Fossil Remains Blamed for Defects in Teeth

It is a long call from the mastodons—giant elephants that roamed over North America 50,000 years ago—to the teeth of Arizona school children, but there appears to be a clear connection as reported from the Arizona experiment station of the Department of Agriculture.

Friday the Thirteenth Still Considered "Jinx" With all the wealth of fact and philosophy at his command man continues to be a victim of superstition, forcing himself to accept inconveniences and endure suffering because of a fear complex. The old superstitious fear that Friday is an unlucky day, and if Friday falls on the thirteenth day of the month, it is a jinx filled with danger and probable disaster to mankind, comes into evidence continually in the modern times. The baseless fear of Friday probably was born of witchery and ignorance, but the fear of the thirteenth day of the month may have had its origin in more modern times. The spread of human intelligence should have eliminated both fears from the minds of man but it has not. Recently a great ocean liner was delayed for hours in leaving New York so that the trip might be started on the fourteenth day of the month, and not on Friday, the thirteenth. Officials scoffed at the superstition, but admitted that there had been a clamor from passengers to accept the delay and escape the supposed jinx. There is room for more public education so long as people display this fear complex.—Ohio State Journal.

England's Virgin Queen as Frenchman Saw Her In November, 1597, an ambassador extraordinary from Henry IV of France to Elizabeth of England was put ashore at Dover. Of his interviews with the queen, her appearance, her clothes, her demeanor, what she said, he gives the fullest account. This is his pen portrait: "She was strangely attired in a dress of silver cloth, white and crimson, or silver gauze as they call it. This dress had slashed sleeves lined with red taffeta, and was girt about with other little sleeves that hung down to the ground, which she was forever twisting and untwisting. She kept the front of her dress open, so that one could see the whole of her bosom. . . . As for her face, it is and appears to be very aged. It is long and thin, and her teeth are very yellow and unequal, compared to what they were formerly, so they say, and on the left side less than on the right. Many of them are missing, so that one cannot understand her easily when she speaks quickly. Her figure is fair and tall and graceful in whatever she does; so far as may be she keeps her dignity, yet humbly and graciously withal."

Safety Glass Discovery The year 1931 is virtually the twenty-first birthday of safety glass, for it was in 1910 that the patent now most generally used was filed. The inventor was Edouard Benedictus, a French chemist of Dutch origin, who had an experimental laboratory in Paris. One day he dropped a bottle to the stone floor, and although it was starred inside like a crystal it did not break. He remembered that it had contained a mixture of various chemicals which had evaporated and coated the interior with a transparent enamel. Benedictus noted the formula, and realized that on his shelf lay the secret of unsplintered glass. The patent was filed in 1910, but it was not till Reginald Delpech, the English pioneer motorist, took up the idea that safety glass was manufactured. Imagination Goes Far With the Superstitious No matter how intelligent we are by nature, or how reasonable and wise we may become with the experiences of years, man never quite loses his fear of the supernatural—nor belief in its manifestations, regardless of how exalted his circumstances and conditions. An instance has just been reported from Moncalieri, near Turin, where a young couple, setting up housekeeping, had just moved into a dwelling which had been unoccupied for some months. No sooner had they established themselves in these quarters than all sorts of mysterious and astonishing, as well as terrifying noises became audible. Doors shut and opened of their own accord; windows rattled; vapors of unknown source moved here and there; now and then the strains of music, or of shrill whistling were heard. These experiences were so alarming that next day the trembling pair sought the aid of the police. A gendarme, stationed there the next night, insisted strenuously that he heard all the various commotions, too, and not only that, but actually saw a weird shape floating about to be compared with nothing he had ever witnessed before. Which all goes to prove that superstitions, if not native to the individual, are at least contagious, and may be acquired and entertained even by the most staid and unimaginative of the population.—Il Messaggero, Rome.

Importance of Grasses in Man's Advancement Civilization has been built directly upon one or another of the cereal grasses, supplemented in some cases with pasture grasses, according to a professor of Berkeley university, Calif. Cereal grasses changed man from a nomad to a settler. Even the calendar and social life was made necessary by the cultivation of cereal grasses. In 2700 B. C., the Chinese instituted the symbolic ceremony of sowing five useful plants each year, these being rice, wheat, sorghum, millet and the legume, soy beans. In Egypt, barley and millet were produced as early as 4000 B. C. On the American continent, civilization is practically synonymous with one grass, maize, or Indian corn. The greatest portion of the dry land surface of the earth is occupied by grasses.

"Crossing the Line" In the modern ceremony of crossing the equator Neptune appears carrying a trident with his attendants, among whom is the barber, carrying a huge razor and tub. Neptune is accompanied by Amphitrite. A sheep pen lined with canvas and filled with water is prepared. The victim is seated on a platform laid over this and blindfolded. First he is shaved by the barber, then plunged backward into the water. It was formerly the custom to attach the victim to a rope and dip him into the sea.

Message Made History When war broke out between Spain and the United States it was very necessary to communicate quickly with Garcia, the leader of the insurgents. He was somewhere in the mountain fastnesses of Cuba, no one knew where. No mail or telegram could reach him. Rowan was sent for and given a letter to be delivered to Garcia. He accepted the mission without question and delivered the letter. The message to Garcia was pertaining to co-operation with the United States army.

Ancient Toys Dug Up A little girl's grave in a cemetery about 4,000 years old, dug up in Persia by scientists, yielded, among other things, small figurines carved like cows and sheep. Excavations in the cemetery unearthed remains of children with miniature dishes, as well as those of men and women with cups, bows and pitchers. Translucent and banded alabaster vessels, burnished gray and black pottery, bracelets, anklets and finger rings were also found.

Medieval Churches Four churches of medieval period can be seen by visitors to Berlin, in spite of the common impression that the German capital is a comparatively young city. The youngest of the four, which stands in Klosterstrasse, has been restored to its original form. This church was erected by Franciscan monks of the Gray Cloister, in 1290, and is said to be one of the oldest monuments of Gothic architecture in northern Germany.

Well-Watered Country In Venezuela rainfall varies from less than one inch a month in the dry season to as much as five inches a month in the rainy season. In addition Venezuela is particularly well endowed with rivers. The country has more than 1,000 rivers. About 250 rivers empty into the Caribbean sea, while some 200 flow into Lake Maracaibo. Included among its streams is the Orinoco, one of the great rivers of the world.

Secretary of Congress In the Continental congresses there was one official, called the secretary of the congress, as the Continental congress was a unicameral body. Charles Thompson of Pennsylvania acted in this capacity throughout 15 sessions in eight cities and under 14 presidents of the congress. He served from September 5, 1774, until January 22, 1783.
