State Highway Dept. Conducts Experiment

The State Highway Department announced this week that experiments would be conducted this summer in an effort to curb damage to Michigan roadsides by deer and cattle.

State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner explained that the hoofs of deer feeding on grass along the highways had torn up sod placed to prevent erosion on steep backslopes. He said that maintenance workers were ready to start a series of experiments to find suitable vines which can be planted on backslopes in place of sod. "Apparently, the carefully planted and maintained sod along the highways appeals to the appetite of Michigan deer," the commissioner said. Highways in the forest areas on northern counties have suffered the most although in some more settled sections cattle have caused the same difficulty.

It was pointed out that vines hold the same possibilities for erosion control as sod. They will form a dense matting which will be less appealing to deer and cattle and which will also be more stable. Experiments are planned for counties in the northwest part of the lower peninsula.

This is the first time that any extensive use has been made of vines as a plant material for controlling erosion along Michigan highways.

On the heels of his recent announcement of a drive by police of Michigan against unlicensed operators of motor vehicles, Leon D. Case, Secretary of State, points out that nearly 700,000 such licenses will expire during the next nine months. The exact figure is 688,434.

Licenses cost \$1 and are good for three years. They are issued as provided in the Uniform Operators' and Chauffeurs' act of 1931, the result being that every third year following that date, the bulk of operators' licenses

expire. Secretary Case points out that a driver whose license has expired, is no different, in the eyes of the law, than one who never had a license at all, and that the only way to make certain of an operator's license, is for everyone to check his own expiration date at once. It is printed on every license.

All applications for operators' license must be approved by the chief of police if the applicant lives in a city or village having a chief of police, or by the sheriff, if the applicant lives elsewhere.

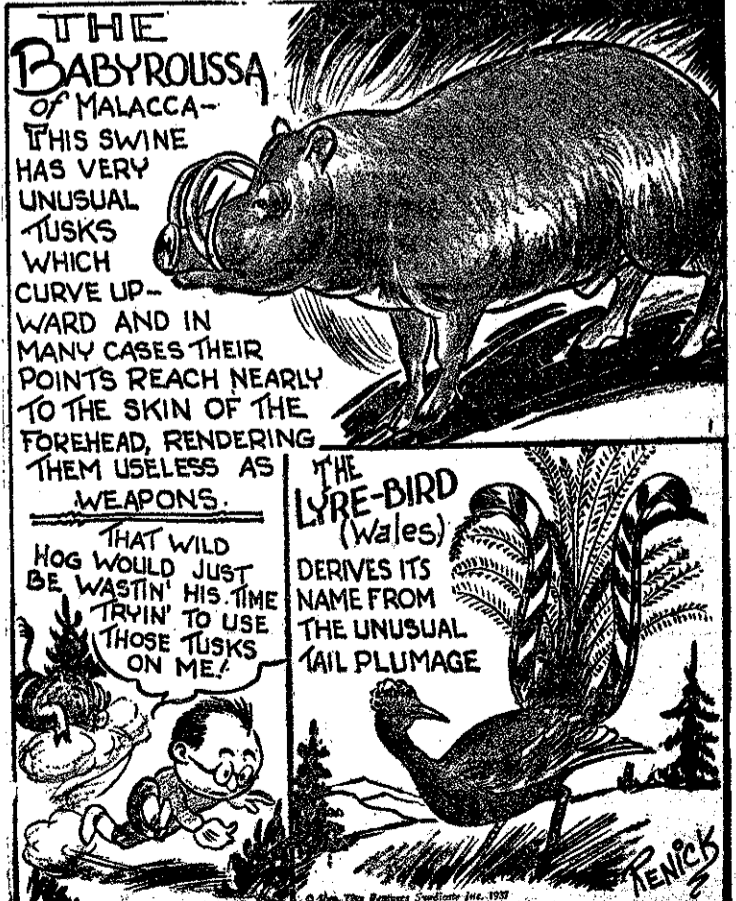

Unemployment Board Grants 3,000 Employers Chance for Refund

A new regulation permitting a tax refund to an estimated 3,000 small employers who failed to deduct the first

\$6,000 in computing their 1936 payroll contributions, was announced today by the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission.

"Employers who because of error or misapprehension failed to claim the permissive statutory deduction of \$5,000 are now permitted to file an amended

contribution report within 120 days from the date when their report was due," Frank A. Pickart, commission chairman, explained.

"We estimate that about 3,000 small employers, not subject to the federal excise tax on payrolls because they did not have eight or more employees during 1936, will benefit from this new commission ruling."

"In order for them to claim the refund they must submit an amended return together with a sworn statement setting forth the circumstances of their error before July 20, next. The commission then will pass on their claim and authorize a refund. This amounts to nine-tenths of one percent of the employer's payroll if the total was less than \$5,000. If the total was over \$5,000, the refund will be \$54.00, the contribution paid on the first \$5,000."

approval of this amendment, any change in the number of justices could be effected only by the direct voice of the people throughout another amendment. Neither the President nor the Congress would have power to add to or reduce the membership of the court. Since the Constitution of the United States specifically provides for a Supreme Court, Rep. Dondero contends that all changes should be effected by enactment of equal dignity. Under the Dondero plan, if the American people want to increase the membership of the Supreme Court, they can do this directly and thus preserve "the government of the people, by the people, and for the people."

In speaking of this proposed amendment, Rep. Dondero said, "I believe in no half-way measures when it comes to assuring control of the Federal government to the people. Members of Congress and the President, under this system of government, must periodically render to the people an account of their direct and full control of the Supreme Court and remove all possibility of changes unless directly enacted by the people, thus strengthening the structure of our American form of representative government."

Rep. Dondero's resolution provides: "The Supreme Court shall consist of nine active judges, one of whom shall be appointed as Chief Justice, and eight of whom shall be appointed as Associate Justices, to be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall hold their offices during good behavior, and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office."

Dondero Amendment Limits High Court as Bar to Packing

Rep. George A. Dondero, 17th Michigan district, is the author of a joint resolution introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives, which offers an amendment to the Constitution of the United States to fix the number of Justices of the Supreme Court. The object of the amendment is to prevent making the high court the plaything of any President, regardless of party affiliation, and to give the American people full and direct control of this coordinate branch of the Federal government.

The Dondero proposal fixes the number of Justices at nine to be named in the same manner as at present. Upon

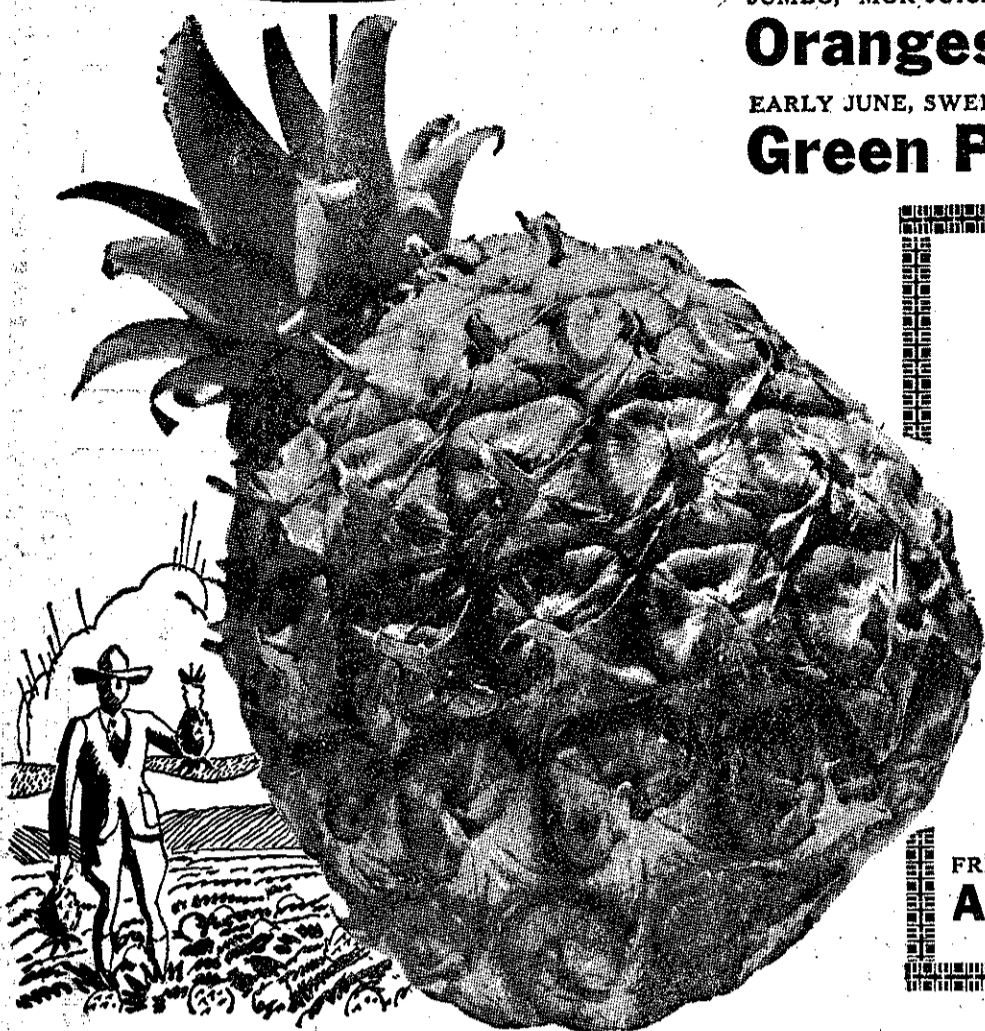
