### Reserve Officers to Hold Convention in Detroit, January 31

Reserve officers from all over the state will attend the ninth annual convention of the Michigan Department, Reserve Officers Association of the United States, which meets at Detroit, January 31 and February 1. Major General Frank Parker, commanding general of the sixth corps area, with headquarters in Chicago, will attend the convention.

The session of the convention will be preceded by a meeting of the executive committee of the association, Friday evening, January 30. The regular sessions start Saturday morning when delegates will be received by Mayor Frank Murphy at the city hall. Luncheon will be at the Michigan Cavalry Club.

In the afternoon the main speaker will be Major General Parker, who will tell the delegates about "Training of the Organized Reserves." Preceding him on the program is Lieutenant Colonel Eugene I. Santschi, officer in charge of reserve affairs for the sixth corps area, from Chicago.

The annual banquet and ball will feature the Saturday evening program. Music for the ball will be furnished by the Second Infantry band from Fort Wayne, Michigan.

Business sessions will be held Sunday morning. Colonel C. D. Herron, executive officer of the organized reserves, in the war department, will give the main address. This will be followed by committee reports and election of officers.

### Dedication of Gabriel Richard Elementary Unit Set for Tuesday

The Rev. Fr. Edward J. Hickey, Jr., Ph. D., professor of church history at Sacred Heart Seminary, will give the principal address at the dedication of the Pere Gabriel Richard Elementary school next Tuesday evening.

For several years, Fr. Hickey has been engaged in collecting material for the writing of a biography of Fr. Richard, after whom the school is named. He is a son of Edward J. Hickey, Sr., a former member of the Board of Education. His topic will be Fr. Richard's influence in education and culture in early Detroit.

The public is invited to the dedication exercises which will begin at 8:30 o'clock. If there is not sufficient room in the auditorium of the school for those who attend, they will be accommodated in the other rooms of the school, where they hear the program by means of the radio equipment which is a feature of the school.

Invitations to the exercises have been sent to representative school men throughout the Metropolitan area, to members of the department of public instruction in Lansing, and to professors of education at the University of Michigan, Detroit Teachers College and other institutions.

The Pere Gabriel Richard school serves the area bounded by Mack Avenue, Moran Road, Lake St. Clair and Lakeland avenue. Of beautiful French chateau architecture, the building reflects the spirit of the intrepid French pioneers who made their homes in the wilderness on the shores of the Detroit river and Lake St. Clair. When the landscaping is completed, it will provide an artistic setting that will harmonize with the beautiful residences of the neighborhood, as well as the architecture of the school.

The Richard school is a Michigan ten-six year organization, with the first four grades on the traditional basis, and with departmentalized work in the fifth and sixth grades. There is a coaching room for the purpose of aiding those pupils who, for one reason or another, are in need of special help.

The classrooms are of standard size, capable of seating 40 pupils. There are built-in cupboards for textbooks and supplies. The blackboard space is adequate in each room. To comply with best acoustical and sanitary demands, the floors are laid with a linoleum which takes a wax finish well.

In addition to the regular classrooms, there are the following special rooms: a beautiful kindergarten, a combined gymnasium-auditorium, an art room, an office suite, janitors' rooms, etc.

A visit to the school on next Tuesday night will show the public the type of school that is provided for the children of Grosse Pointe.

"Polly Cologne," by A. M. Diaz. The story of a rag doll whose first appearance was in 1801. It is now reissued in attractive modern dress while the original drawings of the early edition fortunately have been retained.

"The William Henry letters," by A. M. Diaz. Another reprint of an old favorite. If read aloud the humor should be enjoyed by the entire family.

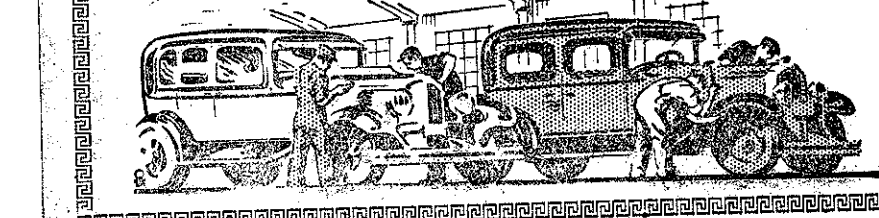

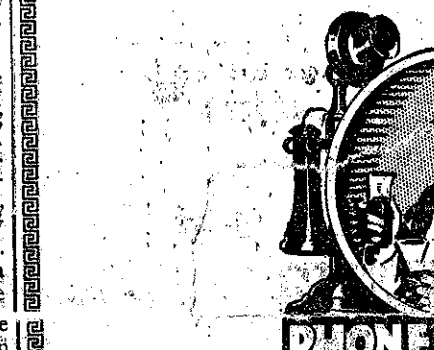
