Here on The Michigan **Reapportionment Plan** 

Under the leadership of State Senator Fred W. Handing, of Grosse Pointe, petitions are in circulation in the community this week for "The Michigan Plan" for Reapportionment of the Michigan State Legislature. Residents were urged in a statement this week by Senator Harding to sign the petitions that the reapportionment proposal may be placed on the ballot in the coming November election.

"The Michigan Plan," briefly stated, Senator Harding pointed out, is a proposal for reorganizing the State Legislature by establishing in the State Constitution :

1. A fair and reasonable basis for representation in both branches:

2. An enforcible provision for periodically adjusting the representation in the Lower House to changes in population:

"The actual operation of the machinery of government must be intrusted to officers chosen by the people to represent them.

"If the will of the people is to be made effective through these public officers, the basis upon which they are selected must be such as to insure just and equitable representation of the interests of the people.

"This basis is established in the Constitution-the fundamental law of the state.

"The Superintendent at one time called it a Laboratory system, and meeting with some criticism has now named it the Contract system. Whatever its label is, the children, not the teacher, run the school. "Under it the child has to agree to do so much work in say a month. So much reading, so much geography, so much spelling, so much writing, so much arithmetic, etc. "When he does it is of no consequence. If he comes to school and feels like doing spelling he does that. If he prefers writing, he does some exercises in that. Sometimes he lets

one subject like arithmetic go altogether. At the end of the period he gets behind and then he has to do it all at once. The children correct each other's papers, talk and move about as much as they please, and so on. In fact they do their work as they are "Motived from within." That is the way I understood it from the principal.

"My boy was in the 5th grade last. year and had A's and B's. This year he began to slump fast and his marks fell off. He seemed to neglect his work. If he didn't feel like doing certain of his subjects he just let them slide. Same old boy but he probably didn't "motivate" right. Formerly an obedient youngster, home discipline took a nose dive, because it seemed to be opposed to such "utter lack of discipline" under the Dalton experimental system.

**Petitions** Circulated Here on The Michigan Reapportionment Plan

(Continued from Page One) embodies the principles of "THE MICHIGAN PLAN," removes the objections to the present constitutional provisions and offers a permanent solution of the problem of legislative rearrangement.

"To maintain the principle of checks and balances, the two branches of the Legislature are retained. But the term of Senators is extended to four years, and provision is made for the election of half the membership every two years. Thus, by the lengthening and overlapping of terms, the Senate will never be without experienced members.

"The present senatorial districts become permanent. Population as the basis for representation in the Senate Parents Condemns Plan is abandoned. Each senatorial district is to select one Senator regardless of its population.

"It is believed that a Senate composed of one Senator from each of these districts will always provide a reasonable representation of the local interests of the different sections of the state.

"Under the proposed amendment the to be. membership of the House of Representatives will be apportioned every ten years, so that each member will, as nearly as may be possible, represent an equal number of people.

"The duty of reapportioning the Representatives every ten years is placed with the Legislature; but it is provided that the Secretary of State must perform this duty if the Legislature fails to do so.

"To avoid the evils which result from electing at large a great number of Representatives, the proposed amendment provides that not more than four Representatives may be elected from any one district.

"The proposed amendment merely proposes a re-arrangement of the Legislature in order to secure just representation of all the people.

"No section, no group and no interest is specially favored. No county may ever control both branches of the Legislature.

"The less populous sections of the state are assured of fair and adequate representation in the Senate; and the more populous sections are assured of fair and adequate representation in the House of Representatives.

"It is only by this just balancing of interests that a Legislature truly representing ALL OF THE INTERESTS general adoption. OF ALL OF THE PEOPLE CAN BE SECURED.

"It is your duty as a citizen of the State of Michigan to understand the proposed amendment in order that you may vote intelligently on this question , at the election in November."

#### **Dutch Offered to Sell** Manhattan to Bavaria

New York might have been a Bavarian town had the British not occupied New Amsterdam ab the decisive moment and forcibly made the Dutch settlement an English colony, ancient documents discovered in the Munich archives disclosed.

In 1664, the documents show, negotiations were under way between the Bavarian elector, Ferdinand Maria, and a group of Dutch diplomats for the sale of Manhattan island and the surrounding territory which the Dutch had possessed since 1626. The British move upset their plans.

A scheme of Dr. Johann Joachim Becher, Bavaria's financial adviser, provided for the acquisition of colonles and the creation of a Bavarian navy. His efforts were advocated warmly by the elector. Ferdinand Maria. Bavaria's search for colonies was born out of the Thirty Years' war, which had ravaged the country and exhausted the state treasury.

## Gorilla "Cousin" to Man

The gorilla, it is explained by Dr. William M. Mann, director of the Washington zoo is credited generally with being the closest to "human" of all the anthropoids. He is not, of course, considered part of the ancestral stock of man, but as a sort of distant cousin. He is the nearest human in appearance, and his habits appear to approach closer to those of man than his nearest rival, the chimpanzee.

He also has a slightly larger brain, with a capacity of about 600 cubic centimeters, compared to 900 cubic centimeters for the most primitive human skulls in the collections of the National museum at Washington. Unlike other apes-approaching in this

Inventor Seeks Secret of Philosopher's Stone

An inventor is said to be endeavoring in Paris to prove that he can make gold from sand. He claims that some time ago he produced ingots of gold from sand taken from the shores of the Mediterranean. Will he succeed

now? The search for an invention that will enable common substances to be turned into gold dates back to the early days of science. All through the Middle ages alchemists were engaged in trying to discover the philosopher's stone which would enable this to be done.

Probably it is possible, for radium has shown us that one metal may change into another. In course of time, though, radium, now the world's most valuable metal, changes into dull, common lead. The process takes millions of years, and science knows no way of hastening it.

The Paris inventor states that he performs his miracle by means of ultra violet rays. A distinguished French scientist who watched earlier experiments describes how he saw metal slowly deposited upon a nickel plate; after a time this metal was treated with mercury, and a fraction of an ounce of pure gold was obtained.

## Arabian Desert Called

Great Population Center The Arabian desert, near the region generally associated with the Garden of Eden, may become recognized by scientists as a great center of population in prehistoric times, from which the ancestors of modern man migrated to other parts of Asia, as well as to Africa.

Dr. R. Henry Field, assistant director of the Field museum, Chicago, told the American Anthropological association that he had found evidence that man lived in paleolithic times where the desert now exists. Although the region now is without sufficient water to make living possible, Doctor Field said, there is every reason to believe it was well watered and that paleolithic man lived there for a long period. Fifteen hundred years ago the Romans constructed a great stone cistern in the midst of the present desert, indicating that water was more plentiful then. Doctor Field pointed out that dry river beds still lined the desert.

#### British Columbia

The events leading up to the founding of British Columbia were as follows, says an article in the Montreal Family Herald. In June, 1858, it was reported in California that gold in abundance had been found on the mainland of North America, a little to the north and east of Vancouver island, and there was an immediate rush of gold seekers to the vicinity. James Douglas, governor of Vancouver island, showed much ability in preserving order. The territory, with adjacent islands, was made a British colony and called British Columbia and was placed under Mr. Douglas. The colony was formally nominated and the sovernment settled in August, 1858. Vancouver island was incorporated with the colony in 1866 and Victoria made the capital in 1868. British Columbia joined the Dominion of Canada in 1871.

"New England is a finished place," declares the writer. "Its destiny is that of Florence, of Venice, not Milan, while the American empire careens onward toward its unpredicted end. "It is the first American section to be finished, to achieve stability in the conditions of its life. It is the first old civilization, the first permanent civilization in America. adverse.

# Norse Custom Kept Up

by Shetland Islanders The ancient Norse fire festival of Up-Helly-aa, which means the last of the holy yule days, is annually celebrated in Lerwick, Shetland islands. In the last celebration three hundred "Guizers," carrying six-foot torches, took part in the torchlight procession, wearing brilliantly-colored costumes. They were led by stalwart "vikings." The leader of the Guizers, the Guizer Jarl, a commanding figure, wore a purple and orange cloak, aluminum coat of mail, and silver helmet surmounted by outspread ravens' wings. The Guizers fell in behind the full-size Norse war galley "Frithr," meaning friendship, with its towering dragon head and fish-like tail. The "Jarl" stood a solitary figure firmly grasping the star board steering oar of the ship. A bugle call gave the signal to light up the torches, and then, accompanied by the singing of martial airs and band and pipe music, the procession moved through the streets of the town. Finally the torches are thrown into the valley, which is thus consigned to Valhalla. This ceremony recalls to Shetlanders the Norse custom of placing a dead warrior in his galley, setting it alight, and launching it on the sea.

#### Watt's Laurels Disputed
