## City of Grosse Pointe Fire Losses for 1935 Total Only \$9,123.00

In making his annual report concerning fire department activities in the City of Grosse Pointe, Joseph T. Brisson, Superintendent of Public Safety, relates that his officers are continuing their annual inspection of all buildings in the city in an effort to discover possible danger spots and to warn residents of fire hazards that exist in their homes and are easily preventable by a bit of foresight and caution.

Fire losses during 1935 totaled \$9,123 in the City as opposed to a value of property endangered amounting to \$201,725.00 with insurance coverage amounting to \$181,725.00. This is a remarkably low loss in view of the total valuation of the property endangered or involved by fire and considering that the firemen responded to 118 alarms during the year.

Superintendent Brisson states that, while the causes of fire are many and varied, one of the most common is that of blazes which originate in rubbish which has been allowed to accumulate in basements against wooden walls or partitions. In several instances last year firemen were called to quench flames which were rapidly assuming dangerous proportions when detected. In each case these fires were the result of ignition of either loose rubbish or the rubbish-filled bags which had been placed upon wooden walls or near or under the basement stairway from which the fire was in a fair way to communicate itself upward throughout the structure. A fire originating thus is particularly dangerous because: 1, It is frequently undetected for a long interval. 2, It can spread very rapidly because the studding or stairwells act as a large flue. 3, When such fires develop sufficiently before being discovered they nearly always center about the stairway and thus cut off occupants of the upper floors, thus seriously endangering them.

Two means of abating the danger of such fires originating in debris or rubbish are suggested: 1, Keep all such material (and containers) away from wooden walls, framing or partitions. 2, Secure metal cans of ample capacity, and deposit therein the burlap bags containing rubbish. Inasmuch as rubbish and waste collections in the City are based upon a minimum weekly schedule there should be no large accumulation of such material at any time. Of course, the ideal method of averting all such danger is to keep refuse in large covered, metal cans or

It should be noted that aggravated or serious fire losses can have a direct result in increasing fire insurance rates and fire prevention is much more economical than fire loss.

Steps are being taken to do so again and it is believed that residents will be able to avail themselves of the opportunity to get suitable containers at a reasonable price.

## Defer School Bond Issue Paid in Full by School Board

No formal ceremony was held, but the Grosse Pointe Board of Education celebrated the paying off of the \$250,000 bond issue on the Defer School at the last meeting, held on Thursday evening, January 16. The building is now completely paid for. The payment was made without any refunding; it was pointed out, through placing in the Sinking Fund each year a sufficient amount to retire the bonds when they became due.

Mr. Charles A. Parcels, president of the Board, said that it was a source of satisfaction to him and to the Board—and must be to the community—that the bond issue is paid off. He stated, "The \$250,000 in bonds issued January 15, 1921, drawing interest at the rate of six per cent, which became due on January 15, 1936, were paid off with money which was on hand for the purpose."

The payment of this amount reduces the bonded indebtedness of the school district from \$3,863,000 to \$3,613,000 and reduces the annual interest obligation by \$15,000.

## F. M. Alger Jr. May Be Candidate for Congress in Fall

In an attempt to wrest the Fourteenth Congressional District from the Democrats, Republican County leaders are planning to run Fred M. Alger, Jr., of Grosse Pointe Farms, for Congress if that district next fall, it became known today. The seat now is held by Rep. Louis C. Rabaut (Dem.).

Some of the candidates who contested for the Republican nomination in the fourteenth in 1934 have been approached by party leaders and asked to keep out of the coming primary in order to clear the way for Mr. Alger, according to the statement of Edward H. Kennedy, one of the 1934 candidates.

Alger is a polo player and horseman of note. He owns a stable of thoroughbreds, including Azucar, winner of the \$100,000 Santa Anita Handicap in 1935.

He comes from a family with a high political tradition. His father, the late Col. Frederick M. Alger, was prominent in veterans' and Republican affairs. His mother was the leader of the women's wet forces during the fight to repeal prohibition and more recently was a member of the State Liquor Control Commission. His grandfather, Gen. Russell A. Alger, was governor of Michigan, United States senator and Secretary of War in President McKinley's Cabinet during the Spanish-American War.

In 1929 young Alger, then a member of the American staff working with Charles S. Dewey, financial adviser to the Republic of Poland, married Dewey's daughter, Suzette, in Warsaw. They live at 27 Touraine road, Grosse Pointe Farms.

21 States to Be Represented in Exposition

Trying in with the Foreign Trade Day of the Detroit and Michigan Exposition which is to be March 10, a mass meeting will be held in Detroit on March 11 and 12 as the start of a drive to push the St. Lawrence Waterway Treaty through the United States Senate, according to A. O. Moreaux, of Liverno, Minn., Executive Director of the Tidewater Association.

The formal treaty between Canada and the United States providing for construction of the deep water link was signed by the two nations two years ago. It missed ratification in the United States Senate by 13 votes. Cost of the project to the United States will be two hundred forty million dollars.

Governors, official waterway commissions and chambers of commerce of 21 states will be invited to the Detroit meeting, Moreaux said. Details of the mass meeting are being arranged by a sub-committee of Maureaux, O. K. Fjetland, and R. J. MacLean, of Detroit, and Miss Irene Snyder of Washington, Association secretary.

The present channel between the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence is 16 feet deep. The channel proposed in the treaty would admit all ships of 25 or less draft, which would accommodate all ocean going vessels except super liners.

States officially supporting the treaty, according to Moreaux, are Michigan, Ohio, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oregon, South Carolina, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming.

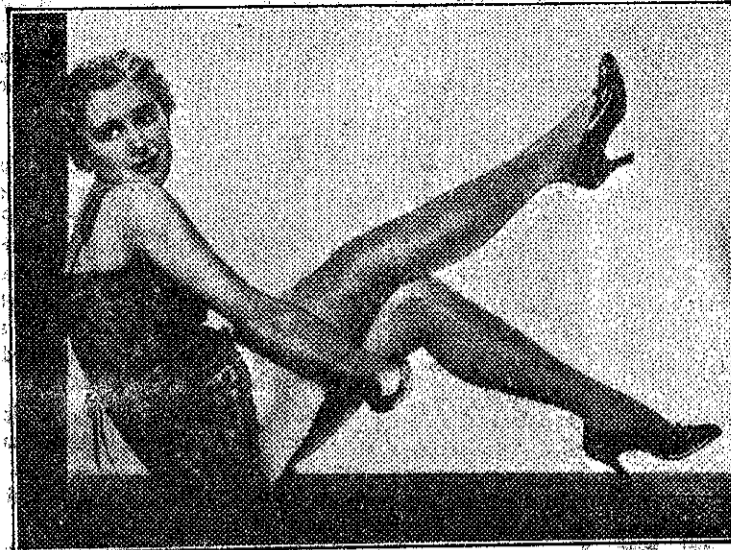

Sen. Gerald P. Nye To Speak at Town Hall

U. S. Senator Gerald P. Nye, (Rep.) from North Dakota, who is chairman of the Senate Munitions Investigating Committee, will speak before the Detroit Town Hall in the Fisher Theater, Wednesday morning, Jan. 29, at 11 o'clock. Senator Nye will speak on "The Munitions Racket."

The tempest Senator Nye's current investigating has stirred up both in the Senate and throughout the country, is nothing unusual for the crusading, 43-year-old orator from the wheatlands. He was chairman of the Senate Public

Lands Committee which investigated the Continental Trading Company's relation to the Teapot Dome oil scandal. The questions he and the late Thomas Walsh asked helped to return to the United States Treasury, in back taxes and penalties, oil concessions and other stolen goods, enough to finance any number of investigations.

Four years later, he investigated the high cost of Senate seats to the misfortune of Ruth McCormick, of Illinois, Joseph Grundy, of Pennsylvania, Bishop Cannon and others. He did not hesitate to rake Gen. Hugh Johnson and the NRA in behalf of "small business," and the objections raised by himself and Senator Borah caused the President to appoint the Darrow Board.

Nye's inquiry into the munitions industry in 1934 made him a national figure. Though a believer in adequate defense, he has long been an enemy of militarism and imperialism, voting against all bills for naval expansion, and opposing the protection of American foreign investments by armed forces.

Mrs. Elizabeth Hudson, Latin instructor at the Grosse Pointe High School, is the author of an article entitled "Character Building through the Medium of Latin Literature" which appears in the January issue of the Classical Journal.

The Classical Journal is a professional magazine devoted to research in the languages, literature, history, and

life of classical antiquity.

The article describes an experiment conducted by Mrs. Hudson in her Latin VI class during a period of six weeks of the semester ending in June, 1934. It sets forth the view of the author that advanced Latin translations should be read and studied not as mere grammatical exercises but as the literary masterpieces of any language are read and studied—for enjoyment, inspiration, and guidance. It was written in its present form and read at the fiftieth annual session of the Michigan Schoolmasters Club held in Ann Arbor last April.

Since the publication of the article Mrs. Hudson has received a letter from

Mr. Walter V. McDuffee, supervisor of Latin in the Springfield, Mass., public schools and author of the text, "Third Year Latin," now being used in the school. In the letter Mr. McDuffee expresses his interest in the article and his approval of Mrs. Hudson's project.

Mrs. Hudson has also received a communication from Mr. J. S. Fleet, head of the language department of the Culver Military Academy, in which he makes the following statement: "This is exactly the kind of work that I think enlivens Latin and makes it worth while \* \* \* I want to congratulate you most heartily on the article and on the idea that you evolved in reference to

this work, and I should greatly appreciate anything that you could give me that would enable me to carry on in this particular school the work you have started in Grosse Pointe."

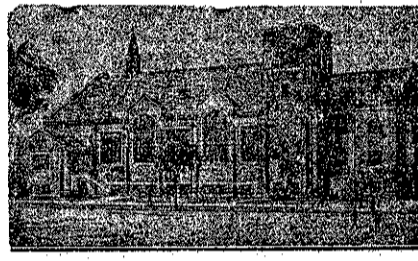
