# Is 2019 the year for change?

n my recent edition of *Club Industry*, an online trade magazine for people in the fitness business, there was this bit of news:

For the first time in a decade, the U.S. government has updated its

physical activity guidelines — under the caveat that less than a quarter of Americans currently meet exercise standards. Under the



Under the U.S. Department

of Health and Human Services' new guidelines, adults are encouraged to participate in 150 minutes of moderate to vigorous aerobic exercise every week with at least two days of strength training. Children ages six through 17 require 60 minutes of moderate to vigorous physical activity each day.

It went on to report that only 26 percent of men, 19 percent of women and 20 percent of adolescents currently meet these recommendations.

That's pretty shocking information when you consider the number of gyms, studios and health clubs that are currently open nationwide and continue to open even right here in our community.

The benefits of training and exercise are well documented. The big question is how to get going, then maintain exercise as a lifestyle?

Exercise is mental and emotional before it's physical and always about you, your needs and wants only. Simply put; understand what you want, make a plan and go after it.

I like to tell people the stories behind paintings. I could talk about Diego Rivera and details about his frescos for hours."

Garvey is able to walk and talk visitors through nearly every gallery in the museum. Her favorites include "The Wedding Dance" by Pieter Bruegel the Elder, "Officer of the Hussars" by Kehinde Wiley, "Flowers in a Glass Vase" by Rachel Ruysch and all the Dutch galleries.

Garvey started out as a gallery information volunteer about a dozen years ago, then signed on for the ninemonth training required for docents. "I really appreciated the depth of knowledge presented in the training as well as the opportunity to learn skills for conducting a museum tour." She has also worked on the Speakers' Bureau, giving talks about the DIA's collection offsite, and as a docent for special tours and tours for seniors. Currently, she conducts tours four, sometimes five days a week.

A widow with two grown sons, she grew up in San Diego but moved to Grosse Pointe 14 years ago. Plans for her future? She would like to go to Mexico City to see more of Rivera's work. "I admire Mexican art, Mexican people, Mexican food."

Her theater background includes some acting, but she mostly served as stage manager. "The DIA is entertainment," she says. "I'm the conduit, the stage manager." **P**

At press time the list of exhibitors for 2019 hadn't been finalized. The number

of exhibitors will, however, be higher than the previous year, with more space allocated for the show, Wendecker says. The event will include several first-time exhibitors.

"Quite a few exhibitors have grown and will have more models to show this year," she says.

The show expansion reflects the ongoing wave of growth the industry has been riding since the Great Recession. Michigan reportedly is the third-largest state in number of boat registrations, which in May stood at 905,519.

Statewide sales have risen for at least eight years straight, showing growth percentages in double digits in all but one year. The boating industry's statewide economic impact recently was estimated at \$7.4 billion, the association reports.

The show will include a variety of entertainment and educational offerings, including the popular Kid Zone on the two weekends. A new highlight will be a live shark tank.

"The host of the show gets in with the sharks," Wendecker says. "It's very educational."

## PONTE | Great Lakes Log Grosse Pointe Sail Club turns 70

ike so many other things in this world, the birth of Grosse Pointe Sail Club was, at the time, an inauspicious event. Twelve sailors — all men — gathered in the shade of a huge elm

tree in Windmill Pointe Park and created a club. It was as simple as that. The date was



Sept. 12, 1948, now more than 70 years ago. The club celebrated with a 70th anniversary gala at Tompkins Center in Windmill Pointe Park, near the spot

where it all began.

The first order of business in 1948 was to elect directors and officers. All but one of the original officers and directors were men. The exception — rare in those days — was Antoinette "Toni" Ebner (later Antoinette King by marriage). She served on the board for the first two years of the new club's existence and was its secretary in 1950-51. King passed away at the age of 93, less than a month before GPSC's 70th anniversary.

GPSC launched its Tuesday Evening Sundown Series in 1961. The series is believed to be the longest running open sailing competition on Lake St. Clair. The Tuesday races are popular among both local sailors and the dozens of spectators who enjoy an excellent view of the weekly starts and finishes from the main pier at Windmill Pointe Park.

Commodore Mike Sherwood said the club has made good use of social media in recent years (unheard of in 1948 by those 12 men under that elm tree) to promote its sailing programs and to attract new members. The club has over 200 members as it begins its 71st year, and Commodore Sherwood credits social media for the addition of 20 of those in 2018 alone.

ervices for Older Citizens, a non-profit, served the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods for 40 years. Now, The Helm At the Boll Life Center, will take the wheel for the next 40.

It's the same organization, which in October, announced it would change names.

"We're looking forward to the future," says executive director Peggy Hayes. "We want to continue being a viable service to the community."

The Helm offers hundreds of programs, as well as entertainment and fun activities for seniors. The organization provides thousands of hot meals and friendly visits to homebound seniors, as well as health screenings, rides to medical appointments, help with navigating Medicaid and Medicare, and much more.

of themselves as seniors. Some think, 'I'm a senior, but I'm still active.'"

In an effort to continue offering programs to serve the needs of the community, The Helm will hold an open house Jan. 26, from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. "There will be demonstrations on what we offer. We want to hear from the people. We want to get feedback. There'll be ping pong tables and refreshments. It should be a fun afternoon."

The Open House will give people a peek behind the doors of the beautiful building at 158 Ridge Road to see what really goes on here! Many people will recognize the building as the former Cottage Hospital Nurses' dormitory, originally opened in 1930.

Approximately seven years ago, recognizing that the organization needed a larger and more suitable facility, Henry Ford Cottage Hospital offered to rent the building to Services for Older Citizens for a nominal fee.

However, prior to moving into the building (which occurred in 2013), the organization had to undertake a capital campaign to raise funds to retrofit the aging building to make it suitable to house a senior service program. Literally hundreds of generous community residents, banded together and successfully raised the \$2.2 million it took to cover the renovations.

A critical donation by John A. and Marlene L. Boll helped move the campaign forward, hence the full name of The Helm: The Helm at the Boll Life Center. This significant renovation turned The Helm into a bright, busy gathering place for seniors in our community.

"Everyone who comes here, loves it," says Hayes. "It's a great place to meet friends. There's always something going on. People can eat together and socialize. It's just an important resource in the community."

# Gotten your flu shot yet?

e are full into a new year, so why am I talking about getting a flu shot?! Because it is *that* important! Flu activity can occur year-round, and vaccinations can be given well into spring.

Many people are still on the fence

about getting a flu shot. Some believe the vaccine makes them sick; others feel that the vaccine is not effective. Still other people just don't think that they will get sick,



either because they are healthy, have never gotten the flu or have gotten it and survived.

The flu shot is a killed virus vaccine, which means it cannot cause the flu. However, the body's reaction to the vaccine is sometimes apparent in mild "flu-like" symptoms a few days after the injection. This just means your immune system is making antibodies the "soldiers" in the body that fight the live virus.

The vaccine's efficacy in any year is never perfect, but if something will give you even a 40 percent chance of survival compared to zero, it's probably worth it.

Finally, if you don't get the vaccine for yourself, get it for people you love. Do you have young kids in the family, or someone with asthma or diabetes? Your vaccination means you are less likely to transmit a virus to them and help prevent them from getting the flu even if they did not or cannot get the vaccine themselves.

Celebrating Yamasaki, alternative homes, public art and sustainable landscapes

his year "Your Old Mansion," an annual lecture series sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Artists Association (GPAA), brings together community change agents.

Four lectures will be held Sunday afternoons at 2 p.m. at The War Memorial, opening Sunday, Feb. 3, with a panel on the powers of public art. Leading the discussion will be blogger Tom Leeper and muralist Nicole Macdonald.

Leeper, who bikes around Detroit photographing public art, has reported on more than 5,000 murals, sculptures and pieces of graffiti in his prizewinning blog, everylinearmile.com. Macdonald is a Kresge Detroit Arts Fellow, a collaborator on the DIA's mural projects in the suburbs and creator of the first mural for GPAA's AlterCrossing public art project.

On Sunday, March 3, Lawrence Technological University Professor Dale Gyure will lead a discussion on Minoru Yamasaki, the architect who did for office buildings what Albert Kahn did for factories. Yale Press heralds Gyure's recent book on the architect as the "first to reevaluate the evocative and polarizing midcentury architect." Joining Gyure will be architectural photographer Jim Haefner and others who have been involved in recording and restoring Yamasaki's work.

It will be all about water when a panel of experts discusses sustainable landscapes on Sunday, April 7. Patrick Judd has the inside details on drainage plans for the much-anticipated Oudolf garden planned for Belle Isle. Professional landscaper Stephen Hansen will share his experiences harvesting rain water, and retired grounds manager at Grosse Pointe Farms Pier Park Rodney Girolami will list the pros and cons of a rain garden. The moderator will be James Ridgway, who is involved in water runoff planning for the Jefferson-Chalmers neighborhood.

Finding new ways to solve housing needs will be the topic for the final lecture on Sunday, April 28. Among the panelists will be the Rev. Faith Fowler of Cass Community Social Services and Leslie Horn, founder and CEO of ThreeSquared Inc. Fowler started a Tiny Homes neighborhood in Detroit to provide housing for the homeless and others who find homeownership out of reach. Horn's company fabricated the largest container apartment complex in the country. Quinn Evans architect Angela Wyrembelski who designed a tiny home will join them.

The finale of the series will be a tour of the one-of-a-kind home of artists Kurt Kastner and Monika Essen just a few blocks away from The War Memorial. Only series ticket holders will be invited on the tour that will follow the April 28 lecture.

Series tickets for four lectures and the house tour are \$80 for GPAA members and \$100 for non-GPAA members. Tickets for individual lectures are \$20 each for GPAA members and \$25 for non-members.

A boy in school uniform alights my mind's eye. I can almost feel Mom's kiss on my forehead, Almost see Mom waving until the road curved right. Come afternoon, you stood in this very same spot, As if you never left my sight. This was my happy corner, the school bus stop.

School taught me subjects: Mom taught me life. Our rough road through poverty smoothed With hard study, honest work, good deeds, a degree. Mother's pride beamed as you took my arm whose hand Held the diploma: graduate MD. Corner to corner, I followed her direction.

A good human being; a different day not so long ago. After Mom left this world, a cocaine sewer sucked me in, Swallowed me whole. What remains is a shell without soul. Heart broken in heaven, can you take me now? My last request, don't disavow. This is my dark corner: how long must I wait?

t's always funny to me when I speak to rental owners from warmer climates and they do not understand our seasons and what I mean when I tell them.

"We are in winter pricing."

I will never live anywhere but Michigan. I will take the cold winter months in exchange for the unbelievable spring and



summer months, and I will take the slower seasonal rental months in exchange for the exciting real estate rebirth we experience vearly.

Depending on which side of the table you are on, winter can be daunting to an owner with a vacancy or an amazing opportunity for a tenant to secure a rental home for a lower lease rate and save hundreds or thousands of dollars throughout the year.

Inventory on rental units is generally higher in the summer, but we still have a lot of available properties in the winter; we just have less potential people looking to rent.

It is easy to assume that wanting to hang holiday decorations or not moving in three feet of snow are great deterrents for a tenant to move in the winter.

For owners with a winter vacancy. ### Gyro Sandwich with Tzatziki Sauce *serves 4*

Gyro meat Ingredients 1 lb. ground lamb 2 tsp. kosher salt ½ tsp. ground pepper 2 tbs. fresh oregano 1 small yellow onion, cut into small chunks 1 garlic clove, sliced 5 slices bacon cut into ½-inch pieces

### Directions

- 1. In a bowl, combine ground lamb, oregano leaves, salt and pepper, mixing until all seasonings have been evenly distributed. Cover and refrigerate for one hour or overnight
- 2. Preheat oven to 300F. Place lamb mixture in a food processor and add bacon, onion and garlic. Process for 30 to 60 seconds, until mixture becomes a smooth puree
- 3. Line a rimmed baking sheet with aluminum foil. Shape the lamb mixture into a rectangle about 8 inches long and 5 inches wide. Bake 30 to 35 minutes, or until loaf reaches 155F. Remove from oven and allow lamb to rest 15 minutes
- 4. Adjust the oven rack to the top of oven, just below the broiler and preheat the broiler

ear to Grosse Pointe South High School and only one block north of Lake St. Clair, 43 McKinley Place is one of the most recognizable homes in Grosse Pointe Farms. Built in 1905 by famed Detroit architects Chittenden & Kotting (Detroit Boat Club, The Bingley Fales House), this three-story classic English Tudor boasts 8,500 square feet of sheer luxury.

Sadly, it hasn't always been that way. In recent years, the house had sat empty and neglected, with multiple signs of disrepair as a result. Ivy had run amok, not only obscuring the home's windows but growing into their panes. A prior "quick fix" of the slate roof had caused water damage to the home's original plaster and lathe walls. The once-spectacular harlequin marble floor in the foyer had not been cleaned or polished in years, its intended magnificence obscured by dirt and grime.

The home's current owner, investor Brent Gatecliff, saw through the flaws By Jane Nordberg

and was struck by the home's unique features.

"I was really taken by the architecture of the house," Gatecliff says, noting its two-story bay window



and asymmetrical design, framed by limestone accents. "My main goal was to stop it from deteriorating and restore it with modern features in the style the architects intended."

Gatecliff enlisted the help of Connell Building Company, specialists in the restoration of historic homes. Despite the structure's numerous challenges, Dan Connell says he had a clear and immediate vision of what was needed to get the home market-ready.

"We had to do some major upgrades, not only to bring it up to code but also to provide the conveniences a modern family needs for how we live today," Connell says. An existing smaller bedroom near the master suite was transformed into a spacious closet, while the three other bedrooms received ensuite baths. Multiple walls were removed to expand the kitchen, where interior designer Elisabeth Meda aided Pointe Kitchen and Bath with the custom raised-panel cabinetry.

That said, Connell endeavored to keep as much of the home's original


features intact. "We saved everything we could that was architecturally significant," he says. Detroit Woodworking painstakingly recreated spindles and carved stair caps missing from the main staircase, refurbished the handrails and risers and even handdipped the brass fixtures. Original crown molding remains throughout the home and the massive wooden front



door was elevated to its rightful place as a breathtaking gateway to the nowluminescent marble floor foyer.

The overhaul hasn't been limited to the home's aesthetics; many improvements were made behind the scenes. The plumbing and electrical systems have been modernized, 127 new Pella windows installed, and the battered slate roof received \$120,000 in repairs.

"Some of the biggest-ticket items in the renovation were things an owner wouldn't notice right away, but will certainly appreciate over time," Gatecliff says. "Advancements that were necessary to keep the house structurally sound decades into the future."

Built as a carriage house, the adjacent three-car garage houses another potential living space. That structure, also, received new windows and roof repairs, and was cleared to provide a blank slate for use as a studio, gym or mother-in-law apartment.

The renovation complete, Connell says the massive undertaking was a labor of love. "Any time you take on a historic renovation, you come into it with a vision for how you will retain the structure's history while providing







present-day comforts," he says. "It's been my passion for 20 years, and I feel it's a great way to make a living."

Now restored to its former glory with the addition of modern conveniences, 43 McKinley Place is ready for its next owner to provide the loving touches deserving of this grand landmark. For a tour of this showstopper, call Brent Gatecliff at (248) 219-3051.

### Marijuana and pets

ith the recent legalization of marijuana in Michigan and other states, the number of reported marijuana toxicities in pets has quadrupled.

Symptoms of toxicity include sedation/lethargy, dilated pupils, difficulty walking, agitation, dribbling urine, tremors and even seizures. Fortunately, toxicity is rarely fatal in dogs and cats; however, with the newer medical-grade, synthetic and high-potency edibles now available, this may not continue to be the case.

Symptoms usually begin five minutes to 12 hours post-exposure and can last several days. In-home test kits are unreliable in pets, so veterinarians typically have to rely on the history the caretaker provides.

Since there is no specific antidote for marijuana toxicity, supportive care, such as maintaining hydration and body temperature, are the mainstays of treatment.

There are many studies underway evaluating the medicinal benefits of these products in our companion animals, but because marijuana is still illegal at the federal level it cannot be prescribed by veterinarians.

This also applies to CBD cannabidiol — products. Even though CBD products are theoretically void of THC (the toxic, psychotropic chemical) there has been varying levels of THC found in many of these products.

Because of this variability, pet owners should be aware of potential toxicity if they choose to use any of these products on their own.

## AUTO SHOW

In January, the eyes of the automotive world will once again be turned toward Detroit's Cobo Center, the site of the 30th annual show.

"There will be 750 cars on the show floor, 1,800 semis hauling equipment and 5,100 journalists from more than 60 countries," says Bill Golling, NAIAS chairman.

The January show will be the last one in the winter. For 2020, NAIAS leaders are making a bold move, taking the event to June. Golling envisions visitors possibly driving the cars on the Cobo roof, and/or, along the riverfront, and elsewhere. "It gives them the chance to experience them firsthand."

Moving the show to June also cuts costs for exhibitors. By not having to work around the Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years holidays, labor costs will be reduced. The show will also have a three-week move-in timeframe, instead of the usual eight. This will simplify some of the exhibits, further lowering costs for automakers.

The January show has a jam-packed schedule. "It's basically, six shows in one," Golling says. It all starts Saturday, Jan. 12 with the gallery at MGM Grand, featuring the exotic cars. Monday and Tuesday, Jan. 14 and 15 is the press preview. Monday through Thursday is AutoMobili-D. Wednesday and Thursday is the industry preview. Friday, Jan. 18, is the Charity Preview. Saturday, Jan. 19 through Jan. 27, the show opens to the public.
