**A GIRL SCOUT OBEYS ORDERS**

The founding of any nation depends upon obedience, for in this world is the basis of all co-operation. Of all the desirable characteristics in a successful being, to be able to obey without question, is the deepest. In our opinion it is the most important; for without this, no co-operation can possibly be achieved.

The girl who can "carry the message to Garcia" will be wanted in every town, city and village throughout the world. We realize that if the girls are aware of this early in life, it will be easier for them to obey important orders given them in later life, without question or hesitation.

**Safer Highways**

In the March issue of "The Wayne Engineer" Roger L. Morrison, Professor of Highway Engineering and Highway Transportation, University of Michigan, presents a most impressive and educational article on the subject of "Safer Highways." The following brief does not do justice to the Professor as the whole article should be read by all.

"If 1937 is no worse than 1936, there will be approximately 106 persons killed and more than 3,000 injured every day. About 1000 of the injured will be permanently crippled. Conservative figures place the annual traffic accident cost at about a billion dollars so that each day's bill will be nearly three million dollars.

Traffic deaths in cities have been slowly decreasing but deaths on rural highways, particularly at night, are increasing at an alarming rate. Three principal factors are involved—the vehicles, the highways, and the persons using the vehicles and highways.

So far as the vehicles are concerned it is claimed that they are being made safer all the time but it is my belief that they are being made more dangerous due to the increasing speed capacity.

Highways are being made safer by the removal of better illumination of obstructions, elimination of hazardous grade crossings, erection or removal of traffic signals and signs, channelization of complicated intersections, and by separating of traffic streams moving in opposite directions.

The greatest possibility for accident reduction seems to be in the control of the Highway User, both Driver and Pedestrian. To control the driver we need (first) uniform, sane and understandable traffic rules and regulations and standard properly-placed traffic control devices; (second) we need good driver's-license laws, properly administered by a state agency; (third) we need effective, definite, educational activities and (fourth) we need strict and impartial enforcement of traffic laws by the police and the courts.

The control of pedestrians is more difficult. Child pedestrians of school age have been so well taught that there has been no increase in fatalities for many years. Education, by various methods, seems to offer the best hope for making people walk more safely."

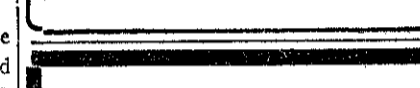

**Newspapers in Leading Cities Show 10% Gain**

The newspaper in the 52 leading cities as measured by Media Records, Inc., showed a gain of 10.7 per cent in total advertising in 1936 as compared with the previous year; Financial advertising showed the biggest percentage gain, 17.4 percent, followed by: General 15.9 percent; classified, 15.9 percent; retail, 8.3 percent; and department stores 8 percent.

The full year's report indicates that department stores are the most consistent believers in newspaper advertising. For the month of December department stores lineage was 99.2 per cent of the peak year of 1929, and for the full 12 months the stores used 93 percent as much space as in 1929.
