Loyalty of Friends in, Death, Consoles Family of Late Judge

The recent death of Judge Arthur Vernier, of Grosse Pointe Farms, has caused considerable sorrow among his host of friends in the Pointe and scores of expressions of sympathy to be extended to the surviving members of his family, but it is particularly the cause of grief to his aged foster parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred G. Moran.

Mrs. Moran, who resides at 118 Moran road in the Farms where she has been a life-long resident, today recalls distinctly the adoption of Judge Vernier, then a boy of five years of age.

His school days, his early manhood, his marriage and his more recent career in public office are vivid memories in her mind and are the source of considerable joy to her in reminiscing.

She recalls how early in life, Judge Vernier showed his colors when at the age of 17, he enlisted with the 19th Michigan Regulars for service in the Spanish American War.

Shortly following his return from military service, he married. He was 23 at that time. His widow and a son, Arthur, Jr., survive him.

During his participation in public affairs, Judge Vernier was highly respected and revered for his honesty, ability and integrity.

Mrs. Moran's greatest consolation in her bereavement is the memory of the funeral day when friends from far and near in great numbers gathered in St Paul's church on Lake Shore road to pay their last respects to a departed friend. 
