Teachers' Salaries To be Cut 15%; School Board Reduces Budget

Salary schedules of teachers in the Grosse Pointe public school system will be cut 15 per cent during the next school year, the Board of Education determined in a meeting last Monday evening in fixing the school budget for the 1932-33 school year at \$705,000 as compared with \$850.-000 for the school year now nearing completion. This is a decrease in the budget of \$145,000 or 17 per cent.



Explodes Snake Myths The way animals adapt themselves to environmental changes has always been one of the wonders of zoology. Green and Black Teas

The same kind of tea leaves can be used for the manufacture of either green or black tea, the difference of the two teas lying merely in the process of curing. Some varieties of ten leaves, however, are better adapted than others for making certain kinds of tea. In producing green tea the leaves are sterilized by steam. This prevents oxidizing or fermentation of the leaf which retains its green color and when boiling water is poured over it the result is green or greenish-yel low liquid. In manufacturing black tea the leaf is allowed to ferment. which changes its color from green to very dark brown. In the case of colong or semi-fermented tea the fer mentation is allowed to reach a certain desired point.

Treasure Beyond Price

Is Excavators' Reward From east to west archeologists have announced their discoveries of tombs filled with the treasures and splendor

of ancient kings. Professor Garstang has found the tombs of the kings who reigned in Jerico 35 centuries ago as vassais of the Pharaohs.

Over 500 vases were found in one of these royal tombs, and in a tomb of earlier period, 4,000 years old, hundreds of Bronze age objects were discovered.

Don Alphonso Caso, excavating in Mexico, opened a tomb of the rulers of the Mixtees, who preceded the Aztecs as lords of Central America.

This was about the time Columbus first reached the New world. Little did he guess that he had come to a land with a civilization which had Don Alphonso reported that the

finds were worth millions-utensils of gold, jars of onyx, skulls encrusted with turquoise, vases, and beautiful ornaments made by skilled craftsmen. The scene of this find is among the ruins at Monte Alban near Oaxaca.

English Monetary Unit Adopted From the Roman

The English monetary unit, the pound, was originally a pound weight of silver, and corresponded to the Roman libra (Latin pound weight), from which is derived the "£" designating this denomination. This pound was soon known as the Pound Tower because the chief mint of the country was established in the tower, and by it the weight of English coins was regulated. It contained 5,400 grains and was divided into 12 ounces of 20 pennyweights each. The Pound Troy superseded the Pound Tower in 1527, and contained 5,760 grains.

The shilling, a division of the pound weight of silver, corresponded to Roman solidus, and the penny, which represented the 240th part of a pound, corresponded to the Roman denarius. Hence we have the abbreviations £, s, and d.

The Roman system of computation was adopted by all European countries after they had accepted Roman Christianity. In England it was adopted by Ethelbert of Kent at the beginning of the Seventh century.

The Cowards!

How white corpuscles can be aided in overpowering and destroying certain disease germs is described by a Philadelphia scientist. These germs, he discovered, wear a protective armor which shields them from attack. But he discovered another germ capable of secreting a substance that pierces and dissolves this armorwhereupon, the white corpuscle, lying in wait, sets upon the first germ and destroys it.

Good team work, certainly, yet it doesn't speak well for the courage of the average white corpuscle. I couldn't feel very proud of a white corpuscle that hits a germ when it is down. My own red corpuscles are always shouting at my white corpuscles, "Why don't you stand up and fight!"-Detroit

Linguistic Puzzles The Japanese language is very dif-

ferent from the Chinese, although the two may be considered distantly related. Japanese looks similar to Chinese in western eyes because the Ja anese system of writing was derived from that used by the Chinese, just as the Japanese art was taken from the Chinese art. In this way a Chinaman would be able to tell what sounds were expressed by Japanese characters in a good many cases, but would not be able to tell what they meant. This is exactly the same situation which exists among western Europeans. An Englishman can tell what letters are used in Polish and he might even make an attempt at pronouncing the words, but he could not tell what they meant without learning the language.

Better Microphones

The first microphones made for use about moving picture studios were long tubelike things which were most effective only when the sound came from directly in front and from other points the results were not all that might be desired. It was explained that the sounds were obstructed by the shape of the "mike." Transmission has been greatly improved by making these in struments in spherical form. Besides being more efficient they are smaller and lighter.

Too Late to Prove Evidence of a suspected prehistoric murder is being investigated by East African scientists instead of the police. The famous Oldoway man of Tanganyika who was discovered by a German professor before the war is now stated by a noted archeologist, to be at least 25,000 years earlier than any known example of human kind. But this man was apparently bound tightly after death and then buried in shallow water. Foul play is suspected.

Prairie Schooner Relics Five of the white oak wagon bows that supported the top of the prairie schooner Charles Robinson drove to California in 1852 are in the University of Kansas. The bows were the gift of Henry Wilson, negro carpenter, who died at the age of eighty-one. Wilson was long employed by Governor Robinson at his 1,000-acre farm near Lawrence, and received the bows

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
