Social workers penetrate these districts in an effort to find the need of such unfortunate individuals and sometimes are criticized for the suggestions they offer.

C. M. T. C. Applications Now Double "Quota," P. Newberry Reports

More than twice as many applications have been received for attendance at the Citizens' Military Training Camps at Camp Custer and Fort Brady this year than can be accepted, Phelps Newberry, Civilian Aide to the Secretary of War, announced today.

"The quota for Michigan," said Mr. Newberry, "is 1600, and to date we have received applications from 3219 young men who seek training at these camps."

"The popularity of citizens' Military Training Camps has increased tremendously during the past three years. It used to be that quotas were not always completed until almost time for camps. Two years ago the quota was completed one month prior to the date of the camps, and last year it was completed two months before the camps opened. This year the quota was 25 per cent over before the date for receiving applications, which is March 1."

"It is very unfortunate that thousands of young men who have the strength of character to give up their summer vacations for an intensive 30-day training period have to be refused. This is especially true for the youth who train at these camps become the very nucleus of good citizenship in their communities. No organization in the country equals the orderly record of young men who complete their training periods at these camps."

"Cases are on record where young men were sent to Citizens' Military Training Camps by communists with the avowed purpose of spreading communism among the young men attending them. In every instance not only did these communistic efforts fail, but the young men sent by the communists saw so clearly the absurdity of their propaganda that they became good, loyal citizens."

"To those who understand that Citizens' Military Training Camps are first of all schools of good citizenship, that they teach them fundamentals of American government and the principles on which our democracy is based, this record is not surprising."

"C. M. T. Camps are the strongest bulwarks of our republican form of government and democracy. They are our greatest asset for the future and deserve the strongest support of every believer in good government and good citizens."

High School News Briefs

North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools has just notified Grosse Pointe High school that it has been accredited by the association for the period ending March 17, 1933.

Graduates of an accredited high school are privileged to enter institutions of higher education within the North Central States without entrance examinations, if they have completed work in the high school subjects required by the college or university for admission. Twenty states comprise the association, the largest of its kind in the United States.

The high school diplomas of these graduates will be acceptable to state boards having to do with the granting of certificates for the various professions of medicine, dentistry, law, and almost any other position.

Before any school can be considered for accrediting by the North Central Association, it must be on the highest list of schools approved and accredited by the school authorities of this state. Every detail must be of high standard, such as the equipment, library, laboratories, school records, instruction, and spirit, salaries of teachers, training of teachers, and the school program with reference to physical education and to its athletic relationship with other high schools as determined by the State Athletic Association.

Any high school approved by the North Central Association must maintain high standards and consequently, the community is assured of a program of modern high school education.

DO YOU KNOW?

Olive oil is injured by freezing. Do not keep in a cold place. Keep in an air-tight can.

When cooked frostings are used, it is best to have the cake slightly warm with the exception of confections frostings where boiling water is employed.

A spoonful of kerosene added to a pail of very hot water will make windows, mirrors, and picture glasses bright and clear.

To remove stains from the inside of cups rub them with a damp cloth and a little baking soda.

When removing a cake from the oven, place the tin on a damp towel for a moment and the cake will come out of the tin quite easily.

All vegetables should be put on to cook in boiling water. This holds the major portion of the mineral matter and starch within.

Meat should not be salted before cooking as it tends to extract the juices. No meat should be salted in cooking but just after the surface has been seared and the meat partly cooked.

- 1 lb. spaghetti
- 2 onions
- 1 cup tomatoes
- 1 lb. weinies

Method:

1. Cook spaghetti and onion in rapidly boiling water.
2. Drain and remove onion.
3. Put tomato through sieve and add spaghetti.
4. Add weinies which have been plumped by cooking a few minutes in boiling water and cook all together for a few minutes.

CHEESE FOUODOU

- 1 cup scalded milk
- 1 cup stale bread crumbs
- ¼ lb. cheese, cut fine
- 1 tsp. butter
- ½ tsp. salt
- 3 eggs

1. Scald milk and add butter, add bread crumbs and beaten egg yolks and then cheese and salt.

2. Beat egg whites stiff and fold into mixture.

3. Put in well greased baking dish and bake in moderate hot oven for 20 minutes.

Discovery in Dispute
Conflicting stories are told about the introduction of the potato, a native of the western hemisphere, to European circles. It is generally believed, however, that Sir John was responsible for the sweet potato's presentation. When they were first transplanted to the Old World the potatoes were like stepchildren. This probably was because Europeans were deep set in their ideas of diet and prejudiced against new foods.

Wolves and Music

Science is continually destroying our fondest beliefs. For centuries we have believed that music has the power to move the very stones and soothe the most savage of beasts. But this is not so if we can believe the enterprising gentleman who had the violin played for the wolves in the London zoological gardens. Wild wolves from Europe and Asia cringed and put their tails between their respective legs at the sound of a fiddle played behind their cages. When the violinist, still playing, stepped within their range of vision, terror turned to rage and the wolves lunged at their restraining bars. Incidentally, the experiment bore out another legend—that the music of a violin would drive wolves away.

History of Sound

The history of sound is practically identical with the progress of mathematics and dynamics from the time of Galileo and Newton to the present, and few dates can be assigned to definite discoveries. The laws of vibrations of a stretched string were first deduced mathematically by Brook Taylor in 1715 and by Daniel Bernoulli in 1755. Longitudinal vibrations of bars were investigated by Chladni (1758-1837). The history of the phenomena of the sense of hearing, harmony, etc., begins probably with the earliest days of civilization. It was known to Pythagoras in the Sixth century B. C. Much research was conducted by Helmholtz beginning with 1854.

Washington's Pecan Tree

In 1794 a friend of Washington who had been in the southern states, brought to Philadelphia a bundle of small Pecan trees, and this bundle was brought from Philadelphia to Mount Vernon by Thomas Jefferson. It seems that many of Washington's friends knew of his fondness for trees. Three of these Pecans still remain at Mount Vernon, the largest with a trunk 2 feet 11 inches in diameter and a few inches short of 100 feet in height. Washington recognized the value of the pecan as a beautiful shade tree, even without the added value of its nuts.

Few Recognized Beauty of Gettysburg Address

When the speakers were being chosen to make addresses at Gettysburg in 1863, President Lincoln was an afterthought—and then a dubious chairman begged him to make his speech as short as possible! It is generally believed that Lincoln wrote the Gettysburg address on a piece of brown paper, on the way to Gettysburg. But this is not true, according to the Golden Book Magazine. Two days before the dedication at Gettysburg, President Lincoln had the speech almost all written and in his hat (where he usually kept valuable papers). "The silence during the delivery of the speech, and the lack of hearty demonstration at its close," said Ward Hill Lamon, describing the event, "were taken by Mr. Lincoln as certain proof that it had not been well received. In that opinion we all shared. "Mr. Lincoln said to me: 'Lamon, that speech won't scurr! It's a flat failure and the people are disappointed.'" It occurred to only a few who heard it that it was an immortal address.
