### Farms Opens New Water System

#### Residents Inspect New Water Plant in Farms: Open Now

Grosse Pointe Farms may well feel proud of its new water system and filtration plant that was dedicated last Sunday when more than a thousand residents of Grosse Pointe Township turned out to inspect the beautiful new building and to attend the dedication services. The plant is located at the corner of Moross road and Provençal boulevard.

Considering the vast amount of preliminary planning, starting from the recommendation of health officer, Dr. B. H. Warren and the discussions by Township and Farms officials during Daniel G. Allor's last administration as president of the Farms, to the election of Kenneth Moore who succeeded Allor, and who as one of the first acts of his administration brought forth the

#### Village Tax Review Board will Meet Next Monday and Tuesday

Monday and Tuesday, May 25 and 26, from 8:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m., have been set by the officials of the Village of Grosse Pointe for a meeting of the Board of Review to hear complaints on taxes levied by the Village for 1931. The meetings will be held at the Village Hall, 17150 Maumee avenue. Objections to the amount of either real or personal taxes can be made at these meetings.

In past years, the Board of Review of the Village has not met until the middle of June. The purpose of this year's earlier date is to bring closer together the beginning of the fiscal year of the Village, March 1, and the date for the collection of taxes. In fact, the Village officials predict, that hereafter the Board will sit even earlier in the year, resulting in being able to start the collection of taxes much sooner than in the past.

This year the Village will start collecting taxes June 1st. Regardless of the funds spent in Village welfare work during the past year, which, of course, were unexpected, and not a part of the 1930 budget, Village officials by planning rigid economies have been able to adopt a budget for 1931 resulting in a tax rate for this year which is the same as last year.

#### Ed. Vernier Requests School Board Leave to Meet in Building

As president of the Village of Lochmoor, Edmund C. Vernier has requested the Grosse Pointe Board of education for permission to use the Mason school building for the purpose of holding the council meetings there. The request was made by letter to the Board, but up to the time of the regular meeting last Monday evening no action had been taken. Trustee Charles Poupard introduced the matter at the Board's meeting, Monday evening. Fred Sutter, president of the Board, asked the superintendent of schools, Dr. S. M. Brownell, to investigate the request before a decision was made.

#### High School Carnival Takes Place Saturday; Plans Are Completed

Plans for the Grosse Pointe High school carnival to be held Saturday night are concluded. Home rooms and clubs alike have put forth efforts to aid, by sponsoring interesting concessions. The Junior Dramatic Club is showing a continuous miniature movie. The Hi-Y club is taking full charge of the checking. Miniature golf is being offered by home room 206.

#### WALTER S. CONELY ANNOUNCES HIS CANDIDACY FOR SCHOOL BOARD: CITES EXPERIENCE ON H. P. BOARD

Walter S. Conely, of 1046 Kensington road, Grosse Pointe Park, on Tuesday announced his candidacy for trustee on the Grosse Pointe School Board. Petitions in his behalf are reported in circulation and it is expected they will be filed before the closing date for petitions on Saturday, May 23.

He is seeking the post on the School Board now held by Fred Sutter whose term expires this year. The election is scheduled to be held June 8. Mr. Sutter on Monday announced his candidacy for re-election.

Mr. Conely has resided in Grosse Pointe three years and prior to taking up his residence here lived in Highland Park for 22 years during which time he was actively interested in school affairs of that community.

He served the Highland Park School Board for 12 years, being in office in various capacities from 1910 to 1922. In that time he served as secretary, treasurer and president of the Board and it was during his extended tenure of office that practically all schools in Highland Park were constructed, it was reported.

During his membership on the Board in Highland Park, he saw the school system there develop from a single 8-room school building, housing about 350 pupils, to eight school buildings, including the High school, to care for the educational needs of approximately 12,000 pupils.

Believing that Mr. Conely's experience and record on the Highland Park School Board, which stands among the highest in the country, gave him qualifications that would make him a valuable member of the School Board in Grosse Pointe Township where he now resides, a large group of his friends throughout the community are reported to have induced him to become a candidate for School Trustee at the coming election on June 8.

In announcing his candidacy, Mr. Conely made the following statement:

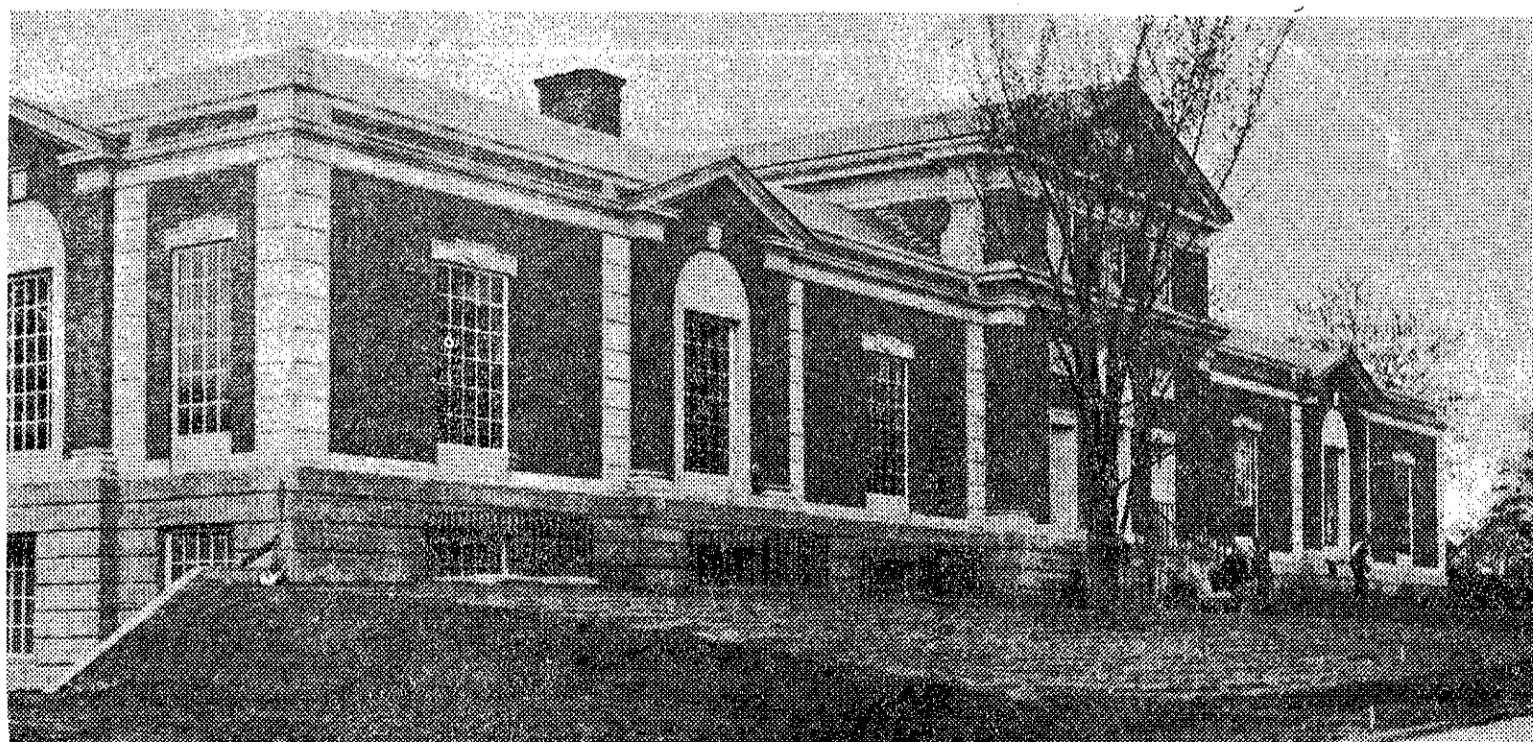

### Grosse Pointe Farms Pumping Station

Last Sunday witnessed the formal dedication and opening ceremonies of the new pumping station recently constructed in Grosse Pointe Farms at an approximate cost of \$287,000. Hundreds of residents in that community led by a vanguard of the Village officials inspected the new station that will henceforth supply the water needs in a most satisfactory manner. The station is located on Seven Mile road near Lake Shore drive and has a present filter and treatment capacity of 6,000,000 gallons daily with possible expansion to 12,000,000 gallons daily. Murray M. Smith, engineer in the Farms, has been named water superintendent and will be assisted by the following plant personnel: Siney DeBoer, chemist; Herman Dondero, chief operator; and John Auckland, Ignatius Backman and Fred Dansbury, assistant operators.

#### Assessed Valuation in Township Reduced 10 Per Cent by Vernier

Edmund C. Vernier, supervisor of Grosse Pointe Township, announced this week that he has authorized a blanket 10 per cent reduction in the assessed valuation of property in the Township. His action, Mr. Vernier pointed out, has been approved by the State taxing authorities and it is expected that the lowered assessed valuation will work for a reduction in the State taxes.

"The reduction of the assessed valuation of the Township," said Mr. Vernier, "does not automatically make a similar reduction in the Township tax. The Township tax is controlled by the various budgets of the district and the Supervisor's office does not control the fixing of the tax rate."

"It is the assessed valuation of the Township that the Supervisor can control and in keeping with the existing economic circumstances, I have authorized the flat 10 per cent reduction in assessed valuation of property."

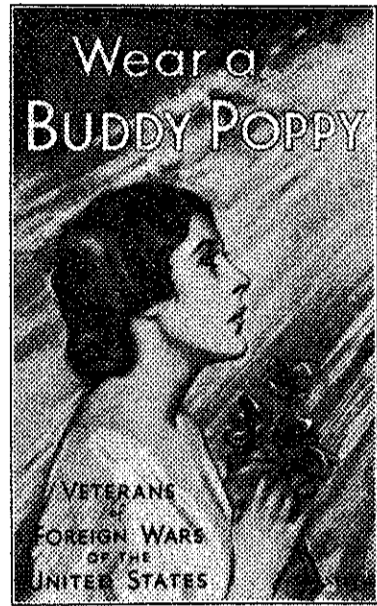
#### Village Residents to Obtain Cards at Park: Urged to Do So Early

In a statement issued this week, William Fisher, member of the Village council and commissioner in charge of the Village Park at the foot of University place, urged residents who will need and are entitled to cards admitting them to the Park to obtain them early.

He announced that the cards for the Park will be issued this year by the attendants at the entrance gates to the Park. In former years it was the practice and custom, Mr. Fisher stated, to issue the cards at the office of the Village clerk.

Previous to this year, they were issued at the Village clerk's office, but the work involved in satisfactorily caring for the matter proved to be interfering with the other functions of the Village government.

"Attendants at the Village Park have been instructed properly in the matter of caring for residents upon making an application for a card and it can not be too strongly pointed out to the residents that it would be for their best interests to obtain their cards at once rather than delay until the summer season is on in full swing."

#### Park Council Calls Public Hearing Next Wednesday on Budget

The Grosse Pointe Park council announced this week that a public hearing will be held on the 1931 budget at the Municipal building, next Wednesday, May 27. The hearing will open at 9 a. m.

The summary of the 1931 budget on file now at the office of the clerk indicates that approximately \$452,550 will have to be raised by taxation to meet the requirements of the Park during the next fiscal year.

#### Summarizes Effect of Recent Legislation on G. P. School District

The Legislature has passed a series of amendments to the State School code in what was known as the "Omnibus Bill," it was announced at the School Board meeting last Monday evening.

The effect of the "Omnibus Bill" on the Grosse Pointe School District, according to Fred Sutter, president of the School Board in summary follows:

1. Bond issues will be voted on in precincts rather than in general meetings where a "viva voce" vote is taken;
2. Obstacles are cleared for the entrance of the Grosse Pointe School District into a district of the third class; at present Grosse Pointe is classified as a Rural Agricultural School District;
3. Transportation of school children is optional with the School Board instead of formerly when it was compulsory to furnish transportation.
