## THE CADIEUX-KERCHEVAL SCHOOL SITE

At the last regular meeting of the School Board a delegation of taxpayers presented a petition requesting early action towards the construction of an elementary school on the property now owned by the school district at Cadieux Road and Kercheval (north corner). The petition was signed by 479 taxpayers. Mr. Frederick Laing and Mr. Ralph Clark of Grosse Pointe Park, headed the petitioners. Mr. Laing, in presenting the petition, said they were prepared to get a great many more signers if the Board thought a stronger expression was needed. He explained that 279 of the signers resided in Grosse Pointe Park, about 150 in the Village and the other 50 in rest of the Township; pointing out that this request was not a contention of any village, but was mainly an expression of the parents of the children who would use the school asking that it be logically and conveniently located.

The property under consideration was purchased for an elementary school three years ago with a view to the elimination of the old Cadieux School which is poorly located in relationship to new population growth. The construction of the school building was being delayed until after the much needed Junior High School Number One was located and built.

At the special meeting on September 30th, attended by over 600 electors, the bond issues on the three Junior High sites were defeated by approximately a two to one vote. Those in the majority at this meeting, sensing what appeared to be an opportunity to put Junior High site Number One definitely out of their neighborhood, made a motion to construct Junior High Number One on the Cadieux-Kercheval site instead of the elementary school. The School Board attorney, Mr. Fitzpatrick, informed the meeting this mo-

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### COST OF GABRIEL RICHARD SCHOOL

With the opening of the Gabriel Richard School this September and the subsequent inspection of the modern equipment and appointments of this beautiful school many taxpayers have become concerned over the cost of the building. A great deal of misinformation seems to be in circulation in our school district as a whole but most particularly on the Richard school. During the excitement of the Sept. 30th campaign and open meeting in the High School Auditorium, on Junior High School bond issues some of the statements made were very startling and gave cause for investigation.

A. It was said that the Gabriel Richard roof cost \$80,000.00.

\*B. It was said that the per student cost of the Gabriel School was \$620.

C. It was said that the Gabriel Richard School was a gross extravagance and an example of a tendency of our present school board to waste the taxpayers' money.

Civic News has investigated these statements and finds:

a. That the French type of roof constructed in slate cost \$20,000 more than the cheapest flat roof would have cost (communication of Sept. 15th from office of Robt. O. Derrick) and that the storage space provided by the high pitch of the roof, houses fans and ventilating equipment. Had a flat roof been used more basement would have been required than now exists to provide for these facilities, and Mr. Derrick writes "would have consumed considerable of the difference in cost between the two types of roof."

b. Mr. Oldson of the Detroit School system was asked to compute the per student cost of the

Richard school using the Detroit method of figuring. He gave the per student cost as \$441.00.

c. To the third and general charge of extravagance Civic News finds that the per cubic foot cost of the Gabriel Richard School is 41 cents while the average of the Detroit Schools built during the same period was 42.4 cents. (Board of Education Report, City of Detroit, 1929, page 120.)

A point of interest about the Richard school is that it is a cheaper school from the per student cost standpoint than the Trombly or the Mason school. (This, of course, is due in part to its having been built at a more advantageous time.)

The Board of Directors of the Citizens Association after reviewing the facts of the case think the Architect, Builder and the present School Board should be complimented on the accomplishment of the Gabriel Richard School from the standpoint of appearance, appointments, and cost. What do you think?

\*With statement B on the per student cost of the Richard School it was pointed out that the John Marshall School of Detroit cost \$272 per student. Investigation proves that the John Marshall School by crowding 1,320 students within its cinder block unplastered walls made a student cost of \$272. But since the time of construction the Detroit Board has found it necessary to make alterations in the cheap interior from the standpoint of health and comfort of the pupils, increasing the per student cost. The cheap construction of the John Marshall School is now considered a mistake by the Detroit Board of Education and they have discontinued the idea of constructing similar buildings.

tion was not in order because the special meeting was called for the express purpose of accepting or rejecting the bond issues and it had no other jurisdiction. Nevertheless, an appeal was made from the decision of the chair and the motion passed. President of the Board, Mr. Fred Sutter, said that while the motion was without legal qualification, it would be taken as an expression of the majority of those present.

The petition for the elementary school originated in Grosse Pointe Park and 60% of the signers are from the Park, mostly in the north-eastern section. Another interesting feature of the situation is that the 479 electors on the petition are requesting that a school be built in their neighborhood, while the 400 or so electors at the September 30th meeting were voting to keep a school out of their neighborhood. The idea, as stated by the petition, was one of convenience for the children who would use it.
