Last Thursday morning at 6 o'clock the residents in the vicinity of St. Clair and Maumee avenues were rudely awakened by the City of Grosse Pointe's fire department siren answering a fire call at St. Clair avenue at Jefferson in which the lives of a mother, Mrs. Constance Hayes, and her two children, Schofield and Constance

Two other children were miraculously saved through the bravery of Nanette and Casimira Gzowski, who risked their lives to save the two youngest children of Mrs. Hayes from the flames.

The City of Grosse Pointe fire department, with the aid of the Grosse Pointe Park fire department, succeeded in getting the flames under control and kept them from spreading to neighboring buildings.

It was a remarkable display of fire fighting, and both departments are deserving of commendation for their determined effort refusal to sacrifice quality for speed to keep the fire confined as much as possible to the one home and has been responsible for the remarkeventually conquering the flames.



Food Shortage Is Averted During Flood Emergency by Co-operation of Merchants

CINCINNATI, O .- As this city began settling back to normal after the greatest flood disaster in history, attention began to focus on the forces

Milk will be used in these dishes wherever possible, and thus the family will be receiving this vital fluid in the full quantity needed for bodily health (one pint per adult, one quart per child), an amount which ordinarily they might not consume as a beverage. Cream sauce and white sauce are favorite binders for many of the savory casseroles of eggs, cheese, seafood and vegetables, and they are used for combining Lenten croquettes for deep-fat

One of the handsomest pinch-hitters that crust will not form on surface. Mushrooms may be added to Lenten casseroles for delicate richness and flavor, and a flaky timbale or pastry shell dresses up the plate service of many dishes that are combined with a thickened sauce.
