



#### **Auto Craft Labor** Shortage Foreseen

Settlement of automobile strikes seems likely to create a shortage of workers in several automotive occupations, a study of registration files of the National Reemployment Service indicates, Major Howard Starret, State Reemployment Director, declared today, As factories reopen it is anticipated that in the Detroit area there will be a shortage of workers in a number of skilled trades, Major Starret said. "In other offices farther removed from the

center of automobile production, the shortage of such labor is even more noticeable. We note a scarcity of cold header operators, metal finishers, both loose panel and body; torch solderers for body work, external and internal grinders, floor and machine molders, production lathe operators, milling machine operators, multiple drill operaors and hand solderers."

Major Starret pointed out that through the clearance system of the NRS, jobs are made available to workers in any section of the state and workmen are similarly made available to employers. All men trained along any of the above lines are urged to register at once at the nearest office of the National Reemployment Service to be ready when expected calls are received from automobile manufac-

No charge is made for services of the National Reemployment Service which is a division of the United States Department of Labor.

Three scholarship in Michigan Colleges will be among the many prizes, medals and awards made to Michigan young men at the Citizens' Military Training Camps this year, Phelps Newberry, Civilian Aide to the Secretary of War, announced today. The founding of any nation depends upon obedience, for in this word is the basis of all co-operation. Of all the desirable characteristics in a successful being, to be able to obey without question, is the deepest. In our opinion it is the most important; for without this, no co-operation can pos-

sibly be achieved. The girl who can "carry the message to Garcia" will be wanted in every town, city and village throughout the world. It is here that the National Reemployment Service can step into the picture to lighten the housewife's burden and provide for the gleaming home she wants, Major Howard Starret State Reemployment Director, points A GIRL SCOUT OBEYS ORDERS

> "Files in our various offices throughout the state well stocked with men and yomen capable of and eager for the chance of performing the infinite variety of household tasks which come to the fore in the Spring," Major Starret said. "Many are unskilled in particular trades but can do an excellent job of washing windows or walls, beating rugs, cleaning cellars, scrubbing floors, spading gardens, planting shrubbery or bulbs or other similar tasks.

"These men and women would be delighted to obtain a few days' or weeks' work in household tasks. Many are able to touch-up painting, plastering or carpenter work. Housewives who need such help should call our nearest office, stating just what tasks they wish performed and a men or woman who can do such work will be referred." Major Starret added. Men or women seeking this type of employment are urged to register at the nearest National Reemployment Service, a division of the United States Employment Service operated under the U. S. Department of Labor.

So far as the vehicles are concerned it is claimed that they are being made safer all the time but it is my belief that they are being made more dangerous due to the increasing speed capaci-

Highways are being made safer by the removal of better illumination of obstructions, elimination of hazardous grade crossings, erection or removal of traffic signals and signs, channelization of complicated intersections, and by separating of traffic streams moving in opposite directions.

The greatest possibility for accident reduction seems to be in the control of the Highway User, both Driver and Pedestrain. To control the driver we need (first) uniform, sane and understandable traffic rules and regulations and standard properly-placed traffic control devices; (second) we need good driver's-license laws, properly adminis-tered by a state agency; (third) we need effective, definite, educational activities and (fourth) we need strict and impartial enforcement of traffic laws by the police and the courts.

The control of pedestrains is more difficult. Child pedestrains of school age have been so well taught that there has been no increase in fatalities for many years. Education, by various methods, seems to offer the best hope for making people walk more safely."


