1-Ash-pit should be cleaned regularly as ash accumulations interfere with draft, and lack of proper draft is cause of fuel waste because of improper combustion.

2-All danipers must fit true and tight. If fire does not burn when check draft is closed and draft damper in ash-pit door is open, draft is deficient. Chimney should be examined for possible defects such as cracks or being clogged.

New System Destined to Affect House Values.

Now that the American public is becoming air-conditioning conscious, it is easy to envision radical departures from present-day standards in home design and equipment, according to the Holland Institute of Thermology, of Holland, Mich.

Within a decade, today's modern home will be as definitely obsolete as is the home built twenty years ago compared with today's modern home. The most revolutionary feature of the home of the future will center around the heating plant. Modern warm air heating plants for bungalow or palatial residence are really indoor weather-making plants. In addition to heating, their functions are to inject an adequate supply of moisture into the home air, wash the air to free it from dust and bacteria and to keep the air in gentle, yet draftless, motion. These functions will enable the home owner to enjoy artificial June weather in his home the year

Obsolescence is a more important factor than physical depreciation in the maintenance of realty values nowadays. In building new homes, persons should equip them with a modern air conditioning system rather than just a heating system. Not only will they enjoy a degree of indoor comfort heretofore unknown in the home, but the market value of their home will not be jeopardized by the fact that the heating system is not a heating-air-conditioning system.

To supply the home air with the required amount of moisture, calls for the evaporation of several gallons of water daily-six to eight gallons in homes of moderate size. Injecting this water-vapor uniformly into the home air makes possible the maintenance of physical comfort at moderate temperatures of 70-72 degrees Fahrenlieit. Warm-air heaters of the vapor air type are equipped with specially designed humidifiers which will. automatically evaporate as much as 25 gallons of water daily. They are also equipped with electrically operated and controlled air propeller units which provide the desired air-motion and uniform heat distribution.

Modern warmin, air-conditioning systems, with thermostatically controlled dampers and automatic fuel feed, constitute the predominating modern feature of modern homes.

500,000 Cubic Feet of Air Pass Through Home Daily

During the winter heating season air in the average American home contains from one-third to one-half the amount of moisture that it should contain to insure maximum comfort at moderate temperatures and to protect health. In the average five or sixroom home which contains 10,000 to 12,000 cubic feet, six to eight gallons of water should be evaporated daily during the winter season to supply the required amount of moisture. On the surface, points out the Holland Institute of Thermology, of Holland, Mich, this apparently is a huge volume of water to inject into the home air. However, it is infinitesimal compared with the volume of air that passes through a home each day. Eight gallons of water constitute less than 11/2 cubic feet. With an average of two air changes per house, more than 500,000 cubic fe t of air would pass through the average small home each day.

Ancient Parish Church The one hundredth anniversary of the Parish church of Manchester, England, was celebrated recently when the bishop of Coventry preached a special thanksgiving • sermon. The church, which is one of the oldest in the country, stands on the same foundations of a Saxon church which was built in 930 A. D. Beautiful antique stained glass windows decorate the east wall A peal of five bells, dating from 1350, still call the villagers to church. Five books, including Fox's "Book of Martyrs" are among the church's treasured possessions. Two of the more recent English martyrs, Robert Glover and Mrs. Joyce Lewis, worshiped at the shrine. Glover was burned at the stake at Coventry in 1505, and Mrs. Lewis met a similar fate at Lichfield two years later. The old church is in a wonderful state of preservation considering her ten centuries of life.
