Feta Roasted Salmon & Tomatoes

Prep time: 15 minutes Cook time: 15 minutes Servings: 4

Ingredients

Nonstick cooking spray **3 cups** halved cherry tomatoes **2 teaspoons** olive oil **1 teaspoon** minced garlic **1/2 teaspoon** dried oregano or dried dill weed **1/4 teaspoon** salt

1/2 teaspoon coarsely ground black pepper, divided

1 1/2 pounds salmon or halibut fillets, cut into four serving-size pieces

1 cup (4 ounces) crumbled feta cheese

Directions

- Preheat oven to 425 F. Line 18 x 13 x 1-inch baking pan with foil. Lightly spray foil with nonstick cooking spray. Set aside.
- 2. In medium bowl, toss tomatoes, olive oil, garlic, oregano or dill weed, salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper.
- Place fish pieces, skin side down, on one side of prepared pan. Sprinkle with remaining pepper. Lightly press feta cheese on top of fish. Pour tomato mixture on other side of prepared pan. Bake, uncovered, 12-15 minutes, or until fish flakes easily with fork.
- 4. Place salmon on serving plates. Spoon tomato mixture over top.

The New Year: Are you ready?

f you want this year to be different and not fall off the workout wagon, I have two suggestions for you.

I want to repeat some advice I wrote about a few years ago that are still my golden rules for being consistent and staying healthy.

One: Make a commitment, not a resolution. A commitment is more than giving something a try. Make a firm decision that no matter what you're going to commit to a workout routine



and stay with it. We believe in honoring our commitments. For the sake of yourself and those who love you, commit to be fit.

Two: The workout philosophy that's kept me working out my whole life through busy and tightly scheduled times; the 7-day rule.

It's the "resolution solution."

You'll read that we should all workout vigorously an hour a day, 7 days a week. In a perfect world, sure, but the demands of life constantly get in the way.

The 7-day rule says be sure to workout at least twice a week, but with this twist. Think of a week as not a calendar week but as just seven days in a row.

If you work out on a Tuesday, the 7-day rule says you need to work out, "one more time" before the following Tuesday. Let's say you get to work out the upcoming Saturday. Now Saturday becomes the first day of the next 7 days. Keep track on a calendar to keep yourself on track. Whatever your workout day is, it starts the next 7 days.

Allowing yourself this flexibility eliminates the all or nothing mentality that unravels many a good start and dismantles consistency. You might even work out more often because now you've created a plan for steady results.

Vitamin B12

s people's diets change due to a desire to get healthier or intolerance of certain foods, vitamin deficiencies are possible. Vitamin B12 deficiency is one example.

Vitamin B12 is very important for our blood and our nerves. It is present

in most animal products, such as meat, dairy and eggs. The highest concentration of vitamin B12 is in clams and liver.



Most of the absorption of this vitamin takes place in

the acidic stomach. Those with vitamin B12 deficiency may feel weak and tired, their vision may be affected and their memory less sharp such that they often appear confused. They could complain of numbness and tingling in their hands and feet that could affect their walking. They may have a decreased appetite and lose weight. They may complain of a sore tongue or mouth or even feel depressed and irritable.

By the time symptoms appear, the deficiency may have been going on for years.

People over 70 years of age are at a slightly increased risk of the deficiency, but so are those who don't eat meat or meat products, have digestive disorders such as Celiac Disease or Crohn's Disease, regularly take certain medications such as acid reducers for heartburn or Metformin for Diabetes, have had certain types of weight loss surgery, and those with an autoimmune disease called Pernicious Anemia.

A simple blood test can reveal the deficiency that is easily fixed with an over the counter supplement.

MyID bracelet for dementia

nyone who has or is caring for someone with the onset of dementia knows the fear of their patient or loved one wandering off and becoming lost. Now that fate can be alleviated somewhat by a new product being offered throughout Michigan by Miles for Memories, a nonprofit organization out of Calhoun County created to raise awareness of Alzheimer's Disease and dementia.

The organization began distributing personal ID bracelets, manufactured by MyID, to caregivers, family members and emergency responders, who are trained in how to program the devices. Comfortable, adjustable and waterproof, the bracelets contain a QR code that can be scanned by any smartphone. The code links the wearer's personal page that provides name, address and emergency contact information. The page can also include medications, medical history and conditions and any other pertinent data. Family members can limit the information to what they feel comfortable revealing.

The program was so successful in Calhoun County that Miles for Memories received a grant from the Michigan Health Endowment Fund to enlarge the program throughout Michigan and to train caregivers, health care professionals and emergency responders on the bracelets' use.

Carolyn Van Dorn, of Nursing Unlimited in Grosse Pointe Woods, received four hours training on the bracelet in August. "It is not a 'tracker," she explains. "It is designed to provide information if someone is found.

"If you have the ID (bracelet), you can scan the QR code with a cell phone camera and all available information will show. If not, you can go to the website GetMYID.com and enter the ID number and PIN and access that way."

When the QR code is scanned or accessed manually, emergency contacts are immediately notified of the bracelet wearer's whereabouts.

Upon completion of training, participants were given sample bracelets to pass out or use for demonstration purposes back home.

"I have a limited amount of free ones to offer in the community," Van Dorn says, "but even if purchased, they are inexpensive compared to others."

"It's a chance to perform for each

other and enjoy each other's company," says Alcantara. "It's a free event. The public is welcome!"

Grunyons rehearsals are held every Tuesday at a member's house. While they get business done, they have a blast doing it. "We call ourselves a drinking group with a singing problem," laughs Prost. And they're looking for others (specifically a first tenor) to join the fun.

To ensure the group's legacy, Alcantara adds, "We are always looking for younger guys to join us." The age range is large, with members in their early 30s to 80s.

"It's a group of great guys who have a passion for singing," says Alcantara. "Others play golf together, or cards; we like to sing together and to bring happiness and enjoyment to the people that get to hear us."

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Early member reminisces upon Grosse Pointe Theatre's 75th season

olleen McBride may be one of the oldest surviving members from Grosse Pointe Theatre's earliest seasons. With the 75th season in full swing, she reminisces on her time performing in and directing musicals with the beloved company.

Born in London and raised in Surrey, McBride's story begins across the pond.

"I completed four years at the Guildhall School of Music & Drama in London," she says. Following graduation, McBride visited an uncle and aunt in Grosse Pointe.

"I spent five days on the Queen Elizabeth II. My uncle and aunt met me in New York City. I always remembered the smell of the city, compared to London."

The Grosse Pointe relatives had planned to host her for a few weeks. She ended up staying indefinitely.

"At the time, it was several years after

World War II. Unlike America, England was still living on ration books," says McBride.

"No wonder I wanted to stay here," she laughs. With their only child settled abroad, McBride's parents followed her to the states one year later.

"I was quickly brought into Grosse Pointe Theatre by Phyllis Reeve," says McBride. "Phyllis and Mark Reeve were instrumental in Grosse Pointe Theatre."

"I would imagine there were about 50 people involved at the time," says McBride. Today, there are about 350 members. "In those days, we didn't have what they have today with instant communication. It was marvelous what

we managed to do."

McBride's talent lay in an operatic voice and piano. "I can remember performing at Cannon in Detroit."

Cannon Recreational Center was attached to Finney High School and later demolished for a replacement school.

By the time McBride met husband, Bob, Grosse Pointe Theatre had moved to The War Memorial.

"I met him at an Our Lady Star of the Sea dance. I wasn't a member of Star, but my best friend was a member of the youth group there and had



invited me to tag along," says McBride. "The dance was in a member's Lake Shore home that was later demolished. He (Bob) danced every dance with me."

In the early days of their marriage, Bob encouraged her to continue with Grosse Pointe Theatre. Later, the responsibilities of raising three children prompted McBride to leave the stage.

"It was a wonderful outlet for me. Everybody worked so hard to make it a professional show. Cannon used to be packed with people for our performances," says McBride. "It's amazing that I'm around to see what has happened in Grosse Pointe Theatre since that time."

She says that same dedication and the support of loyal patrons has stood the test of time.

"Grosse Pointe Theatre members were the first people I met here," says McBride. And it made all the difference to the roots she ended up planting in the Pointes.

And Barnes knew exactly who she wanted for the job — Maple & Mill.

"We had worked with Jamie Mertz, with Mertz|Casazza in 2018," says Barnes. Mertz, owner of Maple & Mill, had designed an award-winning exterior

renovation for the family, which will be featured in a future issue. She trusted Mertz's Maple & Mill would be able to work the same magic.

"The laundry room layout made no sense," says Barnes. "I also wanted storage and an extra work area." The addition of a desk transformed a once inefficient laundry room into a place for wrapping gifts, folding laundry, office work, and eventually homework for their two young children.

As for the exposed pipes that couldn't be moved: "They built custom

cabinets around what we couldn't move. They were so patient about options for the configuration. It was a total collaboration, moving the pieces together until I was happy," says Barnes. "It was perfect."

The superintendent, Christian, came every day to check the progress. "That's such a wonderful part of working with Maple & Mill. There is support the whole time."

While the laundry room was the most dramatic part of the basement renovation, Barnes raves about the new bathroom.

"We moved the sink and lighting and added lighting," says Barnes. Becca Priester, Interior Designer at Maple & Mill, was responsible for choosing the sconces, granite, paint, mirror and hardware in the renovation.

Throughout the basement, the ceiling had been drywalled. To open the space up, the drywall was removed and the ceiling was painted black, creating the illusion of height.

In the main living space, built-in cabinetry now surrounds a television.

A false start with too-large Arhaus furniture forced the family to switch to a Macy's sofa. "We needed a sectional that could be moved in small pieces" — a common problem in old Grosse Pointe homes.

Paige Loperfido of Décor & More Designs styled the rooms, including shelving décor, sofa selection, wallpaper and more.

Barnes couldn't be happier with the finished product. "The basement just feels like part of the home now — the same as the upstairs." \P

Pre-planning a funeral

client of mine recently related what happened after her father died. My client and her mother were quite close. Both were estranged from my client's sister. When the father died, all three went to the funeral home to plan the arrangements. All three

members of the family were nervous, fearing the estranged daughter would make things difficult.

When they met with the funeral director and after he

had expressed his condolences, the first thing he did was show them the samples of the Thank You notes to be ordered. There were three different color choices: pink, green and purple. The deceased's favorite color was purple, so the choice was easy. Once they all agreed on the color, the funeral director stood up and said, "That's all you need to do."

Stunned, the family was told that the husband, many months before he died, had gone to the funeral home and made all of the arrangements for his funeral and paid for it in full. The father knew that his death would be an emotional time for his family. He did what he could to reduce the stress by taking care of the funeral prior to his death.

While most families do not have issues like the one in this story, planning a funeral in advance is a good idea. When a loved one dies, emotions run high on those left behind. Pre-planning a funeral takes away one of those stressors.

he Crystal Ballroom, it is SOOOOO beautiful," Andrea Rivera Fleming texted her friends. "My daughter and I are here for a jazz concert."

She attached several photos to illustrate her message. One was of the reflecting pool that greets guests as they enter the new Fred M. Alger Center at The War Memorial. It is a space of quiet intention set beneath a framed banner of an authentic Command Flag used in battle at Omaha Beach on D-Day, June 6, 1944.

The reflecting pool is constructed from black granite, like the National September 11 Memorial in New York City. Its place within the Reflection Room invites guests to pause for a moment of patriotism and gratitude for the service and sacrifice of our veterans. The other photo was of the stunning colonnade that connects the new addition at the front of the building to the original ballroom space in the rear. Supported by 25-foot pillars wrapped in Indiana limestone and sheathed in floor-to-ceiling glass, the colonnade allows a view of the Alger House courtyard and carries attention forward to a glimpse of Lake St. Clair and things to come.

That glimpse of the lake turns into a panorama in the ballroom. The architects have wrapped the room in glass with only an occasional structural pole interrupting the view of Lake St. Clair.

"I cannot explain in writing just how beautiful the ballroom is with those stunning views," wrote a bride whose wedding reception was one of the first hosted in the new ballroom under its



31 crystal chandeliers.

Since 1962, the ballroom has been a favorite with brides. Now with 25,000 square feet of space, it can host business conferences, community-

wide meetings and bigger weddings. A series of folding walls and doors add flexibility, allowing the space to be configured to meet the needs of smaller groups like the Men's Club of Grosse Pointe, which resumed meeting at The War Memorial in November after spending the last couple of years like nomads because of COVID concerns and construction at The War Memorial.

"The new facilities are wonderful," says Men's Club President Jim Hoekwater. "They don't disappoint and the hospitality is the same or better. The food is great. We're glad to be back."

The welcome mat is out to the

community to visit the new building and see for themselves, says The War Memorial President & CEO Charles Burke. Concierge Betsy Alexander will be available to answer your questions.

For instance, she can tell you that there are 72,000 LED bulbs in the skylight that runs the length of the colonnade. They will bathe you in a warm welcome when you visit, and the player piano could be playing your favorite song.

The community can thank Fred Alger for donating \$20 million to reimagine the ballroom wing that was added to The War Memorial in 1962. His largesse adds vitality to The War Memorial campus built around The Moorings, a 1910 mansion, that was home to the Russell Alger Family and later given to the community.

The new addition better allows The War Memorial to fulfill its mission of being a driver of arts, learning, patriotism, hospitality and connectivity.

A NEW BEGINNING

The Fred M. Alger Center at The War Memorial

Since it opened, the Fred M. Alger Center at The War Memorial has hosted events ranging from Veterans Day Breakfast to 250-person weddings.

Opened in November, the Fred. M. Alger Center at the War Memorial serves as a home for art, culture, and the humanities in Grosse Pointe Farms. The 25,000 square foot facility with sweeping views features a full restoration of the 1961 crystal ballroom, and a new Colonnade entrance. The Center also affords new spaces for patriotic reflection and community gathering, encouraging patrons to come and simply be. The center was made possible thanks in large part to financial gifts from Fred M. Alger, prominent member of the Alger Family and founder of the Wall Street firm, Alger Management.

Features of the center include a new Colonnade entryway, Reflection Room, Community Room and Pre-function Room. The Collonade interior is filled with sunlight, allowing you to focus on the water at the far end, while, at the same time, keeping the historical house anchored to your left with the Ellen Biddle Shipman gardens and the Charles Platt Alger House facade. To the right of the Colonnade entrance is a reflection space for patrons to consider their personal patriotism. The Reflection Room is centered on a reflective pool and bathed in sunlight from the Pantheon-inspired oculus skylight, and features a framed banner of an authentic Command Flag that was used in battle at Omaha Beach on D-Day, June 6, 1944.

The orchestra, conducted by Joseph Striplin, has played in the former ballroom at The War Memorial. It held an outdoor concert in the summer during the COVID-19 pandemic and played here in 2021. The orchestra members vary in levels from professional to community musicians.

Upcoming performances include Feb. 26 at 3 p.m. and April 23 at 7 p.m. Both take place at Our Lady Star of the Sea in Grosse Pointe Woods. The February concert features Dr. Augustus Hill and Marina Stojanovska. Tickets can be purchased at **warmemorial.org/arts**.

Welcoming Back the DANE BENNET Winter Jazz Brunch Series Warm up this winter at The War Memorial with the return

of the Dave Bennett Winter Jazz Brunch Series.

The series includes three concerts - one by Bennett and his four-member jazz band on Feb. 5, jazz drummer Sean Dobbins on Jan. 22, and jazz pianist Cliff Monear on March 19. Brunch begins at 11 a.m. with the concert commencing at 12:15 p.m. and lasts until about 1:45 p.m.

"Cliff and Sean are some of the best musicians in the Michigan area and the country," Bennett said. "They've done the series before, and it's always been a great time and turnout. It's a nice mixture."

Bennett is a jazz clarinet player and a Mack Avenue Records artist. He fuses serious jazz improvisation with a host of modern pop influences.

"The new album is a little bit of a departure from what we've done before," Bennett said when asked what folks can expect from his February performance. "I don't do strictly jazz. I play piano, guitar and sing. It's a mixture of jazz-swing and a little bit of 1950s rockabilly. They will hear a lot of songs they like to hear, but also a lot of new stuff we've added to the show. There's a lot of joy in the show."

His most recent album, "Nowhere Fast," was released in June. Bennett said stylistically he writes jazz, "surf rock, Chris Isaak-Roy Orbison style." Bennett's other albums include "Don't Be That Way" and "Blood Moon." The first brunch series at The War Memorial with Bennett came in January 2019.

"It was a wonderful thing and very honored that they asked me to help curate it," he said. "I've played Grosse Pointe for a number of years now when we're not on the road and there's a lot of love in the community and have treated us with much kindness. I'm glad to do it again."

Bennett has been a featured soloist at Carnegie Hall with The New York Pops in 2013, and has been featured with 35 other U.S. and Canadian orchestras including Nashville, Detroit, Omaha, Toronto, Calgary and Jacksonville. Some of his annual appearances include The Elkhart Jazz Festival, The Suncoast Classic Jazz Festival, and The Arizona Classic Jazz Festival.

Now 38, Bennett has been a professional musician since he was a teenager. In March 2022, he and his band performed to a sold-out audience at New York City's Birdland Theater.

"I'm the happiest when I am on stage," he said. "It's the greatest feeling in the world and when I see that we're making other people really happy, it keeps building. Every time we perform, we go away feeling very fulfilled."

eil Simon is one of the most prolific playwrights of all time, so the story of his life, of course, is fascinating.

"Broadway Bound" is a semiautobiographical play by Neil Simon. The play rounds out his Eugene trilogy, which also features "Brighton Beach Memoirs" and "Biloxi Blues."

Grosse Pointe Theatre will present its production of "Broadway Bound" from Friday, Jan. 27, through Sunday, Feb. 5, at Parcells Middle School auditorium.

As Director Laura Ver Beek describes, this play is a must-see for any fan of Simon, especially if they've already seen "Brighton Beach Memoirs" and "Biloxi Blues."

"Neil Simon is such a good playwright. This is more of a dramedy, in that it's a bit of a departure from some of his outright comedies, but there's still a lot of humor in there, because he's such a witty writer. This play always really appealed to me. It tells the story of his life. It's a family story. It takes place in 1949, so it's also a good period piece."

What should the audience expect?

"Lots of laughs and maybe getting a little choked up, too," Ver Beek says. "They're going to experience some of the best playwriting that has ever been presented."

Ver Beek says she loves many aspects of being involved with Grosse Pointe

Theatre.

"I love the friendships and working together on a project with people that love the arts just as much as I do," she says. "I love the creative process and learning new things. Especially in this show, I'm really learning a lot about sound and lighting and working closely with my production team, and

that's fun."

She's looking forward to opening night in a major way.

"I can't wait for the opening night, because I know the production will be amazing," Ver Beek says. "The cast is amazing and takes my direction so well. When the audience watches this play, it will be like they're just looking into this living room. That's how believable the actors are. There's no sense that they're acting. I'm so excited for the audience to see that."

UNSUNG HEROES CROSSING GUARDS

n a school district that prides itself on walkability, crossing guards are the vital component making our school commutes not only safe, but possible. I chatted with the three crossing guards on our twice daily commute to learn the why and how of a job so valued in the Pointes.

"I was retired and I wanted to find something else to do," says Jeani Segodnia of Grosse Pointe Park. "I saw an ad in the Grosse Pointe News for a crossing guard position."

That was eight years ago. Ever since, the former nurse and Peace Corps member has been guiding students and



parents safely across Cook Rd.

"I quit my professional job when my kids were born. Now, they're grown up and gone. Being a crossing guard gets me up and going for the rest of my day," says Lori Huguenin of Grosse Pointe Woods.

"I like talking to everybody," she

adds. And while she is getting to know the regular walkers, she laughs, "I call it Karen's social hour." Her friend and neighbor, Karen Kaled, is the one who got Huguenin to apply for the job, which covers the crossing of busy Mack Ave. "My favorite part is the people," Kaled says. "I've developed friendships."

"You really get to know these people," agrees Segodnia.









They also agree that it's not all about friendship though. "People go right through the stop sign. I have to do a lot of traffic control," says Segodnia.

"It's a serious job," says Kaled. "I say a prayer for safety every day."

Beyond physical safety, the job often deals in mental health. "A kid told me he was being bullied. I immediately went and



talked to the principal," says Segodnia. "I'd like to be seen as security for

them, as a constant in their life," says Kaled, who sees familiar faces several years later.

Children she once crossed return to visit her after high school. "It is about connection, community, about those precious years of elementary school," says Kaled.

Kaled will never forget the crossing guards in her own life. "Fred, my crossing guard at Maire Elementary, would put a kid on his shoulders every day."

Kaled graduated from Maire, Pierce and South, and then sent her children to Monteith, Brownell and

North. Huguenin has been her neighbor in the Woods since 1993, and also sent her children through Grosse Pointe Public Schools, relying also on the security of crossing guards. That they fulfill those roles today is a testament to the importance of the position.

Spend Sunday afternoons by the fire with world-class artists, architects and designers

ooking for something to do on your wintery Sunday afternoons? Add the Your Old Mansion lecture series to your calendar. This is the seventh year that the Grosse Pointe Artists Association has hosted the lecture series, dedicated to bringing outstanding architects, artists, designers and community activists to talk about their projects.

On **Sunday, Jan. 8**, you can sit by the fireplaces in the historic Alger House at The War Memorial and listen as Italian Consul Allegra Baistrocchi and Daniela D'Amico Henderson of the Dante Alighieri Society of Michigan talk about their LoveItDetroit campaign, designed to create synergy between the creative communities in Detroit and Italy. When the idea debuted in Detroit Month of Design last year, it excited attention around the world.

On **Sunday**, **Jan. 29**, artist Scott Hocking will tell his Detroit Stories. He is considered a master of documenting the city's every-changing landscape. He captured international attention for a series of sculptures assembled in abandoned buildings. Cranbrook is currently hosting his first museum retrospective titled Scott Hocking: Detroit Stories and publishing a 344-page book by the same name.

On **Sunday**, **Feb. 19**, arts historian and activist Deborah Kawsky will lead a discussion of the contributions murals make to Detroit's economic and spiritual wellbeing. Joining her will be muralists Ijania Cortez, who won the Gilda Award in 2021 from Kresge Arts in Detroit, and Hubert Massey, who was recently commissioned by Stellantis to paint a mural on the sound barrier at the Jeep plant on Mack Ave., as part of a \$35 million community benefits agreement between the company, city and neighborhood residents.

The final lecture is on **Sunday, March 12**, when Eric and Rachel Mitchell will lead a discussion among a panel of craftsmen who helped them restore the Frederick K. Stearns house, an arts and crafts mansion in West Village. The house is now an inn with 10 guest suites, a ballroom, pub and other social gathering rooms. For series ticketholders, the couple offer a tour of the house at 8109 E. Jefferson, Detroit, and a drink in the pub following the lecture.

Each lecture begins at 2 p.m. All speakers donate their time. One hundred percent of the proceeds go to support the Artists Association's free programming for veterans and senior citizens.

Dental care in pets

ost people brush their teeth twice a day and go to the dentist twice a year. Do you brush your pet's teeth twice a day? Has your pet ever had a professional dental

cleaning?

February is "Pet Dental Health Month" and the goal is to raise awareness about improving your pet's dental health. According to the American



Animal Hospital Association, most dogs and cats have some level of periodontal disease by three years of age.

Periodontal disease is caused by bacteria that are attracted to the tooth surface. Over time bacteria become mineralized and produce calculus (tartar). This leads to gingivitis (inflammation of the gum tissue), which can in turn lead to bone loss. One of the first signs of dental problems is bad breath.

Your veterinarian should do an oral exam at least once a year. If indicated, a professional dental cleaning may be recommended. This is an anesthetic procedure, which includes scaling of the teeth (to remove plaque buildup), polishing the teeth, and possible dental radiographs. If necessary, your pet may be referred to a board-certified veterinary dentist for advanced procedures, such as a root canal, in order to save a tooth.

Prevention is another step to better oral health for your pet. Daily brushing with pet safe toothpaste, dental chews, and other products recommended by the Veterinary Oral Health Council are tools that can lead to a healthier mouth.
