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## Parent Council Supports Purchasing of Additional Property for Junior High

The following article was drafted by the Parent Council for submission to the voters presenting their views on the purchase of additional school property:

The following resolution was drafted by the Parent Council for submission to the voters, presenting their views on the purchase of additional school property:

**What is a Junior High School?**  
A junior high school is a school operated and equipped to meet the special needs of children in grades 7, 8 and 9, with ages approximately from 12 to 15.

Pupils come to the junior high school with a common school background. They leave to enter a school where they must prepare for a definite goal; e. g., commercial work, homemaking, the trades, or college preparation.

It is the job of the junior high school to offer opportunities for pupils to try out and find their special interests, abilities and needs. This means that a variety of activities and experiences must be offered all pupils. It means some choice of courses must be started. It means much guidance must be given to help pupils plan a wise senior high school course. It means a continuation for many pupils, of development of the common foundation of knowledge, skills, habits and attitudes on which their later schooling and living is based.

**How does a junior high school differ from an elementary school?**  
In an elementary school there is no choice of subjects by pupils. The chief purpose of these years is to have children develop the common foundation of knowledge, skills, habits and attitudes on which their later schooling and living is based.

**How does a junior high school differ from a senior high school?**  
A senior high school is operated and equipped for pupils of grades 10, 11 and 12, with ages ranging from 15 to 19 to give them the different kinds of training that will prepare them for what they plan to do when they graduate. In Grosse Pointe about six out of ten who graduate will get a job in an office, shop or store, or will enter other work as housewife or in the trades. For these pupils the senior high school must provide the final citizenship as well as commercial, manual, or household training which they will get in school. The other 40 per cent of graduates go on to college or other type of further schooling. For them senior high school must provide the college preparatory training.

The senior high school is therefore a school in which pupils may receive carefully organized training to prepare for definite and special purposes. Such a school must offer a wide variety of subjects in carefully organized programs to prepare pupils for the wide variety of activities in which the graduates go:

1. Who is eligible to vote on April 19th?  
Taxpayers who live in Grosse Pointe and who are registered for school elections.

2. How can I find out if I am registered for school elections?  
If you have voted in a school election you are registered.  
If you will call the Board of Education offices, Niagara 2000, they will tell you if you are registered.

3. When may taxpayers register?  
Any day up to and including April 17, 1937 at the offices of the Board of Education, 389 St. Clair avenue, during office hours 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., Saturdays from 8:30 a. m. to 12 noon. On Saturday, April 17, the office will be open for registrations from 8 a. m. until 8 p. m.

4. When and where will the voting be held?  
At the regular school voting precincts from 12 noon to 8 p. m. on April 19, 1937.  
Precinct No. 1—City of Grosse Pointe, at the Cadieux School.  
Precinct No. 2—Grosse Pointe Park

Next Monday's special school election promises to be a lively battle at the polls, as both the "pro" and "anti" groups continue to show determined activity. The latest development in the first comes in the form of a circular mailed by the "antis" to all taxpayers of Grosse Pointe Township. It reads as follows: To the Taxpayers of Grosse Pointe Township:

We are opposed to this purchase on the ground that it involves an unnecessary expenditure of the taxpayers' money, when a site is already available. We are not opposed to a Junior High School. We favor building a Junior High School on the property now available.

## WHY?

Why did the School Board refuse to appoint the clerks of the various villages of Grosse Pointe Township and the clerk of the City of Grosse Pointe as deputies for the registration of voters for the Special School Election?

## WHY YOU SHOULD VOTE "NO" ON PURCHASE OF JUNIOR HIGH SITE

On Monday, April 19, the taxpayers of Grosse Pointe Township and the City of Grosse Pointe will be called upon to settle a matter which has been discussed both pro and con during the past few weeks. The School Board has fostered the purchase of additional school property, which is being opposed strenuously.

A careful survey of the situation emphatically impresses us that such a purchase is a ridiculous spending of the taxpayers' money when such an expenditure is absolutely unnecessary.

Dr. Price of the Detroit Board of Education states that 100 square feet of recreational grounds is sufficient for each pupil. At present our Grosse Pointe High School occupies but 1.81 acres on a 22.5-acre school site.

If a Junior High School was constructed on one end of the property now occupied by the Grosse Pointe High School with a probable attendance of 3,500 pupils in both schools, and according to school figures submitted only about 1,750 attend the High School at present, representing both junior and senior pupils, there would still be sufficient recreation ground for more than 8,224 pupils.

Then, too, it is said that an appraiser has set the value of the property in question at \$30,000, yet property has been sold in this area at \$250.00 a foot frontage, which indicates that the property in question is worth between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

The proposed site will be paid for out of taxes already collected. It is easy to buy property when taxes are handled in this manner.

The 1935-36 debt service requirements were \$197,272.25 but the amount asked for was \$296,650.00, a difference of \$99,377.75 to provide for tax delinquencies. According to records of Grosse Pointe Township and the City of Grosse Pointe tax delinquencies have rarely exceeded 20 per cent, which would mean approximately \$40,000 more tax collection than is necessary.

For 1936-37 period debt service requirements are \$221,184.44, an increase of about \$24,000 and the tax levy asked is \$327,330.75.

Why doesn't the School Board set aside these surplus tax collections toward the construction of a new Junior High School IF ONE IS ACTUALLY NEEDED, WHICH IS DOUBTFUL, rather than the purchase of more property when it owns 67.22 acres with but 4.81 acres occupied by buildings? The janitors might also be considered and their pay increased to a living wage.

The School Board possesses valuable business frontage on Jefferson avenue and on Kercheval avenue. This could also be sold and a substantial contribution made toward the construction of the Junior High School.

When the purchase of the site for the present Grosse Pointe High School was being made the School Board at that time spent considerable time trying to decide whether they should purchase just sufficient property for the High School or purchase the entire site of 22.5 acres permitting a future construction of a Junior High School. After much deliberation it was decided to purchase the entire parcel while the price was favorable. Stephen Van Tiem can verify this statement as he attended a meeting of the School Board at that time and sponsored the property purchase.

In view of the fact that there is no need for the purchasing of property which according to appraisers is worth in the neighborhood of \$100,000 we recommend that you vote NO on the proposal which will be submitted to you at the Special School Election on Monday, April 19.

Curtail this absolutely unnecessary expenditure of funds which you must contribute through assessments. VOTE NO! VOTE NO!

The present high school site comprises 22.5 acres of ground of which but 1.81 acres is occupied by the school buildings. A Junior High School building of equal size could be erected on the opposite end of this land and still leave 18.88 acres available for recreational or other purposes. This would give each of the two school 9.44 acres. The attendance of the two schools would equal some 3500 pupils. On the basis of the best existing school practice, there would be ample recreational room for every pupil. In fact, there would be more square feet per pupil than in some of the new Detroit High School properties. The existing football field, baseball diamond and practice football field and tennis courts could be preserved.

In the Roosevelt School group, Detroit, there are an elementary school of 2064 pupils, the Durfee Junior High School of 2685 pupils and the Central High of 3357 pupils, a total of 8106 pupils, more than twice the estimated attendance at our High School and Junior High School. The total area of the Roosevelt School group property, including buildings, is 38.5 acres, less than twice the land in our 22.5 acre piece. In the Southeastern group, are the Southeastern High School and the Foch Junior High with a total of 6148 pupils. This property comprises only 13.5 acres, as against the Grosse Pointe High School site, which will have 18.88 acres after deducting the land occupied by the present and proposed buildings. The Cooley High School, Detroit's most modern high school plant, handles 4316 pupils on 13 acres.

Dr. Price, the Detroit Board of Education's expert, figures that 100 square feet of recreation ground is desirable for each pupil. On this basis, the Grosse Pointe High School site, with buildings deducted, could care for 8224 pupils, or more than twice as many as would attend the two schools.

We heartily recommend that you vote NO on this proposition next Monday. Bear in mind that a negative vote is not a vote against a Junior High School which this committee concedes is highly desirable and necessary. It merely would register a protest against buying additional land.

The School Board of the Township already owns 67.22 acres of land in School District No. 1, and of this but 4.81 acres is occupied by school buildings. It would be wasteful to acquire any more land at this time or for many years to come. It is true that no additional taxes would be levied directly by this land, but the saving of its purchase price would nevertheless be a saving to the taxpayers as the money would be available for other purposes and in particular the cost of the Junior High School.

Be sure to register for this election if you are not already registered for a school election. Registration for ordinary elections is not sufficient. Only taxpayers (their husbands or wives) are eligible to vote in school elections. For the convenience of citizens, the registration books in the Board of Education offices, 389 St. Clair avenue, will be open daily from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. and on Saturday, April 17, from 8:30 a. m. to 8 p. m.

## A Legionnaire Writes About Communism

The doctrine of communism was founded on the principles of dialectical and historical materialism previously advocated by Marx, which the theoreticians of Bolshevism tried to give the only genuine interpretation.

According to this doctrine there is in the world only one reality, matter, prime forces which evolve into plant, animal and man.

Even human society is nothing but phenomena and a form of matter evolving in the same way. By the law of inexorable necessities and through perpetual conflict of forces, matter moves toward the final synthesis of classless society.

In such a doctrine, as is evident, there is no room for the idea of God; there is no difference between matter and spirit, between soul and body; there is neither the survival of the soul

after death nor any hope of a future life.

Thus man's liberty is destroyed. Every right of the human person is denied. Man becomes, as it were, a mere cog in the collectivist machinery which alone has unlimited control over the lives of men. All hierarchy of authority is nullified.

The dignity of the indissolubility of marriage is set aside. The family is profaned. The woman is torn from her home and from the care of her children. Religion is dubbed the opiate of the people and assailed with any weapon at hand. The very idea of God is rejected and condemned.

Communism, therefore, is a system full of errors and sophism. It is in opposition to both reason and divine revelation. It is subversive to the social order because it means the destruction (Continued on Page Eight)

Van Wagoner Free of Campaign Promises

The survey is expected by him to yield information that will guide highway policies—including construction policies—for the next twenty years.

Commissioner Van Wagoner left on a vacation immediately after the election. On his return, one of the first problems to face him will be new construction program shortly to get underway.

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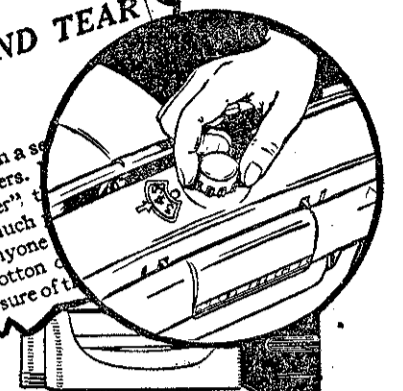
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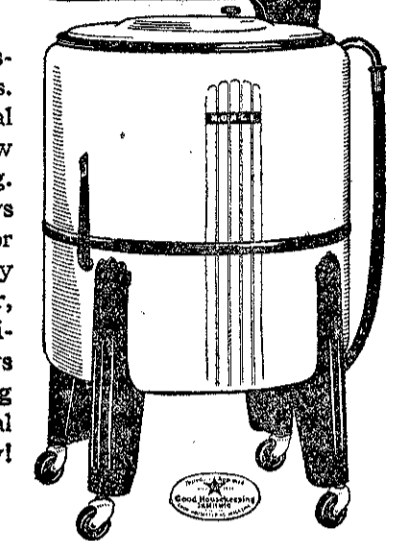

Parent Council Supports Purchasing of Additional Property for Junior High

(Continued from Page One)
5. What is this election for?
To authorize the Board of Education to secure a site for a junior high school and to provide badly needed playground space for the Pere Gabriel Richard elementary school.

Seven acres running back from Kercheval avenue adjoining the high school athletic field.

7. What is the advantage of acquiring the junior high school site at the present time?
To avail ourselves now of the property just described with a view to erecting a junior high school building in the near future.

8. When and why will a junior high school be needed in Grosse Pointe?
There is no junior high school building in Grosse Pointe at present. The junior high school pupils have been housed in the high school building along with the senior high school pupils. This condition, parents recognize, has many disadvantages.

There is no longer room in the high school building for both the senior high school and junior high school pupils. The high school building has room for from 1400 to 1450 pupils. There are now 1750 pupils in the junior high and senior high school grades combined. The combined enrollment is, grow-

ing at the rate of approximately 100 pupils per year and the rate is increasing as more new houses are erected in Grosse Pointe.

There were 600 new houses erected in Grosse Pointe school district in 1936. There were 173 permits issued in January, February and March of 1937. This is nearly twice as many as in the first three months of 1936. It is a known fact that the schools of Grosse Pointe were responsible for many of these houses being built or sold.

The fact that there is insufficient room for junior high school and senior high school pupils in the present high school building means that by September, 1937, every seventh grade and every 8-B grade pupil will have to transfer buildings in the middle of the day.

"Every room in the high school is being used. The increasing number of junior high school pupils cannot be cared for in the elementary schools. In September 1937 the situation will be as follows:

15. How will the removal of this property from the tax rolls of Grosse Pointe Farms affect the taxes of that village?
The taxes being paid on the proposed sites will amount to approximately \$217 for the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms in 1936.

16. Do the Parent Associations of Grosse Pointe endorse the proposal?
This proposal has been presented before, and discussed by the elected and authorized officers and delegates to the Grosse Pointe Council of Parent and Parent-Teacher Associations and unanimously approved.

15. How will the removal of this property from the tax rolls of Grosse Pointe Farms affect the taxes of that village?
The taxes being paid on the proposed sites will amount to approximately \$217 for the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms in 1936.

The total tax levy in Grosse Pointe Farms in 1936 was approximately \$357,875.00. Therefore the immediate tax loss is negligible. If at some later date all of the land in the proposed sites were occupied by buildings it is possible that the taxes derived might be between \$7,000 and \$10,000 per year. By that time the assessed value of Grosse Pointe Farms would presumably be double what it is now or \$40,900,000.00. Not having these sites on the tax rolls would therefore mean an increased tax for a resident of Grosse Pointe Farms in the amount of less than \$1.00 per year on a house and lot with a market value of approximately \$10,000.00.

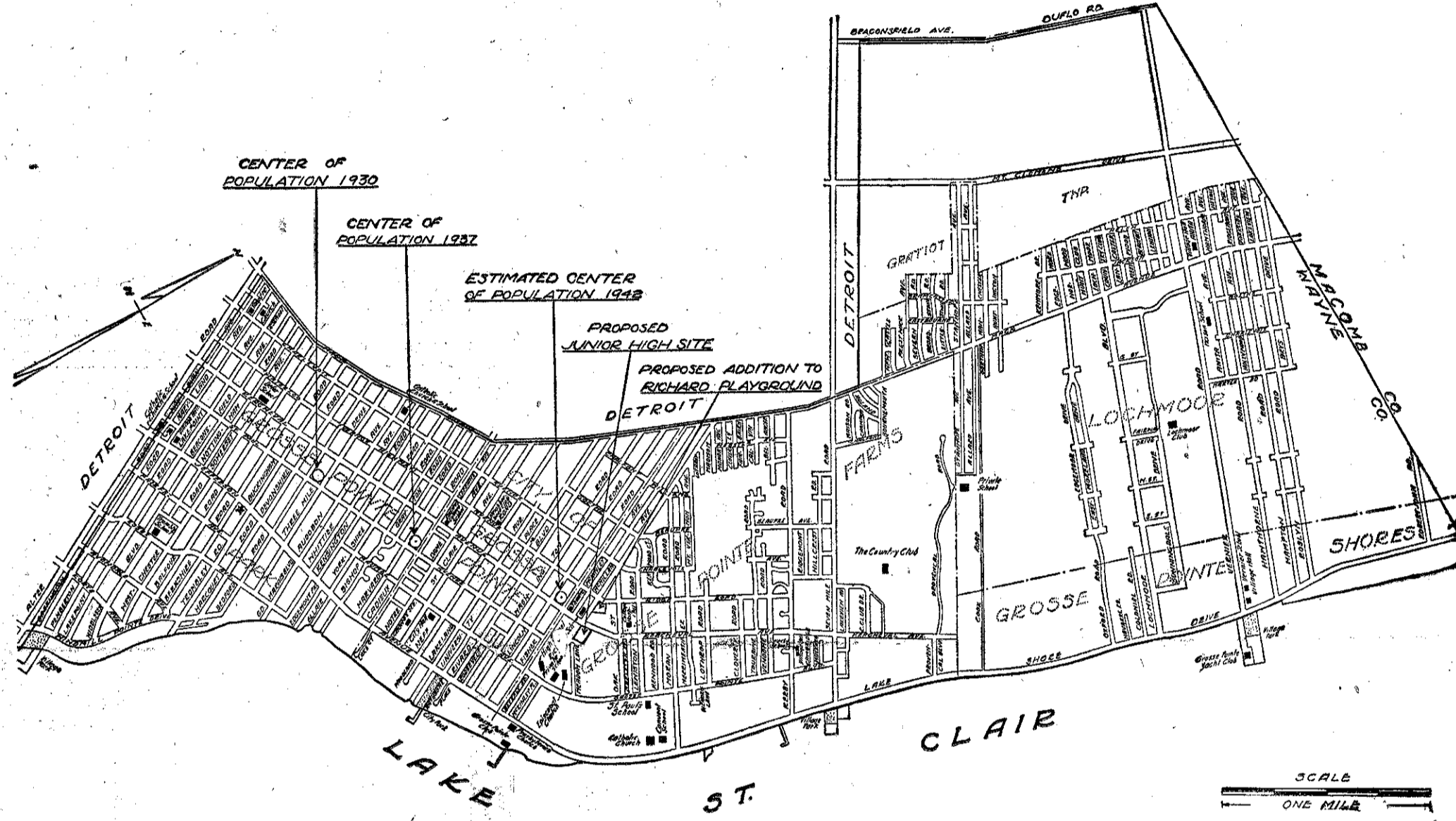

**A JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL IS BADLY NEEDED.**

There is no Junior High School building in Grosse Pointe at present. There is no longer room in the High School building for both the Senior High School pupils and Junior High School pupils. Every room in the High School is being used. The increasing number of Junior High School pupils cannot be cared for in the elementary schools. In September, 1937, 94 out of the 98 classrooms in Grosse Pointe elementary schools will be in use.

**THE JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL SITE IS IN THE LOGICAL LOCATION.**

It is reasonably near the center of the entire Grosse Pointe School district. It is possible to get along with a smaller site here than if located elsewhere. If the junior high school site were not adjoining the high school athletic field so that both junior and senior high school pupils could make use of it, the junior high site would need to be nearly twice as large in order that the junior high school pupils have adequate play and athletic fields.

Having the junior high school and senior high school adjacent makes for convenience of parents in transporting children to and from schools where they have children enrolled in both schools.

**IT IS NECESSARY TO SECURE THIS PROPERTY.**

The only possible site owned by the district that could be used for the Junior High School building and leave any reasonable play and athletic field is the present Senior High School site. It contains 22 acres, with the building, drives, walks and front lawn using 8 acres. This leaves an athletic field of 14 acres for 1450 pupils.

If, on this 14 acre athletic field a junior high school were built, the building, lawn and drives would take away at least 5 acres. This would leave an athletic and recreation field of only 9 acres and nearly double the number of pupils to use it.

Even at present in the fall of the year when 10 or 12 football squads and 8 to 12 girls groups in hockey and kick ball want to use the field there is insufficient space for all at one time. In the spring, soft ball, track groups and girl sports groups frequently have to wait their turn for playground space.

Reducing the field by 5 acres and adding 1200 pupils to use the field would make the athletic and recreation fields decidedly crowded and inadequate.

Adequate playground space is a safety measure to keep children from playing in the streets. Doctors say that junior and senior high school pupils need adequate outdoor recreation.

The proposed plan of the Board of Education would leave the size of the athletic and recreation fields at the High School as they now are although it would practically double the number of pupils using them.

The Richard School playground is crowded with the present 575 pupils. The school enrollment is growing. When an addition is built on the school at a later time, the enrollment will be increased to more than 1,000 but the addition will use some of what is now playground.

Property without subdivision improvements or houses, both of which greatly increase the cost of property, is becoming scarce in the central portion of the Grosse Pointe school district.

There is every reason to believe that if these sites are not secured now, buildings will be erected upon them and their cost increased many times.

Delinquent taxes are being paid this year in greater amount than anticipated when the budget was set up. It is estimated that there will be a sufficient amount of these added delinquent tax payments to provide enough money to acquire the proposed sites.

of its foundations; because it ignores the true origin and purpose of the State; and because it denies the right, dignity and liberty of human personality.

That a system so obviously erroneous should be so widely accepted is due to the false ideal of justice and equality which Communism has held up to the masses, promising elimination of many undeniable abuses and improvement of the conditions of the poor working man.

Deceived by the thesis and promises, they have blindly followed the prophets of the new doctrine, unable to perceive the very serious errors of Communism.

By pretending to desire only betterment of the condition of the working classes, by urging removal of the very real abuses chargeable to a liberalistic economic order, and by demanding a more equitable distribution of this world's good (an objective entirely and undoubtedly legitimate), Communists take advantage of the present world-wide economic crisis to draw into the sphere of their influence even those sections of the populace which on principle reject all forms of materialism and terrorism. In addition to the sad plight in which liberal economics have left the working man, two other factors undoubtedly hastened this diffusion; first, clever, wide-spread propaganda organized with truly diabolical perfection and, secondly, the inexplicable silence of a large section of the press in the face of the spread of Communism.

There is a vast difference between allegation and objective reality. To make an assertion is one thing. To demonstrate the objective reality of that assertion is quite another thing. Communism attempts to make the unthinking reader that it is the remedy for the economic ills which affect mankind at the present moment. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Communism means the destruction of democracy, of civil liberties, of true education, of genuine culture, of patriotism, of intellectual traditions, of religion, of the family, of the home, of liberty, of progress, of peace and individual betterment. Communism means a return to the brutal tyranny and degradation of the pagan Roman Empire.

To prove this we are not confined to theoretical arguments. Communism boasts that it controls the destinies of 160,000,000 people in Soviet Russia. There it can be studied in its concrete applications. In the days of the pagan (Roman Empire the number of those who enjoyed the Roman citizenship and who therefore were permitted to rule was small. The ruling class in pagan Rome was small. Soviet Russia presents a similar picture. There, too, the ruling class is small. Those who belong to the Communist party in Russia are alone permitted to occupy high and leading official positions. Only 2,000,000 out of 160,000,000 in Russia are permitted to be members of the Russia Communist party. The upper class, the ruling class, the tyrannical class in Russia is all one. That class is composed of those who belong to the Communist party. All other classes in Russia are subjected to them.

From another standpoint the Communist empire of Soviet Russia is worse than the pagan empire of Rome. The Roman empire did not seek to destroy God and to annihilate all religions. Within the Communist empire of Soviet Russia freedom of propaganda is given only to atheists. Communism denounces God and religion. The constitution of the Soviet Communist empire of Russia makes a clear distinction between freedom of religious worship and freedom of anti-religious propaganda. No attempt may be made to propagate religion. Every encouragement is given to the Communist tyrannical minority in control of the Soviet empire to militant atheists and to those, who in the words of Earl Browder, seek to root out the idea of God and the supernatural from the minds of men. World Communism, therefore, means a system of world tyranny more degrading and more brutal and more godless than the world tyranny of the ancient Roman empire from which our modern liberals are glad to boast the world has traveled so far. Communism means world retrogression.

That there is a necessity of working for a greater distribution of the fruits of the earth and of the harvest of men's labor on earth is undeniable. This can be done and this must be done without sacrificing a single shred of the civil liberties and spiritual rights and human culture and worldly idealism won by mankind throughout those ages of progress which began with the fall of the pagan Roman empire and which world Communism would destroy. Just because there are rats in a house is no reason why the house should be set on fire in order to be rid of them. There are other means of exterminating the rodents. Because some individual members of a crew are behaving badly, it is not necessary to scuttle the ship. In the same way Communism is worse than the ills it falsely promises to cure. World Communism is universal poison. Its poisonous ingredients will be presented and analyzed in succeeding articles.

**Field Staff to Check Employer's Records**

A check-up of the books of employers whose reports on 1936 payrolls contained possible errors was begun today by the staff of field representatives of the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission.

Frank A. Picard, commission chairman, said the field men would start their work in Wayne County and gradually spread throughout the state.

"We first will check those employers whose reports indicate they may have wrongly claimed exemption on their 1936 payroll contribution to the state unemployment compensation fund," Mr. Picard exclaimed.

"We feel that many, because this was their first report under the new state law, many have misunderstood the provisions of the act and we wish to point out errors and give the employers a chance to file amended returns."

Another group whose records will be checked by the field staff will be the larger employers who failed to file any contribution reports with the state commission.

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
