Highway Commission Opens Sidewalk Bids

Murray D. Van Wagoner, state highway commissioner, opened bids today on three sidewalk construction projects just outside the cities of Flint and Grand Rapds.

The commissioner stressed the safety benefits to be derived from the sidewalks to be built along heavily-traveled highways near the city limits of the two municipalities. This is particularly true of pedestrian traffic, he said.

The low bids on the three projects totaled \$32,503.08. Construction is expected to get underway within ten days: Low Bids follow:

1.482 miles of sidewalks on US-23 and M-10 from the city limits of Flint north William E. Malow Utica, low bidder, \$10,789.92.

1.136 miles of sidewalks on M-10 from the city limits of Flint south William E. Malow, \$14,782.17.

1.76 miles of sidewalks on US-16 from Grand Rapids city limits west, P. Vander Veen & Sons, Grand Rapids,





Community Fund Campaign Success Urged by Haber

Support for the current Community Fund campaign, ending November 20, was urged by William Haber, State Relief Administrator and Professor of Economics at the University of Michigan in a statement today. Mr. Haber

"Because of the enormous amount of money spent by tax-supported social agencies, most people have come to think that the entire field of human need has been provided for by the government. Important as these public programs are, we must not allow them to overshadow the fact that our local communities still depend upon Community Fund agencies for many types of service.

"In practically every field our work is supplemented and strengthened by the private social agencies supported by the Fund. The private agencies can in fact approach many problems with individualized treatment and care not practicable for public agencies to attempt. Our entire program for relieving the sick, the homeless, the handicapped and the under-privileged has been sadly curtailed in these depression years and needs strengthening through-MYS

"It is highly important that the citizens of Detroit realize the need for these services, the vital place occupied by the Fund agencies, and lend every! effort toward making our Community Fund campaign a success."...

"Our agencies co-operate with the public departments in every'field," said Percival Dodge, managing director of the Fund, in discussing Mr. Haber's statement. "In many cases where relief funds or boarding care or physicians' fees are provided for by the state, city or county funds, Community Fund agencies do the actual work with the family, supervise the boarding home or supplement the medical care.

"Members of our family service agencies meet with members of the Department of Public Welfare regularly each week to discuss families in which we are active, and for whom public relief is needed.

"Our work begins where public re-lief ends. Because of the very nature of tax-supported institutions, they must be less flexible and less institutional in their approach than the private agency.

"The care top dependent children in foster and orphan homes, protective work for boys and girls preferred by the Juvenile Court, care for unmarried mothers and bed-side nursing service for those who cannot afford it are some of the services which we supply and for which no government agency is responsible.
The whole field of individualized

work with young people is again the special charge of the private agency, for two reasons: The first is that the mands a constructive program of character building for its young people. And the second is that only in a private agency can the boy or girl who cannot pay club fees or membership dues, be received on an equal basis with those other young people who can afford to pay their own way. The Community Fund agencies can and do give these boys and girls the same recreational and educational population which more prosperous parents can pay.

1936 Milk Sales for 9 Months Reach New 5-Year High

Farmer's cash income from sales of milk during the first nine months of 1936 reached a new billion dollar five year high with a total of \$1.074,000,000, according to the Milk Industry Founda-

The 1936 nine months' total milk income for farmers represents an increase of \$80,000,000 over the 1935 nine months' period which totaled \$994,000,000 With Sept. milk income at \$12,000,000, the nine months' total for 1936 was \$298,000,000, greater than the 1932 total of \$776,000,000 for the same period.

Milk contains as the best single source of a farm cash income, the Foundation says, with 1936 improvement aided by raising consumer buya power in the cities.

Fall pastures have shown notable improvement since last summer's drought and milk production held up well in September. While the usual seasonal declines in milk production can be expected from now on until the new year, the Foundation report stated, farm income from milk should continue to exceed 1935 figure.
