

he Old Newsboys' Goodfellow Fund of Detroit is in the thick of its holiday events and initiatives. The organization has many Grosse Pointe members, John Minnis and myself among them. Each year, they do all in their power to ensure there is "no kiddie without a Christmas" in Detroit.

We were fortunate enough to receive an in-depth look into the organization when they asked us to write an Arcadia history book for their 100th anniversary in 2014. Pete Waldmeir, longtime Goodfellow, Grosse Pointer, Detroit News alum and former recipient of a Goodfellow Christmas box himself, inspired us and helped with the book. And working with Frank Brady (also a Pointer) and Henry Guthard, whose families were founding members, was an honor. With Henry, we pored over archives and film negatives at Walter P. Reuther Library, digging our hands into the soil of this group, finding at its foundation, the purest intentions, ones that remain today.

It all started with James J. Brady who saw a cartoon of a child sobbing over an empty stocking on Christmas morning, wondering what she'd done wrong. Why hadn't Santa visited? He couldn't shake the image and made it his mission in life to bring Christmas to the underprivileged in Detroit.

I'm anxious to get back to work with the Goodfellows this year. On Monday, Nov. 26, you'll find me walking in their Sales Day Parade downtown and hawking newspapers for donations, as the Old Newsboys have done since the beginning.


A couple of years ago, I hawked newspapers in Campus Martius, and I'm surprised to say, sold the most that day! That *may* have been because I sheepishly ducked out of the cold and into the lobby of an office building. Early lunch breakers passed in droves, trading their cash for my Goodfellow papers.

What makes the Fund so special is the incredibly low overhead. Every penny I collected that day went directly to helping underprivileged children. Each holiday season the Detroit Goodfellows distribute holiday gift boxes, containing clothing, toys, books, games, candy, dental kit, library card and more, to children ages four through 13 living in Detroit, Highland Park, River Rouge, Hamtramck and Harper Woods.

ew schools can claim a senator's visit. Even fewer can say they've had a senator interviewed by the high school editors the week of a Supreme Court Justice appointment.

Syeda Rizvi, editor of Grosse Pointe North's *North Pointe*, and Alyssa Czech, editor of Grosse Pointe South's *The Tower*, were given that opportunity.

"Getting to interview a senator is rewarding," says Czech. "It's helpful for my future, gaining this experience."

Michigan Senator Gary Peters flew in for the community wide luncheon hosted by Grosse Pointe Public Schools at Defer Elementary School. Members from all Grosse Pointe and Harper Woods city councils, public safety departments, media and public and private school administrations were in attendance.

The gathering's purpose is to foster unity among local organizations,

governments and schools.

"Functions like these are crucial to building a relationship between the children and adults of the community," says Rizvi. "It's important for everyone to realize that teenagers have their own perspective. They are the future of the community."

A testament to a Grosse Pointe education, the high school editors questioned the senator about everything from gun control in schools to plans to expand technological program offerings in secondary education.

Senator Peters' speech focused on the rapidly expanding technological industry and the ways in which Michigan would prepare for its growing work force. Before his talk, he described to Czech, a South senior, and Rizvi, a North junior, the "major shortfall in women and minorities" in technological positions.

"We have to ask, 'Why aren't they

seeking these jobs?"

He explained the current (and anticipated) boom in skilled trades, with a two or four year degree no longer being a requirement for many people.

"Other good paying jobs will be available for a strong, middle class life," says Peters.

He plans to promote skilled trades in secondary education, including programs that will teach counselors how to present these options to students.

Finally, he described to Czech and Rizvi his plans for training a cyber workforce and for expanding programs in STEM fields. Peters wants Michigan to be the leader in what he anticipates will be a major change to society and jobs.

"Make sure you have coding skills," he advises. "It will be part of most jobs.

"Grosse Pointe programs are right on point," he laughs. "No pun intended."

Dermotologist, Audrey Kunin, MD, who wrote the book, *The DERMAdoctor Skinstruction Manual* explains it this way.


"Working up a good sweat is like getting a mini facial," she says. "When the pores dilate, sweat expels trapped dirt and oil."

"Breaking a sweat isn't the only way exercise benefits the skin — it also reduces body wide inflammation, helps regulate skin significant hormones and prevents free radical damage. When you exercise, the tiny arteries in your skin open up, allowing more blood to reach the skin's surface and deliver nutrients that repair damage from the sun and environmental pollutants. So your skin looks younger."

The Holley Institute has served thousands of Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing people and their families over the years.

They have screened for hearing loss in over 60,000 newborns at St. John Hospital with its trained volunteers. All of these services are a result of community support.

As they move into 2019, a new initiate is on the horizon, the Family Literacy Program. With this program, the highly trained mentors visit the children's natural environments (usually their homes) and work with the family as a whole on early intervention and literacy.

On Wednesday, Dec. 5, The Holley Institute will host its annual St. Nicholas Christmas Dinner Party. Proceeds from that event will benefit the Family Literacy Program.

arming the hearts, minds and bodies of children, Operation Warm inspires hope and empowers communities by providing new winter coats to children in need across the country. Since its beginning in 1998, Operation Warm has provided this gift of warmth to more than one million children.

Closer to home in southeast Michigan, Operation Warm-Detroit finds Rotarians in the Grosse Pointes and Detroit taking charge, along with the Northeast Guidance Center, working together to fund, purchase and distribute 4,000 coats for this winter.

This very important metro area initiative dates back to 2012 through the selfless club-wide efforts of the Grosse Pointe Rotary, Grosse Pointe Sunrise Rotary, Detroit Rotary and Detroit A.M. Rotary.

The goal is to combine resources

to spike community-wide awareness to generate funds to help more atrisk children brave our harsh winter temperatures and conditions. Kids in warm winter coats are generally healthier and less likely to become ill and miss school. Operation Warm is not just about distributing coats, but giving at-risk kids a better chance to succeed. Total coats purchased and distributed over the past six-year effort in metro Detroit is 22.800.

Winter coats are purchased from a national clearinghouse at a cost of approximately \$20 each. Coats are then distributed to selected agencies and schools in the area, including Northeast Guidance Center, Crossroads of Michigan, the National School Lunch Program in Grosse Pointe and Harper Woods, Matrix Human Services, For the Seventh Generation and The Children's Center of Detroit. The Rotary clubs' Operation Warm-Detroit fund raising effort continues through the end of 2018. A donation of \$20 will buy a coat for a child and support his or her wellbeing this winter. his holiday season, Edsel & Eleanor Ford House is bringing Eleanor Ford to life as a grandmother and a hostess with Holiday Belles. For the first time, guests will have the opportunity to tour Ford House exactly as Eleanor would have decorated it for Christmas in the 1960s.

"This is an authentic recreation of the debutante receptions Eleanor hosted for her granddaughters," says Director of Visitor Experience, Sheila Ruen. "More historically accurate than any Christmas tours we've done."

They are accomplishing the feat with the help of newspaper articles, scrapbooks, family narratives and oral histories. But most useful of all are the photographs published in local newspapers.

"We are focusing on two years in the 60s," explains Director of Material Culture, Lisa Worley. "We will recreate what is in the photos."

This includes the fruit laden decorations, six-foot wreaths flanking the fireplace and spring-like floral arrangements. Ford House even plans to remove the Gallery's chandeliers and replace them with hanging Christmas trees, true to Eleanor form.

"It's a one-of-a-kind perspective into the creativity and playfulness of Eleanor," says Ruen.

The butler's pantry will be staged as if food is being prepared for transportation to the dining room — including smell!

"It's a multi-sensory approach," says Worley. Included in this multi-sensory experience are luminous digital photos displayed in wood frames. The photos, from receptions, will serve as reference points for the room's recreation.

The purpose of the debutante receptions was for high society to meet and mingle before the girls' formal debut to society. They were a gift from "Granny" to her granddaughters Josephine "Jo," Martha "Muffy," Sheila, Lynn, Eleanor "Nonnie," and Anne.

"It was Grandma's celebration of her granddaughters and a way for people to experience how the family used the house after Edsel's death," says Ruen.

Eleanor was close to floral designer Medard Lange and interior designer Polly Jessup and employed their expertise for many years.

"She collaborated closely with them for the debutante receptions as well," says Ruen. "Jessup was known for integrating art with design."

The Ford family's art collection was an important element of the home's interior design and incorporated into party decor.

On the guided tour, visitors will have the opportunity to learn about the receptions, Ford family Christmas traditions and entertaining at the estate, including lesser known family stories.

"We want this to be how Eleanor would want people to see the house today," says Worley.

The authenticity also means there will be no Winter Wonderland this year. With construction ongoing, visitors are reminded to visit the Garage, the temporary visitor center and gift shop.

Holiday Belles guided tours will take place from Nov. 23 to Jan. 6. Tickets are \$12 for adults, \$11 for seniors, \$8 for children, and free for members. Evening tours are sold in advance at fordhouse. org and daytime tours are first come, first served.







The festivities typically begin with the exchange of Christmas cards, including the traditional practice of displaying them throughout the house.

Beloved recipes from grandparents' kitchens are cooked, giving the house that wonderful aroma of days gone by.

And what would Christmas be without music? Pavarotti's Christmas, A Charlie Brown Christmas, Bing Crosby, Nat King Cole and the plethora of jazz, rock, pop, soul and classical artists singing their interpretations of Christmas fill our hearts and homes with joy.



The malady of merriment

word to the wise about a sinister malady that often rears its ugly head during times of merriment: Gout. The usual scenario is as follows: The morning after a holiday party where you overindulged, you notice your left big toe is red, hot and

swollen. It hurts so much that you can't stand the bed sheet on it, let alone wear a shoe.

You wonder was it a bug bite? Did you fall and break a toe? No; this is a "gout attack."




Gout occurs when there is too much uric acid in the body and the crystals are deposited in a joint, most commonly a big toe but can also occur in an ankle, knee or finger joint. Uric acid crystals are formed from the breakdown of purines which are found in certain foods, such as red meat (beef, lamb, pork), organ meats (liver, kidneys) and certain seafood, such as tuna, shrimp, mussels and scallops.

Sugary foods like pies, cheesecake and cookies and alcohol, especially beer and distilled spirits, are also major triggers; so is dehydration. So a traditional holiday dinner has all the makings of a gout attack.

Health problems such as hypertension, diabetes, kidney disease and obesity and certain medications, such as diuretics (water pills), also increase the risk of an attack. Gout can be treated with medication and diet changes, but prevention is key!

Eat meats in moderation, avoid or cut down alcohol and remain well hydrated to stay happy and healthy during the holidays!

The Family Center also started Play Central, where kids can go to a school gym to blow off steam in the winter. It's also a place where parents, grandparents and guardians can socialize.

"People will come up to me at an event and say, 'I'd like you to meet my daughter. We went to Play Central when she was a kid, and she's off to college, now.' It's very fulfilling," says Strickler.

Seeing people benefit from programs offerings has been incredibly rewarding to those involved.

"People tell me, 'this has really changed my life," says Walsh-Sahutske. "It's enormously gratifying to support our community and give back."

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
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
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
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ome for the holidays' is an honored tradition all over the country, but for many Pointers it's like a ceremonial custom.

Joe Choma relates to his fellow Pointe residents' enjoyment of the holidays. In fact, he relates so much that he began an event designed to bring the whole community together to celebrate.

"You kind of see the day shift into the night," he adds. "Earlier in the day you see the kids with their parents, and then later in the evening it becomes more of a party atmosphere."

Other featured performers include vouth from Grosse Pointe Music

Academy in the Hummingbirds Music Together program, leading family-friendly songs.

An average of about 3,000 people attend, Choma says, adding that the Social is open to families and visitors from beyond the Pointes.

"It's not just a Grosse Pointe event," he says. "It just happens to be in Grosse Pointe."

But for Pointes-area residents and returning visitors who enjoy being home for the holidays, the celebration can to add to their local traditions.

Adds Choma: "It's a great meeting spot for families and visiting relatives who are back in town for the holidays."







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

ith Ukrainian roots and New York training, Natalia Tarnavsky is now at home as Executive Chef of The War Memorial.

"It's a very special place, not just for Grosse Pointe residents, but for anyone who visits," she says. "It's the setting, sure, being on the lake, but also the history, the culture. It's very team-oriented here."

That team atmosphere is something The War Memorial staff prides itself on, says Vice President of Hospitality Nikki Charbonneau. Tarnavsky caught Charbonneau's eye when the chef, then catering director/chef/instructor at Dorsey Schools Culinary Academy, participated in the "Local on the Lake" fundraiser in October of 2017.

"We knew what we wanted," Charbonneau says. "Chef Natalia has a great temperament and is a teacher at heart; she's a great role model for the less experienced staff members and is big on teamwork in the kitchen."

With more than 3,000 events held at the site annually, there is no room in the War Memorial kitchen for egos or prima donnas, Tarnavsky says. The six-member kitchen team is a unique blend of eager, enthusiastic newbies and seasoned professionals with years of institutional knowledge.

"I can't be everywhere and do everything, and there's no need to with such a great team," Tarnavsky says.

Tarnavsky holds degrees from The Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, NY, and has an extensive background as a chef and general manager from Edsel and Eleanor Ford House to restaurants in the metro Detroit area. Her teaching experience includes not only six years with the Dorsey Schools but also service as a culinary arts program director and instructor to high school students.

From 2012 to 2018, Tarnavsky has medaled at every annual American Culinary Federation competition, earning a gold, four silvers and two bronzes. One of her proudest moments came this fall, when The War Memorial hosted the Michigan Chapter of the Confrérie de la Chaîne des Rôtisseurs, a group of more than 150 food and wine enthusiasts. Tarnavsky's eight-course menu received glowing accolades.


"One member said it was the best French meal she had ever eaten," Tarnavsky says. "That's incredibly rewarding."

While she keeps abreast of everchanging food trends, Tarnavsky's personal taste leans toward the traditional. She credits her mother, a retired opera singer, with "always putting something delicious on the table, with nothing out of a can." And her Ukrainian roots run deep. "I love the traditional Ukrainian dishes of my childhood," she says. "Hearty stews, pierogies, pork roasts, meat loaf. I cook how I like to eat, and I absolutely love comfort food."

"We're known for our weddings, which are nothing short of perfection," says Jessi Kaminski, Manager of Communications and Programming. 
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Answering the call:

a rare increase in ordination

hile Christopher D.
Muer was growing up in
Grosse Pointe Park, his
great uncle, Father Francis H. Burns,
periodically conducted Mass at family
gatherings, drafting youngsters as
altar servers.

"My brothers and I would fight over who would help Uncle Bud," Muer says.

The late priest was among the influences leading Muer to Detroit's Sacred Heart Major Seminary. This year Muer, 30, became associate pastor of Our Lady of the Lakes, Waterford. He was one of several Grosse Pointe natives answering the call to religious vocation.

Four local individuals were ordained recently, with another scheduled in 2019. In May, two of the three men ordained in the Archdiocese of Detroit were Grosse Pointe natives. One of the six ordained last year has local ties. Another Grosse Pointer was ordained this year in Arizona.

The ordinations followed a dry spell: No one local is believed to have been ordained in several years.

Muer attended Grosse Pointe South High School and St. Clare of Montefalco. His parents are wellknown restaurateurs. David G. Muer is host of M's Table + Bar, Partridge Creek Mall, Clinton Township. He operated Detroit's former Blue Pointe restaurant for decades. Mary Lou Muer runs the Park Café in Windmill Pointe Park.

Muer says he felt a strong vocational call while majoring in construction management at Ferris State University. He worked about a year as a construction coordinator before entering seminary.


"I'm happier now than ever," he says. "I believe I'm doing what God wants me to do with my life."

This year John A. Maksym, 57, became associate pastor of St. Joseph, Lake Orion. He spent his later childhood in Grosse Pointe Park, most often attending St. Ambrose with his parents, the late Anthony S. and Jeanne H. Maksym. He graduated from the University of Detroit Jesuit High School and Academy; the University of Michigan; Detroit College of Law; and Pope Saint John XXIII National Seminary, Weston, Mass.

Maksym says he was the longestserving judge in the history of the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps, serving 31 years in the Judge Advocate General's Corps. He left active duty as a Navy commander in 2014.

This year, Thomas E. Quirk, 46, became parochial vicar at Tucson's Our Mother of Sorrows. His duties include serving as school chaplain. Quirk grew up in Grosse Pointe Park, attended South and worshipped at St. Clare of Montefalco. His parents are Madeline M. and the late Thomas E. Quirk. He's a graduate of Butler University, Indianapolis; and Mundelein Seminary, Chicago.

Colin M. Fricke, 31, is studying at the Detroit seminary. In August, he completed an internship at St. Fabian, Farmington Hills. He's scheduled for 2019 ordination. Fricke taught at two area Catholic schools

after graduating from Siena Heights University, Adrian. He grew up in Grosse Pointe Woods, attended North and worshipped at the former parish of Our Lady Queen of Peace with his parents, Michael E. and Kathy M. Fricke.

Ordained in 2017, Grayson D. Heenan, 30, became associate pastor this year at St. Damien of Molokai, Pontiac. Growing up in Grosse Pointe Farms, he worshipped at St. Paul on the Lake with his parents, Earl "Rusty" I. and Valerie "Anne" J. Heenan. He's a graduate of University of Detroit Jesuit and Boston College.

After finishing at the Detroit seminary, he undertook five years of post-graduate studies in theology at the Vatican's Pontifical North American College.

"I had to write the papers in Italian," he says. "That was pretty challenging."

A memorable experience was a Mass Pope Francis conducted.

"I got to meet him," Heenan says.
"We shook hands and had a brief conversation."

rosse Pointe native Michael Landuyt has accomplished great things in the sport of rowing.

Landuyt excelled at rowing at Grosse Pointe South, working under coach Dick Bell, and took third place in the Lightweight 8+ in the U.S. Rowing Youth National Championships in 2013 and 2014.

After graduating from high school in 2015, he began studying aerospace engineering at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (RPI) in Troy, New York, and continued rowing. He eventually moved up to the ARION high-performance program in Saratoga Springs, New York.

Today, Michael rows with the best.



This past September, he represented the United States at the 2018 World Rowing Championships — one of the biggest honors in the sport.

Michael says being on the U.S. Rowing National Team was a reminder of how much he loves being part of a team.

"It's the process of going through something hard with a goal in mind and pushing yourself to the limit and seeing the cards fall," he says.

He also loves the teamwork aspect of rowing.

"You strive to get a rhythm with the other guys," he says. "It probably feels like in football when you get the perfect play down. It's that feeling that you're working but not putting out

effort, because it's going so smoothly."

Landuyt's father, Dave, remembers when his son was first interested in rowing.

"He came home at the end of eighth grade with a flyer from his history teacher, and it was a learn-to-row flyer," Dave says. "He loved it from the get-go. He loved the community of kids, the competition — everything about it."

Michael recalls his early days rowing as being both challenging and rewarding.

"Being physically small forced me to focus on technique, and as I trained over time and grew and put on some weight, I already had some of the technical aspects down," he says. "So now, I have a larger appreciation for the fitness that I currently have."

At RPI, Michael is also a Midshipman First Class in the Navy ROTC program.

"As a parent, I think I'm most proud of his determination and perseverance," Dave says. "He sets a goal and works to achieve it. He's the most dedicated and committed person I know when it comes to that, because it's not easy. He's got a full load at college that he has to balance with his degree and commitment with the Navy."

After graduating from college, Michael will be commissioned as an Ensign and begin training in the Navy's nuclear program.

"Rowing and the Navy are similar because it's a team atmosphere, but it's also kind of competitive," Michael says. Balsamic Vinegar Dressing Ingredients

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


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
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

Separation anxiety in dogs

s many as one in six dogs may suffer from some form of a condition called "separation anxiety" when they are left alone. Common symptoms may

include house soiling, destructiveness (usually around points of exit) and excessive whining, barking or howling. Symptoms are typically the worst shortly after being left, and tend to be more



extreme when left alone unexpectedly.

Management of separation anxiety is typically lifelong, but many dogs do well once the right combination of behavior modification treatments is found. Keeping a consistent routine is key most relapses occur when a routine is broken. If having someone stay at home is not an option, some dogs may benefit from attending day care. When left at home, some dogs find comfort in being confined to a room or crate, while others may be negatively triggered by these barriers and should be left out. Positive reinforcement training to acclimate your dog to being alone can also be helpful. Items such as food puzzle toys may help to distract them.

For dogs still struggling with separation anxiety despite training and other environmental modifications, various treatment options are available. Some dogs may respond well to more conservative approaches such as anxiety supplements or wearing a Thundershirt. For others, especially those at risk of harming themselves, there are many prescription medication options available. If you feel your dog has separation anxiety, be sure to discuss the various treatment options with your veterinarian.
