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



"After writing my first book (Stuff in the Basement: Influences of James Dean) I wanted to write more about my military experience," says Farrell.

The 'Fourteen Pairs of Boots' are his own 14 pairs used during his military service and pictured on the cover. "I wrote my second book about what I learned in the Marine Corps, and I plan to write a sequel about life lessons

learned in the Air Force."

One of his biggest life lessons is to "dream big." Farrell says that "a little progress in pursuing a bigger dream is better than none at all."

Farrell hopes the book will offer readers valuable advice on how to navigate life's hurdles.

"I think if a reader can benefit from my own experiences, then I'm helping," he says. "I feel like it's a nice way to help

others and pass on my life lessons." He adds that writing the book was cathartic.

"I feel like everyone has a story to tell, and by telling my story, even if the book isn't a major seller, I have shared something," he says. "I just became a grandpa, and my grandson could read the book someday and say, 'Wow. This is what my grandpa went through.' I hope they can take some of my advice and lessons I learned and use it in their own lives."

His grandson will certainly be impressed with everything Farrell has experienced, starting with cold weather training 200 miles north of the Arctic Circle in Norway in 1989. The following year, Farrell was activated in support of Operation Desert Storm and sent to Okinawa.

In the book, Farrell details several challenging, sometimes terrifying, experiences while serving abroad. Among them is his 1991 service in the Philippines, where he witnessed the eruption of Mount Pinatubo.

"We remained there to clean up and assist the evacuation of civilians," he says.

In 1993, Farrell left the Marines and

was reassigned to the IRR (In Ready Reserves). On July 14, 1994, he was honorably discharged.

However, he again heard the call to serve. "After September 11, 2001, I enlisted in the Air Force Reserve. I served for three years and was honorably discharged on August 19, 2005."

Farrell then enlisted in the Air National Guard, where he served from 2006 to 2014.

"I finally got the chance to serve overseas in the United Kingdom in April of 2015," says Farrell. "On January 9, 2017, I retired from the Air Force Reserves with 20 years of credited service."

With two decades of military service, Farrell is passionate about sharing the lessons he learned.


"Endurance and persistence will be rewarded no matter what challenges come your way," says Farrell. "There's something you can learn from every experience. If you have a negative experience, you learn from it, and you learn to move on from there."

He adds, "It goes hand-in-hand with one of my other 14 keys to personal growth and happiness, which is to laugh at least once a day. If you can laugh at yourself, that helps too. Don't take life too seriously, and cherish the little things. You don't need fancy cars or a boat. Just enjoy a sunset or something free."

Today, Farrell works at Stellantis in the Mopar Parts Distribution Center. He enjoys staying active in Grosse Pointe Theatre and spending time with his two daughters, Courtney, 23, and Heidi, 18. This August, he celebrated the birth of his first grandson, Harvey Schwarz.

rosse Pointe Theatre presents the timeless musical, *Anything Goes*, starting November 10 at Pierce Middle School. For Director Don Bischoff, *Anything Goes* is familiar territory. This marks his fifth time being involved with the show. In fact, *Anything Goes* holds a special place in Bischoff's heart.

"I've been doing theater since I was a teenager," Bischoff says. "Then, you go to college, get married, take a break from theater and have kids. When my kids got a little bit older, I got back into theater. My first show when I got back in was *Anything Goes* at Grosse Pointe Theatre in 2001. I was able to land the leading role of Billy. So, the show has been a passion for me."

"The shows I primarily do are big dance shows," says Bischoff, who is an expert tap dancer and has been dancing for 40 years. "Tapping is what I love to do. This is a great ensemble show for tapping, too. I love the 1930s and 1940s era of musicals, the 'Golden Age,' with all the great classic songs.

"I love the big production numbers," he adds. "Whenever you can get the audience to clap during the middle of a song, you know you did something well. The energy and dance and music make people feel emotion."

Anything Goes is fun for all ages. Bischoff hopes families come out for an evening of exciting music and theater to make them forget their worries.

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Race to Alaska

he Race to Alaska (R2AK) has been described as the world's wildest, weirdest boat race. It's 750 nautical miles from Port Townsend, Wash., to Ketchikan, Alaska, and completely engineless — you either sail, row or paddle. The fleet includes everything from custombuilt sailboats to kayaks.

Two Detroit-area sailors — Matthew

Declercq and Elliot Lee
— were part of "Team
Dacron & Denim," a sixman crew that sailed the
2023 R2AK in a 34-foot
sailboat ... equipped with
paddles in case the wind
died.

Declercq grew up sailing at Bayview Yacht Club while Lee sailed at the Detroit Yacht Club. Declercq went on to sail for Michigan State, and Lee sailed for Grand Valley State University. They were competitors all those years until they both joined Team Dacron & Denim for the R2AK.

Team Dacron & Denim was less than halfway up the spectacularly beautiful British Columbia coast along the 700-nm Victoria, British Columbia-to-Ketchikan stage of the race when they hit a log, damaging their rudder. A crew braved the 55-degree water in a dry suit and used zip ties to stabilize the delaminating rudder until repairs could be made in Bella Bella, BC, some 80 nm farther up the course.

Team Dacron & Denim sailed on until they were becalmed and had to paddle — yes, paddle! — the last 20 nautical miles.

With no fiberglass repairs available in Bella Bella, a local craftsman built the team an aluminum rudder, and

two days after arriving, they again were sailing toward Ketchikan.

Competitors that might have passed Team Dacron & Denim while they were getting the new rudder took refuge from a weather system with 30-knot winds, enabling the team to maintain its lead and sail to a 4th place finish with an elapsed time of 7:22:59.

Asked whether they would sail R2AK again, Declercq and Lee had the same answer: "Absolutely!"

Congratulations! We'll be watching.













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40-year dream comes to life at Mike's

n June 1965 when Robert and Mary Lou LeFevre brought home their baby girl Susan, little Michael was more excited about the Snoopy doll in his dad's arms than his baby sister.

Mike adopted Snoopy as his own. That Christmas, he received a Snoopy





music box. The gift tag read, "To my brother Mike. Merry Christmas. Love, Your Sister, Susan."

Mike's Snoopy collection grew. "At my birthday when I was 10, I had like 15 pieces on my dresser," Mike recalls.

Though Michael would grow up to be a successful businessman traveling the world, "Uncle Snoop" remained close to his little sister and his nieces and nephews. When Susan was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2009, Mike gave up his travels and came home to Grosse Pointe to be with her.



Over the years, his collection of Snoopy collectibles has grown to over 15,000. "I spoke to the Grosse Pointe Questers in my house some 23 years ago," Mike recalls. "I said one day I'm going to build a bar with a museum in it. I did it."

Adjacent to Mike's on the Water on Jefferson on the Nautical Mile, the Snoopy museum is a former sail barn painted black and white. Featuring black and white concrete pups from a Grosse Pointe Chamber charity auction, the museum bears no name. "There's nothing out here that tells you it's Snoopy," Mike says.

Two plaques outside quote *Mike-isms*: "If you build it, they will come, but you better be good when they come" and "This place is highly recommended by the owner."

In the vestibule, visitors are greeted by chef figurines from 129 countries around the world all collected by Mike on his travels. (There is also a donation box. "It's all about charity.")

The hallway contains a display cabinet of Baby Boomer toys. "All the stuff that we played with, the old View Masters, The Little Rascals, the Superman, the Hot Wheels,

Mrs. Beasley, Tonka toys, Suzy Homemaker, Barbie and Ken," Mike explains. "I put all the stuff that my sister and I played with in this cabinet to tease you."

The suspense is built for the black curtain to open. The view is overwhelming. One man cried upon seeing it, Mike says. "If this doesn't move you, nothing will."

Mike's collection includes his sister's original Snoopy with a missing nose and grandma's many stitches, along with Mike's old bike and the toboggan he used to race down Vernier and Balduck hills.

While he personally acquired many of his Snoopys — some in garage sales, others in auction and more costly — most of his 15,000+ pieces have been given to him over the years by family, friends and customers. They include many homemade items, even edibles such as cookies that have been lacquered to preserve them.


One corner features Captain Snoopy motoring past the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club, the Nine Mile Tower and Mike's on the Water on the Nautical Mile. Another wall features a world map depicting where Snoop has been. "I've been to all seven continents and 129 countries," Mike says. There's Snoopy at the Iditarod, Snoopy in Rio, Snoopy in Antarctica, Snoopy in Paris, Snoopy at the Taj Mahal, Snoopy at the Great Barrier Reef. Like country singer Hank Snow, Snoop's "been everywhere."

Mike's on the Water is now booking parties in the banquet room through November and December. Dates are filling quickly.

The room holds 40 to 50 people. Larger groups in January and February when Mike's is closed can be split up between the museum space and restaurant. Since this is "all about charity," the room charge goes to local charities: Kids on the Go, Racing for Kids, Wigs 4 Kids, The Helm, Full Circle Foundation, JT Mestdagh Foundation, The Family Center, Grosse Pointe Crisis Club, St. Clair Shores Cops for Kids and the The Holley Institute at Ascension St. John Hospital.

hat began four years ago as a multi-phase Library Reimagined capital improvements project is now coming to completion.

"Central Branch's reopening is the capstone of the longer term project," says Grosse Pointe Public Library Director Jessica Keyser.

Of the improvements to Central Branch, the expanded youth area will be the most dramatic to visitors.

"It is surrounded by windows and the space was doubled in size," says Keyser. "It is refreshed, cheerful, colorful, with dedicated stroller parking and a family restroom."

Children will be excited to see the installation of a wall mounted interactive light board like the one at Woods Branch.

For teens, there is the library's first ever designated teen space with plenty of outlets and desk space. The new drive-thru window has made a significant change to the parking lot. Patrons must now enter off of Fisher and exit onto Kercheval. Its benefits will be well worth the new flow. "Not only can you drop off books at the drive-thru, but you can also pick-up," says Keyser. "There will even be a 'drive-thru pick-up' option when you have a hold."

Those who have taken advantage of the tool lending library — started during WWII and the the oldest in the country will notice a massive upgrade to the tools' storage with a newly built tool lending room.

There are also vital improvements that the public won't notice.

"We are now up to code on fire safety," says Keyser. And the staff will benefit from a newly installed elevator.

The restrooms have been completely renovated and are more accessible.

A grand re-opening celebration is

planned for early November. "We will have a band, face painting, balloon animals, giveaways. The Friends of the Grosse Pointe Library are going to help us do tours and explain the new areas," says Marketing & Programming Coordinator

"This is a hub of the community. I hope people continue to use the library and share their feedback. We'll always be evolving and paying attention to how people use the library."



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Lumps & bumps

wo of the most common and benign lumps and bumps people are concerned about are lipomas and epidermoid cysts.

Lipomas are the most common noncancerous soft tissue tumors. They are a collection of mature fat cells usually encased in a thin fibrous capsule. They can occur anywhere on the body, most

commonly on the arms, thighs, chest, back, shoulders and neck. They are soft, movable, and range in size from 1 cm to greater than 10 cm. They usually cause no symptoms and



do not need to be removed. Occasionally, lipomas can become large, occur in a place where they restrict movement or can invade into the surrounding muscle and cause some discomfort. When this occurs, they can easily be removed and usually do not recur.

Epidermoid cysts appear as a dome-shaped lump, often with a central punctum which is a dark colored dot-like opening on the surface of the cyst. They are formed from a part of a hair follicle and can occur anywhere on the body including the face, neck and genitalia. The cysts are filled with keratin. They grow slowly and often remain asymptomatic for years or a lifetime. Sometimes these become red and painful and may drain a cheesy foul smelling substance. This may resolve on its own but can recur. The cysts can also become infected and may require incision and drainage and antibiotics.

As always, any skin lump or bump that grows quickly, changes in appearance or becomes painful, should be evaluated by your doctor.

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

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



The lecture series is the Grosse Pointe


Artists Association's primary fundraiser. Presenters donate their time and all proceeds go to support the Association's programming for veterans, senior citizens and art students from local high schools.


On Sunday, Jan. 14, Jonathan Quint, a PhD student in history at University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, will take us back



As the son of a Korean War veteran, Terence Thomas appreciates the mission of The War Memorial- to be a patriotic, cultural and community leader.

"It's been quite exhilarating," he said in response to how the first few months as a board member have gone. "I've learned things I didn't know, both of the challenges and opportunities of The War Memorial."

Thomas was one of five new board members who took their seats on the governing body of The War Memorial in July, along with Jodie Rappe, Richard Swaine, Jessica Taub and Aaron Turk.

Thomas' father, Richard Andrews, served in the Army.

Thomas was recruited to join the board by current Board Treasurer Ed Russell.

"Ed and I are part of a Bible study and he asked me about my interest, and he suggested I take a close look at serving on The War Memorial board," he said. "Most people know me as a connector who enjoys listening to other people's stories and finding a way to knit those stories together because I find commonality in all people."

Expanding on what his skills are that he brings to The War Memorial, Thomas noted his experience of participating in civic work across the state on behalf of Ascension Michigan, formerly St. John Providence Health System.

"Due to those relationships and experiences, I understand the different needs, goals, and aspirations of a variety of people and understand how their stories fit into The War Memorial," he said. "I want to ensure that The War Memorial is inviting and inclusive to our broader southeast Michigan community."

Thomas indicated that The War Memorial's ability to become self-sustaining in an authentic way in commemorating veterans and making sure that their stories and experiences never die is a great strength of the organization.

Grosse Pointe resident who served in the Air Force proud to work with veterans

Retired Air Force Col. Nancy Bozzer's passion for military veterans is clear.

Bozzer, of Grosse Pointe, is the former director of Gratiot County's Department of Veterans Affairs, leaving that job earlier this year to become a Rating Service Veterans Representative with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs in Detroit. She and her husband, Jim Thompson, attended this year's 9/11 Service of Remembrance at The War Memorial.

"I love being able to sit down and talk with veterans, to listen to their stories," Bozzer said.

In September, Bozzer was the Detroit Lions Hometown Hero for the game at Ford Field against the Atlanta Falcons which the Lions won, 20-6.

"It was amazing to be able to represent the military, and women in the military, because it was all focused on women in

football," Bozzer commented about the Lions gameday experience. "It was quite an honor."

Bozzer spent over 25 years in the U.S. Air Force, retiring in 2016 with the rank of colonel. She has logged over 2,800 flying hours in the KC-135 Stratotanker and C-9 Aeromedical aircraft, accumulating more than 500 combat and combat-support hours.

"I relate my last job of being a wing commander to the Super Bowl," Bozzer said. "I was in charge of a lot of airmen that were carrying out missions across multiple continents."

While in the military, she served as an aviator, command pilot, and instructor among several other duties. She earned her bachelor's degree from Michigan State University and master's degree

from the University of Phoenix.

"I hope that I was a role model to women that you can have it all," Bozzer said. "You can be a mother and have a career."

Born in Detroit, Bozzer earned her private pilot's license when she was 16. She was commissioned as a second lieutenant, entering active duty in 1990. She commanded at all levels, both in garrison and at deployed locations, ascending to the rank

of colonel. Bozzer was promoted to colonel in April 2012. As a Senior Command Pilot, Bozzer instructed and evaluated aviators in the KC-135 and the C-9 aircrafts. She commanded multiple missions in



Southwest Asia in support of the Gulf War, Operation Iraqi Freedom, and Operation Enduring Freedom.

"It was exhilarating," Bozzer said.
"Watching the tankers take off
every 3O seconds, knowing we
were up there doing the mission.
We did special ops along with
other operations. Knowing you
were making a difference, and in
something bigger than yourself, was
great. Your job is to get fuel to the
fighters so the fighters can protect
people on the ground. You really felt
you were doing something that was
worthwhile."

Upon retiring from the Air Force as the Commander of the 521st Air Mobility Operations Wing at Ramstein Air Base in Germany, Bozzer managed a small business in Newaygo County in Michigan, and worked for Hormel Foods Corporation. As commander, Bozzer oversaw two groups, 10 squadrons, and eight operating locations spanning over 5,000 miles throughout Europe, Africa, and Central Asia. In February, the Heroes Center in Gratiot County opened. It is a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing veterans and their families with the necessary resources and services to help them heal, grow, and succeed in civilian life. Bozzer spearheaded the founding of the center.

Bozzer has been awarded The United States Legion of Merrit, Meritorious Service medal, air medal, and many others. Bozzer and her husband have been married for 31 years and have a son, Dillon, who is currently an officer in the Marines.



There will be no shuttles during the event, so Ford House reminds visitors that this is a three-quarter mile walking path. In keeping with the estate's attempt to be inclusive to all visitors, an aluminum deck will be installed over the garden for a smoother journey over the gravel path.

















Grosse Pointe Santa Claus Parade celebrates 'A Musical Christmas'

Rabies: What you need to know

t's 2023, and rabies is still a concern in our world. Rabies is a fatal, but preventable, virus. It only affects mammals (warmblooded animals with fur, this includes

people). Rabies is transmitted in the saliva of an infected animal, typically through a bite wound. The most common sources of rabies in the United States are wildlife, like bats, skunks,



raccoons and foxes. In other countries, dogs are also a source of rabies.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, rabid bats have been found in all 49 continental states, only Hawaii is rabies-free. In the State of Michigan (as of Sept. 25, 2023), there have been 44 cases of rabies identified: 28 bats, 15 skunks and one kitten. Macomb County accounts for 11 of the positive skunks and one bat. Oakland County had one rabid kitten, the rest of the cases were bats or skunks. Wayne County had three positive skunks. The good news is that not all wild animals have rabies.

The best way to protect your pets from rabies is to see your veterinarian on a regular basis to keep rabies vaccinations up to date on all cats, dogs and ferrets. In addition, keep cats and ferrets indoors, and dogs under direct supervision while outside to lessen exposure. If your pet is bitten by another animal, either owned or wild, contact your veterinarian. If you are concerned about any stray or wild animals in your neighborhood or home, call your local Animal Control officer.




Vaster Wilds

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
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
