"An' she only had a teeny little bit," put in Joe, staunchly. "An' you're s'posed to give to folks Christmas, ain't you?"



Business Improves in Grosse Pointe Park Over 100 Per Cent

In the space of two years business has improved over 100 per cent in Grosse Pointe Park according to a survey made by the United States Chamber of Commerce for 1935. Sales in 1933 grossed \$930,000 and in 1935 this figure increased to \$1,973,000. In 1933 there were only 127 employed by 51 merchants, while in 1935 there were 50 employers employing 236 persons.

We are publishing herewith a resume of the 1935 census as compared with 1933 grouping the merchants under 10 distinct classifications. Several of the groups have been absorbed into others in order not to disclose confidential matters which the bureau is not at liberty to submit for publication. The comparative report follows:

476 Varieties of Auto Workers

To aid in the interviewing of people for private jobs in the automotive manufacturing industry, an intensive study of job specifications will soon be distributed to all Michigan offices of the National Reemployment Service, according to Major Howard Starret, State Reemployment Director.

A field staff of analysts and supervisors interviewed officials in the industry and by personal observation analyzed a majority of the jobs in Michigan automobile construction and body plants. A total of 685 field schedules were written and from these 286 separate job specifications have been prepared that represent 476 individual job titles.

The study, in three volumes containing nearly 800 pages, is by the division of standards and research of the United States Employment Service of which the NRS is a part.

"The specifications aid our interviewers in properly classifying workers," Major Starret explains. "Obviously it is a large task for our interviewers to determine just which one of 476 automobile jobs a man is qualified for. This study is a great aid. We now have detailed information about all these jobs enabling us to be of greater service to industry."

American Duels Set Pace for Savagery, Writer Says

Dueling reached its most savage lengths in America. One year after the landing of the Pilgrims two of them fought. During the Revolution there were some notable duels. Gen. Charles Lee and Col. John Laurens fought, as did Generals Cadwalader and Conway. Button Gwinnett, signer of the Declaration of Independence, was killed in a duel with General McIntosh. Virginia and Georgia were hotbeds of dueling, writes Frederick T. Haskins in the Washington Star.

The duels of Hamilton and Burr are history, as are those of General Jackson and Major Wilkinson, Capt. Barron and Decatur, Henry Clay and John Randolph, of Roanoke. Richard Somers, an officer of the Intrepid, is reputed to have fought three duels in a single day.

Not so much the number, but the savagery of American duels set them apart. There were duels in which the adversaries stood with a handkerchief on the ground between them. The only possible chance of escape was the misfiring of one of the pistols. A frequently used form called for the duellists to stand back to back. At a word they would walk six or a dozen paces, as prearranged, whirl and fire. Then there were the fenish knife duels, especially after James Bowie had invented the Bowie knife. The men fought in some cases with their left wrists handcuffed to each other. Often both duellists died. If one survived he would have to be unlocked from the corpse of his opponent.

Termites Are Not Ants; Related to Cockroaches
Termites are not white, but a neutral grayish color. They are not ants, but are related to cockroaches. The relationship is fairly distant and is based on anatomical resemblances. The termite is free from the cockroach's filthy habits and deplorable morals.

On the other hand, according to Dr. Thomas M. Beck, in the Chicago Tribune, the termite has evolved a social organization quite similar to that of ants. The colonies of most species of termites are divided into five castes which differ greatly from each other in appearance. First there are those of the winged type, which periodically swarm out into the open and fly away to establish new colonies. These are the largest, being about a half inch long.

A second and larger group consists of individuals with only rudimentary wings, and then there is a third group whose members are wingless. Each of the three groups consists of males and females and apparently is capable of reproducing any or all of the five termite types.

Finally there are the two most numerous groups, the soldiers and the workers, which are sexless. The worker resembles one of the wingless type mentioned above and does most of the hard work around the colony. Such being the case, he is the one most responsible for the damage done to buildings.

Britain's Worst Storm

What is said to have been the worst storm Great Britain ever experienced occurred on November 27th, 1703, says a writer in Pearson's Weekly. It was attended by flashes of lightning which unroofed many houses and churches. The wind blew down the spires of many steeples, tore whole groves of trees up by the roots, and the leads of some churches were rolled up like scrolls of parchment. Many vessels were sunk in the Thames; but the royal navy, which had just returned from the Mediterranean, suffered the greatest damage and lost over a dozen ships. Over 1,500 seamen were lost beside those that were drowned in London. The damage was estimated at a million pounds.

Travel Through Treetops

The only people who do most of their traveling through the tops of trees are the longtots, a tribe of Luzon in the Philippines. With a heavy knife they cut off the branch of one tree, slide the loop end of a 50-foot rope over it, then cast and catch the hook end of the rope over a branch of an adjoining tree. And with great agility, they travel across it in monkey fashion.—Collier's Weekly.

Largest Date Palm Grove

Elche in Spain boasts one of the largest date palm groves in the world, variously estimated at from 80,000 to 110,000 trees. The fruit-bearing palms are pollinated by hand, men scaling the trunks by hoisting themselves with a rope tied loosely around the tree and their waists. Many of the leaves are blanched and sold throughout Spain for Palm Sunday, and as protection against lightning.

Brine Production Methods

Brine used in alkali manufacture and for the production of table salt is frequently obtained by circulating water through wells drilled down to beds of salt. Such beds, formed in past ages by evaporation of sea water, are found as much as 300 feet thick, in New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Ohio, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Louisiana, says Chemical and Metallurgical Engineering.


"Gallery Gods"
The ceiling of the old Drury Lane theater, in London, was painted to represent the sky, with clouds and the usual cupids and cherubs. Since the ceiling was immediately above persons seated in the gallery, they were said to be "among the gods." Out of this grew the appellation "gallery gods" to designate those occupying the highest seats in any theater.

Great Dane, Boarhound
The fact that the Great Dane was called the boarhound gives a clue to its early use in Europe. It is generally conceded that this big dog was at one time employed to hunt wild boars, wolves, and bears. The breed survived the longest in Germany because there wild game was preserved after it had disappeared from the forests of England. And after the Danes were no longer used for hunting purposes German royalty kept Danes as companion dogs.

"Point" in Market Reports
"Point," as employed in market reports, means a recognized unit of variation in price and is used in quoting the prices of stocks as well as various commodities. In the United States stock market one point ordinarily means one dollar a share. The value of a point, however, varies according to the commodity in question. Therefore in order to understand the market reports one must be acquainted with the value of a point in reference to any given commodity. In the coffee and cotton markets, for instance, a point is the hundredth part of a cent; in oil, grain, sugar and pork it is 1 cent. When cotton goes up 200 points it goes up 2 cents; when grain goes up 5 points it goes up 5 cents.

Conifers and Evergreens
Persons who are accustomed to thinking of conifers and evergreens as synonymous terms for a certain group of trees may be interested to learn that there are conifers that shed their leaves annually and, conversely, there are true evergreen trees that do not bear cones. The larch, or tamarack, is one example given by an eastern forestry authority of a coniferous tree that fails to qualify also as an evergreen, because it sheds its leaves each year.

Upside-Down Sloth's Coat Blends With the Foliage
The upside-down, slow-motion sloth is about 10 times as conspicuous in a zoo as he would be back in his native South American jungles, writes W. H. Shippen, Jr., in the Washington Star.
In his usual haunts his coat is a bright, living green to match the foliage into which he blends.
Natural coloration is the strange little creature's only protection from his enemies.
Back in the damp jungles, the sloth's coarse hair is covered with a green parasite plant called alga of the same primitive type which colors the shells of sea turtles. The alga dies when the sloth leaves the steaming climate of the tropics.
The sloth's hair grows the wrong way, he lives upside down, creeps along limbs at night in search of fruit and tender shoots, hangs motionless all day and never descends voluntarily to the ground.
Instead of toes he has strong, permanently flexed hooks, and on the ground he cannot walk, but must hitch himself along like a man with a broken leg. Another strange feature of the sloth is the fact that he has one more or one less bone in his neck than any other mammal.
His slothful lazy ways won him his name with the coming of the white man. The sloth is a distant relative of the huge ground sloths which were larger than elephants and which disappeared from South America millions of years ago.
The anteater seems to have descended from this huge prehistoric creature also.

NEW YEAR'S BELLS
FROM the earliest times the ringing of bells has been employed as a method of announcing death, and the use of bells at New Year's eve symbolizes the death of the old year. In England it was formerly customary to ring muffled bells just before twelve, and at twelve to remove the wrappings and to allow the bells to ring loudly.

Carpets and Rugs Play Part in Some Countries
In Turkey, Anatolia, Persia, Afghanistan, Baluchistan, and Turkistan, carpets not only play a great part in social life, but also in the great political and religious ceremonies. Every year, states a writer in Tit-Bits Magazine, a special carpet is carried from Cairo to Mecca where it covers the Kaaba, a building in the Mohammedan mosque; openings in this cover are made to show two sacred stones.
This covering is used only once, and afterwards it is cut up and sold to the pilgrims. It is made of a black brocade and on this are inscriptions woven in silk. These convey the following ideas: Good Luck, Health, Happiness, Dominion, Craft, Fire, Water, Royalty, Divine Wisdom and the Glory of God.
Color has its various meanings: trouble, white mourning, white and green joy, yellow honor and distinction, while dignity is represented by red and purple. It can be said that from the splendor of the carpets displayed the dignity of the occasion may be judged.
France was the first to develop carpet-making in 1607. In 1685 several French craftsmen crossed the Channel and settled in Bristol and Axminster and other towns in the southwest of England where an industry soon spread north to Glasgow, Kidderminster, and Yorkshire towns, which explains the names given to many carpets.

Abbreviation "E. & O. E."
The abbreviation E. & O. E. stands for errors and omissions excepted. Belgian History In March of Time Picture at Aloma

Not since the war-torn days of 1914 has little Belgium seen turbulence equal to today's—a turbulence dramatically and expertly told in one of the featured episodes in the new March of Time opening Wednesday and Thursday, December 23-24 at the Aloma theatre.

In a swiftly-moving series of striking pictures—most of them exclusive—young King Leopold III is shown shrewdly and heroically meeting the first major crises of his two-year reign. Torn internally by political unrest, surrounded by three Great Powers again preparing for war, to the eyes of the world Belgium appears likely to be trampled once more. AN ORDINANCE

TO PROVIDE FOR THE CREATION OF THE OFFICE OF VILLAGE CONTROLLER AND TO SPECIFY THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF SUCH OFFICE.

THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:

Section 1. That on and after January 1st, 1937, there shall be created in the Village of Grosse Pointe Park an office, to be known as "Village Controller."

Village Commission, in accordance with the provisions of the Village Charter.

Section 5. The powers and duties of such officer shall be as follows:

(a) He shall have general supervision over the financial affairs of the Village.

(b) He shall keep a complete set of books which shall show the financial affairs of the Village in its various departments and funds, its resources and liabilities, with a proper classification thereof, and each fund or appropriation for any distinct object of expenditure or class of expenditures, in order that the amount of the assets and liabilities of the Village of every character may at any time be known at his office.

(c) He shall keep a complete inventory of all property, both real, personal and mixed, belonging to the Village.

(d) He shall make a statement to the Village Commission at the first

regular meeting thereof after the tenth day of each month, showing the true financial condition of the Village and of each of the several funds thereof, in such form as may be prescribed by the Village Commission.

(e) He shall lay before the Village Commission on or before the first day of July, a complete classified statement in tabular form of all moneys received and expended by the Village during the preceding fiscal year, and of all leases of the property of the Village, specifying the names of the lessees, the rates of rent and the period when the leases will terminate.

(f) He shall receive from the Assessor all tax rolls, and shall examine the same, and, after making proper entries in his books, transmit the said rolls to the Village Treasurer, and shall audit such rolls at the expiration of the term of the warrant of collection.

(g) He shall open an account with the Village Treasurer in which he shall charge him with the whole amount of taxes, general and special levied in the Village, also the whole amount in detail of all bonds, notes, mortgages, leases, rents, interest and other moneys receivable in order that the value and description of all personal property belonging to the Village may at any time be known.

(h) He shall open accounts with the Village Treasurer in which he shall charge him with all moneys appropriated, raised or received for each of the several funds of the Village, and credit him for all the warrants drawn thereon, keeping a separate account of debit and credit of each fund, charging every warrant drawn to the account of the particular fund constituted or raised for the specific purpose for which such warrant is drawn, in order that it may be known at the office of the Controller when each fund has been or may be exhausted, and what balance, if any, may remain therein.

(i) He shall establish and supervise the accounting system in the various departments of the Village, and it shall be his duty to examine all books of account kept by the various departments from time to time, and to require at any time statements therefrom relative to their accounts and finances.

Section 6. The provisions of this ordinance shall not be construed to relieve any officer of the Village from the duties imposed upon such officer by the provisions of the Village Charter, and wherever the provisions of this ordinance confer certain powers upon the Village Controller where such powers have been delegated to some other of-

ficer of the Village by the Village Charter, in such event such powers shall be concurrently exercised by the Controller and such Village Officer.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect January 1st, 1937.

Detroit Symphony To Open Adult Concert

One of the most important offerings in the history of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the lecture-concert series for adults, has been announced by Murray G. Paterson, manager.

This series, to begin at 8 p. m. Monday, January 25, in Orchestra Hall, and to continue for eight consecutive Monday nights through March 15, has been designed to acquaint adults in the Greater Detroit area with the great music literature of all time. Particular care has been taken to build and present programs in such a manner that even the most unmusical will discover for himself that the lecture-concert series for adults will prove of permanent value.

At each of the eight concerts everything will be explained clearly. "Appreciation Through Experience" will be the keynote to this lecture-concert series, and those thousands who will seek to make up for a silent childhood, where good music was seldom heard and rarely understood, will be afforded an opportunity not paralleled in the history of symphony orchestras in the United States.

The Detroit Symphony Orchestra has been a pioneer through its concerts for children and young people. This work has helped the orchestra gain and maintain a high international reputation. Now in presenting its Lecture-Concert Series for Adults, the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, so far as is known, undertakes a work never before done anywhere.

Each lecture-concert will consist of an hour's program by the orchestra, preceded by a thirty-minute lecture and followed by a question and answer period. Each thirty-minute lecture will begin at 8 p. m.

Victor Kolar, internationally-known orchestra conductor who was brought to Detroit by the late Ossip Gabrilowitsch in 1919, will be in charge of the programs. Edith Rhett's Tilton, educational director of the Detroit Symphony Society, will present the lectures and lead the question and discussion periods.

After coming to the United States at the age of 15, Mr. Kolar was violinist and assistant conductor of the Pitts-

burgh Symphony Orchestra, and later assistant conductor and violin soloist with Walter Damrosch and the New York Symphony Orchestra.

Mr. Kolar's feat at the Century of Progress Exposition in Chicago, where he conducted the Detroit Symphony Orchestra in 160 two-hour symphony concerts, and 48 national broadcasts in 86 days, probably set a record for all conductors and symphony orchestras.

Mrs. Tilton, nationally-known music educator and lecturer, was brought to Detroit by Mr. Gabrilowitsch in 1923 to create and direct the educational department of the Detroit Symphony Society, said to be the only one of its kind in the United States.

To date Mr. Kolar and Mrs. Tilton have collaborated in 210 educational programs on the stage of Orchestra Hall, exclusive of engagements to tour.

The Lecture-Concert Series for Adults will be presented with the combined sponsorship of 10 outstanding Detroit institutions engaged in adult education. They are the American Association of University Women, Detroit College of Law, the Detroit Institute of Technology, Highland Park Junior College, Merrill-Palmer School, Pi Lambda Theta Sorority, The Tuesday Musicale, University of Detroit, University of Michigan, Extension Division and Wayne University. University credit will be given for attendance to this lecture-concert series by Wayne University, University of Detroit and Highland Park Junior College. Application for such credit should be made to the registrars of the schools named.

The complete list of dates and topics, to be presented with the aid of stereopticon slides in color and in black and white, and involving in the discussion references to the other fine arts

as well as an understanding of the political background of the times; January 25, Strings and Percussion; February 1, Woodwinds and Brasses; February 8, Classicism and Great Classicists (featuring the fugue); February 15, Classicism and Great Classicists (featuring the symphony); February 22, Romanticism; March 1, Romanticism; March 8, Nationality in Music; March 15, Wagner.

Tickets for this series, to go on sale at Orchestra Hall Saturday, January 2, will be sold at the rate of \$6 for the entire course. Single admissions will cost \$1.

"Behind the 8-Ball"

The National Billiard Association of America says: "It is generally conceded that the 8-ball is the most difficult for the player to see clearly in the execution of his shot. In reality, this fact was what started the now common saying, 'behind the 8-ball,' used in the player's vernacular in the sense that being in any kind of a difficult point on the table, many times calls for the remark that one is 'behind the 8-ball.' In other words, they use this to explain any difficult situation which may confront them in the game."







What To Serve After Too Much Christmas

"Twas the night before Christmas, And all through the house Not a creature was stirring, Not even a mouse, . . ."

should read the Night after Christmas, for after Christmas is over no one wants to stir. Everyone is worn out; the excitement leaves us all in a state approaching hysterics, and we are glad to hear no more of Christmas for another whole year. All of which is probably due to the fact that we have eaten too much.

But meals must go on, three of them every day, and the problem of what to serve becomes fairly acute when the family is neither hungry or interested. When things come to this state, it is time for something nourishing and light something liquid, hot, and very appetizing in taste and appearance.

Adirondack Chowder is the answer and here is the simple recipe.

ADIRONDIC CHOWDER
1/4 lb. salt pork diced finely
1 large onion sliced
2 tbs. flour
scored corn from six ears or No. 1 can corn
1 tbs. chopped green pepper
6 cups milk
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1 tbs. sugar
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
small pinch each of ground cloves and mustard
pilot crackers
brown salt pork and add onion, brown onion and add flour and blend. Then add corn, green pepper, milk and seasoning. Let simmer for one hour, stirring frequently. Serve a split pilot cracker filled with unsweetened whipped cream on top of each bowl of chowder. Serves 6.

Serve this with grapefruit or orange sections which have been marinated in French dressing and arranged on a nest of water cress alternating with layers of seasoned cottage cheese.

Another menu that will find favor is Escalloped Cauliflower and Eggs

Tomato Aspic Mold

Toast Squares
Prepare cauliflower as usual, cook eggs in water not boiling, place broken cauliflower and sliced cooked egg in buttered baking dish, cover with cream sauce into which grated cheese has been added.

Place in low oven for fifteen minutes or until cheese sauce slightly bubbles. Serve with buttered croutons and Tomato aspic jelly mold filled with chopped celery, carrots and peas, green pepper, mixed with sour cream dressing.

SOUR CREAM DRESSING
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. cayenne pepper
1 tbs. lemon juice
1 tbs. vinegar
1 cup sour cream
Mix ingredients together, serve very cold.

Vitamin B and A Child's Appetite

Many problems arising from a child's stubborn refusal to eat may soon be recognized as diet rather than discipline problems, according to scientists who are working to give new prominence to the importance of Vitamin B in building appetites.

Experiments by Dr. Walter H. Eddy, of Columbia University, have already shown that a child's or adult's appetite may be in direct proportion to the amount of Vitamin B in his diet, and it is a known fact that with the loss of appetite may come parallel cases of indigestion from forced eating, constipation, and nervousness.

Once an adequate amount of Vitamin B is included in a child's diet, gastric activity, as well as appetite, benefits. In spite of actions to the contrary, infants are, as a rule born without likes or dislikes in foods. Such fancies such as a dislike for spinach, are gradually acquired through the years, according to the example set by the elders.

Children must be gradually accustomed to new flavors, however, and their tastes must be cultivated. The learning process is a dull routine, but, scientists say, a worthwhile one.

One of the earliest studies on Vitamin B as an appetite-stimulator was made by Dr. Eddy in 1916. At this time, he gave babies suffering from marasmic (a name applied when children refuse all milk-formulae) a dosage of Vitamin B. Under his treatment, most of the babies stopped pushing away their bottles and became eager for their formulae.

Other scientists later showed the exact relation of Vitamin B to appetite. They explained that the sensation of hunger is associated with the contraction of the muscles of an empty stomach. When the supply of Vitamin B is inadequate, the stomach muscles lose tone, and the muscle contractions cease, with the result that the individual no longer has any warning of hunger. The importance of Vitamin B, they proved, rests with its effect on the muscles of the digestive tract.

So, scientists warn, when the appetite begins to lag, look to the following foods for correction: brewers' yeast,

the richest natural source of Vitamin B; germs of cereals; bananas, carrots, watercress, lettuce, cauliflower, beets, peas, nuts, bran, brown rice, lean beef, mutton, and liver. Generally speaking, fatty foods contain no Vitamin B.

imposed limitations, from self-ease self-pity, self-depreciation, self-condemnation. It breaks the bondage of hereditary traits and tendencies. Christians are under as direct orders now, as they were then, to be Christ-like, to possess the Christ-spirit, to follow the Christ-example, and to heal the sick as well as the sinning." For Christian Scientists to obey these orders is to celebrate Christmas in the Christianly scientific way. Such a celebration partakes of the true Christmas spirit. It need not be confined to Christmas Day, but should extend

throughout the year and through all the years.—From the Christian Science Sentinel.


