Comrades and Residents Honor Two Park Patrolmen In Death

TWO PARK PATROLMEN, VICTIMS OF RUTHLESS GUNFIRE OF GANGSTERS, BURIED WEDNESDAY; SERVICES FORMAL

Official police funerals for the two Grosse Pointe Park patrolmen, Claude Lanstra and Erhardt Meyer, who were killed by gangsters early Sunday morning were held Wednesday, the former's services being held in the morning and the latter's in the afternoon. The two officers were the first Grosse Pointe Patrolmen to be killed in the line of duty in the history of the community and paid the supreme sacrifice in one of the most cold blooded murders ever perpetrated by gangsters in the Detroit area.

Two Daring Robbers Ransack Sales Home Escaping With \$300

Awakened by a flashlight playing on his face, Murray W. Sales was the victim of two daring burglars who entered his home at 17743 Jefferson avenue, Grosse Pointe Village, early last Saturday morning and robbed him of \$300. After obtaining the money, the pair made preparations to bind and gag him but desisted from these operations when they were assured that no outburst would be made, Sales told the Village police, who are conducting a search for the burglars.

Threatening to alarm Mrs. Sales, the two youthful thugs were disarmed from doing this upon being told that the door leading to her bedroom was to the bathroom.

It is the theory of the Sales' household that the burglary resulted from preparations for a musical recital in the home Saturday night. Two hundred of Detroit's socially prominent persons were present to hear Ossip Gabrilowitch. Outside help had been brought in to assist the servants. The intruders gained entrance to the Sales home through the rear door, it is believed.

Gangsters' Cold Blooded Double Murder of Park Officers Marks Grosse Pointe's First Patrolmen to Pay with Lives in Discharge of Duties.

Interest in Annual School District Poll Monday, at Low Ebb

Interest in the approaching annual School District election to be held next Monday, June 9, is comparatively at a low ebb as result of there being no opposition in the race for the two vacancies on the board and only issues of minor importance, if any, confronting the electors on the ballots or at the "vive voce" meeting which is to take place at 8 o'clock in the evening in the High School building.

Charles Poupard, incumbent treasurer, is a candidate to succeed himself as trustee and J. Lee Barrett, of Grosse Pointe Park, a newcomer in the School District's political circles, is Poupard's running mate for the other vacancy on the Board caused by the expiration of the term of office of Julius L. Berns. Berns, vice president of the Board, has been an exceedingly active trustee during his term of office. This year, however, he has steadfastly refused to be a candidate.

Little Action

Routine business, only, was conducted at the regular school board meeting held last Monday evening in the High school building. Recommendations of Dr. Brownell for the purchase of miscellaneous school needs, including gym and playground equipment to the amount of approximately \$3,000 were accepted and the purchases authorized. It was Julius Berns' last meeting before he leaves office, next Monday, and he marked the occasion by a striking display of leadership in the discussion and dispensation of even the routine business as has been his custom and practice.

Poupard and Barrett will be automatically elected next Monday, being without contestants. The reported "licker" candidacy in behalf of a woman resident, rumored to have been started last week, so far has failed to get past the "report" stage. The one and only issue electors have been asked to consider on the ballots is the dedication of part of the Kerby elementary school site for highway purposes.

Cadieux Teachers in Farewell Fete Given A. H. Clark, Principal

A farewell luncheon was tendered last Wednesday noon by the teachers of the Cadieux elementary school to A. H. Clark, principal of the school, who at the close of the current school year will leave the principal's post to undertake a teacher's position at the Grosse Pointe High school. The luncheon which was held in the Cadieux school was attended by the entire staff of the teachers, numbering 15. They welcomed the opportunity to express their appreciation and esteem for Mr. Clark's leadership during the eight years he reigned as principal at Cadieux. As a token of their affection and regard for his abilities and accomplishments in their behalf and in the interests of the school children in the community, a handsome set of bronze book ends were presented to him, the gift of his teaching staff.

The assignment of Mr. Clark, returning him to the teachers ranks after his long and satisfactory service as principal was recommended by Dr. S. M. Brownell, superintendent of schools, and approved by the School Board. It is to be effective at the beginning of the next year in September.

During his career as principal, Mr. Clark won the affection and co-operation of all with whom he came in contact and was particularly endeared to the school children who had attended and are attending the Cadieux school because of his genial-temperament and sound character. His ability as an able and competent principal was and is today recognized by the teachers, parents of the school children and the school children themselves.

One of the outstanding achievements of his career as principal was the important part he played in having the High School placed on the accredited list of the University of Michigan. Mr. Clark holds a degree of Master of Arts from the University of Michigan.

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Two Park Patrolman Victims of Gangsters

Ena Pinasco, 184 Victor avenue, Highland Park, was struck by an automobile. The driver helped to carry her into a candy store and then drove away.

The license number of this car, however, had been taken by Gus Anaston, a clerk in the store, and was reported to the Grosse Pointe Park police. Patrolmen Lanstra and Meyer, detailed to search for the driver, saw a car bearing the license number they sought parked at the curb in front of the Village Restaurant, 15017 Jefferson avenue.

In the car, a large coupe, were three men. Two other cars, filled with men, were at the curb behind it, witnesses told police later.

The patrolmen, riding in a scout car with Lanstra driving, swung to the curb ahead of the three cars. Meyers, in uniform, jumped out and started back. Witnesses in the restaurant said the driver of the coupe fired once at Meyer, who fell without returning the fire. His pistol was clasped in his hand when he was picked up.

Lanstra, still in the police car, drew his pistol and fired at the men. All three parked cars fled, the men in the coupe firing on Lanstra as it shot away from the curb. Witnesses said occupants of the car directly behind the coupe also joined in the shooting and shots are believed to have come from the third car. Lanstra was struck by four bullets. More than 25 shots were fired in all.

The side and rear of the police car were pierced by bullets and a number flew wild down Jefferson avenue.

The Grosse Pointe Park police station is less than a block from the scene and officers, hearing the shots, ran into the street in time to see the coupe speed west into Detroit.

Chief Drysdale said he was certain the men in the three cars were rum-

they did not want to be questioned, runners or gunmen and fired because about their presence on Jefferson avenue. There was extensive activity Saturday night and early Sunday among the liquor runners because the Canadian export docks were closed by law at midnight.

A favorite place for landing the loads brought across Lake St. Clair is along the shore of Alter road, the Detroit City limits, to Pemberton road in Grosse Pointe Park, the liquor being taken from the boat to waiting automobiles or trucks, which are driven to Jefferson avenue.

Chief Drysdale said that it had been known for some time that a gang had been operating along the Detroit city limits, running liquor under heavy guard to depots in Detroit. He believes the slayers were members of this gang.

Patrolman Lanstra had been a member of the Grosse Pointe Park police department for a year. He was a brother of Chief Harold Lanstra of the St. Clair Shores police, and lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Lanstra.

Wife Collapses
Patrolman Meyer joined the Grosse Pointe Park police in June, 1928, and was married a month later. His wife, Audrey Meyer, collapsed when she was told of her husband's death. Lanstra's elder brother, also a Grosse Pointe Park patrolman, died a month ago following an operation for appendicitis.

Police have in custody two members of the gang believed involved in the killing of Grosse Pointe Park's two officers.

 But, especially is this true of those who are serving in the Police Department. Those men risk their lives in order to protect us, our families, our homes, our property. Out in the dark hours of the night—out into the dens of crime and wickedness, these men go in order to run down and apprehend the criminal and, thus, to protect our lives and our property. Do we realize what a debt of gratitude we owe to these public servants? I want to tell you that I've always had a warm spot in my heart for these men.
 This brother's life was given to service in this high office; and, in that service, he has paid the supreme price. Saturday evening he donned his uniform, bade good-bye to his dear wife and went to police headquarters to take up his assigned place of duty for the night; and in the performance of those duties, he and his partner were shot down. Yes, he paid the supreme price—he laid down his life in serving the people of this community.
 And, he has not paid the price alone, but others are paying a price with him; Here is this heart-broken young wife,

with whom he was joined in wedlock at this altar less than two years ago. What a tremendous price this tragedy demands of her! And, here is this grief-stricken mother—what a price she is paying in her declining years to have to give up her boy. And, here are these sorrowing brothers and sisters, and these children who loved him as "Uncle Eddie." I say, you are all paying a price in the sacrifice you make and in the sorrow that you feel.
 But, my brethren, you are not paying this price for naught, and you are not without a comfort that is rich and beautiful: Your beloved died a hero. He died in the service of God and of mankind. Yes, he died in the performance of duty. What a comfort to realize that he has laid down his life in such a noble way and for such a great cause! Verily, his name shall be inscribed on the monument that bears the names of the martyrs of the ages. What joy and what comfort that must give to you, his loved ones!
 And you, his comrades, must be deeply touched today as you think of the price he paid; and especially when you realize that you might have paid the price he paid if, instead of his meeting with those criminals, you had done so. So, I'm sure the Police Department of Grosse Pointe as well as the citizens of this great city of ours will ever honor the name of Erhardt Meyer who laid down his life in the service of his fellow-men; for "greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."
