Born in Cleveland February 22, 54 years ago, Mr. Stoiber had lived in Detroit 25 years. For 32 years he had been district manager for the Black & Decker Manufacturing Co. and the Van Dorn Electric Tool Co.

A widely known sportsman and yachtsman, he was a member of the Northwood Club near Grayling; a director of the English Springer Spaniel Club of Michigan; a member of the Put-In-Bay Club, and an ardent supporter of Father Flannigan's Boys' School at Omaha. His summer home is at Put-In-Bay, where for years he had taken part in the annual regatta.

Surviving are his wife, Clara I. Stoiber; two children, Romer and Katherine Rose Stoiber, and his parents, Fred J. and Anna M. Stoiber.

Interesting Facts from Dept. of Instruction

Some interesting facts have just been disclosed by Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, Superintendent of Public Instruction. The information concerns 4,854 disabled persons who have applied for assistance at the Rehabilitation Division of the Department, during the last 8 years. The average weekly earnings of these persons before disability was \$15.97. The average weekly wage after rehabilitation is \$19.80. This improvement was brought about by physical retraining and vocational training and guidance.

Toys Fixed by Scouts to Bring Needy Tots Joy

Thousands of children whose parents cannot afford to buy toys for them will not have to face a cheerless Christmas. In hundreds of communities Boy Scouts are collecting, repairing and distributing toys given by householders and made by the boys themselves.

Toy repairing has been a principal fall activity of the Scouts since their organization was founded in America in 1910. It is a good turn that benefits three ways. It enables householders to put to good, damaged or outgrown toys and games that clutter up the house. It gives the Boy Scouts opportunities of rendering a worthwhile service and put to practice the knowledge they acquire through their merit badge program such as: basketry, blacksmithing, book binding, carpentry, electricity, handicraft, leathercraft and leatherwork, metal work, painting, wood carving and wood turning. And most important, is the joy the boys bring to less-chance youngsters on Christmas morn.

Many Scout Troops started their toy work in October. First they obtained permission to use the manual training room in a local school, or obtained the use of a vacant store where they gather after school and Saturdays with their own or borrowed tools. In some communities firemen and other municipal employees devote their time, between duties, to repairing toys. In these cases the Scouts concentrate on finding toys that can be spared, bringing them to these groups. At Christmas they distribute them to homes listed by social service agencies.

The annual toy campaign gets underway when the local newspapers announce the date that Scouts will call for the toys. Householders are urged to rummage through their closets, attic and cellars and get the games and toys together and then call the Scouts. Merchants aid by lending their trucks and drivers to pick up the donated toys while others help with the loan of tools and gifts of materials necessary in the repair work.

Thanksgiving Service Held by Sixth Church of Christ, Scientist

The annual Thanksgiving service was held in Sixth Church of Christ, Scientist, 14529 Kercheval avenue, on Thursday morning, with a large attendance. An interesting feature of the occasion was the testimonies of thanksgiving for the healing of sickness, sin, sorrow and lack, through the ministrations of Christian Science, told briefly in quick succession by members of the congregation.

The special Thanksgiving Lesson, Sermon read in Christian Science churches throughout the United States, made up of passages from the Bible and selections from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, contained this verse from Malachi 3:10: "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, said the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

Liberty Editor to Address Town Hall Audience Wednesday

"Most of us are nine-tenths asleep and, therefore, never touch our undeveloped riches." In a stirring lecture, Fulton Carsler, editor of Liberty and 11 other magazines, best-seller novelist and playwright, will tell the Town Hall audience how to attain more energy, more happiness and more success. Mr. Oursler will speak in the Fisher Theater Wednesday morning, December 9, at 11 o'clock on the subject, "Our Undeveloped Riches" (Nine lives we never use).

In ten years packed to the brim with widely divergent activities Mr. Oursler has demonstrated magnificently that his philosophy is not merely a pleasant theory but a practical program. Editor of 12 magazines, he has in his spare hours written seven important novels, including "Behold This Dreamer," "Sandalwood," "The Great Jasper" and "Joshua Todd," five Broadway hits, "The Spide," one of the biggest box-office successes in the history of Broadway, which was also made into a moving picture by Fox; "Behold This Dreamer," with Glenn Hunter; "All the King's Men," with Grant Mitchell, filmed by RKO as "Second Wife," and "Sandalwood," one of Pauline Lord's greatest plays.

He has written six best-selling detective novels under the pseudonym Anthony Abbot; more than 200 magazine stories and articles; spent a year in Hollywood writing scenarios and adapting his own material to the screen; delivered a successful series of radio broadcasts—"Stories That Should Be Told," collaborated with Franklin D. Roosevelt on the only novel ever produced by a President.

Detroit Public to Hear Spanish Gov. Representatives

Three representatives of the Spanish government, whose soldiers are now making a valiant stand against General Franco's Fascist troops at Madrid, will be greeted at a mass meeting in Detroit Monday night, December 7, at 8 o'clock in Cass Technical High School, according to George W. Dean, chairman of the Committee to Aid Spanish Democracy and vice president

of the Michigan Federation of Labor. The three representatives of the Spanish government are the Rev. Father Luis Scarsola, Catholic priest and scholar; Marcilino Domingo, president, Left Republican Party, former Minister of Education; and Donna Isabella de Palencia, Spanish Ambassador to Sweden.

Having arrived several weeks ago in New York, the delegation is making a flying trip across the continent to present to the American people the case of Spanish Democracy. Their visit here, while their country is in the throes of a struggle for democracy, has been compared to the historic visit of Benjamin Franklin to France during the American Revolution.

Dean will be chairman of the meeting. One of the principal speakers greeting the delegation will be Lazaro Bartolome, Spanish Consul in Detroit. Since arriving in the United States the Spanish delegation has been received by huge audiences in a number of large cities, eager to hear first hand reports of the war in Spain and exact explanations of the position of the Spanish government. They will come to Detroit from Chicago and proceed from here to Cleveland.

Detroit Community Fund Quota Exceeded

Consideration of budgets for its 77 affiliated agencies will be the next phase of the Detroit Community Fund's work, following its successful campaign to raise \$2,250,000 for 1937 needs. The drive exceeds its quota, it was announced at the victory dinner in the Hotel Statler, Friday evening, Nov. 20, and reached the figure of \$2,259,000. The campaign was carried on intensively for two weeks from November 9 to November 20th with 3,000 volunteer workers representing more than 6,000 business and industrial concerns in the Metropolitan area engaged in solicitation.

Among the larger gifts received by the Fund during the campaign were those from General Motors Corp., \$75,000; J. L. Hudson Co., and employees, \$68,360; Detroit school teachers, \$57,745; Briggs Manufacturing Co., and employees, \$53,126 and Mr. and Walter O. Briggs \$15,000. Reports of campaign results throughout the country show Detroit in the lead with Allen Burns, executive secretary of Community Chests & Councils, Inc., New York, describes as the greatest increase shown by any fund gathering organization this year.

Van Wagoner to Deliver Address at San Francisco

Murray D. Van Wagoner, state highway commissioner, will deliver an address before the annual convention of the American Association of State Highway Officials, this month at San Francisco on the economic feasibility of a nationwide program for divided highways.

For the successive year, the commissioner is one of six speakers on the general session program. Last year he addressed the convention on the inadequacy of present legislation for the protection of roadside beauty. He will speak on the morning of December 8 this year.

The commissioner, combining a vacation with business, is now en route to the convention. He left here last week for Mexico City to inspect the new highway between the Mexico Capitol and Laredo, Tex., prior to his arrival in California. The entire trip is being made by automobile.

In the preparation of his address before the California convention, Commissioner Van Wagoner sent questionnaires to every state highway department in the country on the question of

divided highways. Answers to the questionnaires showed that Michigan ranks among the leading states in the Union in its parkway and divided highway mileage.

At the present time the state highway department is experimenting with highway division by the use of bituminous or metal medial strips. The present site of the experiment is on US-23 between Saginaw and Bay City. The Oakland County experiment has been accompanied by a law-enforcement program requiring drivers to remain in their proper lane of traffic.

After-Turkey Days

(By Nutrition Department, Detroit Dairy and Food Council)

Thanksgiving dinner, with its traditional roast turkey, cranberries, pumpkin pies and all the rest of the good things, is a meal to be looked forward to with enthusiasm from one year to the next.

That fragrant brown turkey simply oozing goodness and stuffing is the prize of the day. The thing that many families complain about a bit, however, is that it may continue to be the piece de resistance of too many meals to come.

With a bit of ingenuity and juggling by a skillful meal planner, this unfortunate treatment of both family and fowl may be eliminated.

In the first place, skip several days before even thinking of turkey after the big meal. Then slice off all the remaining meat possible, chop off the rest, then crack the bones and make turkey broth of the remains. Wrap the meat in waxed paper and keep in a very cold place. The meat will keep for a long time in this way—long enough that it is again a treat to have turkey.

In addition to creamed turkey on toast, cold sliced turkey, salad and sandwiches, there are a number of delicious ways to serve left over fowl. One method which combines left over mashed potatoes as well, is almost as popular as in the original form. This is a modified method of making croquettes. Add a beaten egg, salt, pepper and a bit of nutmeg to left-over mashed potatoes. Add chopped meat and a bit of chopped onion. Form into small cones or cakes and brown on all sides in butter.

Luncheon chicken and turkey soufflé are a bit unusual and delightful dishes to serve to luncheon guests.

Luncheon Chicken
1 1/2 cups cooked fowl, diced
1 cup white sauce (may be made with turkey stock)

Onion salt
2-3 cup buttered cracker crumbs

4 eggs
Season sauce with onion salt. Add chicken or turkey. Turn on slightly buttered baking platter and sprinkle with cracker crumbs. Make four nests and in each nest slip an egg; cover eggs with crumbs and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F) until egg whites are firm.

Turkey Soufflé

2 cups white sauce
2 cups cooked turkey finely chopped
3 egg whites, beaten stiff
3 egg yolks, well beaten
1 cup finely chopped parsley
1/2 cup stale soft bread crumbs
Add bread crumbs to sauce and cook two minutes; remove from fire, add turkey, egg yolks and parsley, then fold in egg whites. Turn into a buttered baking dish and bake for 35 minutes in slow oven.

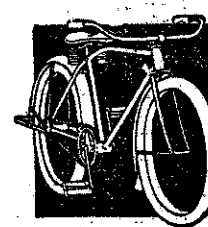

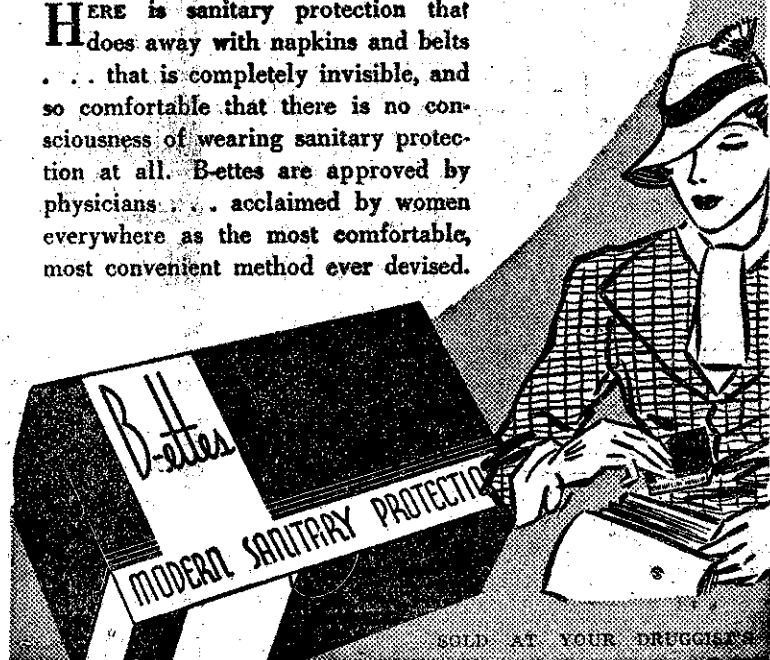
