# \$3,000 GOODFELLOW FUND SOUGHT

## How the Goodfellow Fund Is Distributed

The Grosse Pointe Lions' Goodfellow Newspaper Sale is conducted annually by the Grosse Pointe Lions Club, for the purpose of immediate relief for unfortunates, pending proper investigation of the circumstances and also to assist in any needy cause requiring medical attention, optical service, hospital care, milk for babies and undernourished children and families in distressed circumstances.

The fund is under the direct supervision of its executive committee. This committee meets monthly and carefully analyzes all expenditures. The welfare work is conducted by experienced social workers of the Neighborhood Club of Grosse Pointe, which acts as a clearing house for the prevention of duplication of aid. The Club is not desirous of providing a Christmas basket program. They consider it more advisable to continue a welfare program throughout the year and render immediate relief. As investigation is made the case is turned over to the proper authorities.

During 1936, milk, coal, clothing, galoshes and other necessities were satisfactorily arranged for.

The membership of the Grosse Pointe Lions Club is made up from the business, executive and professional members of the various municipal governments in the Township and because of their pride and interest they take more than common care to see that the fund is carefully and properly handled and the greatest amount of good accomplished with the funds available. The Grosse Pointe Goodfellow Fund, since its inauguration in December, 1929, has collected through the sale of papers and other activities the sum of \$18,547.15 of which the Fund has spent for welfare and relief work \$17,827.80. No money whatever is expended for expenses involved through organization or operation. The entire amount received from this effort is used entirely for relief work.

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Fortress of Chillon Is Popular in Switzerland

The Swiss town of Villeneuve at the eastern end of Lake Lemane always welcomes visitors, for in spite of its name, "New City," it is a very ancient town, known in the time of the Romans as Penniloci. But as in years past, it yielded to the attractions of the Castle of Chillon, the best known castle in all Switzerland, with whose story, first celebrated by Lord Byron in 1816, few castles in all Europe can compete.

The fortress of Chillon stands a mile from Villeneuve, on an isolated rock about twenty yards from the bank of the lake. It is connected with the shore by a bridge, which in medieval days was a drawbridge. How old the castle may be none can tell, but Bronze Age tombs, nearly 4,000 years old, discovered at its entrance, give one some key to its antiquity. The earliest mention of Chillon Castle in any document is 1005 A. D., when it belonged to the bishops of Sion, but from the Twelfth to the Sixteenth century it was held by the Dukes of Savoy, during whose reign most of the fortifications took place.

Although in the Sixteenth century Francois Bonivard, the subject of Byron's poem, was imprisoned there when he with other Swiss patriots rebelled against the Duke of Savoy, his two years fettered in the dungeon which bears his name was but slight suffering compared to the tortures of most who were thrown into the dark, damp chambers there. The post, erected in 1256, near where the torture by fire was perpetrated shows the scorings and burns made by the executioners in their testings of the heated irons.

The Lapps of Finland A long blue blouse gathered at the waist with a belt and slashed with red and yellow, tight blue trousers and caps on which they wear huge red pompons. Their shoes are a moccasin of reindeer hide, bound at the ankle with red and yellow woolen bands and turned up at the toes. Lapps sometimes place a certain type of grass, which they call shoe grass, in their moccasins and so protected, their feet go unharmed on the roughest ground and keep warm in the coldest weather. Just as they have for centuries, the Lapps still depend on their reindeer herds for both food and shelter. The milk of the deer is made into cheese, the flesh used for meat, the skins for clothing, tents and cooking utensils. Even the bones are utilized for needles in sewing and for the hondo which prevents the knot of a lasso from pulling too tight.

Offer Daily Sacrifices Every Brahman family in India possesses and offers daily sacrifices to its sacred Salagrama Stone, a little pebble which is found in countless numbers in the rivers of Nepal. The great reverence for these stones is illustrated by the annual festival given by the Maharaja of Orcha for his Salagrama. In some years the procession has included, among other things, 1,200 camels, 4,000 horses and more than 100,000 guests.—Collier's Weekly.

Raise, Rise, Increase The form, "a raise in salary," is well established, and since 1728 has been accepted as good English. It is found in good literature on both sides of the Atlantic. "An increase," as of pay for services rendered, is as common in England as it is in the United States. Rise with the meaning, "an advance in wages," is colloquial English and dates from 1836.—Literary Digest.

"Bruin" Means "Brown" The name "bruin" comes from the Danish language, and means "brown." It was first used in Europe, because of the big brown bears found there, according to an authority. The brown bears of Europe are of very good size, the full-grown males being about six feet long.

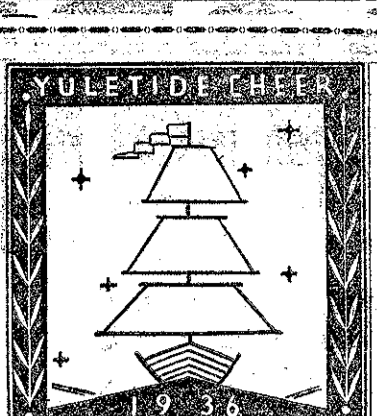

INSURANCE TIPS

Get a group of men together for a hobby night and you will be surprised at the variety of their hobbies. Some will be collectors only, some creators and some both creators and collectors, like the stamp collector who also prints his own explanation of his stamps on his mountings, by means of his own printing press.

The value of some of the collections will be nominal but the value of others may be considerable. Tools and equipment of some may be very valuable. The loss of tools, equipment or collection by fire, theft or other hazard would be a severe blow if not insured. Yet many do not realize that their regular fire and burglary insurance policies may not cover their tools, equipment or collections and that there are other perils besides fire and theft.

Special Mention Advisable Fire insurance policies on "household and personal effects of every description are usual or incidental to the occupancy of the premises by the insured." Courts have held that this phraseology does not apply to "animate objects" subject as plants, birds, tropical fish and dogs. Nor does it apply to "inanimate" stamp and coin collections as they are not "usual or incidental". However, art collections are covered if the premises are occupied as a dwelling and the collection is not for sale or on display.

To be absolutely sure that your printing press, power lathe or collection is insured against fire, your fire insurance policy should state specifically that it is included with the furniture and clothing.

Stamp and coin collections are not insured for more than \$100 unless insured as a separate item.

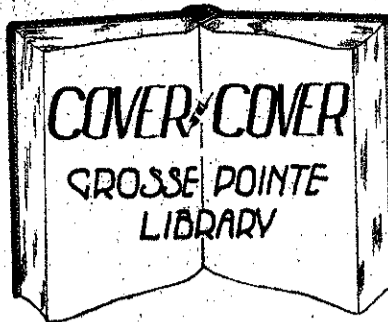
All Risk Insurance But by far the most satisfactory way to insure inanimate collections is by means of "all risk" insurance. All risk insurance covers all hazards—fire, theft, transportation, mysterious disappearance and others—with but few exceptions not only at the assured's residence but elsewhere as well.

Stamp collectors can insure their stamps and other philatelic property at a rate usually less than \$1.00 per \$1,000 per year. Stamps can be insured individually for a specified amount and, in event of loss, that amount is paid. Or a collection can be insured for a lump sum. In event of loss, 50 per cent of the value of the stamp, up to \$100 is paid.

Dr. Elliott's Plans Would Be Benefit to Rural Schools

The cause of public school education, particularly in the state's rural areas, would be greatly aided if the 1937 legislature adopts the major portion of the program of improvement publicity advocated this week by Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, Superintendent of Public Instruction.

While the whole program constitutes a comprehensive plan for betterment of the entire public school system much emphasis was laid by the state's school head on educational problems peculiar to the areas outside metropolitan districts.

Underlying the whole proposal, which was in the form of the biennial report of the Department of Public Instruction to Governor Fitzgerald, as required by law, was the basic contention that the public school system must receive substantially more state aid in order to meet existing social and economic conditions. Public schools now receive \$38,000,000 annually from the state, including the primary school fund.

Following are the phases of the Elliott plan which would particularly benefit the rural areas.

Payment by the state of all tuition costs now charged non-resident pupils for 7th and 8th grade instruction in city and village high schools, which pupils must pay at present.

Increase of the state's payment of tuition for non-resident high school students. The state now pays \$65 per pupil per year, but the report points out that in many cases actual costs are considerably higher, the difference being met by local taxpayers.

Relief from the present overcrowded condition in many schools, particularly of the consolidated type, by direct assistance from the state to school districts for the construction of new schools.

Higher pay for country school commissioners "commensurate with their educational qualifications and responsibilities."

Revision of the whole body of school transportation legislation which at present lacks uniformity in different districts, as to legal and financial arrangements.

Reorganization of school districts where economy and increased efficiency would be brought about, with consent of local residents a primary condition.

While enactment of legislation conforming with any one of these recommendations would be reflected in easing the cost of education in rural areas, the other points in the Elliott program

would be beneficial throughout the entire state.

Summarized, the more significant recommendations are: removing the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction from partisan politics by making the office appointive by an enlarged State Board of Education; higher salaries for all teachers, modification or repeal of the "teachers' oath of allegiance" law to avoid certain abuses, a tenure act to protect "efficient" teachers from being dismissed capriciously if such a measure can be agreed on, prevention of use of state aid funds for purposes supposed to be met by local taxation.

Local Scouts Now Registering for National Jamboree

The proposed 1935 National Jamboree cancelled because of Infantile Paralysis, will be held June 29th to July 9th next year.

The first two local boys already registered are: Herbert McCord and Richard School of Troop 279, which is sponsored by the Puritan Heights Lutheran Church. Herbert lives at 16506 Wisconsin, and Richard at 16246 Northlawn.

The cancellation of the proposed 1935 Jamboree was a dark disappointment to nearly 45,000 American Scouts and Leaders, whose reservations had been made. However, in the Scouting spirit, all agreed that for Health Safety's sake the activity should not go on. Many of the foreign delegations were enroute when the cancellation was announced but all of these groups continued their journey and toured America.

Of course, all of the work done by the National Jamboree Committee, setting up tents, laying miles of water main and sewer lines, communication facilities, etc., will prove a valuable experience in planning the 1937 Jamboree—which will be bigger and better than ever.

It is estimated that 50,000 or more will attend from the whole nation and the several foreign countries, which are also sending delegates.

Candidates to the International Jamboree, also to be held this summer in Holland, must, as a requirement, attend the National Jamboree at Washington, as preliminary training.

Last year nearly 300 Scouts and Leaders, from the local council, were ready for Washington when the cancellation notice was received.

Why experiment? In Grosse Pointe it's the Elaine Marie Arndt Dance Studio.

Wayne Medical Society Auxiliary to Give Party

Adequate educational standards and registration requirements to safeguard the public from incompletely trained, unqualified "specialists" are being established in the College of Medicine of Wayne University, according to a recent announcement issued by Dean Raymond B. Allen.

The Medical College has inaugurated a training program leading to the Master of Science Degree in Medicine for those medical graduates who wish to specialize in some branch of the "basic medical sciences" such as anatomy, bacteriology, physiology, etc., as well as for those who wish to devote themselves to the "clinical specialties" such as general surgery, internal medicine, neurology, obstetrics and gynecology, etc.

"Detroit offers some of the best opportunities in the country for the development of this kind of training," explains Dean Allen. "Before long there will be regularly established registries where the public may find listed the names of those physicians who really are recognized by the medical profession to be bona fide specialists, not just self-styled specialists. This will meet a long-felt need, since the people heretofore could not always be sure that a 'specialist' was actually well qualified to practice in his so-called branch of specialization."

In co-operation with various hospitals in Detroit, these courses are being offered to the full-time staff members of the various institutions, for whom tuition fees in the post graduate work have been waived by the Board of Education.

For the general practitioner, "short" courses are offered co-operatively by the Wayne University College of Medicine, the University of Michigan Medical School, and the Michigan State Medical Society. These latter are not designed to make a specialist of the general practitioner, but rather to assist him to improve himself professionally.

**Services at Christ Church Cranbrook**

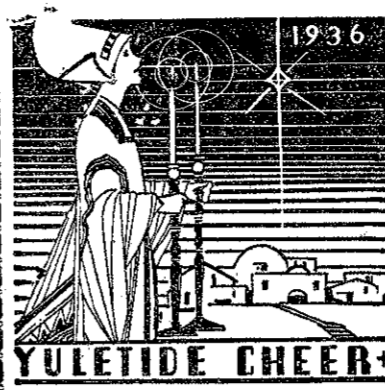

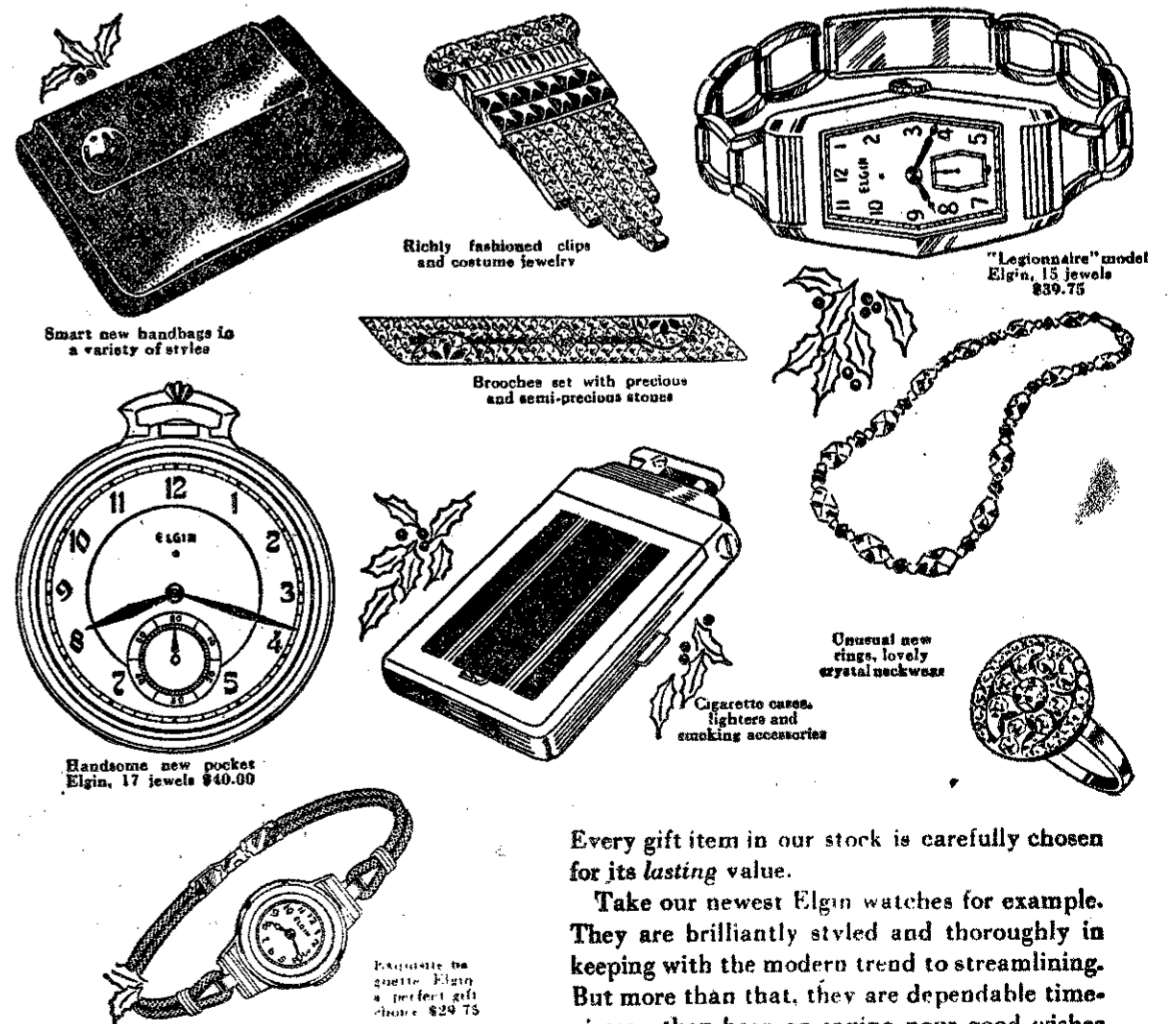

**Detroit Evening Schools Complete Term Tonight**

Detroit public evening schools complete their fall term of 12 weeks on December 17 with a total individual membership of 22,000 constituting a class membership of approximately 24,000, about evenly divided between men and women. Of the class membership approximately 5,000 were elementary students and 19,000 in high school, technical, and other courses. The term load on the basis of average attendance was on the whole about eight per cent heavier than in 1935. A slightly improved enrollment for elementary work and a marked increase in secondary enrollment characterized the term.

The chief innovation of the fall term was the continued development of a comprehensive homemaking program in all schools at a fee of 50 cents. Over 1,700 women registered, which was 300 more than last year. Classes were formed not only in sewing and cooking but in first aid, care of the sick, child care, gardening, art needlework, knitting and crocheting, and many other courses.

Another development was the organization of traffic safety classes at Cass Technical evening high school. These classes give a course consisting of two lectures on traffic laws and practice which, during the term, was taken by upwards of 3,000 drivers.

All evening schools will remain closed until January 4 at 7 p. m., when enrollments for a new term of 12 weeks will be received.

**Many Interesting Talks on Art Institute Series**



**Fingerprints for Positive Identification**

By Det. J. Warren Bistran, F. P. E.  
In the event of a catastrophic identification is often difficult, and in train wrecks, casualties at sea, and other disasters there is often a long list of

unidentified dead. In addition many persons suffer from amnesia or loss of memory. Fingerprint identifications would eliminate the instances in which friends and relatives anxious to properly honor the deceased, are prevented from providing a family burial with

proper religious services because of failure to establish identity.

It is also believed the fingerprints of persons fearing kidnaping should be on file in the Civil Identification Section of the United States Department of Justice, in Washington. Further, persons who by reason of prominence are harassed by the activities of impersonators may insure identification through the use of fingerprints. It is thus possible for the real person to

establish his true identity as against the impersonator. Your fingerprints on file in Washington should be considered as nothing more or less than a signature which cannot be forged. There has not been found two fingerprints alike in the millions on file throughout the world.

Fingerprints must be looked upon by the average citizen as his proof of identity and of good standing in a community. The honest citizen who is found dead and who is not protected by his fingerprint identification goes to a grave in ignorance to his fate.

Fingerprint identification will be looked upon not only as the foe to criminal but the friend of the good citizen, the protector, the assistant, the character reference and the repository of information which will give the honest man greater freedom and greater peace of mind.

There is no recommendation of identity as good as that of being able to say that a citizen has thought enough of his future and that of his family to place his mark of identification on file in this manner. It is a badge of honor. It should give one a good standing in a community. It should be a letter of recommendation to any bank or insurance or business institution and it should be the duty of good citizens everywhere to assume leadership in this movement by preaching its usefulness to employers and friends.

The Police Department and other law-enforcing agencies will be only too glad to assist you in this movement to protect yourself, free of charge.

**Dancing Sons and Daughters**

Dancing sons and daughters will become Cinderellas—home early—if tempting foods are ready for the "wee small hour" chat. These energetic young people need plenty of nourishment. Eating before bed is not only a pleasure, but a necessity. Menus or foods selected should be those readily digested and assimilated. Liquid foods are best, especially in that they stimulate digestion and make for drowsiness and sleep. Oyster stew is an old favorite, and a delightful one for midnight suppers.

**Oyster Stew**

1 quart oysters  
3/4 cup cold water  
4 cups scalded milk  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper

Carefully pick over oysters, removing bits of shell. Add water, cook slowly until oysters are plump and edges begin to curl. Remove oysters with skimmer and add hot milk. Add strained oyster liquor, butter, salt and pepper. Serve very hot with oyster crackers.

Are your young people in the habit of bringing home a crowd without a moment's notice, and then expecting something to eat? Be ready for them by keeping some cocoa syrup in the ice box constantly. Then, you can proudly produce steaming hot chocolate in surprisingly short order.

**Cocoa Syrup**

1/4 cup sugar  
1 cup cocoa  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 cups water  
1 1/4 teaspoons vanilla

Mix cocoa, sugar and salt. Add hot water and bring gradually to boil, stirring constantly. Boil very slowly ten to fifteen minutes. Thorough cooking of syrup is the secret of good cocoa. This quantity of syrup will make 25 cups of cocoa. Syrup when cool may be put into jar and will keep indefinitely in ice box. To make up entire amount three to four quarts of milk will be needed.

If you are planning a party for your young people during the holidays a splendid thing to build your menu around would be Tropical Gingerbread with cream cheese filling.

**Tropical Gingerbread with Cream Cheese Filling**

1/2 cup butter  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup molasses  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 1/4 cup flour  
1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon ginger  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon

Cream butter and sugar, add unbeaten eggs and blend. Into the molasses beat the soda until smooth. Sift the flour and spices together. Add alternately to the creamed mixture the liquids and flour. Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F) for 25 minutes. The cake may be split in two with a sharp knife and served with the following cream dressing between layers:

1 cup whipped cream  
3 tablespoons orange marmalade  
1 package cream cheese

Work the cheese with the marmalade until creamy, and fold into the whipped cream.

### City Lights to Remain on One Hour Longer

Co-operating with the authorities of the City of Grosse Pointe in an effort to reduce traffic accidents the Detroit Edison Co. will, during December and January, turn on streets lights one-half hour earlier in the evening and allow them to remain lighted a half hour later in the morning according to information received by the City Clerk this week. Thus, the City will receive an extra hour of service on street lights during these two months at no additional cost to the taxpayers.

An analysis of figures covering traffic accidents over a lengthy period indicates greater frequency of accidents during the "half-light" intervals at dusk and dawn and it has been proven that accidents are fewer on well lighted streets. It is hoped that this move on the part of the Edison Co. will be of material benefit in averting traffic dangers.

The City contracts with the Edison Co. for street lighting service on a flat basis of cost per light unit per year of approximately 4,000 light-hours. The terms of the contract require a daily test of all lights during the daytime hours in order that all units be in good operating condition each night. This test may possibly occur two or three times daily while the Edison company has the circuit under scrutiny. No extra expense is incurred by such tests in view of the flat unit rate basis mentioned above.

It is hoped that the two-month period of extra lighting will show a marked reduction of accidents throughout the district.

Fortress of Chillon Is Popular in Switzerland

The Swiss town of Villeneuve at the eastern end of Lake Lemane always welcomes visitors, for in spite of its name, "New City," it is a very ancient town, known in the time of the Romans as Penniloci. But as in years past, it yielded to the attractions of the Castle of Chillon, the best known castle in all Switzerland, with whose story, first celebrated by Lord Byron in 1816, few castles in all Europe can compete.

The fortress of Chillon stands a mile from Villeneuve, on an isolated rock about twenty yards from the bank of the lake. It is connected with the shore by a bridge, which in medieval days was a drawbridge. How old the castle may be none can tell, but Bronze Age tombs, nearly 4,000 years old, discovered at its entrance, give one some key to its antiquity. The earliest mention of Chillon Castle in any document is 1005 A. D., when it belonged to the bishops of Sion, but from the twelfth to the sixteenth century it was held by the Dukes of Savoy, during whose reign most of the tortures it took place.

Although in the sixteenth century François Bonivard, the subject of Byron's poem, was imprisoned there when he with other Swiss patriots rebelled against the Duke of Savoy, his two years fettered in the dungeon which bears his name was but slight suffering compared to the tortures of most who were thrown into the dark, damp chambers there. The post, erected in 1256, near where the torture by fire was perpetrated shows the scorings and burns made by the executioners in their testings of the heated irons.

The Lapps of Finland The Lapps of Finland wear a long blue blouse gathered at the waist with a belt and slashed with red and yellow, tight blue trousers and caps on which they wear huge red pom-poms. Their shoes are a moccasin of reindeer hide, bound at the ankle with red and yellow woolen bands and turned up at the toes. Lapps sometimes place a certain type of grass, which they call shoe grass, in their moccasins and so protected, their feet go unharmed on the roughest ground and keep warm in the coldest weather. Just as they have for centuries, the Lapps still depend on their reindeer herds for both food and shelter. The milk of the deer is made into cheese, the flesh used for meat, the skins for clothing, tents and cooking utensils. Even the bones are utilized for needles in sewing and for the hondo which prevents the knot of a lasso from pulling too tight.

Offer Daily Sacrifices Every Brahmin family in India possesses and offers daily sacrifices to its sacred Salagrama Stone, a little pebble which is found in countless numbers in the rivers of Nepal. The great reverence for these stones is illustrated by the annual festival given by the Maharaja of Orcha for his Salagrama. In some years the procession has included, among other things, 1,200 camels, 4,000 horses and more than 100,000 guests.—Collier's Weekly.

Raise, Rise, Increase The form, "a raise in salary," is well established, and since 1728 has been accepted as good English. It is found in good literature on both sides of the Atlantic. "An increase," as of pay for services rendered, is as common in England as it is in the United States. Rise with the meaning, "an advance in wages," is colloquial English and dates from 1836.—Literary Digest.

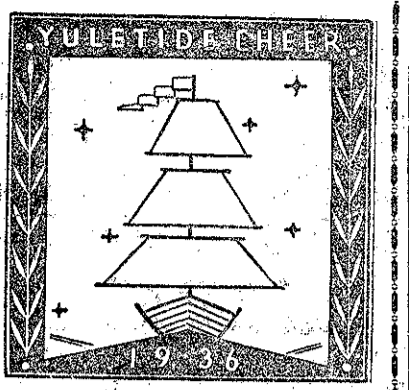

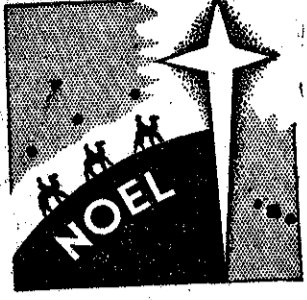

**INSURANCE TIPS**

Get a group of men together for a hobby night and you will be surprised at the variety of their hobbies. Some will be collectors only, some creators and some both creators and collectors, like the stamp collector who also prints his own explanation of his stamps on his mountings by means of his own explanation of his stamps on his mountings by means of his own printing press.

The value of some of the collections will be nominal but the value of others may be considerable. Tools and equipment of some may be very valuable. The loss of tools, equipment or collection by fire, theft or other hazard would be a severe blow if not insured. Yet many do not realize that their regular fire and burglary insurance policies may not cover their tools, equipment or collections and that there are other perils besides fire and theft.

**Special Mention Advisable**  
Fire insurance policies on "household and personal effects of every description are usual or incidental to the occupancy of the premises by the insured." Courts have held that this phraseology does not apply to "animate objects" subject as plants, birds, tropical fish and dogs. Nor does it apply to "inanimate" stamp and coin collections as they are not "usual or incidental." However, art collections are covered if the premises are occupied as a dwelling and the collection is not for sale or on display.

To be absolutely sure that your printing press, power lathe or collection is insured against fire, your fire insurance policy should state specifically that it is included with the furniture and clothing.

Stamp and coin collections are not insured for more than \$100 unless insured as a separate item.

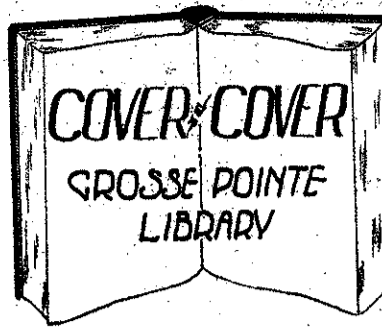
**All Risk Insurance**  
But by far the most satisfactory way to insure inanimate collections is by means of "all risk" insurance. All risk insurance covers all hazards—fire, theft, transportation, mysterious disappearance and others—with but few exceptions not only at the assured's residence but elsewhere as well.

Stamp collectors can insure their stamps and other philatelic property at a rate usually less than \$1.00 per \$1,000 per year. Stamps can be insured individually for a specified amount and, in event of loss, that amount is paid. Or a collection can be insured for a lump sum. In event of loss, 50 per cent of the value of the stamp up to \$100 is paid.

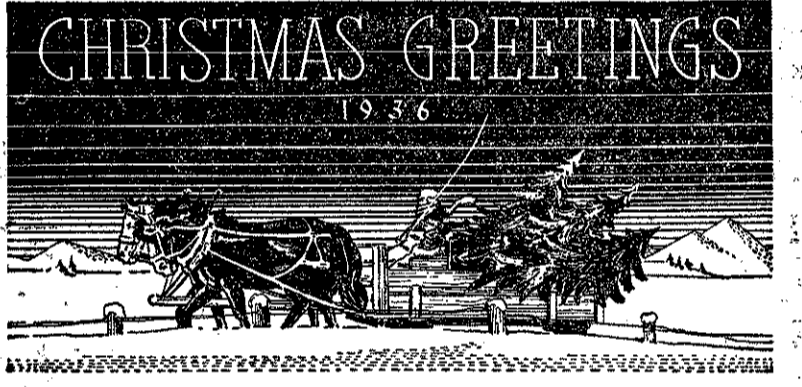

**Dr. Elliott's Plans Would Be Benefit to Rural Schools**

The cause of public school education, particularly in the state's rural areas, would be greatly aided if the 1937 legislature adopts the major portion of the program of improvement publicly advocated this week by Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, Superintendent of Public Instruction.

While the whole program constitutes a comprehensive plan for betterment of the entire public school system much emphasis was laid by the state's school head on educational problems peculiar to the areas outside metropolitan districts.

Underlying the whole proposal, which was in the form of the biennial report of the Department of Public Instruction to Governor Fitzgerald, as required by law, was the basic contention that the public school system must receive substantially more state aid in order to meet existing social and economic conditions. Public schools now receive \$38,000,000 annually from the state, including the primary school fund.

Following are the phases of the Elliott plan which would particularly benefit the rural areas.

Payment by the state of all tuition costs now charged non-resident pupils for 7th and 8th grade instruction in city and village high schools, which pupils must pay at present.

Increase of the state's payment of tuition for non-resident high school students. The state now pays \$65 per pupil per year, but the report points out that in many cases actual costs are considerably higher, the difference being met by local taxpayers.

Relief from the present overcrowded condition in many schools, particularly of the consolidated type, by direct assistance from the state to school districts for the construction of new schools.

Higher pay for country school commissioners "commensurate with their educational qualifications and responsibilities."

Revision of the whole body of school transportation legislation which at present lacks uniformity in different districts, as to legal and financial arrangements.

Reorganization of school districts where economy and increased efficiency would be brought about, with consent of local residents a primary condition.

While enactment of legislation conforming with any one of these recommendations would be reflected in easing the cost of education in rural areas, the other points in the Elliott program

would be beneficial throughout the entire state.

Summarized, the more significant recommendations are: removing the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction from partisan politics by making the office appointive by an enlarged State Board of Education; higher salaries for all teachers, modification or repeal of the "teachers' oath of allegiance" law to avoid certain abuses, a tenure act to protect "efficient" teachers from being dismissed capriciously if such a measure can be agreed on, prevention of use of state aid funds for purposes supposed to be met by local taxation.

**Local Scouts Now Registering for National Jamboree**

The proposed 1935 National Jamboree cancelled because of infantile Paralysis, will be held June 29th to July 9th next year.

The first two local boys already registered are: Herbert McCord and Richard School of Troop 279, which is sponsored by the Puritan Heights Lutheran Church. Herbert lives at 16506 Wisconsin, and Richard at 16246 Northlawn.

The cancellation of the proposed 1935 Jamboree was a dark disappointment to nearly 45,000 American "Scouts and Leaders, whose reservations had been made. However, in the Scouting spirit, all agreed that for Health Safety's sake the activity should not go on. Many of the foreign delegations were enroute when the cancellation was announced but all of these groups continued their journey and toured America.

Of course, all of the work done by the National Jamboree Committee, setting up tents, laying miles of water main and sewer lines, communication facilities, etc., will prove a valuable experience in planning the 1937 Jamboree—which will be bigger and better than ever.

It is estimated that 50,000 or more will attend from the whole nation and the several foreign countries, which are also sending delegates.

Candidates to the International Jamboree, also to be held this summer in Holland, must, as a requirement, attend the National Jamboree at Washington, as preliminary training.

Last year nearly 300 Scouts and Leaders, from the local council, were ready for Washington when the cancellation notice was received.

**Wayne Medical Society Auxiliary to Give Party**

Adequate educational standards and registration requirements to safeguard the public from incompletely trained, unqualified "specialists" are being established in the College of Medicine of Wayne University, according to a recent announcement issued by Dean Raymond B. Allen.

The Medical College has inaugurated a training program leading to the Master of Science Degree in Medicine for those medical graduates who wish to specialize in some branch of the "basic medical sciences" such as anatomy, bacteriology, physiology, etc., as well as for those who wish to devote themselves to the "clinical specialties" such as general surgery, internal medicine, neurology, obstetrics and gynecology, etc.

"Detroit offers some of the best opportunities in the country for the development of this kind of training," explains Dean Allen. "Before long there will be regularly established registries where the names of those physicians who really are recognized by the medical profession to be bona fide specialists, not just self-styled specialists. This will meet a long-felt need, since the people heretofore could not always be sure that a "specialist" was actually well qualified to practice in his so-called branch of specialization."

In co-operation with various hospitals in Detroit, these courses are being offered to the full-time staff members of the various institutions, for whom tuition fees in the post graduate work have been waived by the Board of Education.

For the general practitioner, "short" courses are offered co-operatively by the Wayne University College of Medicine, the University of Michigan Medical School, and the Michigan State Medical Society. These latter are not designed to make a specialist of the general practitioner, but rather to assist him to improve himself professionally.

**Detroit Evening Schools Complete Term Tonight**

Detroit public evening schools complete their fall term of 12 weeks on December 17 with a total individual membership of 22,000 constituting a class membership of approximately 24,000, about evenly divided between men and women. Of the class membership approximately 5,000 were elementary students and 19,000 in high school, technical, and other courses. The term load on the basis of average attendance was on the whole about eight per cent heavier than in 1935. A slightly improved enrollment for elementary work and a marked increase in secondary enrollment characterized the term.

The chief innovation of the fall term was the continued development of a comprehensive homemaking program in all schools at a fee of 50 cents. Over 1,700 women registered, which was 300 more than last year. Classes were formed not only in sewing and cooking but in first aid, care of the sick, child care, gardening, art needlework, knitting and crocheting, and many other courses.

Another development was the organization of traffic safety classes at Cass Technical evening high school. These classes give a course consisting of two lectures on traffic laws and practice which, during the term, was taken by upwards of 3,000 drivers.

All evening schools will remain closed until January 4 at 7 p. m., when enrollments for a new term of 12 weeks will be received.

**Fingerprints for Positive Identification**

By Det. J. Warren Bistran, F. P. E. In the event of a catastrophe, identification is often difficult, and in train wrecks, casualties at sea, and other disasters there is often a long list of

unidentified dead. In addition many persons suffer from amnesia or loss of memory. Fingerprint identifications would eliminate the instances in which friends and relatives anxious to properly honor the deceased, are prevented from providing a family burial with

proper religious services because of failure to establish identity.

It is also believed the fingerprints of persons fearing kidnaping should be on file in the Civil Identification Section of the United States Department of Justice, in Washington. Further, persons who by reason of prominence are harassed by the activities of impersonators may insure identification through the use of fingerprints. It is thus possible for the real person to

establish his true identity as against the impersonator. Your fingerprints on file in Washington should be considered as nothing more or less than a signature which cannot be forged. There has not been found two fingerprints alike in the millions on file throughout the world.

Fingerprints must be looked upon by the average citizen as his proof of identity and of good standing in a community. The honest citizen who is found dead and who is not protected by his fingerprint identification goes to a grave in ignorance to his fate.

Fingerprint identification will be looked upon not only as the foe to criminal but the friend of the good citizen, the protector, the assistant, the character reference and the repository of information which will give the honest man greater freedom and greater peace of mind.

There is no recommendation of identity as good as that of being able to say that a citizen has thought enough of his future and that of his family to place his mark of identification on file in this manner. It is a badge of honor. It should give one a good standing in a community. It should be a letter of recommendation to any bank or insurance or business institution and it should be the duty of good citizens everywhere to assume leadership in this movement by preaching its usefulness to employers and friends.

The Police Department and other law-enforcing agencies will be only too glad to assist you in this movement to protect yourself, free of charge.

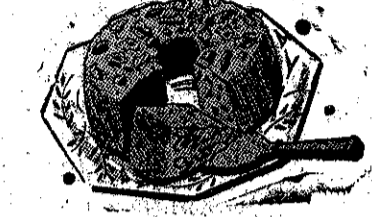

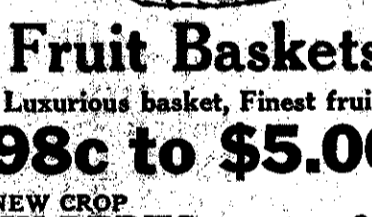

**Dancing Sons and Daughters**

Dancing sons and daughters will become Cinderellas—home early—if tempting foods are ready for the "wee small hour" chat. These energetic young people need plenty of nourishment. Eating before bed is not only a pleasure, but a necessity. Menus or foods selected should be those readily digested and assimilated. Liquid foods are best, especially in that they stimulate digestion and make for drowsiness and sleep. Oyster stew is an old favorite, and a delightful one for midnight suppers.

**Oyster Stew**  
1 quart oysters  
3/4 cup cold water  
4 cups scalded milk  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
Carefully pick over oysters, removing bits of shell. Add water, cook slowly until oysters are plump and edges begin to curl. Remove oysters with skimmer and add hot milk. Add strained oyster liquor, butter, salt and pepper. Serve very hot with oyster crackers.

Are your young people in the habit of bringing home a crowd without a moment's notice, and then expecting something to eat? Be ready for them by keeping some cocoa syrup in the ice box constantly. Then, you can proudly produce steaming hot chocolate in surprisingly short order.

**Cocoa Syrup**  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 cup cocoa  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 cups water  
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla  
Mix cocoa, sugar and salt. Add hot water and bring gradually to boil, stirring constantly. Boil very slowly ten to fifteen minutes. Thorough cooking of syrup is the secret of good cocoa. This quantity of syrup will make 25 cups of cocoa. Syrup when cool may be put into jar and will keep indefinitely in ice box. To make up entire amount three to four quarts of milk will be needed.

If you are planning a party for your young people during the holidays a splendid thing to build your menu around would be Tropical Gingerbread with cream cheese filling.

**Tropical Gingerbread with Cream Cheese Filling**  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup molasses  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 1/4 cup flour  
1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon ginger  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
Cream butter and sugar, add unbeaten eggs and blend. Into the molasses beat the soda until smooth. Sift the flour and spices together. Add alternately to the creamed mixture the liquids and flour. Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F) for 25 minutes. The cake may be split in two with a sharp knife and served with the following cream dressing between layers:  
1 cup whipped cream  
3 tablespoons orange marmalade  
1 package cream cheese  
Work the cheese with the marmalade until creamy, and fold into the whipped cream.
