Fred Sutter, President of Board, Advances County Plan to Save Wayne

Plans for the organization of Grosse Pointe County, separate and distinct from Wayne County, week by Fred Sutter, of 1000 Kensington, annual savings of hundreds of thousands of dollars from Wayne County, seemingly, would result in saving from Wayne County to form the new county, following his preliminary investigation.

Mr. Sutter, who is president of the Grosse Pointe County Plan, in his announcement stated that he has the support of the Township and of the five Villages in purpose of considering his plan, as a

The meeting will be held, Mr. Sutter said, next Monday evening, June 1, in the Municipal building in Grosse Pointe Park.

"In times such as we are living through at present," said Mr. Sutter, "public and private expenditures are being curtailed. Items of expense which are not essential are eliminated while other items are reduced as far as possible. In Grosse Pointe as elsewhere public appropriations are quite properly being held in check to lighten the tax burden.

"It has occurred to me however, that while we have been busy in lopping off a dollar or so here and there we have lost sight of a possible saving running into hundreds of thousands per annum. We are saving at the spigot and wasting at the bung. I wish to call the attention of our taxpayers to a possible saving which in my opinion, should amount to a million dollars every three years. In fact within the next few years it is entirely probable that this saving will be substantially greater than the sum mentioned.

"The item of expense which I propose for consideration at this time is the tax which Grosse Pointe pays to Wayne County. Last year we paid a county tax of \$487,690.31 and it will not be long, with our increased valuations due to building, before we are paying into the Wayne County treasury at least \$500,000.00 per annum. What do we receive for this huge sum? We get a little use of the Probate Court, the Register of Deeds, Circuit

Odd Organization for Preservation of Trees

Men of the Trees is the name of an organization of African scouts founded by Richard E. St. Barbe Baker, formerly assistant conservator of forests in the Kenya colony. The natives, the Kikuyu tribe, are Bantu in origin and many of the old tribal customs are retained. Certain trees are held sacred and sacrifices are made to them. Mr. Baker, on his arrival in the colony, found that large areas of forest had been destroyed by fire and to make way for cultivation. He assembled the chiefs and explained to them the value of forests to man and proposed that instead of being forest destroyers they become forest planters. Many of the natives immediately responded and the Watu wa Mili, or Men of the Trees, was organized. The badge is a small brass disk bearing the design of a tree; the colors are green and white. Later on a simple ritual and initiation ceremony were evolved. Like the Boy Scouts, the members are expected to do a good deed each day. The entire organization is known as the Forest, which is divided into districts, each named after the dominant species of tree growing in it. The districts are divided into branches, each ruled by a forest guide. An important part of the work is the planting of a forest nursery, where more than 80,000 young trees have been raised.

Interesting Picture of Birth of Solar System

Tracing time and its changes back to the very beginning of things, Sir James Jeans of Cambridge gives, in a recently published work, a wonderful picture of the birth of our solar system as the result of a collision some 2,000,000,000 years ago.

"A second star, wandering blindly through space, happened to come within hailing distance of the sun. Just as the sun and moon raise tides on the earth, so this second star must have raised tides on the surface of the sun... a huge tidal wave must have traveled over the surface of the sun, ultimately forming a mountain of prodigious height, which would rise even higher and higher as the cause of the disturbance came nearer and nearer. And, before the second star began to recede, its tidal pull had become so powerful that this mountain was torn to pieces and threw off small fragments of itself, much as the crest of a wave throws off spray. These small fragments have been circulating around their parent sun ever since. They are the planets, great and small, of which our earth is one."

South Africa's "Tablecloth"

The "Tablecloth" is a cloud that occasionally covers the flat top of Table Mountain in South Africa. Charles Fitzhugh Talman of the United States weather bureau, in his book "The Realm of the Air," says it is probably the most famous individual cloud in the world, and in describing it adds: "It consists of a dense cloud sheet, formed when warm moisture-bearing winds are forced up the steep slope of the mountain, especially in summer. The cloud often pours over the brow of the mountain, like a mighty waterfall, and is dissolved as the wind is warmed by compression in descending to a lower level. The effects produced by this rolling mass of vapor are sometimes indescribably grand, and the phenomenon is all the more striking because a perfectly clear sky generally prevails over the surrounding country while the "Tablecloth" over-spreads the mountain."

Canning Factory in Arctic

Within a few hundred miles of the North pole a fish-canning factory has been established, worked entirely by Eskimos. The plant, financed by the Danish government, is in Holstenberg, Greenland, a town beyond the Arctic circle.

Modern in every detail, the factory makes use of electric power derived from the swift-running rivers, and employs up-to-date dynamos and oil engines for emergencies. It is operated mainly by Eskimo women. The whole population of the district, numbering approximately 250, is devoted to the new industry. A fleet of modern motor fishing boats, recently shipped from Denmark, keeps the establishment supplied.

Famous Old Roman Road

The Applan way is a famous road built by the Romans between the cities of Rome and Brandist. It received its name from Applan Claudius, who was censor when the first part of the road was begun about 312 B. C. The section between Capua and Rome is about 140 miles long and is as straight as a taut string. The width of the road ranges from 14 to 18 feet. No expense was spared in making the pavement and part of the original road bed is still used without much alteration.

Divisions of Ship's Crew

The crew of a ship is divided into three departments. The first is the deck department. The captain, first, second, third and fourth mates, the boatswain, able seamen, ordinary seamen and radio operators belong to this department. In the engineering department there are the chief engineer, second, third, fourth and junior engineers, firemen, greasers, water tenders and coal passers. Those belonging to the steward's department are the chief steward, second steward, cook, second cook, mess steward and mess boy.

Involved? The answer is, make Grosse Pointe Township a county. Let us have our own county organization, run our own affairs, be independent of Wayne and save money by so doing. So the answer is, Grosse Pointe county. "I have held preliminary conversations with a number of Grosse Pointe business men, attorneys and local public officials. After the shock of novelty had worn off, these citizens expressed the liveliest interest and urged that the idea be fully investigated. What is proposed now is that we make a thorough survey of the situation from the financial, legal and political viewpoints. Let us secure the facts. Let us study the advantages of the plan and its disadvantages, if there be any. I would strongly discourage any disposition on the part of our taxpayers to jump at conclusions either one way or the other until the committee has submitted a report.

"The fact that Grosse Pointe is a purely residential community of an exceptionally high character means that our county activities for the most part would be routine or clerical. Machinery for handling crime, poverty, disease or legal matters would be of the simplest. Below is given the county organization required by existing law.

"The above is not entirely an addition to our present list of public offices for the reason that present township officers would become county officers and to that extent cutting down the number of created offices. The skeleton county organization necessary to serve Grosse Pointe while formidable looking on paper is in reality fairly simple. A preliminary study indicates that it can be operated at a fraction of what we are now paying Wayne County thus saving to our taxpayers a substantial sum each year.

"It should be remembered that Grosse Pointe Township is entirely included within the limits of the five villages, namely, the Park, the Village, the Farms, the Saucers and Lochmoor. There is no township territory outside of the corporate limits of the five villages. That frequently asked question, "Why have a township?" may be answered thus: "Make it a county!" The villages are the township and under the new set-up the township becomes the county. Hence we have that ideal unit of government the city-county. The statement was recently made to me by a prominent attorney to the effect that such a form of government would ultimately cut the Grosse Pointe tax squarely in two.

"There are political pitfalls for Grosse Pointe as long as we are tied up with Wayne County. I will not attempt to go into this feature at this time except to say that one or two bills which were introduced during the present session of the state legislature opened the eyes of some of our better posted citizens regarding the danger we were in. Grosse Pointe county will be bomb-proof against this sort of thing, or practically so.

"It is believed that the plan outlined affords a scientifically economic method of handling one phase of our own tax problem. It is to be hoped that those citizens who have devoted time to the consideration of tax matters will recognize this plan as Grosse Pointe's great opportunity and put their shoulders to the wheel."

"The School Board does not like these figures, and instead of using the standard count used generally by educators, prefer what they call a 'working capacity' count which cuts down the figure of 4,000 to 3,385. In other words, while other communities build schools for maximum use, our Board first pays an exorbitant price for its schools even for the standard count compared with other districts, and then limits their use by what they please to term 'working capacity.' The result is, we have one of the most extravagant school plants in the state.

"In buildings and site alone to educate a daily membership of 3,225 we have approximately \$4,150,000.00 invested. We have about 63 acres now far as they can be per pupil cost. off the tax rolls for school purposes. Our tax rate has been steadily climbing. In 1927 it was \$3.86 per thousand; it is now \$8.22 per thousand. In the meantime our assessed valuation has declined from \$127,000,000.00 in 1927 to \$117,000,000.00 in 1930; and with a prospective decrease to about \$107,000,000.00 for 1931.

"The low tax rate is due to our relatively high property values in the township of high assessed valuation. The School Board continually harps upon this tax rate. They ignore so far as they can the per pupil cost. Our school budget for 1930-31 was \$374,610.00 to educate a daily average membership of 3,225. Deducting the bond and interest item of \$285,130.00, gives \$89,480.00. This is the deduction made by school authorities to arrive at per pupil cost. Dividing this \$89,480.00 by 3,225; gives \$182.00 per pupil.

"So far as we know, this is about the highest per pupil cost in the state for the size of the group educated from kindergarten to the twelfth grade. Any small saving that the Board might claim to be able to effect from this budget to reduce it could also apply to other communities. The comparison stands just the same.
