Some 4,000 voters turned out in Grosse Pointe Township to reassert their faith in the present administration and its present policy of economical government, at the polls in Grosse Pointe Township, Monday, April 5th, with the exception of Board of Review on which Newton Whiteley, Republican replaces Charles A. Howind.

#### 628 Special School Board Election April 19th

A movement is being fostered by the School Board of the Grosse Pointe District to construct a new Junior High School for the area. Structures of this kind cost in the vicinity of a half million dollars, and unless there should be an immediate need for a structure of this kind it is a premature burdening of the taxpayer for an anticipated increase in the number of pupils anticipated five or ten years hence.

Why buy more property when building could be erected on some of the property now owned by the school district, if the property now owned isn't suitable for school purposes, why not sell it, and put it back on the tax roll.

Every property owner in the City of Grosse Pointe and Grosse Pointe Township should register for this special election and weigh the matter thoroughly before casting your ballot; because more unnecessary schools; more

taxes to pay. There has been a great deal of discussion of this problem, and it seems that forethought must have been lacking when the recent school structure was built, it could just as well have been constructed sufficiently large enough to care for the additional pupils anticipated for at least the next five years, if such a shortage of space and

facilities really exists. It is to be recalled that the new school which was constructed on Cadieux Road was primarily intended to care for the anticipated increase in pupils during the next ten years, and yet before this school has been opened six months a new school is fostered. Why?

We have received a considerable number of telephone calls and letters approving our suggestion that registrations be available through the clerks of the various villages.



On April 19, there will be a special election in Grosse Pointe Township to consider a proposal of the Board of Education to purchase 10 acres of land adjoining the present Grosse Pointe High School property. This purchase is proposed for the purpose of building a Junior High School

All registered taxpayers in Grosse Pointe Park, Grosse Pointe City, Grosse Pointe Farms, Grosse Pointe Shores and Lochmoor are eligible to vote in this election. As taxpayers we are unalterably opposed to this plan, because it means a waste of taxpayers' money.

The plot of ground on which the Grosse Pointe High School stands is 22.5 acres in area. Of this but 1.81 acres are occupied by the high school building, leaving 20.69 acres available for recreational purposes.

There is plenty of room on this property for a Junior High School building, which at the outside would occupy less than two acres, leaving almost 19 acres for the recreation facilities of the two schools.

We contend that it is highly desirable to group two or more schools whenever possible, for convenience in transportation use of a common heating plant, etc. In this case, the existing High School and the Junior High School would each have approximately  $9\frac{1}{2}$  acres for its own individual recreation purposes, making possible separate football and baseball fields, tennis courts, etc.


The consolidated school district No. 1 of Grosse Pointe already owns 67.22 acres of ground, of which but 4.81 acres are occupied by school buildings. Under such conditions, the purchase of additional land is unnecessary and unwise.

#### Walls of Ancient Forts

Stand Guard Over City Early in its reign as the Queen City of the Caribbean, Cartagena was strongly fortified. Historians have estimated that the walls about the port cost half a billion dollars in time, labor and loss of life. When Ferdinand VI of Spain was presented with the accounts of the building of the great fortifications he is reported to have climbed to the top of the tower of his castle and to have peered long and wistfully to-ward the west. 

#### Fighting Dogs and Men Once in the Same Class

Fighting dogs and fighting men went together in the early Victorian days, for the ownership of a bulldog often spelled trouble. An owner had to be ready and handy with his fists and a pugilist bragged as much of his dog's fighting ability as he did his own, asserts a writer in the Los Angeles Times.

Reputation for their gameness grew until the name of bulldog became a synonym for the word courage. Phrases used to describe their qualities were applied to other incidents. For example, a buildog grip, pugnacious as a bulldog, fight like a bulldog, were expressions heard and still used. A person having a pronounced chin was referred to as having a bulldog jaw and the owner was supposed to have an unusual amount of tenacity and will power.

No other dog is built on the same plan as this breed. His nose turns up, his face is covered with wrinkles, the bowed front is not really bowed but only seems so because front legs are set on the corner of a broad chest. A good many of their points are an exaggeration of former characteristics, and some of their good qualities have been sacrificed to type, By reason of his heavy formation, the gait varies from that of other breeds. The hindquarters are higher from the ground than the front and therefore his hind feet shove him forward. He does not run but has a cantering gait similar to a horse.

#### The Funny Potto

The potto, one of the least known animals of the world is from the jungles of Uganda, in Africa. A member of the interesting lemur fanily, which is closely related to the monkeys, the animal is about the size of a squirrel and has large "pop" eyes. Its habits re-semble those of the sloth. It lives in trees, sometimes hanging upside down from the branches for hours.

The potto is little known because it is one of the many creatures which appear only at night. This makes it difficult for scientists to study its habits. About all that is really known about the funny little creature are the details of its anatomy. It has hands somewhat like a monkey's (except for the index fingers which are missing) and a very short tail.

#### Invented Adhesive Stamp

Mrs. Lyons is the flag custodian of the Historic Memorials Society, formerly the Mount Vernon Society.

Mrs. Smith and Miss Wearing arrived Tuesday and were the dinner guests that evening of Mrs. Albert L. Hart at the Whittier. Other guests were Mrs. Charles Horton Metcalf, president of the Historic Memorials Society, and Mrs. Marjorie Metcalf Edgar. On Wednesday, Mrs. Alva Macauley, of Lake Shore road, gave a luncheon at her home for ten members of the state board for Kenmore, honoring Mrs. Smith. Mrs. Wistar W. Gates honored the visitors Thursday with a luncheon for eight guests at her home on St. Clair avenue. Mrs. Smith visited, with Mrs. Metcalf, the parliamentary law class which Mrs. Metcalf conducted in the absence of Mrs. Fox in Flint.
