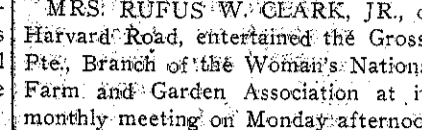

Scout Executives Announce New Award

A new Scout honor—to be known as the "President Jamieson Award" has been announced to the 350 units of the Detroit Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, by Scout Executive Amos R. Shields.

The new award, a beautifully engraved certificate, will be personally pre-

sent by President A. D. Jamieson at the Scouters' Annual Meeting to be held early next year.

The requirements for the award—within reach of any Scouting unit (Scout Troop, Cub Pack, or Senior Division)—are as follows:

1. Have at least 85% of the unit's membership present when a Roll Call is conducted by some visiting official during the period of November 1-21.
2. Have at least one Troop Committeeman present at the Roll Call.
3. Recruit and register at least three new members during the Roll Call period. No unit is so large that it cannot accommodate three additional

members. The task of checking the Council's entire membership during a three-week period seems formidable when one realizes that such membership includes about 9,000 boys and over 2,200 men. However, each District's Roll Call staff will include the District Commissioner, his Assistants, and any other Scouters especially assigned on this important mission.

Noted Scientist at Art Institute November 15

Arthur C. Pillsbury, explorer and

scientist, will tell his audience how to grow flowers and vegetables without soil and reveal an inexpensive chemical formula for doing it when he speaks on "New Miracles of Nature," with motion pictures in natural color, at the Detroit Institute of Arts at 3:30 Sunday afternoon, November 15.

From small tanks of water treated with less than a dollar's worth of chemicals Mr. Pillsbury has grown tomato plants 25 feet high, and shown how to increase an acre's potato yield from 104 bushels to from 2,000 to 3,000 bushels. With a new film he will demonstrate every phase of growing flowers and vegetables from seed to harvest,

including the inexpensive formula and how to mix it.

Mr. Pillsbury's films will deal with the beginning of life, the mating of flowers, the motion picture story of pollen and spirgyra, the life cycle of flowers and vegetables from germination to fruition. By means of polarized light photography he will reveal the astonishing activities that go on within a drop of water.

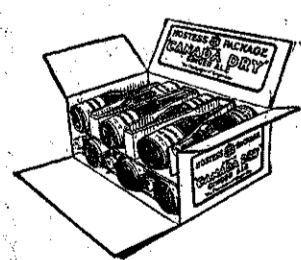

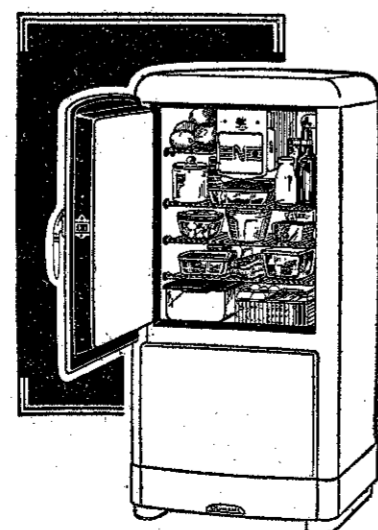

"Because of the enormous amount of money spent by tax-supported social agencies, most people have come to think that the entire field of human need has been provided for by the government. Important as these public programs are, we must not allow them to overshadow the fact that our local communities still depend upon Community Fund agencies for many types of service."

"In practically every field our work is supplemented and strengthened by the private social agencies supported by the Fund. The private agencies can in fact approach many problems with individualized treatment and care not practicable for public agencies to attempt."

"It is highly important that the citizens of Detroit realize the need for these services, the vital place occupied by the Fund agencies, and lend every effort toward making our Community Fund campaign a success."

"Our agencies co-operate with the public departments in every field," said Percival Dodge, managing director of the Fund, in discussing Mr. Haber's statement.

"Members of our family service agencies meet with members of the Department of Public Welfare regularly each week to discuss families in which we are active, and for whom public relief is needed."

"Our work begins where public relief ends. Because of the very nature of tax-supported institutions, they must be less flexible and less individual in their approach than the private agency."

"The whole field of individualized work with young people is again the special charge of the private agency, for two reasons: The first is that the community as a whole needs and demands a constructive program of character building for its young people. And the second is that only in a private agency can the boy or girl who cannot pay club fees or membership dues, be received on an equal basis with those other young people who can afford to pay their own way."

Luncheon at One

Now and again women like to go elegant with their grandest airs and white gloves — which means that a young bride who chooses to make her first company meal a luncheon, will please her friends and have a good time for herself, as well.

The problem of the inexperienced cook — although the spring bride is by now beginning to feel like past master at the art cookery — is to give her luncheon a look and a taste of elegance, without getting into the too complicated dishes. For, unfortunately, some of the elaborate dishes that look so beautiful in the pictures and read so good, oftentimes turn out to be a little short of the mark, in not-so-experienced hands.

The trick to giving the desired luxurious effect to a simple, easy-to-prepare meal is in the little additions to every foods — garnishes, sauces, condiments, and so on. Beautiful table appointments and perfect service can make of even a completely unadorned meal, however, one fit for any visiting potentate. Hot food served hot, cold food served to a point of iciness are "musts" of any good meal.

The following menu is guaranteed to please the most particular group yet leave the hostess in a calm unflurried, unburied state, particularly if she does as much of the preparation the day before as possible.

- Cream of Tomato Soup (garnished with lightly salted whipped cream, and chopped, salted peanuts.)
- Lamb or Veal Chops baked in milk brown them well first over direct heat, about cover, with milk; bake in oven until tender and milk is cooked into them.)
- Rosy Apple Slices
- Celery Curls
- Mashed squash in orange cups (cook squash; mash and add butter; put in hollowed out basket; reheat in oven until brown on top.)
- Hot Refrigerator Rolls
- Mint Ice

1936 Milk Sales for 9 Months Reach New 5-Year High

Farmer's cash income from sales of milk during the first nine months of 1936 reached a new billion dollar five year high with a total of \$1,074,000,000, according to the Milk Industry Foundation.

The 1936 nine months' total milk income for farmers represents an increase of \$80,000,000 over the 1935 nine months' period which totaled \$994,000,000. With Sept. milk income at \$12,000,000, the nine months' total for 1936 was \$298,000,000, greater than the 1932 total of \$276,000,000 for the same period.

Milk contains as the best single source of a farm cash income, the Foundation says, with 1936 improvement aided by raising consumer buying power in the cities.

Fall pastures have shown notable improvement since last summer's drought and milk production held up well in September. While the usual seasonal declines in milk production can be expected from now on until the new year, the Foundation report stated, farm income from milk should continue to exceed 1935 figure.

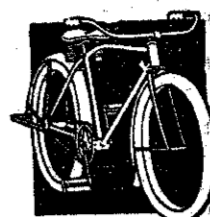
