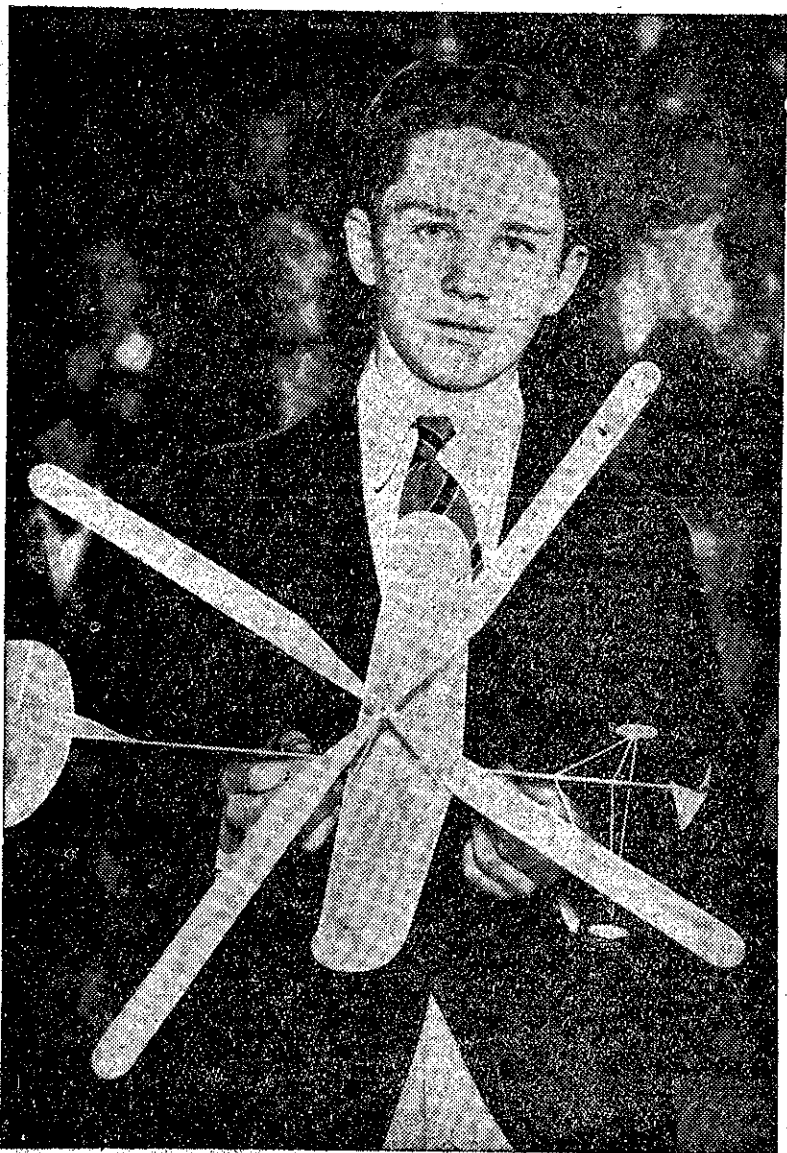

The champion model autogiro builder in the Detroit Metropolitan district is a 14 year old boy from Grosse Pointe Park. He is Harold La Clair who is in the ninth grade at St. Ambrose high school and resides at 1122 Lake-pointe avenue.

Harold won the distinction of champion model autogiro builder in the contest held recently at the Detroit City Airport under the auspices of the Detroit News and the Department of Recreation of Detroit. His score of 162.5 points was the highest made by any of the 134 boys and one girl who entered the contest.

LaClair came through with the winning score on the last of his three flights when his model stayed in the air 62.5 seconds. His first two attempts had been for only 32 and 38 seconds respectively.

U. of D. to Graduate 482 Students Friday at 48th Commencement

Four hundred and eighty-two students will be graduated by the University of Detroit in the forty-eighth annual commencement exercises at the Masonic Temple, Friday evening, June 12. The Rev. John P. McNichols, S. J., president of the university, will confer the degrees.

Hon. Arthur Webster, judge of the third judicial district of Michigan, will address the class. The honorary degree of Doctor of Laws will be conferred on Judge Webster and on Sister Mary Ursula, director of St. Joseph's Hospital, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Degrees of Master of Arts and Master of Science will be conferred on fifty-five teachers in Detroit and Michigan public and private schools.

Conely Wins Election to School Board by Substantial Majority

Walter S. Conely today is trustee-elect to the Board of Education of the Grosse Pointe school district following his decisive victory at the polls last Monday in the annual school district election.

He defeated Fred Sutter who has been a trustee for the past three years and up to election day was president of the School Board.

The results of Monday's voting as announced by Charles Parcels, secretary of the Board, showed Mr. Conely obtained a total of 901 votes against 356 votes polled for Mr. Sutter, or a margin of victory for Mr. Conely of nearly 3 to 1.

An analysis of the voting also indicates that Mr. Conely amassed a greater number of votes than did Mr. Sutter in each of the five villages in the school district with the exception of Lochmoor where Mr. Sutter led Mr. Conely by a small margin.

In Mr. Conely's election is to be seen the second decisive triumph of the Grosse Pointe Taxpayers association in school district affairs during the past year. The Taxpayers association had vigorously attacked Mr. Sutter during his tenure of office and in the pre-election campaign. It, in a pre-election statement, endorsed the candidacy of Mr. Conely pointing out his prior experience on the Highland Park school board as making him more qualified and to his platform of economy as indicating his prior suitability for the post on the Grosse Pointe school board.

The Taxpayers association showed its strength in no uncertain terms about one year ago when the school board then headed by Mr. Sutter proposed a substantial bond issue for the first of a series of three Junior High schools. The Taxpayers association opposed the Junior High school plan of the School Board and at the meeting of the electors in the High School building for the purpose of authorizing the bond issue election, the Taxpayers group overwhelmingly defeated the School Board's Junior High school plan and the proposed election.

Upon being advised of his victory in Monday's election, Mr. Conely in a statement indicated his appreciation of the honor bestowed on him by the school district electors and stated that it would be his policy in assisting in the administration of school district affairs to bear in mind two things, namely, the taxpayers and the school children.

He announced that he was indebted to no one for his election, that his hands were free to act as he saw fit and proper as a school board member and that he was not in alliance with any particular group or faction.

The Mother's Club has promised to give all the flowers and other decorations needed.

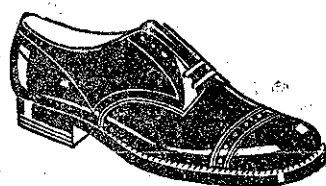
William Haines Stars in Fisher Attraction

Notice of Meeting TO HEAR OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED VACATION OF PART OF KERCHEVAL AVENUE IN THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS

WHEREAS, the recorded plat of Lewis Estate Subdivision of the north one half of Private Claim 258 sometimes called Private Claim 558 lying westerly of Grosse Pointe Boulevard in the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms shows dedication of Kercheval Avenue as a public highway sixty (60) feet wide; and

AT THE THEATERS By MOLLY ELGOOD

Since the legitimate theaters, with the exception of the Civic, closed their doors two weeks ago, things have been pretty quiet, and will remain so until the new season opens in September.

When the curtain rises, and the lights soften, and that curiously excited hush falls upon us, as the first lines of the play are spoken: and straightaway we are under the spell of the theater.

CIVIC THEATER REPEATS "LADIES OF THE JURY"

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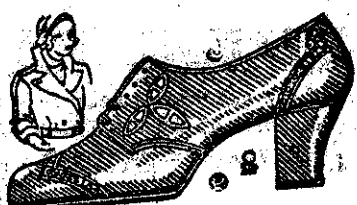

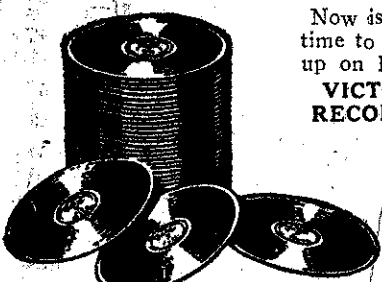
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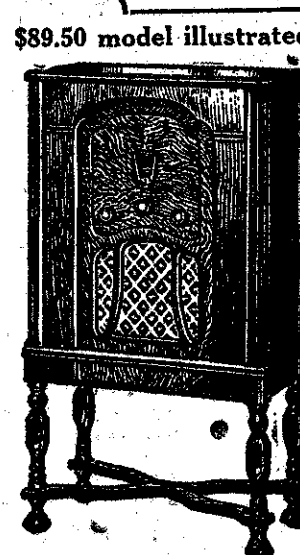
