gress may be attributed to health education. Two specific marks of health education i. e. (1) physical superiority of the present young adults over their parents and grandparents; (2) reduction in disease and death rates. Books, periodicals, and radio broadcasts reveal in their content that the public is becoming "health conscious" and that they realize as never before the relationship of vigorous health to the maintenance of youth and holding one's place in the world of affairs.

But we must not be too sanguine! There are equally strong evidences that the health goal has by no means been attained and that efforts in behalf of optimum child health must be redoubled. No more convincing proof can be given than to point to the condition of the teeth of children today.

School dental surveys commonly show 80 to 90 or an even higher percent of children with a minimum of one to five cavities. In view of the fact that the development and preservation of the teeth are now known to be definitely associated with the nutrition of the individual, it is evident that health education in this respect has scarcely begun.

Recent activities of the Nutrition Committee of the League of Nations has served as a challenge to the countries of the world to improve the health of their citizens—and chiefly through improving their food intake. Dietary studies made in these various countries show the unmistakable relationship between an adequate diet and the health of the people of the nation. Invariably it is demonstrated that groups having more of the protective foods, especially milk are in better health than those having the poor diet. The following statement from a report of the Nutrition Committee summarizes the committee's findings with respect to milk intake:

"The value of milk is well demonstrated by a survey of the dietary habits of the different native races inhabiting the world. Fine physique, good health and virility are usually seen in races where milk has an important place in the diet * * * modern scientific research has entirely confirmed the conclusions drawn from human experience as to the dietary value of milk."

Education Is Only Political Safety: Dr. Eugene B. Elliott

Reiterating the 100-year-old statement by Horace Mann, that "education is our only political safety," Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, state superintendent of public instruction, declared in an address in Lansing recently that the time has come when America must look to the educational systems and institutions to train people to govern themselves.

Speaking before the Ingham County Bar Association, Dr. Elliott recalled that on April 20, 1937, Horace Mann, a lawyer and legislative leader in Massachusetts, obtained passage of a law that created the first state department of public instruction of which he was to become the first executive secretary.

"This was the foundation stone upon which our public school system was instituted," Dr. Elliott declared. "Horace Mann will go down in history as the father of the American public school." His efforts and devotion to the cause of popular education had a vast influence on the people who were moulding this great union of states.

Dr. Elliott declared that the spirit Horace Mann portrayed in his long career as an educator, should be instilled in the mind of every school child today.

"Educators are confronted today with the serious problem of instilling in the minds of young men and women, the idea of accepting the full responsibilities of government," he declared. "Centralization of power in Lansing and Washington is a serious threat to our democratic form of government and we must educate the oncoming generations to accept more of the responsibilities that have been shifted onto government during recent years. The time has come when individuals must think for themselves and not rely upon gov-

ernment to do it for them.
"This was Horace Mann's theory of government," Dr. Elliott declared. "On this basis he laid the pattern for public education throughout the United States. He was interested in education for everyone and realized that only through education could stability be maintained in the young democratic nation."

Naval Veterans Rally Planned

In commemoration of the beginning of the World War twenty years ago, the Detroit Naval Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars of U. S., are sponsoring Detroit's first annual Naval Veterans Rally to be held in the War Veterans Building, 704 E. Jefferson avenue, on Friday evening, April 30.

The purpose of this rally is to bring together again many of the thousands of Detroit Naval Veterans who joined the Navy or Marine Corps twenty years ago.
The Detroit Naval Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars have conducted Memorial Day services in memory of the sailors and marines who lost their lives in the services of their country, and plans for observation of the coming Memorial Day will be discussed, according to Hubert Lemon, chairman.

Among the prominent speakers on the program will be the Honorable William P. Bradley, councilman; and the Honorable John W. Smith, president of the council of the City of Detroit; Fred Beard, State Welfare Officer, Veterans of Foreign Wars. Music will be furnished by the Naval Militia Band and also motion pictures of the modern navy will be shown by the Naval Recruiting Station. Refreshments will be served and all Naval veterans and their families are invited to be present. There is no admission charge.

On and Off the Records

In spite of labor turmoil, March was a banner business month in Wayne County, according to mortgage tax records of County Treasurer, Jacob P. Sumeracki.

The records, reflecting the volume and money totals of new mortgages, are considered important in that they show the extent of borrowing on real estate.

Mortgages for March had a face value of \$4,401,900.00 and meant a tax of \$22,009.50. This amount was the biggest for any month since the depression, except for isolated instances of large corporate refinancing.

In contrast, land contract tax payments were only \$8,859.00, involving a face value of \$1,771,800.00. These tax settlements, with their threat of foreclosure, throughout the depression, averaged three and four times the amount of the mortgage tax payments.

In December, 1933, mortgage taxes were \$1,471.00 and land contract taxes \$11,140.00. The two reached an almost perfect balance in July, 1934, and the following December mortgage taxes rose to \$9,823.00, against contract taxes of \$6,209.00. The markedly favorable balance has continued ever since.


