I have been a member of the Council of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms for eight consecutive years, the period during which the Village has enjoyed its greatest development. In 1923 we realized that the existing utilities were so inadequate as to be dangerous with such a rapidly growing population.

Under our direction and supervision a modern and comprehensive sewer system has been built; sanitary sewage no longer enters Lake St. Clair and the stagnant Black Marsh Ditch was placed underground just when it was beginning to be a serious menace to the health of the Community. While many of the old street sewers must sometime be replaced, the new system of trunks and interceptors will take care of the largest population that the Village can ever have.

During these same years nearly every street in the Village has been paved, Kercheval Avenue has been opened and there is every prospect that the Lake Shore Road will be widened and greatly improved through an arrangement we have entered into with the County Road Commission.

The water main system has been added to according to a definite plan resulting in better pressure and more complete fire protection. We now have filtered water from the City of Detroit, and the Village Filtration Plant and Pumping Station, which will. be in operation in April, wil give us the same quality of water at a lower cost.

I have taken particular interest in, and believe that I may say that I have been largely responsible for the construction of the Village Dock, which has done so much to promote boating, swimming and skating, and for the development of the Lake Front Park, which we shall be able to use this summer, and which, unlike most such parks, is costing the Village an almost negligible amount of money.

I feel that I may justly take some pride in the part that I have had for eight years in bringing about so much progress without an unreasonable increase in taxation, and it is on a basis of this record that I seek election as President of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms.
