Asks Old Route All the property involved is owned by Mr. Ford. In return for the improvement, Mr. Lumley said, Mr. Ford asks only that the right-of-way of the present road be rededicated to him for landscaping and as an entrance to his estate.

The proposed improvement marks the first extension of Wayne's double highway past the county line. In Mr. Davis' eyes, it will become the first section of a double highway from Detroit along the entire eastern lake shore of the Lower Peninsula to the Straits of Mackinac.
