## Vernier Re-Elected; Rasmussen People's Choice

#### Garska, Members of Park Council Point to Record in Office

Four Grosse Pointe Villages, the Park, Grosse Pointe Village, the Shores and Lochmoor, will go to the polls next Monday, March 10, to select officials of their respective communities for the ensuing term. In Grosse Pointe Shores, the spring election will be held May 20.

Alfred J. Garska, incumbent, and John Bery, are contesting for the office of president of Grosse Pointe Park, while five candidates are seeking the three offices of commissioner. Samue Bastien, William P. Shoemaker and Thomas W. McGilligan are the present commissioners, and Noah G. Paye and Harry LeFevre are the new canddidates for the office. No primary election was held due to a clause in the Village charter which states that a primary may be held only when there are more than twice the number of candidates in the field as there are offices to be filled.

Garska, as president, and Bastien. McGilligan and Shoemaker, as commissioners, are citing the progress and development in Grosse Pointe Park during their administration and their record of achievement in contributing to this progress and development as the basis of their appeal to the electorate to return them to office.

#### High Position and Life

Sacrificed for Beard

There is at least one record of a man who gave his life for his beard; or died in consequence of the fear of losing it. The tale is attested in history. It relates to Gillaume Duprat, bishop of Clermont, sufficiently eminent to sit in the council of Trent and who is celebrated in memory connected with the building of the College of Jesuits at Paris. On one Easter morning as he was about to enter his cathedral he was faced by three members of his chapter, bearing among them a razor, a pair of seissors, a basin of warm water, a cake of soap and a towel. It was the end of Du-

prat; or the beginning of the end. Duprat's beard was patriarchal. It was not approved by the prevailing sentiment of the church at the time; and a resolution had been adopted calling upon him to remove it. He had not removed it. Thus he knew what portended when these ominous signs confronted him on the cathedral porch. He turned and fled -with his beard. He found asylum, or refuge, in his castle at Beauregard. It was a cul de sac. He could not go forth with safety to his beard. He bent beneath his distress, sickened and died-of a broken heart, says tradition, which is always as good as history and frequently much better .-Boston Herald.

While the United States has taken the position that the War of 1812 did not necessarily terminate those treaties, there would appear to be no doubt that the provision of article. VIII of the treaty of Ghent, concluded on December 24, 1814, endeavored to have a provision inserted in that treaty which would secure for British subjects the right to navigate the Mississippi, but, the American negotiators being ain willing to yield to that proposal, it was not included in the treaty. Incumbent Officials of Grosse Pointe Park Point To Record In Office As Meriting Your Re-Electing Them

FELLOW RESIDENTS OF GROSSE POINTE PARK:

With the passing of another year in the development of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, it seems fitting to call your attention to a few facts concerning the progress of Village affairs. During that year many improvements have made our Village more worthy of civic pride. Outstanding among the things accomplished in the past year are:-

The completion of the Fox Creek Closed Drain, eliminating a long existing menace to public health and increasing property values throughout the entire Village.

The adoption of a new system of training in the Police and Fire Departments, increasing the protective values of both units, which, with additional equipment and personnel in the Fire Department has brought about a reduction in fire insurance

The re-organization of the Department, of Highways and Public Works with added equipment has reduced the cost of repair work, kept our streets cleaner and in a better state of repair, and made the collection and disposal of garbage and refuse more prompt and regular. One instance of the increased efficiency in our Highway Department was the prompt removal of the abnormal snow-fall of last December 18. Our streets were open to traffic and all catch basins cleared to prevent possible flooding of streets in a much shorter period of time than in any of the surrounding communities.

The establishment of the headquarters of the Grosse Pointe Library in our Village, circulating between 3500 and 4000 volumes per month, was made possible only by the co-operation of the Village Commission with the County and Township.

A complete survey of the records would show much more to the credit of the Commission and to the departments in charge of each individual Commissioner.

Monday, March 10, is the date for the annual election of Village Officials. The continuation of the present administration of the affairs of the Village depends on the re-election of Alfred J. Garska as Village President, Samuel Bastien, Thomas McGilligan and Wm. P. Shoemaker as Commissioners.

Your support would be appreciated for a continuation of the policies that have made Grosse Pointe Park a progressive community.
