

National Reemployment Agent at Township Offices Wed. August 19

In order to extend the facilities of the National Reemployment Service more conveniently to the residents of Grosse Pointe who are unemployed, Mr. Nolan, a representative of the bureau will be at the Grosse Pointe Township offices at 15115 E. Jefferson avenue on Wednesday, August 19, from 9 a. m. for registration of unemployed.

All those wishing employment, male or female, over the age of 16, should take advantage of these facilities in securing employment. The National Reemployment Service is one of the public employment services operated in every state by the United States Government through the Department of Labor. Both non-relief and relief persons, if qualified, are placed in jobs through the service with private em-

ployers and 60 Federal agencies. No fee is charged.

Throughout Michigan the National Reemployment Service placed 65,812 men and women in jobs during the first six months of this year, Major Starret said.

A graduate chemist, Ph. D. preferred is wanted in Illinois who is capable of taking charge of the production of sterile ligatures.

New York State is seeking water leyster rock drillers with tunnel and column experience.

Indiana needs draftsmen-designers with experience in both layout and detailing preferably those who have designed coal and wood heating and cooking stoves.

Montana wants asbestos ore graders, qualified in the treatment of ore, who are experienced miners in grading the particular kind of ore found in that state.

These are examples of out-of-state jobs which are continually available to applicants listed in the Michigan files of the National Reemployment Service, Major Starret said.

Applications needed in Michigan include those for the following kinds of work: form carpenters; asphalt rakers, shovelers, finishing machine operators, and roller operators; slab men; mould-off men; bulldozer operators; Northwest and P. and H. shovel operators; crane operators; trench machine operators; ship draftsmen, chippers, caulkers and riveters; die designers; die leaders, die and tool makers; Keiler machine operators; Lucas-Boring machine operators; G. and L. machine operators; milling machine operators; upsetter operators; iron floor molders, Brown and Sharp machine operators; Planer operators; Half-ton operators; B. and S. grinders; Backoff operators; and machinists.

There is also a demand for experienced young women in housework who must live at the place of employment, Major Starret said.

Anyone in Michigan over 16 years of age who is experienced in any of these jobs and is seeking employment should register at once at the nearest office of the National Reemployment Service, he said. The service is free of charge to both applicant and employer.

Dairy Farm Income Increases \$28,000,000 in Six-Month Period

Cash income from milk brought dairy farmers \$28,000,000 more during the first six months of 1936 than it did in the first half of 1935, according to the Milk Industry Foundation, which reports that total milk income for farmers has reached a new high since 1932.

With June milk income at \$128,000,000 the six months' total for 1936 reached \$683,000,000, the best return to dairy farmers in five years. The figure represents an increase of \$8,000,000 over May.

Milk still remains the farmers' best source of cash income despite the gradual betterment in all farm prices, the Foundation report states, and the 1936 improvement has been aided materially by the raising tide of consumer buying power in the cities where efficient milk distribution has created wider markets.

A larger consumption of bottled milk has been a major factor in boosting dairy farmers' income this year, because farmers receive their highest price for milk sold in fluid form.

While the severe drought in many dairy states has necessarily curtailed production somewhat, the higher prices now being paid for available supplies will tend to prevent any decrease in dairy farm income compared to 1935 during the remainder of the year, according to the Foundation.

Monthly Milk Sales Report

Dairy average sales of fluid milk in June increased 1.47 per cent over May, according to the monthly reports from leading markets to the Milk Industry Foundation.

June daily average sales totaled 6,462,833 quarts compared with 6,368,686 quarts in May and 6,272,652 in April. Payrolls of reporting milk companies increased 3.4 per cent over the preceding month and employment was up 1.5 per cent.

Drive Under Way for \$16,000,000.00 in Back Taxes

Second Payment Under Ten-Year Plan Now Due; Total to Set New Record

With the campaign on in every county in Michigan to collect the second installment of taxes due under the ten-year plan, State Treasurer Theodore I. Fry predicted today that the payments will aggregate \$16,000,000.

A sizable army of taxpayers already has begun marching on the various county treasurers, demanding a "paid" stamp on their bills. Early collection reports all have been good.

"On the basis of our experience a year ago, when the ten-year plan was inaugurated, I have no hesitancy about saying that this year's drive will be a big success," Treasurer Fry said. "I look for collections to top last year's total of \$15,000,000 and to reach possibly \$16,000,000."

"Business conditions are better generally, some individuals have kept their bonus money to pay the tax installment, and an investment in real estate is well worth protecting at this time. I am sure that practically everybody who paid his first installment on back taxes will realize the necessity for keeping up the payments."

"One of the purposes of the campaign is to acquaint those who failed to pay the first installment with the fact that they may still do so, with only a slight extra charge. A third group, who are now financially able to do so, will pay the whole thing up, in this way saving large amounts of interest and clearing the title to their property."

The rush of the public to pay in advance of the September 1 deadline recalls last year's jams at the treasurers' offices. All indications are that again this eleventh-hour visitors will have to wait in line and take their turn. Officials point out that those who pay now, not only gain the comfort of knowing that their property is protected, but save themselves this trouble of waiting.

The onslaught of the taxpayers gives visible proof of a thriving public realization that the State of Michigan is offering a bargain. Under the plan, taxes for 1932 and prior years—for state, counties, villages, townships, and all cities except Detroit, which has its own seven-year plan—are lumped and then divided into ten annual payments. All the heavy interest on these old taxes has been cancelled. The next interest amounts to only four per cent per year on each installment, figured from September 1, 1935, when the plan went into effect.

Those who are just starting in and making the two payments, put themselves on an equal footing with the rest, getting another eight years to meet the balance owing.

A modern machine gun has been added to the equipment of the department, new files have been purchased in order to facilitate speedy checking of fingerprints, every police officer has been equipped with a new raincoat and rubber boots for the Fall season.

Three new scout cars patrol the Farms area, and new modern stop signs conforming to regulations required by the State have replaced the old type along Kercheval avenue, and replacement of others along main thoroughfares will be effected shortly.

With the purchase of the scout cars three new radios were also added to the equipment, bringing the equipment up to a very high standard.

The new Commissioner also requires every officer to participate in target practice at least once a month, and has offered a prize to the best shot on the force at the close of the year when the award will be made by Mr. Sutton.

Most important of all the morale of the department has been brought back to its highest standards through an increase in wages bringing them up to pre-depression levels.

Mr. Sutton is to be commended upon his efforts to develop police protection comparable to the best by modernizing and improving until the police department of Grosse Pointe Farms ranks among the country's finest in spirit, equipment and training, a fact that Grosse Pointe Farms residents may well be proud.

Drive Under Way for \$16,000,000.00 in Back Taxes

The ten-year plan, embodied in the Moore-Holbeck Act, was the happy solution of an extremely serious tax problem. Many, many millions of dollars in taxes lay uncollected, and apparently uncollectible, on tax rolls. Accumulated for years, the taxes in their net amount was so huge that the property owners, despairing of ever paying the total, refused to pay any one year's delinquent tax. Interest and penalty on the older unpaid taxes ran as high as 50 and 60 per cent of the original amount, a fact which further discouraged payment.

Governmental units needed the money which these taxes represented. A tax title sale would have raised funds, but thousands of families would have lost their homes and life savings. Pledging the delinquencies for a good-sized loan was also considered and rejected, because paying back the interest and principal on the loan would have just added that much more of a burden on the already overburdened property owner.

Then the part-payment idea was evolved.

The state went right to its own property owners for assistance, and made the paying of taxes popular. Of the \$15,000,000 collected last year, about ten per cent went to the state treasury, while the other ninety per cent went into local treasuries.

The \$15,000,000 was actual cash. Through payment of it, \$55,000,000 in taxes was "revived" and shifted from dead to active rolls, with collection of the whole amount merely a matter of time.

So successful has been Michigan's new method of collecting delinquent taxes that it has commanded nationwide interest.

All county treasurers have the machinery of their offices geared to provide a maximum of service, knowing that the tide of taxpayers will be a rising one right up to the last minute.

The campaign, for which \$27,000 has been appropriated this year, is again being handled by Milton M. Alexander of Detroit.

Motion adopted unanimously.
President Parcels then administered the oath of Election Inspectors to the said Inspectors. In behalf of the Inspectors who were not present at the time the oath was administered, it was moved by H. F. Laing, supported by Edmond Poupard, to authorize the Chairmen of Election at the various precincts to swear in these officials who were not present at the 10:00 o'clock session. This motion was passed unanimously.

It was moved by William Kellar, supported by H. F. Laing, to instruct all of the chairmen to seal all of the ballot boxes at the precincts before bringing them to the place of the Annual Meeting at the High School to be counted. Motion adopted unanimously.
President Parcels explained that the election boards would disperse to the various polls and that the meeting would reconvene at the high school at 8 p. m.

President Parcels called the meeting to order at 8:30 p. m. with the following trustees being present: Trustees Barrett, Loranger, Parcels, Poupard. Four (4) Absent Trustee Clark. One (1) Superintendent Brownell was also present.

The President then gave a report as follows:
The school year 1935-36 now drawing to a close has been a successful one for the Grosse Pointe School District. As suggested last year, we have experienced a very decided increase in building and a considerable increase in school enrollment. Our increase in number of pupils in the Grosse Pointe schools at the end of May is 118 over May, 1935.

During last summer it became evident to the Board that we would need new facilities within a year or two at least, and we concluded that the proposition of assistance in building a school by a Federal grant should be placed before the electors. The plan was approved and our new school is well under way. We hope to get it at the opening of school in September.

The new school has been named the "Lewis E. Maire School," a tribute to the late Dr. Maire, a member of the Board. Dr. Maire was active in getting the various school districts to unite in 1922 to form the present school district, and was active in school affairs for many years back. We are glad to thus commemorate his years of service.

The contract price of the new school is \$295,222.00. Architect fees and equipment will bring the total cost to about \$317,500.00. The property on which the school is being built was purchased some time ago at \$184,000.00. The Federal grant on this project is \$136,272.00. We expect in time to sell the Kercheval business frontage for enough to practically pay for the building.

It is a distinct pleasure to report that the largest number of Grosse Pointe High School graduates in the history of our school entered college last year—57 students. They entered 23 different colleges and universities; University of Detroit, 9; University of Michigan, 8; Wayne University, 7; Albion, 5; Connecticut College for Women, 4; Cornell, 3; two each in Detroit Institute of Technology, Duke, Marygrove, and Trinity; and one each in Denison, Michigan College of Mining, Milwaukee-Dowder, National College of Education, Nazareth, Oberlin, Stamford, University of Vermont, Valparaiso, Vassar, Washington, Wittenberg, Worcester.

The students in the High School are continuing to engage in a board field of extra-curricular activities. This past year the activities have been notable in several fields, as evidenced by the following records:
Debate tie for Border Cities' League Championship.
Oration—First place for Border Cities' League Championship.
Extempore speaking—First place Border Cities' League Championship.

Prom—All-American rating (highest honors) (National Interscholastic Press rating).
Towel—All American rating (highest honors) (National Interscholastic Press rating, second successive year).

Basketball—Tie for Border Cities' League Championship.
Swimming—Border Cities' League Championship.
Tennis—Runner-up in Border Cities' League, May, 1935, and State tennis tournament.

Your School Board has met this past year in twenty-five (25) meetings. It has been both a busy and pleasant year. We have made a notable improvement in our financial affairs. We have lived within the budget, which was carefully drawn—\$14,200. We have paid off \$282,000.00 of bonded indebtedness. We have reduced our floating indebtedness from \$25,000.00 to nothing. Our staff commend to your gratitude and appreciation the loyal and efficient staff of teachers, janitors, engineers, and administrators. Such a staff make the job of being a Board member a distinct pleasure and they bring out the best in the youth of our community.

The President then called on the Superintendent who gave a brief report.
Treasurer Poupard then gave his report for the last fiscal year.

Mr. Parcels explained that the annual meeting is held in June while the fiscal year closes June 30. It is therefore impossible to present a complete report of the current year at the annual meeting. It is a State law that the report read at the annual meeting be the complete report of the previous, rather than the current year.

It was moved by John McPherson, supported by Mr. Moesta, that the report of the Treasurer be accepted as read. Motion passed unanimously.

It was moved by H. F. Laing, supported by Mr. Hudson, that the following named banks and such others as shall be designated by the Board of Education of Rural Agricultural School District No. 1, Grosse Pointe Township, Wayne County, Michigan, shall be approved as depositories of the moneys and funds of the above named School District:

- Grosse Pointe Bank, Grosse Pointe, Michigan
National Bank of Detroit, Detroit, Michigan
Detroit Savings Bank, Detroit, Michigan
Manufacturers National Bank, Detroit, Michigan

The motion was passed unanimously. It was moved by Joseph Fee, that the salary for Trustees for the coming year be Two hundred (\$200.00) dollars, and that the salary for the Treasurer for the coming year be One Thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars.

After Joseph Fee made the above motion, H. F. Laing made the following statement: Mr. President:

I have been more or less familiar with the work of the Board members and it seems that from time to time they spend a lot of their time and therefore I would like to move an amendment to the motion which has just been put before the meeting that the salary of the Board members be \$300.00 a year and that the Treasurer, with all due respect to Mr. Poupard, be reduced to \$600.00 to maintain the same total expenditure but to make a more equitable distribution of that \$1,800.00 item. I put that in the form of a motion as an amendment to the former motion.

This motion was supported by Mr. McPherson. After considerable discussion by the Board members and electors, Mr. Goodell made the following statement:

It seems to me that the compensation which we have been paying the Board members should be continued. If we are going to try to pay the Board what they are worth we are going to run into a great deal of money but it seems to me that we should not single out one member and ask him to take a reduction. I think that if the amount of compensation is to be increased, it should be increased all along the line. That is my opinion of the matter and I would like to have the other electors here tonight give the matter careful consideration.

After further discussion of the matter, President Parcels asked Mr. Laing if he would be willing to have his motion rescinded which he agreed to do, and the motion made by Mr. Fee was seconded by Mr. Manning and passed unanimously.

It was moved by Mr. Goodell, supported by Mr. Cummings, that the budget for the library for the year 1936-37 be set at \$17,000.00. The motion was unanimously adopted.

President Parcels read the report of the election inspectors which was as follows:

President Parcels then called on Mr. Barrett who made the following statements: Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:

If the Republican Election in Cleveland during this week is as harmonious as the meeting was here this evening I don't believe there will be much difficulty for the "New Dealers."

The small vote cast is a thing which is being puzzling some of us. Whether there has been satisfaction with the present Board or whether there was something else occupying the electors' time, that remains to be seen.

Elections of this kind are exceedingly important. At the moment there is nothing that involves a great expenditure. The new school building which the President has spoken of and for which we received Federal aid in the amount of \$137,000 was a decidedly important thing for this community. I only hope that future schools might be so constructed under the same system but it is scarcely possible that we will again have such a windfall.

I believe that within the last three years a great many things of an interesting nature have happened in this district, particularly within the last two years, with the great influx of new residents in Grosse Pointe and it may be said with a great deal of credit to everyone who lives in this section that many of these newcomers have said that they have come to Grosse Pointe because of the advantages which their children might obtain. There has been criticism in the past, it is true. Of course there would be criticism but the system here has been graduated from the old regime, improving as time goes on.

I thank you very much for the very flattering vote which you gave us this evening and we will try to go along for the next three years and continue the good work.

President Parcels then introduced Mr. Poupard who made the following statement:

Mr. Barrett covered the grounds pretty well so I will just extend to you my thanks for your loyal support and I promise you I will try to be straightforward and give you as good an administration and as honest a one as I have done in the past.

Mr. Norbert Neff, Clerk of the City of Grosse Pointe, brought up the question of securing approval of the voters to authorize the Board of Education to sell the Kercheval Avenue frontage of the Lewis E. Maire site. He pointed out the advantages to the district in having the income which might be derived from the selling of this property without detracting from the value of the school site.

Mr. Parcels pointed out that since the question was not placed on the call for the annual meeting, it would be impossible to take action at the annual meeting. Several others discussed the question bringing out the question as to whether the using of the Kercheval frontage for business purposes would be of sufficient value to offset the desirability of having the complete block for school and community purposes.

Mr. Jack Drew, a patron of the Defer school district, presented a petition signed by parents of children attending the Defer School or taxpayers requesting that the Board of Education refrain from enrolling any students in the Defer school other than those living in the Defer district and from placing two principals in the Defer

School and for the retention of the present principal, Fred J. Kerby. Mr. Drew indicated the understanding of patrons in the district that the Defer school was to be used as an annex to the high school for the seventh and eighth grade work. He indicated that it was his judgment based upon information which he had obtained that the use of the Defer building for this purpose would handicap its use for elementary school purposes and that he believed there was plenty of room in other schools in the district to provide for seventh and eighth grade pupils in the other elementary schools.

President Parcels received the petition and asked if others present desired to make further comments—there being no one desiring to add to the discussion, President Parcels indicated that the matter would be given careful consideration by the Board of Education, that the problem of caring for the increased enrollment in the school had to be determined on the best interests of the entire school district and that the Board of Education appreciated the interest of the parents in the problems of the school and asked their cooperation in working them out.

As there was no further business to be taken up at the meeting, the motion was made, supported and unanimously carried that the meeting adjourn.

America on a Diet

(Nutrition Department, Detroit Dairy and Food Council)

One of the diets that doctors find necessary to recommend most often nowadays is what dietitians call the Soft Diet. Usually the doctor hands a list of foods to the surprised patient, from which he is to select his meals. This may look easy to the doctor, but to the patient, struggling with the list trying to put food together

Because the soft diet is prescribed in many diseases and upsets of the digestive tract as well as for many other reasons, it is particularly important that, to recover, the diet list be followed carefully. The joker seems to be that in order for a sick or convalescing person to eat at all, the food must look and taste good. The things to remember in preparing a soft diet is that it should contain no foods with coarse or fibrous residue, such as raw, leafy vegetables or rough cereals, and no pork, veal, fried or rich foods. But eggs cooked any way except fried or hard boiled, cooked cereals,

white bread and crackers, pureed fruits and vegetables, baked and mashed potatoes in combinations that will be appetizing and attractive, it looks worse than hopeless.atoes, cottage cheese, sponge and angel food cake, milk, ice cream, milk puddings, soups, gelatin desserts, fruit juices and macaroni and spaghetti are all included. On many of the diets roast chicken, and lamb, lean fish, broiled, scraped beef patties or lamb chops are also included. Following are several combinations of meals that would not only look and taste good to the patient, but to a normal individual as well. About the only

change necessary for family meals would be to serve an additional crisp salad occasionally and to puree the vegetable only for the patient.
