

Voters In Five Villages To Cast Ballots Monday For Officials

1,629 Voters Turned Out For Township Election Last Monday

Approximately 1,629 votes were cast in the Township primary election held last Monday, it was estimated today by Daniel G. Allor, Township clerk and chairman of the local election board.

The polling resulted in the election, Allor announced, of Victor H. DeBaeke as Justice of the Peace for a four-year term and in the election of Andrew T. Phillips, Samuel A. Gordon, George Defer and Joseph Trombley as constables.

The office of Justice of the Peace and the constable offices were the only contested positions on Monday's ballot, the incumbent Township officers of supervisor, treasurer and clerk being re-elected without opposition. Edmund C. Vernier is the supervisor, James Rasmussen, treasurer, and Daniel G. Allor, clerk.

DeBaeke in winning the election of Justice of the Peace defeated Noah Paye, who formerly held that office for two terms and William F. Dorn, an attorney.

Champine was defeated in his race for constable, finishing fifth in the field with four to be nominated.

As a result of there not being any candidates on the opposing party ticket, the nominations obtained in Monday's balloting are equivalent to election.

Edwin Watko First Resident of "Colony" for Treasurer's Post

Edwin Watko, of 832 University Place, is one of the six candidates for the office of treasurer of Grosse Pointe Village in next Monday's election and is the first resident of the so-called "Colony" district to seek that office.

He is 36 years of age and was formerly employed in the purchasing department of the Hudson Motor company. Following his return from France where he served with the U. S. Army, Mr. Watko was engaged as a salesman with Peschke Packing company. It was while thus employed that he developed numerous acquaintances and friends among residents of the Village.

His friends point to his intimate knowledge of modern business methods as of being assistance in the operation of the treasurer's office, if he is elected, and also look to him to bring into play his characteristic ability and energetic methods.

Grosse Pointers in Florida Residence Victims of Bandits

Four bandits armed with pistols and a machine gun invaded an exclusive apartment in Hollywood, Fla., and took \$60,000 in jewels and cash from Mr. and Mrs. Arthur J. Rohde, of 911 Edgemont Park, Grosse Pointe, and their 14 guests, according to word received here this week from that city.

Mrs. Edna O. Smith, of Detroit Towers, surrendered \$30,000 in jewels to the bandits. Miss Virginia Diamond, her daughter, also of Detroit, lost an \$1,800 wrist watch and a \$50 necklace.

The robbers, their faces masked, entered the Rohde apartment at Hollywood during a party last night. Several carried pistols and one was armed with a sub-machine gun. They lined their victims against the wall and proceeded systematically to strip them of their jewelry.

Rohde lost a \$600 diamond ring and \$150. Mrs. Smith reported loss of two rings valued at \$9,000; a diamond bracelet worth \$15,000 and a diamond studded brooch, valued at \$5,000. Mrs. John Truss, wife of a Detroit broker, Mrs. Rohde and Mrs. L. Runge, of Hollywood, were not molested by the bandits.

Frank Black, of Miami Beach, lost \$1,000. The bandits took \$240 from John Jennings, a dancer at the Hollywood Country Club, and \$110 from William Kimball of Hollywood.

The remainder of the loot was taken from unnamed guests, residents in and near Hollywood.

Rohde today informed his father-in-law, Edward Verlinden, who lives at the Rohde home, 911 Edgemont park, Grosse Pointe, of the robbery.

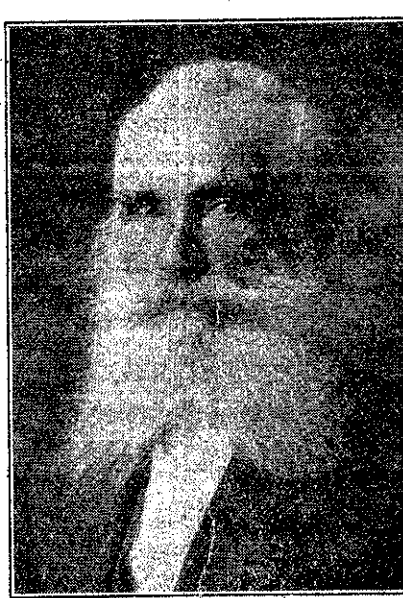
Daughter's Home Is Scene of Death of Charles Lachat, Here


