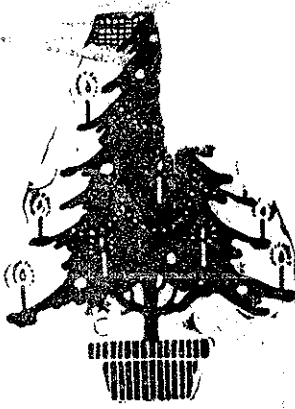

"Goodfellows" Seek \$5,000 Fund Today In Drive To Aid Needy

Andrew T. Phillips To Be Real "Santa Claus" To 30 Needy Families

Some 30 needy families in Grosse Pointe will have a splendid Christmas dinner thanks to the charity of Andrew T. Phillips, constable for Grosse Pointe Township. Phillips is this year rounding out his ninth year as a Grosse Pointe constable. He resides at 1100 Beaconsfield avenue.

Phillips has prepared this week for the families of food containing meats, potatoes, fruits, nuts and candy. He will be distributing these baskets to 30 Grosse Pointe needy families. Phillips is in their homes personally by Mr. and Mrs. Phillips two days before Christmas, it was learned of the several villages of Grosse Pointe by submitting names of families in their respective communities who are in need of food during the holiday.

Village Interested in Motorbus Matter

The proposed action of the City of Detroit toward removing the motor buses operated by the Detroit Motorbus Co., from Jefferson Avenue in Detroit, has awakened the interest of officials of the Village, who claim that a great deal of inconvenience as well as probable additional expense, will be suffered by residents of the Village and district if this action is carried out.

Under the present arrangement, Grosse Pointe patrons of the Kercheval and Jefferson lines, both operated by the Detroit Motor Bus Co., are able to make direct connections with the downtown lines of this concern, with transfer privileges to these lines radiating to all parts of the city. If these buses are forced to discontinue operating on Jefferson avenue, and especially if the D. S. buses to extend transfer privileges to Grosse Pointe bus users, with direct connections at Jefferson and Wayburn avenues, there is no doubt but that a lot of discomfort will ensue. On the other hand, if Detroit does make this move, it also provides D. S. R. service which will make proper connections at these two terminals of the Grosse Pointe lines with a fare adjustment or transfer interchange, there should be little difficulty experienced by Village residents.

A meeting of the Common Council of Detroit was held at 10:00 a. m. last Monday at the City Hall and officials of the Detroit Motor Bus Co. were present together with representatives of the Village. While no definite or final action was taken in the matter a proposal that the Detroit Motor Bus Co. buses be routed so as to operate on Alter Road from Jefferson to Kercheval, thence on Kercheval to Sheridan to Lafayette, thence downtown was made. This proposed routing appeared to be satisfactory to the Motorbus Co., but final action was deferred until a meeting to be held on Monday, December 21. The Village intends to keep in close contact with the situation and residents will be informed through the Grosse Pointe Review of any developments.

"History of Grosse Pointe" by Fintan L. Henk

FOREWORD

In the boulder monument placed in Grosse Pointe Park's "Waterfront Park" and to be dedicated in the near future, a "History of Grosse Pointe" was placed in a permanent copper box in the base of the monument. Written by Fintan L. Henk, of 1235 Grayton road, a long time resident of the Pointe and for many years associated with Alfred J. Garska, president of the Grosse Pointe Park council, in the real estate business here, this "History of Grosse Pointe" is an authentic narrative relating developments and growth of Grosse Pointe from its inception. The information and historical data contained in this history was obtained by Mr. Henk from the official records of Wayne County, the State of Michigan and Grosse Pointe Township. The assembling of this data into a connected and interesting story was an arduous task for Mr. Henk but he discharged this task with ability and enthusiasm as the readers will best be able to judge by reading the history as it is published in succeeding issues of this newspaper. The first installment is published in this, the "Goodfellow" edition of the GROSSE POINTE REVIEW.

In the copper box in the boulder monument in the Park's "Waterfront Park," many other articles of historical significance to posterity were placed in addition to Mr. Henk's "History of Grosse Pointe." These include the following: Photostatic copies of maps of Grosse Pointe Township in 1876; of the Village of Fairview; of the Township in 1898; of Wayne county in 1876; and of several old homes in the Township in that time; also current maps of streets, sewers and lots in Grosse Pointe Park; copies of the plans for the "Waterfront Park;" and the Fox Creek sewer or the Black Marsh ditch project; also photographs of the members and officers of the Grosse Pointe Park police and fire departments and of public officials.

J. Alex Park Is Again Honored for Exhibit of Stamps At Show

Mr. and Mrs. J. Alex Park, of 125 Lewiston road, Grosse Pointe Farms, recently returned from a triumphant trip to Grand Rapids, where Mr. Park received a special award following his exhibition of five large volumes of stamps of Canada. The award was signed by Dr. Clarence Hennan, of Chicago, the president of the American Philatelic Society. The stamps displayed by Mr. Park were both mint and used Canadian stamps and were part of the exhibition at the third annual stamp show of the Grand Rapids Stamp Club. The five volumes of stamps exhibited by Mr. Park are only a part of the large collection he has. His display in Detroit early this year won him the Brisley cup, a highly significant honor, for having in his possession the outstanding exhibit of stamps in Michigan.

VILLAGE NEWS

During the course of construction on the new Lake Shore Road thru Grosse Pointe Farms, Police and officials of the Park Village and Farms have agreed on routing trucks from the Detroit Terminal R. R. via Kercheval, Cadioux, Maumee and Grosse Pointe boulevard to the Seven Mile Road. This route being chosen as being the best with respect to the convenience of other traffic and the ability of the pavements in the three villages to take care of the tonnage involved. It is also intended to reduce the nuisance to residential districts to a minimum by this routing. President Connor of the Village is heartily in accord with the Paper sale conducted by the Goodfellows composed of the members of the local Lions Club, assisted by the members of the Police Departments of the several Villages. The proceeds from this sale are distributed through the Neighborhood Club to the needy of the community and Connor is urging all residents to cooperate in the sale.

New Oakland-Pontiac Branch on Jefferson

A new factory branch of the Oakland Motor Car Company has been opened at 14615 1/2 East Jefferson avenue. It was announced today by H. A. Tyrrell, general manager of the company's retail stores in Detroit.

The new branch, Mr. Tyrrell said, was established primarily to provide greater convenience for Oakland-Pontiac owners in the easterly part of Detroit at in Grosse Pointe.

The building is two-story, of brick and stone, with 150-footage on East Jefferson and extending 200-foot deep. It has a spacious showroom for new cars, an other for used cars, and a completely equipped service station. Twenty-five people comprise the sales and service personnel.

Formal opening took place Sunday, December 12, Mr. Tyrrell stated, and during the past week a large number of Oakland-Pontiac owners and other visitors have inspected the new branch.

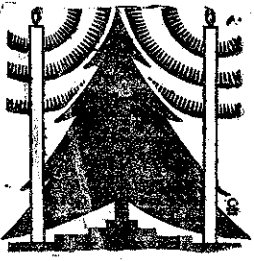

HISTORY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK

(Continued from Page Two) PART I.

"Grosse Pointe—a post Village of Wayne County," this is the only description of Grosse Pointe found in George W. Hawe's Gazetteer and Business Directory for 1860, a few years before the start of the Civil War. The township at this time comprised all territory from what is known as Bewick Avenue, Detroit, to the Macomb County Line and extended a considerable distance northwest of the old Fort Gratiot Road, now known as Gratiot Avenue. All of this territory was formerly part of Hamtramck Township, but on April 1, 1848, it was set off as a separate Township and was named Grosse Pointe, from the point of land projecting into the water in the lower part of Lake St. Clair.

All of the first inhabitants were French, and among those who came over in 1701 with Antoine deLamotte Cadillac, the founder of the City of Detroit, and many of whose descendants are still in Grosse Pointe, were the Beaufaits, St. Bernians, Vermices, Morains, Cadiways, Tronbles, Choies, St. Aubtins, Proncusals, Rivards, and Gouines. There is no record of other arrivals of particular importance until 82 years afterward when Michigan was ceded to the United States, then the Kerbeys, Grants, Martins first Americans who located here.

In a history of Grosse Pointe Township contained in "Illustrated Historical Atlas of Wayne County—1876," it is related that "there are a goodly number of aged Frenchmen living here, one of them, Pierre St. George, still living at the great age of 102 years; their long lives being doubtless attributable to the abstemious and careful habits of their fathers and themselves." It is also stated that the climate of Grosse Pointe is very "salubrious and conducive to longevity. The land is rich, rolling and in a very high state of cultivation. In early days there was, comparatively speaking, no market for grain and other produce but the great and growing demand of the City of Detroit in later years has brought the greater portion of the township under cultivation. It also proved an incentive to market gardening and fruit culture."

In 1876, the population of the entire Grosse Pointe district was 3,000 of which 500 were children. Among the earliest township officers we find the following: Supervisor George Moran, Clerk Robert Baiton, Treasurer Dagobert Juriff, Assessor John Gouine Jr., Assessor James Baiton, School Inspector John Gouine Sr., School Inspector George Githrie, Justice of Peace Francis VanAntwerp, Justice of Peace Frank Juriff, Justice of Peace Daniel Corby, Justice of Peace George Martin.

In the Michigan State Gazetteer published by R. L. Polk and Company in 1883, we read the following description of Grosse Pointe: "With a population of about 200, is a somewhat fashionable suburb of Detroit, and is located on the shore of Lake St. Clair, eight miles northeast of the city. Garden produce, fruit, fish, grain are the principal exports. Considerable improvements have been made here within the last few years by the erection of handsome residences, owned principally by merchants of Detroit. The locality making it a very desirable point for health and comfort in the summer season. It has now a large dock, extending 800 feet into the lake, four churches—two Catholic, English Protestant and German Lutheran—and several schools. Fishing, which is the foremost industry, has lately grown to considerable proportions, and large numbers of muskallonge, whitefish, herring, etc., are marketed. Mail by special supply. Alexander Michie, Postmaster. Alter, John Treasurer Biddell, Frank Hotel Proprietor Curby, Thomas Brickmaker DeLaurier, Gilbert Fisherman Gore, Arthur Hotel Proprietor Gowin, Pontiff Farmer Griner, Michael Justice of Peace Hardy, Michael Constable Harris, Joseph Saloon Ironmonger, Thomas Hotel Proprietor Juiff, Frederick Flour Mill Kerby, John Township Clerk Lamb, Charles Justice of Peace Ludowick, Peter General Store Martin, George Justice of Peace Michie, Alexander Farmer Michie, Archibald Fisherman Michie, William Fisherman Moran, Denis Fisherman Moran, Richard Fisherman Priest, Joram Wagonmaker Rivard, Charles Constable Smith, Isaac Physician and Justice Trombley, John Brickman Vernier, A. Saloon Vernier, Charles Constable Vokes, John Brickmaker Weaver, P. B. Hotel Proprietor."

Many interesting and amusing incidents are recalled by some of the older residents of Grosse Pointe Park who are still living. They tell of the "haunted house" which was located on the old Chauvin farm at what is now Hillger Avenue (City of Detroit), but what was then a part of Grosse Pointe. On this farm stood an old ramshackle dwelling occupied by one, Charles Chauvin, who lead a solitary existence. He was reputed to be quite wealthy and to have his money hidden in his house. One dark night he was murdered and from that time on the house was never again occupied and many worried citizens of that day shuddered when they passed the "haunted house."
