In these nine games, the Detroit team t-brew 120 passes, of 44 were completed for a net gain of 655 yards, the gain being computed from the line of scrimmage and not from the point where the ball was thrown. This gives the Titans and average of .366 for completing passes, an excellent figure considering the risks involved in this play. form of foot weakness.

This was the longest pass made by Detroit, counting the actual distance of flight. The longest gain on a pass followed by a run was 61 yards, made by Pete Rajkovich again Holy Cross. 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Peacock Throne Marvel of Oriental Magnificence

The markle and gold palace of Delhi, in India, mecca of many tourist parties, lost its wonderful "Pealegend of its grandeur survives and is accepted as indicative of the splendor of the rajahs, much of which survives to dazzle the visitor from foreign lands.

The peacock throne was so called from its having the figures of two peacocks of solid gold standing behind it, their tails expanded, and the whole so inlaid with sapphires. rubies, emeralds, pearls and other precious stones of appropriate colors as to represent life.

2928. The throne itself was six feet long and four feet wide; it stood on six massive feet which, with the body, were of solid gold inlaid with subles, emeralds and diamonds. It was surmounted by a canopy of gold supported by 12 pillars all richly emblazoned with costly gems, and a fringe of pearls ornamented; the borders. Between the two peacocks stood the figure of a parrot, said to have been carved out of a single emerald. The throne was taken away by Nadir Shah to Persia as loot and was. last heard of in Teheran, where presumably most of it was melted down. Its estimated value was six and onehalf million pounds sterling, that is \$24,050,000.

Cave-Picture Galleries Unique in Art History

In the heart of the Indian jungle lies a narrow gorge containing the caves of Ajanta, cave-picture galleries unique in the history of art. They are adorned with paintings which are in no wise inferior to the frescoes in

the tombs of the kings of Egypt. European art work seems the creation of yesterday when compared with the productions of Asia. Besides the frescoes at Ajanta, for example, the age of the so-called "old masters" of Europe fades into insignificance, as the latest Ajanta paintings were completed hundreds of years before the Fourteenth century Flemish and Italian artists commenced to paint.

The frescoes may be divided into narrative scenes, portraiture and dec oration, and the illustrations of incidents in the life of Buddha perforce take pride of place. The birth of Gautama, his "Great Renunciation" when he abandoned family and wealth. his enlightenment after resisting the powers of darkness-all these episodes may be traced in the paintings and sculpture at Ajanta. The portraits include representations of Buddhas and Bodhisattyas-Buddhas of the future-In addition to figures of the Brahman

Over a century later, In 1829, the first American typewriter, called a topographer, was patented by W. A. Burt. In 1838 a typewriter was produced in France, having a separate key lever for each letter. In 1844 and in 1846 typewriting machines were in-

vented in England which, like many of the other early machines, were designed primarily for use of the blind, and so produced embossed characters. Between 1840 and 1860 Sir Charles Wheatstone invented several typewriters, which are now in the South Kensington museum.
