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

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

he Grosse Pointe Yacht

fitness director.


"We have 20 to 25 people in here on weekdays," he says. "Saturday mornings are busy. The parent crowd comes on weekday mornings after dropping the kids off at school. Around 3:30 the high schoolers are here. Later, the working crowd." Child care is provided from 3:30 to 7 p.m.

The 1,000 square foot facility is open from 5 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days a week. "Most of what I do is personal

training," Wendzinski says. "But some people come here and just want to learn how to use the machines, then spend a half hour or so by themselves."

"I am delighted with the fitness center," says member Carol Klenow. "It's a great facility for members who want a convenient and friendly place to work out regardless of their fitness level."

The center was carved out of formerly wasted space above the existing locker rooms. It boasts eight exercise machines, all top-of-the-line, according to Wendzinski. Five have screens with Internet access. The room has three treadmills, a rower, ellipticals, a cable machine, leg curl machine, a Lat/Mid-Row machine and two Pelotons, plus

Wendzinski grew up in Grosse Pointe Park and went to Grosse Pointe South High School.

"I spent 10 years in the automotive marketing world," he says, "before I found my true passion: health and wellness." He earned a certificate for personal training from the National Academy of Sports Medicine, plus certification for several other exercise specialties. He is also a golf trainer.

"I see about 100 to 150 people here every week," he says. "Baby boomers are getting older and want to stay in shape. Lots of seniors want to stay active and healthy."

"The Fitness Center is a tremendous addition to the club and has up-to-date and comprehensive equipment," says member Dr. Norman Silverman, 73. "It's expertly managed and provides professional and enjoyable fitness training for all levels."

in a new way

eta Chrisman was destined to be part of Grosse Pointe Theatre. After all, her parents met at the theater company years ago and performed in its shows when she was a little girl.

Now, Chrisman is a major part of Grosse Pointe Theatre, doing everything from directing to stage managing to set design.

She directed their recent production of Camelot and is back to direct *Little Shop of Horrors* this spring.

Directing *Little Shop* — the famed horror comedy rock musical based on the film about a singing, flesh-eating plant — is something Chrisman has wanted to do for a long time.

"I'm a big fan of strong female roles, because a lot of shows — older shows, especially - are very male-dominated," she says. "This show has great roles for women and men. Also, it's very rock 'n' roll and Motown in the way the music was written."

"It's just a fun show. There's a singing alien plant!" she laughs. "There's a lot of fun stuff, but also a lot of heavier stuff, which we will explore."

Even if you've seen *Little Shop* before, Chrisman says Grosse Pointe Theatre's production will bring lots of newness.

"Our plant is being voiced by a woman, and usually, it's voiced by a man," says Chrisman, whose assistant director is Olyvia Brown on the production. "We opened up the Plant to whoever could sing it, and we found this person, Betsy (King), who blew our socks off. She walked in, and we said, 'Who is this and where did she come from?"

This particular production, Chrisman says, will incorporate Motown "because the music stands up and says, 'This is what I need."

> When it comes to the serious side of Little Shop, Grosse Pointe Theatre won't shy away. The show has a domestic violence component between the character of Audrey (Austin Sulkey) and her

abusive boyfriend, dentist Orin Scrivello (Zach Coates).

"A lot of times, it's portrayed as cartoon-ish and glossed over because it's a sensitive subject," Chrisman says. "We decided to take it more seriously. We're even reaching out to partner with a local organization, because we want to shed light on it. We're working to make it more realistic and less cartoon-ish, which is uncomfortable and fantastic. It's something we all take seriously, and it's a fun show, but this is how we feel that material should be treated."

Chrisman is excited to share this production with the world.

"I'm excited to give this caliber of a production to the audience," she says. "It's going to be so great to be able to share it with people. You put in all this work and I love that on opening night, you get to say, 'Here you go! Enjoy this!' That's my favorite thing."



It was important to us to preserve the landscape they painted," explains Mary Alice. "We love working and entertaining outside, and have a great















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






space to do that."

Ford House Grounds Restoration Turns Back the Clock

magine looking across the grounds at Ford House, the historic estate of Edsel and Eleanor Ford, and seeing the same views, right down to the trees, shrubs and flowering plants, the Ford family saw when they moved in almost 100 years ago.

"The estate's largest, most extensive restoration project will bring it back to a historically accurate state," says Ford House president and CEO Mark Heppner. "What you see today is not necessarily what was intended by the family. Our goal is to recreate an authentic experience."

Physical work started this winter with the swimming pool and lagoon on the southeast corner of the 87-acre estate, and will conclude in summer 2021 with plantings.

Work behind the scenes has been underway since 2015. According to Ford House director of landscapes Karl Koto, "We've examined drawings, letters, construction log books, historic photos, aerial photos and family films to piece together what the property was like, what it has become and how it all works together."

The original landscape architect, Denmark-born Jens Jensen, worked closely with the Ford family in the 1920s. A pioneer of the prairie style, he was inspired by nature. His designs incorporate curved lines, hide-and-show views and changing light and shadow.

The swimming pool was a favorite retreat of the Ford grandchildren and 93 years later, is feeling its age. "We will repair the structural integrity, plumbing and mechanics," says Heppner. "Stonework will be replaced and lighting restored. Using extensive family photos and videos, we can accurately bring the pool's landscaping back to what it was like."

The lagoon will see some dramatic changes. Boulders and concrete placed around the edge to stop erosion will be replaced with layered stonework, soft edges and wetlands in Jens Jensen's style.

"We know Jensen intended the lagoon to look like an upnorth swimming hole, with white birches, hemlocks, shrubs





and herbaceous layers," explains Koto. "We'll reintroduce native plants and uncover long-hidden stonework."

Albert Kahn Associates was selected for the first phase of the restoration.

"Our team has fascinating conversations," says Heppner.
"While we don't always agree, we are all guided by the wishes of the Ford family to restore and maintain the estate to the time when they lived there together."

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Pear Trellis Rust

A recent discovery is trellis rust, a European fungus that attacks pear trees. Pear trellis rust is caused by the fungus Gymnosporangium fuscum. The fungus requires two alternate hosts to complete its life cycle. It overwinters on the twigs of juniper species and in early spring it infects newly developed leaves of pear tree species. The pear trellis rust fungus has been introduced to southern Ontario in recent years.

Hosts and Damage

All species of pear are susceptible to the disease. There is no resistance observed on any ornamental

pear species or varieties.

In May and June during warm, humid and rainy weather, the fungal spores spread from juniper to pear by wind. At the early stages of the disease, the infected pear leaves show small orange spots.

In early summer, the spots enlarge and become bright orange and later red

lesions. In late summer, the underside of these lesions begin to swell and form a number of blisters. Spores released from these blisters are carried by wind back to juniper.

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

ShowHouse Interiors (*Grosse Pointe*) has been chosen to redesign the entry foyer. They did not respond for comment by press time.



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


As I was telling him that that was no big deal, he cut me off as quickly as he could and said, 'So I decided to get you this one instead.'

hen Detroiters think of manufacturing in their hometown, they typically think of the automotive industry. But a new non-profit located in Midtown aims to put Detroit on the map as a hub for fashion manufacturing.

"There have been aspirations for years to bring fashion manufacturing to Detroit, but we were missing qualified people," explains Jennifer Guarino, CEO of the Industrial Sewing and Innovation Center (ISAIC). "We're removing that barrier through training and apprenticeships for aspiring industrial sewers and management fellowships." ISAIC is a national institute of excellence for the sewn trades.

Woven into the program are educational opportunities to build a skilled and qualified workforce of sewers in Detroit. In conjunction with Henry Ford College, ISAIC prepares students through a course in basic sewing skills. "They can take their credits and move on to a four-year college, or join ISAIC as an apprentice or entry-level sewer," explains Guarino.

Apprenticeships offer paid, on-the-job training. Entry-level jobs are open to those who have more skills and are ready to start work. "Both opportunities pay a living salary," says Guarino. "Apprentices

earn \$24,000 annually, and new sewers earn \$30,000. Fellowships are designed for women of color interested in management positions. All positions include 100 percent employer paid health insurance and paid time off."

ISAIC's factory is located at 5800 Cass, above the Carhartt store. "Carhartt donated the space and paid for a complete build-out, remodeling and equipment," reveals Guarino.

A public grand opening event is scheduled for April. The brand-new space is open and inviting, surrounding staff with skylights, windows and green plants. Tours, monthly workshops, and a speaker series will continue to bring people in to learn about the organization. Manufacturing will begin with knit products and expand to include additional types of apparel.

"We're doing this in a totally different way — Detroit style," says Guarino.
"It's the only program of its kind in the nation, focused on preparing this workforce with the latest technology, equipment and processes. We're focused on building what the industry needs, and offering it right here in Detroit."

Grosse Pointe's Valade family is helping lead this charge with Gretchen Rose Valade serving on ISAIC's board of trustees and Carhartt donating space

above its flagship Detroit store for the factory (with funds for completing the buildout), while longtime Grosse Pointer Ann Fitzpatrick was recruited to head up marketing and communications.

Wash hands the right way

here is a panicked person in my office at least once a day asking about how not to catch the latest viral infection, be it influenza or the coronavirus. My answer: remain calm and wash your hands often. especially at certain key times and the

right way. Hand washing is the single most effective way to stop the spread of disease.

Many people do not realize that the point of washing is not to kill the viruses



and bacteria that are on your hands but to simply get them off of your hands, to literally wash them away. Hand sanitizers and antibacterial soaps do kill germs, but that is not necessary to avoid getting sick.

Soap creates a slippery medium, making it easier to remove the germs.

Here is the proper way: wet your hands, apply enough soap to make a good lather and then rub your hands, including the palms and the back of the hands. Interlink your fingers and clean between your fingers, including the fingertips and under the fingernails. Scrub for 20 seconds, the amount of time it takes to sing "Happy Birthday" twice. Then rinse your hands, envisioning all those germs sliding off and going down the sink.

Finally, when you dry your hands, you are further removing germs by rubbing them off — so dry well and thoroughly with a clean towel.

Key times to wash your hands include before meal prep, before eating, after you cough or sneeze, after using the restroom and any time you return to your home.

FREEP FILM FESTIVAL RETURNS TO THE PATRIOT THEATER

hen The Patriot Theater at The War Memorial opened almost two years ago, one of its goals was to become a Freep Film Festival venue. "We were selected that first year," says Bruce Ferguson, curator for The Patriot Theater, "and were chosen again this year not only as a venue, but to host the festival launch party."

The Freep Film Festival is one of the preeminent film festivals of the Great Lakes region and an important cultural event for metro Detroit. While there are screening locations throughout the Detroit area, the 207-seat Patriot Theater is the only one on the east side.

Nearly a dozen films will be shown at The Patriot Theater from April 22-26, with multiple screenings per day. The complete lineup will be announced at the March 11 launch party.

"With its digital cinema projector, the theater offers superior visuals and sound, and elevates the experience for the audience and the filmmaker, who may be seeing their work in a theater for the first time," says Kathy Kieliszewski, co-founder and artistic director of the festival and photo and video director at the Detroit Free Press.

Kieliszewski, who lives in Grosse Pointe, adds, "The luxury box seats and the chance to enjoy a glass of wine with your popcorn are particularly welcoming."

The festival focuses on documentaries, many with strong connections to Detroit and Michigan. "We program films we think will resonate and are relevant here, and celebrate Michigan living and Michigan storytellers," says Kieliszewski.

Screenings include post-film discussions, often a panel that may involve the filmmaker, director, stakeholders and policy makers. Moderators are Detroit Free Press journalists whose reporting connects with the issues addressed in the films.

Ferguson's excitement is palpable: "The festival encourages people to travel to Grosse Pointe, dine at Grosse Pointe restaurants, see The War Memorial and enjoy the theater. The Freep staff are the best in the industry, and we are thrilled to partner with them."

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SECURE Act

he SECURE Act was signed into law this past December and made

brings significant changes to almost every aspect of financial, retirement. tax, estate planning and their associated strategies.

Communication is key. But at times, even great communication won't come close to solving the problem.





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Historic design inspires The War Memorial grounds renovation By Susan Bollinger

art of the exciting plans to upgrade The War Memorial include the facility's gardens and grounds, which will be transformed through a combination of historic landscaping and modern accessibility. "Our goal is to elevate the patron experience, and so much of that encompasses the outside space," says Charles Burke, president and CEO of The War Memorial.

The current landscaping at the front of the building — the circle drive, fountain and garden adjacent to the front entrance — are not historic. The original gardens were designed by a woman who led the nation — and specifically the Grosse Pointes — in landscape architecture.

Ellen Biddle Shipman was known as the "dean of the American women landscape architects." A single mother of three, she founded an all-female landscape design business. While her company was based in New York, Grosse Pointe became home to more of her public work than any other community in the nation. Of the 650 gardens she created in the early 1900s, 60 were located in the Pointes.

At The War Memorial, landscaping with a nod to history and Shipman's work will be concentrated at the front

of the house. The stamped concrete of the circle drive will be replaced with an intimate English garden. Parts of the current gardens, such as the gate and fountains, will be re-used inside and outside the building. Historic photos and designs by Shipman, which are stored at Cornell University, will lead the inspiration.


Because The War Memorial's gardens and grounds are the only public lakefront space in Grosse Pointe, "The new design will be interactive, connecting the driveway with the sidewalk system on Lake Shore," reveals Burke. "Patrons will be able to access the water behind the house, regardless of mobility issues. Grass and natural

materials will replace asphalt."

The renovation plans require zero tax dollars. The collision of art, culture, history and humanities are not intended to add volume to The War Memorial programming. The goal is a higher quality experience.

"In everything we do, we will be environmentally sensitive, using locally sourced, native species that are historically accurate," says Burke. "This is a mission we are approaching in an enlightened way. It will take several years to complete, but will be part of the Pointes for generations to come."










Books on the Lake returns May 2

By Margie Reins Smith



Tayari Jones will talk about her fourth novel, *An American Marriage*, which was an Oprah's Book Club selection in 2018 and the winner of the Women's Prize for Fiction in 2019. It's the story of a man unjustly sentenced to prison. It's also a love story. Jones says the idea for the novel came after she overheard a couple arguing in a mall.

"Celestial and Roy are a regular couple. They have their issues, but who doesn't? They are married only 18 months, trying to figure out what it means to be married when Roy is arrested for a crime he didn't commit," says Jones. "The corruption of the justice system, institutional racism and other societal issues are on full display. But no couple goes to bed at night arguing over statistics. We love, we clash and we heal because of our human connections. An American *Marriage* is my effort to look at both the structural and the personal — and to come up with strategies for facing the challenges confronting us in both realms."

The Rev. Faith Fowler, author of *This Far By Faith*, is senior pastor of Cass Community Methodist Church and executive director of Cass Community

Social Services. She says her book is a series of snapshots about people and programs in Detroit.

"It's loaded with humor and unanswered questions," she says. "I'll tell a few stories and answer questions."

Grosse Pointer JT Mestdagh will discuss his memoir, *Untether*. The book tells how he overcame the limitations of VATER syndrome (a rare group of birth defects that affect the gastrointestinal system and the spine) and severe dyslexia (a learning disorder involving reading, writing and comprehension).

"I want to tell kids with VATER and other life-threatening diseases or learning differences to never give up," he says. "I'm a motivator, an encourager, a fixer, a can-do kind of guy."

JT has had 16 surgeries — "so far" — he says. "But I have become an extreme snow skier, a mountain climber, a boater, a hunter and a fisherman." He also has a college degree.

Tickets for the luncheon go on sale at 9 a.m. on Saturday, March 28 at Central Library and on the library's website, grossepointelibrary.org.



Jaye Hill uses faith and love to motivate others

aye Hill regularly brings hope and joy to people all over the country as a motivational speaker, but there was a time when he was the one in need.

Growing up in Pittsburgh, Pa., Hill faced early hardships in his life, and he says a lot of anger and bad decisions stemmed from that.

"My previous life was just about me, and I was self-pleasing and selfish and a manipulator and angry on the inside because of incidents that happened when I was younger," Hill says.

Hill was led to Christ through a local pastor, and his life turned around. Today, Hill — who attends Grace Community Church on Moross in Detroit — uses his faith and turnaround experience to motivate others to believe in themselves and move ahead in life.

"I wouldn't even be living without Jesus," Hill says. "We are people who believe, and we instill those principles to love people where they are, no matter what they decide to do, just to love them the way they are. That's why I have the patience that I have working with kids who are broken. There is brokenness everywhere, not just in the bad neighborhoods, and it's about that love."

Hill — whose children attend Grosse

Pointe North High School, Parcells Middle School and **Defer Elementary** School - has given motivational speeches at churches. businesses. non-profit organizations, schools (including Poupard Elementary and Parcells Middle School) and universities. He

has even given talks to the Cincinnati Bengals.

Speaking to the Bengals was a special thrill.

"I did a chapel for half the team and talked about Jesus and how they need to run their race on the field and off the field, and also the importance of the image they need to express, because they're on TV and role models," Hill says.

Hill, who also works with his wife, Erica, to help children, says motivating others is about being a good listener and wanting to help.

"It's beyond motivating people," Hill says. "It's reaching their hearts and


them tapping into why they feel the way they feel. They begin to tell their story, because you have two ears to listen and one mouth to speak.



For the first time this year, the event will feature a special Afterglow after the main activities, which kicks off at 9 p.m. with a more affordable ticket price. The Afterglow will have principals from across the district taking to the DJ booth to spin dance music until midnight.

Moran loves being involved with the gala because she believes in the service GPFPE provides.

New rules

n Jan. 1, the "Setting **Every Community Up for** Retirement Enhancement" (SECURE) Act became effective. The SECURE Act changed many of the retirement plan rules affecting IRAs, 401(k), 403(b) and other retirement plans. Among the changes:

■ The age limit in which a participant must begin withdrawing funds from the plan is increased from age 70 1/2 to age 72. This change recognized



that many individuals are working (and living) longer and do not wish to begin taking distributions from their retirement, fearing that they might run out of funds in the future.

- The age limit for contributions to IRAs has been eliminated.
- Inherited retirement plan account distributions must now be paid out within 10 years of the death of the participant. This is a major change. Prior to the act, non-spousal inheritors of a retirement plan were generally able to "stretch" the required distributions of an inherited plan over the inheritor's actuarial life expectancy. The former rules allowed for the potential increase in the value of an inherited IRA over time by only taking the minimum required distributions over the life of the beneficiary. When an IRA lists a spouse as the beneficiary, the surviving spouse can still "roll over" the deceased spouse's retirement plan to the survivor's own IRA and the Required Minimum Distributions are based on the survivor's life expectancy.

It is wise to check with your financial adviser and your attorney for advice on how best to take advantage of the Act.

Google it

hat's worse than not working out? I'd say, not learning about it.

The information about exercise, training and living a healthier lifestyle is so easily available to us and is as simple as typing in your Google search something

like, "Why is it hard to lose weight?" or "Why do I hate to exercise?"

On the positive side, if you have a thirst for wanting to know more about your



training and different workouts, you might pull up on YouTube, "latest trends in weight lifting." For many it might be, "Why do I find the idea of fitness overwhelming?"

As most people know, there is nothing, no situation, feeling or curiosity that you can't Google and get an answer to. A lot of answers.

For example, when I searched, "Is it harder to lose weight in February?" an article was found on alternativedaily. com — "Why is it hard to lose weight in the winter?" It seems certain biological factors contribute to the struggle to keep winter pounds from piling on. One of these is an increase in melatonin, the hormone that signals your body that it is time to sleep, and is triggered by darkness. Since winter means less hours of daylight, melatonin levels tend to increase. This hormone acts on appetite. Because melatonin can hormonally affect your appetite, it may trigger some people to eat more. Couple that with less winter activity, age and a slower metabolism. You now have a better understanding and are therefore able to make a better plan to fix it.

You get the idea. Educate to motivate.





Leptospirosis

t's that time of year again when we like to remind dog owners about a zoonotic disease called leptospirosis.

Leptospirosis, commonly known as "lepto," is a bacterium which can be found in water and wet soil contaminated with the urine of critters scurrying through our yards. The most likely



source of infection comes from skunks, opossums and rats.

The bacteria can then enter the body through the mucous membranes in the mouth, eyes and nose and through water-softened skin. Lepto can spread to humans as well; although most human cases do not result from direct animal contact but from aquatic recreational activities.

The leptospirosis bacterium affects the liver and kidneys of dogs and oftentimes will result in very serious illness. The most common signs of infection include fever, anorexia, vomiting and jaundice (yellowing) of the skin. In the early stages of the disease, it can be difficult to diagnose, but if caught early supportive care and antibiotics can be used to successfully treat the infection.

Prevention is key in dealing with leptospirosis. Safely controlling the rodent population in your area and limiting exposure to standing water, especially in times of increased rainfall, is helpful in prevention. Vaccinating your dog annually is very important as well and is generally recommended during your dog's annual wellness visit.

As always, if you have any questions or concerns regarding your pet's health, be sure to consult with your veterinarian.




That is, until four and a half years later, when by chance she meets the very same man from her long-ago vision.
