### Bees Swallow Nectar When bees buzz from flower to flower, they are not gathering honey, says a writer in Pearson's Weekly. They are collecting nectar, which they swallow and partially digest. This is later regurgitated and deposited in the combs of the hive as honey. ## APPLE PIE FESTIVAL



Members of the Michigan legislature became "apple minded" on March 17 when the State Senate and House of Representatives committees on Horticulture held an apple pie festival as an inducement to other members to support one of several legislative proposals designed to provide a state appropriation for the promotion of Michigan apples and ther agricultural products.

Already the Michigan Apple Institute has been organized among apple growers of the state. It is headed by R. J. Martin of Bangor who is devoting his sole time to the work. The Institute is already running a test campaign to determine the possibilities of further apple promotion in the state. Larger consuming centers will be approached if the legislature sees fit to aid the growers.

At the legislative festival, a representative of the Kroger Grocery and Baking Company and other large grocery organizations pledged the support of those companies toward aiding Michigan farmers in marketing their products. The grocery company recently played a major part in helping California citrus growers with a similar problem.

### Deadline for State Unemployment Fund Set for April 1st

Michigan employers who failed to pay their contribution on 1936 payrolls to the state unemployment compensation fund before the deadline March 20, have only a few days left in which federal payroll tax, Frank A. Picard, commission chairman, warned today.

"Under the Federal Social Security Act, all Michigan employers, like those all over the nation, must pay a federal payroll tax by April 1," Mr. Picard explained. "Those employers, subject to the payroll tax, can pay their state contribution of nine-tenths of one per cent to the state fund prior to April 1 and obtain full credit for the payment on their federel payroll tax payment.

"This means that actually they only have to pay the federal government one-tenth of one percent in taxes plus their state contribution credit. But if they fail to pay the state contribution by April 1, they must pay the federal government the entire one percent of their total 1936 payrolls. And in addition, they still must pay the state unemployment compensation fund a contribution of nine-tenths of one percent on these same payrolls. Thus they actually will have to pay contributions totaling 1.9 percent."

While total contributions received by the state unemployment compensation commission on 1936 state payrolls totaled nearly \$14,000,000 this figure is expected to be increased by contributions which will be made this week.

To assist delinquent employers the state commission is maintaining its temporary field information office in Chambers of Commerce in eight outstate cities for the remainder of this week or as long as the demand for report forms and assistance is filling them out, continues, Mr. Picard said.

At the same time, Mr. Picard announced that the commission has decided to give employers who erroneously paid the state commission a contribution on payrolls which totaled less than \$6,000 for 1936, an opportunity to file an amended return.

## Selebration of Michigan entennial Planned for etroit-Mich. Exposition

Celebration of a century of Michigan atchood and the sesquicentennial of he Ordinance of 1787 by which the Northwest territory was created will be held Sunday, April 4, at the Detroit and Michigan Exposition in Convention

Principal speaker for the occasion will be George N. Fuller, Michigan's official historian, and secretary of the Michigan Historical Commission. The Detroit Historical Society will co-

Among points of interest in the address will be description of the first organization of Wayne County. Just nine years after passage of the Ordiance of 1787, Wayne County was formed and named in honor of General 'Mad Anthony" Wayne, who had just completed subjugation of rebellious Indians and signing a treaty with them. The new county included all of the Lower Peninsula of the present-day Michigan, part of Ohio, Indiana, and part of Wisconsin. Half the area of Wayne County was taken in the formation in 1800 of Indiana and in 1802 of Ohio. The name of Wayne County in 1805 was changed by act of congress to Michigan.

But two important trails then traversed Michigan-the one from Detroit to Mackinac, known at the "War Path" of the Chippewas and the Ottawas, and the one westward to St. Joseph, known as the Pottawatomie Trail of the Wyandottes, Miamis and Delewares.

Picturesqueness will be added to the ceremonials of the sesquicentennial in the presence of Michigan's Chippewa Indians, who will furnish entertainment at the Exposition and demonstrate their skill in native crafts.



## Asking for Calcium Chloride for Roads

The State Highway Department takes bids this week March 25, for calcium chloride to be used in the 1937 dust laying program on gravel roads. State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner announced that requirements for 1937 would be 29,000 from the roof of the west porch of the adult doe was both the victim and the tons, which is 1,000 tons less than the amount ordered last year. The reduction is due to a decrease in the gravel mileage to be treated. Calcium chloride was applied last year on a total of 3,443 miles while this year there

"The reduction in our calcium chloride order does not indicate that any gravel roads will be left out of our dust laying program," the Commissioner said. "The construction program of last summer, especially the oil aggregate work, has reduced the gravel mileage and consequently cut down on our dust program."



First applications of calcium chloride will be made during May depending upon the weather conditions. All gravel roads in the trunkline system will be treated again during mid summer and n the early fall.

It was also announced that experiments will be conducted this summer in using a liquid dust layer. The liquid is a solution containing calcium and magnesium chlorides. It is a byproduct of Michigan chemical factories. If found to be satisfactory and more conomical than the flake form now used, more of this type palliative will be ordered for future programs.









## Conservation Corps Observes Anniversary

With applications sufficient to fill nearly one third of the Colonel quota for the Citizens Military Training Camps this summer, Colonel Ralph M. Parker of Detroit, commanding the Michigan Reserve District, has urged all young men who wish to attend the camps to apply at once.

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

## Traffic Court Clears Records by Wiring Violators to Pay

House Bill 269 recently introduced in the House of Representatives to amend two controversial sections of the state drivers' law, one, the diversion second, the loop hole through which apathetic examinations are given to applicants, today was endorsed by the Automobile Club of Michigan through Charles L. Weeks, president.

Under the provisions of the bill introduced by Rep. John F. Kessel, Saginaw, and Rep. Alexander M. Mac-Kay, West Branch, license money will be appropriated from the general fund to assure an increased highway patrol necessitated by the high accident increase and the enforcement of the present drivers' examination section.

Characterizing the present act as derimental to the interests and safety of Michigan's 1,300,000 automobile owners, Weeks declared:

"The original drivers' license law of 1931 was supported by the club because in it we saw a new approach to accident prevention. Through proper examinations provided for automobile owners at definite periods, mentally and physically unfit persons gradually would be barred from the highways. By eliminating hazards we would have been reducing accident potentialities.

But in 1933 the law was amended to divert the major portion of funds for other purposes than examination of drivers and a highway safety program. Thus, thousands of Michigan motorists have believed their \$1 license fees were being used for the furtherance of highway safety when in reality the money was not used for that at all. As a matter of fact the 1933 amendment handicapped the efforts of the State police and other highway safety agencies to reduce traffic accidents. We of the club do not set ourselves!

up as iconoclasts but myriads of Michigan motorists today believe their dollars paid for licenses are being used to build up a state accident prevention program. This will be true if the new bill passes the legislature.

Under the provisions of Bill 269, all license money is to be deposited in the general fund and then appropriated from that fund to defray the cost of registration, enforcement of the act and the maintenance of an increased highway patrol. Fifteen cents from each applicant's dollar will be refunded to the county or municipality acting as an examing body on the condition that such money be used to carry out the

examination provision of the act. "The bill is not intended to make it

difficult for a person to receive a Contest Held Here license," Weeks pointed ont. "Some of the larger cities like Detroit have used it advantageously. A total of 1,888 persons were killed in automobile accidents last year.
