Advent of spring marred by tragedy

he March-April issue of *Pointe Magazine* normally celebrates the end of winter darkness and cold and the hopeful beginning of spring and warmer weather and longer days. This year, however, the Grosse Pointes are hurting, mourning the loss of two of our most promising students.

On Feb. 13, a lone gunman killed three Michigan State University students and wounded five others. Among those taken were our own Arielle Anderson, a 2021 graduate of Grosse Pointe North, and Brian Fraser, a 2021 graduate of Grosse Pointe South. As one would expect, our community sprung into action to support the victims' families and classmates. Among the outpouring of community support, The Family Center — in partnership with the school district, the Grosse Pointe Public Library and The War Memorial — offered drop-in grief counseling. St. Paul on the Lake held a vigil.

Our hearts and prayers go out to the families, students and MSU community.

On an uplifting note, Terry and I are proud to serve on the board of Michael B's Cafe, which will be a coffee shop and diner to be run by our special residents who have graduated from

Grosse Pointe Public School and Full Circle Foundation programs at age

Michael B's is the brainchild of Michael B's Alicia Carlisle, of Grosse Pointe COFFEE.COOKERY.CAFE Farms, whose own son Michael is

now 27 years old. She wanted a place where Michael and his cohorts could go to work and socialize. To be located on Mack in Grosse Pointe Park, Michael B's is slated to open in a newly constructed building in the fall of 2024.

Currently, we are in our capital campaign to raise \$3 million for the project. Our first "ladies night" fundraiser was held in February, and a "March Madness" men's night will be held Thursday, March 23 at Cabbage Patch Saloon starting at 5 p.m. More information can be found at michaelbcafe.com.

On another note, before the horrific news broke, I had the honor of interviewing Ted Everingham, one of the first people to welcome me into the Grosse Pointe business community 13 vears ago.

For all of the years I've known him, I was ignorant of the magnitude of his contributions to sailing. I guess that's not surprising. He makes a point to greet me at every event we both attend, graciously praises this publication, and then asks how the family is. Sometimes he will bring to my attention the achievements of those around him — for example, The War Memorial's winning the Detroit Free Press's Michigan Top Workplaces 2022 Award. But never does he self-promote.


During our interview, Ted choked up when he recalled receiving the call about the Harman Hawkins Trophy, and when describing his wife, Marcia, as instrumental in his success. "Marcia deserves a lot of credit for my accomplishments," he said.

He and Marcia, another force and leader in the sailing world, perhaps should have had their own feature for the major focus of this issue - our wedding issue. When we chatted, Ted laughed about those who doubted their very young nuptials, she newly graduated from high school and he from college. That was over 61 years ago.

Blended families

blended family is one in which one or both spouses were previously married and at least one spouse has children by the previous marriage. Estate planning for blended families can be difficult and requires expert advice and analysis.

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
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ou or your family member decided to earn some extra cash by becoming a driver for Uber or Lyft or deliver for Uber Eats or GrubHub. One of the most important questions you'll ask when starting out is, "Does my personal insurance cover me?" No, business use of a personal auto is not covered by personal car insurance policies.

Some companies can add this endorsement to your personal policy to allow coverage. Driver and delivery companies may also provide coverage for their drivers, but it doesn't protect you the entire time you're on the road – only when you're engaged in transporting passengers or goods.

Keep in mind, not all transportation endorsements are equal. Depending on the insurance carrier, some services are covered, and some are not. For example, just because a transportation endorsement covers Uber or Lyft it may not cover driving for other rideshare companies. Before signing up to drive or deliver for a new service, be sure to contact your agent to find out if you are properly covered.

Think spring!

inally, spring is here and you can just hear Mother Nature shout READY, SET, GO!

Spring heightens our motivation to be active with an eye on getting more fit. You'd expect the streets, gyms and studios to be busier than ever.

That's what I was thinking until I ran across some fitness statistics that really surprised me.

From the Good Body, a group of health and wellbeing



specialists that present researched articles, case studies and product reviews, I found these recent statistics.

- Just one in five U.S. adults exercise each day
- More than three quarters of children in the U.S. are active for less than the recommended 60 minutes each day.
- 23.2% of adults meet the guidelines for both aerobic and muscle strengthening activity. Focusing on aerobic exercise only, it's 53.3%.
- 42.4% of adults in the U.S. are classified as obese.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Guidelines for Physical Activity recommends adults get at least 150 to 300 minutes of moderate-intensity cardio each week along with two strength sessions. That's 25 minutes on the low end and about 50 minutes on the high end each day over six days. That could be budgeted into two days strength and four days cardio at the very least. Fewer than half of adults meet both of these recommendations, according to the CDC.

Of those that do exercise, walking is the most popular and only 10% of the population practice yoga.

So this spring, which side of these statistics will you be on?

Communication key to good health

espite the COVID pandemic slowly winding down, American heathcare continues to challenge patients and providers.

Many people delayed or reduced care during the height of the pandemic and now are trying to catch up. Now patients regularly encounter staffing and supply shortages and

burnt-out providers. Here are a few suggestions to help you get the best care.

Use the patient portals. These are gold mines of information —



your vaccine history, your test results and doctors' notes are all available to you. Many of them include ways to communicate with your primary care provider's office. It can be frustrating to have multiple portals and logins to different places, but ready access to your health information will ultimately save you time and worry.

Know your medications and check your prescription bottles before you leave the pharmacy. You can do this in the privacy of your car, just don't drive away until you know you have (only) the meds you need.

Pharmacies are not usually notified when medications are discontinued so medications are sometimes refilled when they should not be due to "auto-refill."

Make follow up appointments in advance. Providers are booking up quickly and same day or next day appointments are usually kept for urgent or unexpected health issues.

Keep your primary care provider updated on any other doctors' visits, hospitalizations, testing and medication changes. Don't assume they know especially if you receive care in a healthcare network with which they are not affiliated.

hat do life events such as marriage, divorce, birth or adoption of children, death of a loved one or other financial situations have in common? The need to update beneficiaries.

Inside the house, dividing walls were removed, unveiling views of the lake from every room. For instance,

standing at the new, glass front entrance, you can see straight through the house to the lake.

Although the lake views command attention, there are also details in the house that delight.

Kelly Carpenter of Pointe Cabinets and Design, part of the Connell team,





With a large center island, the kitchen invites guests to sit down and chat. And she has thought ahead: the marble-like top is stain-resistant.

All plumbing and electrical were replaced, and Oasis Heating and Cooling, recently acquired by Connell, installed new mechanical systems.

Michael Coyne of Coyne Interiors has worked with the Connell team to put the finishing touches on the renovation. Using Dove White paint throughout, he brings the open plan together and creates a backdrop that complements the views and whispers:





Students from Grosse Pointe Schools team up with War Memorial for learning program

In mid-January, The War Memorial (TWM) embarked on an opportunity with Grosse Pointe Public Schools where three students will participate in a work-based learning program.

The program works with special education secondary students with disabilities to provide pre-vocational/vocational training opportunities to obtain work and social skills, as well as allow them to explore employment opportunities.

The students, from Grosse Pointe Community Campus Program, will be on site with a job coach a couple of days a week for a few hours through May. This is the first time TWM has been a job site as part of the school districts transition services program.

As part of the program, department heads at TWM provided a list of tasks the students can work on each week. Tasks include cleaning, restocking, light clerical work, preparing mailing, labelling, light landscaping, dishwashing, setting tables, and more.

On Jan. 26, students Maria Caballero and Norman Hill visited with the communications and community engagement departments.

"It's been a great experience so far," Caballero said.
"We've been polishing silverware, folding napkins, and kitchen work. I'm hoping to work here for real someday, to make some money."

Ericka Sobczak, director of human resources and culture, said TWM was first introduced to the program by a direct contact that Vice President of Community Engagement and Programming Leah Celebi had at Grosse Pointe Public Schools.

After meeting in the fall, it was decided to move forward once the new Alger Center opened and there was more capacity and tasks to take on a program like this.

She noted that the partnership has been long overdue for TWM.

Previous GPPS work-based learning partnerships have been with Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, Beaumont Hospital and The Helm Boll Life Center.

So, what is Caralis most excited about, when it comes to what the audience will experience with this show?



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Ted Everingham

honored with prestigious Harman Hawkins Trophy

n February 2, 2023 in St. Pete Beach, Fla., Ted Everingham joined a list of select individuals when he was awarded the prestigious Harman Hawkins Trophy at the US Sailing Awards. The trophy is awarded annually to the individual who has made outstanding contributions to the sport of sailing in the field of race administration.

Everingham helped found the award over a decade ago, even helping to choose the name. The distinguished trophy will now bear Everingham's name, along with past winners', and spend the next year at Bayview Yacht Club.

"The trophy Ted won was a well deserved lifetime achievement award," says Bayview Yacht Club Commodore Paul Hulsey. "It sets the example for our members. We are really proud of him."

"I was involved in the creation of the award several years ago," says Everingham. "I knew what went into the choosing of the honoree. We worked hard to make it as prestigious as we could. It never occurred to me in all those years that anyone would ever consider me for it."

Perhaps to Everingham, who shies away from discussing his accomplishments, the honor was a surprise. But to anyone familiar with US Sailing, it has been a long time coming.

Everingham has been a judge or umpire at virtually every US Sailing championship event, past chair of the US Sailing Judges Committee, Race Official Instructor, member of the Review Board, part of the team that developed the modern umpire program and past commodore of Detroit Yacht Club and Bayview Yacht Club.

"It doesn't seem fair that I should get an award for as much fun as I've had, for



the interesting places I've gone, and the worldwide friends I've made," he says.

But Everingham has done much more than travel widely. As a judge and umpire, Everingham has had an enormous impact on the sport.

Through judging, he oversaw countless hearings, deciding whether or not infractures had occurred during a race

Hulsey was 10 years old when he began sailing at Bayview Yacht Club and met Everingham. "Some of my earliest sailing experiences were in the protest room with him at his hearings. I rarely won my protest," he laughs.

"It was a great learning experience for me," Hulsey adds. "When I decided to run for commodore, he was one of the first people I turned to for advice."

Unlike judging, umpiring has only been around for about 30 years and occurs during a race.

"Umpiring takes place on the water, chasing boats," says Everingham.
"When a party thinks an infraction has occurred, they wave a flag and we have to make a decision quickly, in under a

minute. It is very demanding."

Everingham was instrumental in developing the standards and rules for umpiring today. In fact, it is considered one of the leading national umpire programs in the world.

Still, he brushes off the praise — "I was in the right place at the right time."

At a fleet racing regatta at Bayview Yacht Club, a race organizer asked if anyone was interested in learning to umpire in Toronto. Everingham jumped at the opportunity.

"It was our wedding anniversary weekend," he laughs. "I called Marcia after the first day (of umpiring) and said, 'I've never had so much fun, come down!" And she did. The couple celebrated their wedding anniversary in Toronto the next day.

Marcia's matched enthusiasm is no surprise. "She is one of the best race officers in the world. She chaired that committee for US Sailing," says Everingham. "She was also the first woman to chair the Bayview-Mackinac Race and was its principal race officer for decades. Marcia deserves a lot of credit for my accomplishments."

Commodore Hulsey agrees, "Marcia gave as much to the sport of sailing. That is a testament to the Everingham family and how much they mean to Bayview."

Farflung from Bayview, Everingham has umpired in some of the world's largest races, like the Louis Vuitton Cup — the race that determines who will participate in America's Cup, the world's biggest sailing event. He umpired in the US Match Racing Championship "eight, nine, 10 times." And he's even umpired in the Olympic Trials.

Having climbed so high in the sailing world — he is also a certified international judge for World Sailing — some may be surprised to learn that Everingham didn't take up the sport until adulthood.

"I was 29 before I had even stepped on a sailboat," he says. His first experience was at Camp Michigania. Soon after, he joined Detroit Yacht Club for its adult learn-to-sail program. Marcia followed him the following year. They enrolled their three children in the junior sailing program at Detroit Yacht Club, making it a family affair.

"One of the reasons we moved to Grosse Pointe 33 years ago was we wanted to be near the water," says Everingham. "We lived near U of D at the time, in northwest Detroit. After the kids left home, we moved here. I love this community."

His love for this community is evident in his countless roles of service. Everingham is currently on the board of directors for the Grosse Pointe Chamber of Commerce and The War Memorial. He has also served as chair for both organizations. He is on the board of the Youth Nautical Education Foundation, and is past commodore of Bayview Yacht Club, Detroit Yacht Club, and the Detroit Regional Yacht Racing Association. He is the current treasurer and past president of Rotary Club of Grosse Pointe. He was instrumental in the last two Grosse Pointe Public Library millage campaigns. And he still practices law, fulfilling a dream he has had since the start of his career — to work on his own terms and to spend a

good portion of his time doing what he loves, sailing.

"I do what I do and I do my best. I live by deeds," says the former Boy Scout, who has lived by a code of service to others.

Although he still loves sailing, at the end of 2021, Everingham allowed his certification as an international judge to expire. He did the same for his certification as a US judge at the end of 2022.

"I've retired from sailing administration," he says. "As an umpire, I spent eight to 10 hours on a boat, on my feet, for several days in a row. I wanted to quit while I was ahead. Before I slowed down."

His last event was in September 2022 at Tawas Bay Yacht Club. "I wondered how I would feel after the final race," he admits. "It was relief."

Just weeks later, he received news of the award. The Harman Hawkins Trophy is well deserved proof that the world of sports, like our community, have been made better by Ted Everingham.



Heartworm disease in dogs

something commonly spoken of in veterinary medicine, but the question is, "what is it?"

Heartworm disease, as the name implies, are worms which live in the hearts of our four-legged friends.



It is transmitted by mosquitoes, and as we know we have a lot of those here in Southeastern Michigan!

Heartworm disease is something a dog could live with for several months or even years before it's detected. In the early stages, dogs are healthy and show no signs of sickness. If left untreated, however, heartworm disease can be very detrimental to their health.

Luckily, heartworm disease is easily preventable! Your veterinarian will recommend using heartworm prevention. These are most commonly chewable treats which are given once monthly to your pet, or an injection which protects for a 6- or 12-month period. It's recommended these preventatives are given year-round, especially since our weather patterns have drastically changed over the years.

While prevention is key, it's also important to perform yearly heartworm tests to make sure the prevention being used has been effective. A heartworm test is a small blood test which looks for a specific protein released by adult heartworms. If positive, your veterinarian will want to promptly initiate treatment to clear your pet's heartworm disease.


