viruses that causes inflammation and affects your liver's ability to function.

HAV is common wherever sanitation

is poor. You're most likely to get hepatitis A from contaminated food or water or from close contact with a person or object that's infected. Unlike other hepatitis viruses, HAV does not



cause long-term liver damage, and it doesn't become chronic.

Vaccinations provide safe and effective protection for people most at risk, including travelers, those at child care centers, drug users and those potentially exposed to infected blood or bodily fluids.


Good hygiene, especially hand washing, prevents new infections by removing contaminants. Hand washing also prevents the infected from spreading the virus to others.

Most people infected with HAV have mild symptoms and don't require treatment. Symptoms occur two or more weeks after infection and can resemble influenza, e.g., low-grade fever, fatigue, vomiting and diarrhea. In addition, HAV can cause dark urine, liver pain, clay-colored stools and intense itching. Recovery is not fast; symptoms last a few weeks. Severe cases require liver transplants.

Fortunately, if exposure is suspected, your doctor can give you injections of antibodies against the virus and/or the HAV vaccine itself. Even better is that most infected people recover completely, and are immune for life.

says, "you just can't bear to get rid of?" Try hanging them all together on a small tree, perhaps in the kitchen, for a whimsical touch.


Bury stars in a number of videos on safe holiday

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





### Year-end gifting

s 2017 comes to a close, many of us consider gifting to children, grandchildren and charities. The IRS rules on gifting

often cause confusion. Here is some basic information for you.

Each taxpayer is entitled to give away up to \$14,000 per year to as many individuals as



desired. Married couples may double that amount to \$28,000. This is called the annual exclusion.

In addition, the federal gift and estate tax are combined so that, under current law, an individual may give away \$5.49 million (\$11.98 million for a married couple), tax free, either during lifetime or at death. This is called the lifetime gift exclusion. Annual exclusion gifts do not count toward the lifetime gift exclusion.

If you want to make gifts and not have to bother keeping track of them for tax purposes, you may make gifts for medical, dental and tuition expenses for relatives and friends, if you pay the provider directly.

For those who have reached age 70 ½ and are required to make distributions from their Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA), they may make a distribution from their IRA directly to a charity, thus avoiding the income taxation on the IRA distribution.

These are called Qualified Charitable Distributions. These deductions are now permanent in the IRS code. Prior to 2016, Congress renewed the direct contributions annually.

As always, it is smart to check with your CPA or estate planning attorney before making gifts. Happy Holidays to all.

ike a lot of budget-conscious parents, Conrad Koski starts his Christmas shopping for the next year shortly after Santa parks his sleigh back at the North Pole following his annual midnight around-the-globe excursion.

But Koski's motivation is not just to hit the after-holiday sales racks. When you're in the market for more than 270,650 different items to fill some 33,000 packages for the kids on a \$1.1 million gift list, it's best to get a jump on the season as



early as possible.

"Actually, this is a year-round job," says Koski, 71, a Grosse Pointe Farms resident and long-time purchasing and distribution director for the Old Newsboys' Goodfellow Fund of Detroit. "We wish it was otherwise, but we know the need is going to be there, so we buy our warm clothing, books, dolls, toys and other gift items months in advance."

For Koski and his wife Loraine, who helps out when she can, toiling for the 103-year-old Detroit Goodfellows is a labor of love whose origin dates back to Koski's childhood.

"I was eight years old when my dad and another Detroit police officer died in an auto accident on a hunting trip over Thanksgiving," Conrad recalls. "Mom was left with four kids to raise. That Christmas was going to be really tough but a Detroit police officer came to the house and gave us some plain brown boxes full of clothing and gifts.

"I never forgot that visit. I joined the Goodfellows to give something back."

Over the years, those plain brown boxes have been replaced by 33,000 decorative containers holding new clothing, an assortment of age-themed books, hats, scarves, toys, dolls, trinkets and even candy. But the Goodfellows aren't just for Christmas anymore.

While Koski, the retired former CEO of First of Michigan



variety of urban summer camps.

Unlike many charities, the Detroit Goodfellows limit their annual fundraising efforts to a few short weeks each year at holiday time. Their traditional newspaper Sales Day is always the Monday after Thanksgiving. In addition, members send appeal letters to friends and relatives.

"We set a goal, we meet it and we give the donors a break until the next year," Koski explains.


As for this year, the purchasing is finished, the boxes are

- Allergies

- · Social security number
- Date of birth
- Durable power of attorney a legal document that provides authority to named individual(s) to handle financial and legal matters if an elderly family member becomes incapacitated
- Healthcare proxy a legal document that gives authority to a designated person to make medical decisions
- Advanced directives (resuscitate) orders) — this is critical in an emergency, so that your loved ones' wishes will be carried out as directed.
- Religious preferences



### Bacon wrapped water chestnuts

uring the holidays, I enjoy cooking for my family and friends. Over the years I have learned a few tricks so that I can spend more time with them than in the kitchen! Luckily, many easy recipes don't require a lot of time.

The classic bacon wrapped water chestnut recipe is one that can be prepared a day or two before serving. The ingredients are simple and there is not much preparation required. These are also great to have on hand for a party dish to pass around. Be prepared to double or triple the recipe because through the

years, my Christmas Eve guests have proven it's impossible to eat just one!

### Bacon Wrapped Water Chestnuts Serves 6

Ingredients

- 2 (8 oz.) cans of water chestnuts, drained
- 1 lb. bacon
- 1 cup ketchup
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- **2 tsp.** Sriracha (optional) Wooden toothpicks

#### Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees
- 2. Place toothpicks in a dish and cover them in cool water for a few minutes
- 3. On clean, dry surface, cut bacon pieces into even thirds. Wrap each water chestnut in a bacon third and secure the bacon by stabbing a toothpick through whole thing. Continue until all water chestnuts are covered with bacon



- Line a large rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper. Place wrapped water chestnuts on the baking sheet and bake for 20 minutes
- 5. While chestnuts are baking, combine ketchup, brown sugar, Worcestershire sauce and Sriracha in a medium bowl and stir until well combined
- 6. When chestnuts are baked, keep oven on, remove baking sheet from

- oven and transfer chestnuts to paper towels to drain grease
- Dispose of parchment paper and use additional paper towel to wipe bacon grease out of baking sheet
- 8. Line the baking sheet with fresh piece of parchment paper
- 9. Using a pastry brush, coat each bacon wrapped water chestnut generously with sauce and place them on parchment lined baking sheet
- 10. Drizzle any remaining sauce over the lined chestnuts
- 11. Bake in oven for 15 to 20 minutes, until bacon is crispy
- 12. Serve immediately or refrigerate until serving. Before serving, reheat in 350 degree oven for 5 to 10 minutes

Chef Ethan Steiner, a 2008 graduate of De La Salle Collegiate High School, graduated from Le Cordon Bleu College of Culinary Arts with an Associates of Occupational Studies Degree in Culinary Arts and a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Culinary Management in Las Vegas.







## Insight from local novelist during National Novel Writing Month

know what you're thinking: write my novel? I don't have time for that.

Right at this moment, with your schedule, no,

Right at this moment, with your schedule, no, you probably don't. But give me a few minutes of your time and I'll tell you how it's possible in 30 days for you to be holding the first draft of your first book.

Just like you, I've played the conversational game of, "If you could do anything with your life, regardless of money, what would it be?" For me, hands down, it was always the opportunity to write fiction. I wrote tiny, one-page short stories as a child and longer ones as a teenager for our high school's creative magazine but, like you, I set it all aside when I grew up to make a living.

But the dream stayed with me like that proverbial itch and every year I grew more unhappy because I knew I just wasn't doing what I really wanted with my life.

It was obvious why it was so hard, of course. Writing is more than just telling a story, isn't it? You need some skills, experience, knowledge, connections and ideas. Plus, we all have to work. Where can we find the time?

The answer is both harder and simpler than you think.

You write. You write whenever you can. You write between laundry loads, in the morning, before bed, in the car, at the coffee shop. You set aside the time. Meaning, you pick it up, put it in a protective case and set a Rottweiler outside to guard it. It's your time. And in doing this, you write. You will place one word after another on a page, like taking step after step on a very long hike. It's rigorous but also exhilarating. You don't know where you're going but the view is amazing and keeps changing. When it's done you stand on top of the mountain, holding your first book in your hands.

That sounds nonspecific and melodramatic – which I find funny because it's how writing fiction feels a lot of the time. But I realize you're waiting for some practical advice. So, here it is:

Commit to doing National Novel Writing Month (at nanowrimo.org) this November. It's a free, organic challenge where thousands of people just like you plan to write 50,000 words in a single month. That's 30 days of approximately 1,667 words per day or 12,500 words per week. It's how I got started writing again. I was frustrated, fed up with waiting on my dream and desperate for something, anything, that

would get me going. I heard about NaNoWriMo and took the plunge. Thirty days later I reached 50,000 words and finally understood that I could, in fact, write fiction if I wanted to. NaNoWriMo is the difference between wanting and believing.

Believing is what kept me writing

in the years that followed and it's the reason my first book, a children's novel, *Queen Bee*, was published last February.

And, like you, I have plenty of other commitments these days. Chores to run, family who needs my attention, a house to maintain. It's endless. So when do I find time to write the sequel to *Queen Bee?* Never. I've been putting it off for months!

So, in desperation again, I'm trotting back to NaNoWriMo. This sequel will not be written unless I do it. So I'm doing it. And you can join me.

A couple of extra pointers if you decide to proceed:

First, clear that schedule. Do you have any appointments that can be moved to December? Move them now. Dinner plans with friends? "Sorry, something's come up." After work party? "Whoops, I have a previous engagement." Fantasy football? Take a rain check. Sunday night dinners? I see

pizza in your future.

These minor cancellations and disappointments won't matter as much as you think they will.

And here's the one you've been dying to ask me: What about Thanksgiving?

It's one day, folks. Okay, fine, it's a day and a half (half day for shopping/prep and a whole day for the holiday). So take it. Just don't stretch it to four days.

Yes, I can hear the groans all the way in the back. Look,

this might be the most important point I make to you: Books are written by saving no and then saving ves. No is for the non-essentials. Yes is for the writing. This is discipline and this is the primary barrier to your book. And I must ask you: How many wonderful four-day Thanksgiving extravaganzas have you enjoyed? Probably a lot. Don't think you can turn off the tube on Friday morning and get upstairs and write? It's a long weekend after all.

I know. Not fun. But meeting your characters is.

Visiting their worlds is too. Talking with them is even better. I'm telling you: That book is calling you. Time to pick up the phone and say yes.



# Seizures in dogs

seizure is a sudden surge of electrical activity in the brain. A seizure can be Grand Mal or Petit Mal: A Grand Mal seizure is typically very obvious with shaking and the body going rigid, while a Petit Mal seizure may go

unnoticed with only twitches and rapid eye movements. Seizures are one of the more common neurological issues in dogs, whereas seizures in cats are rare.



The most common cause of seizures in dogs is epilepsy. Other causes may be increased body temperature, low blood sugar, liver disease and brain tumors. Seizures can be very frightening for us as pet owners to witness, and while you should have your pet seen by your veterinarian as soon as possible after a seizure to determine the cause, most seizures do not warrant an emergency visit unless the event lasts more than five minutes or there is more than one seizure in a 24-hour period. Depending on the cause, treatment may not be initiated unless there is medically undesirable seizure frequency.

If you notice your dog having a seizure, do not put your hands in or near their mouth as they may unintentionally bite you. (They can't swallow their tongue!) They also may urinate or defecate unintentionally during a seizure, and while you should avoid moving them, make sure they can't fall or knock over items which could cause injury. And as always, be sure to consult with your veterinarian if you have any questions.






