One of the most interesting facts disclosed by Dr. Eastman was the fact that the Indians were the originators of communism. The tribe existed for the welfare of all its members. No one owned anything, food was free, and land was free. No extreme luxury or extreme poverty existed side by side. In times of famine food was divided, and sorrows and joys were shared throughout the entire tribe.

Fingerprinting Shown As Aid to Individual in Cashing Checks

Chiei Drysdale of the Grosse Pointe Park Police Department urges that every one hiring domestic help or otherwise in Grosse Pointe to insist that they be finger-printed which can be done at any of the police departments in Grosse Pointe free of charge.

Chief Drysdale also stated that "during the past year we have had several homes looted by people who hire out as reliable help and work just long enough to become acquainted with the lay-out of the home and the habits of their employer before taking possession of their jewelry and disappearing from sight. In one case last year this happened to the extent of over \$20,000 and started a chase that took in many of the large cities in the east and middle west before we finally caught them. This meant that we had to send officers to Columbus, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Washington, D. C.

"Luckily we recovered nearly all of the jewelry and put seven members of a national gang of crooks of this type behind the bars. We also have had cases of maids who have hired out and just worked long enough to get their eye on something valuable or until the lady of the house goes out then leave taking whatever they could carry with

"We will be glad to fingerprint any one who you intend to hire and thereby safeguard your home from this type of parasite. The point I would like to bring out out is this, nobody who has a prison record will submit to being finger-printed therefor they will not likely go to work for you, if you insist on this being some."

AN ORDINANCE

TO PROVIDE for the appoint-ment of a Sealer of Weights and Measures, prescribing his powers and duties and providing penalties for fraud and deception in the use of false weights and measures and for the confiscation thereof.

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF ROSSE POINTE ORDAIN:

Section 1. There shall be in and for the City of Grosse Pointe an officer to be denominated the Sealer of Weights and Measures, who shall be appointed by the Mayor, by and with the advice and consent of the Council, and who, upon his appointment, shall be under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Public Safety and the Superintendent of Public Safety. The person so appointed shall have the power of performing all the duties pertaining to his office, shall have charge of such standards and apparatus as shall be furnished him as standards by the City of Grosse Pointe, and shall maintain such standards in good order and take all necessary precautions for their safe keeping. He shall keep a true copy of all his official acts.

Sec. 2, The word "measure" or 'measures" as used in this Ordinance shall be construed to mean any device or devices used to ascertain the weight, size, quantity, value, or dimensions of any liquids, solids, or other

Sec. 3. The weights and measures similar to those adopted by the State of Michigan in accord with the statutes of this State shall be the standards by which all weights and measures shall be tried, proved and sealed in the City of Grosse Pointe.

Sec. 4. The Sealer of Weights and Measures shall have jurisdiction and it shall be his duty within the City of Grosse Pointe:

(a) To inspect and test the accuracy of all measures of every kind, and tomary subdivisions, and shall express tools and appliances connected therewith, used and employed within the City to determine the weight, size, value, quantity or dimensions of any liquids, solids, or other articles offered for sale, purchase, hire, or reward;

(b) To re-weigh, or re-measure any packages put up ready for sale or deivery, or any amount of any commodity whatsoever offered for sale or sold by weight or measure, or which is commonly so sold, at any time before or after the actual delivery of such package or amount of commodity to the

(c) To enter, without formal warrant, for the purposes herein specified and in the general performance of his official duties, any stand, place, building, or premises, or to stop any wagon or conveyance in or upon which any measure or measures or weighed or measured packages or amounts of commodity are kept or maintained or carried for the purpose of testing, inspecting, correcting and scaling or condemning such measure or measures, or re-weighing or re-measuring such packages or amount of commodities, either upon his own initiative or at the request of any citizen.
