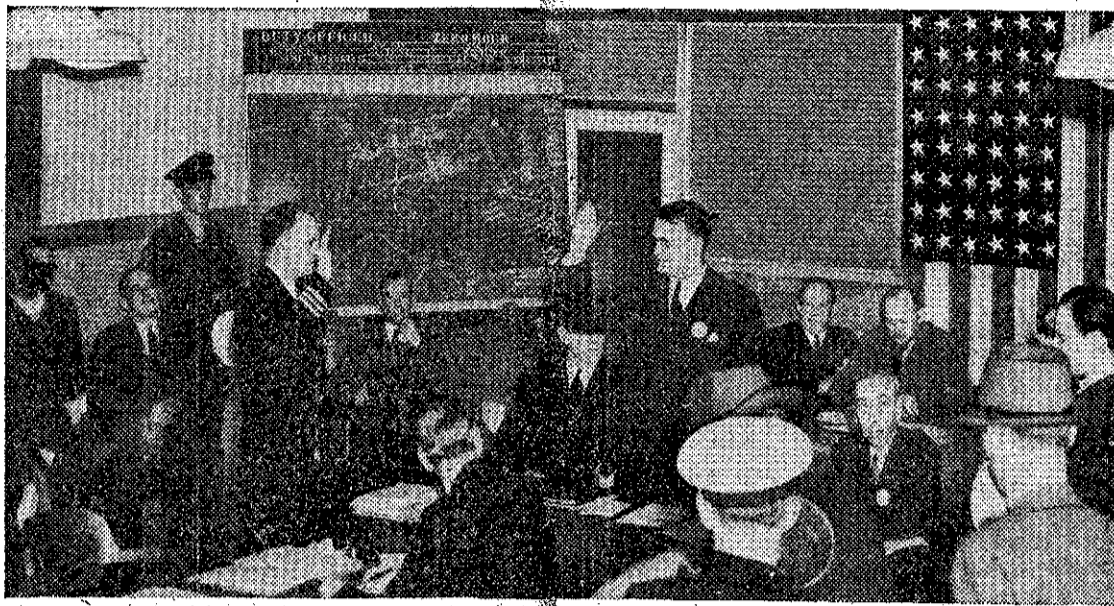

Albert E. Meder School Board Candidate Offers Constructive Program

The many friends of Albert E. Meder are exceedingly pleased because of his agreeing to become a candidate for trustee of the School Board at the election to be held June 14th.

For some years past there has been a demand in the Grosse Pointe district for Mr. Meder to be a member of the School Board. He has refused to run and only consented this week after persistent requests from all sections of the district.

Mr. Meder has lived in Grosse Pointe for the past 15 years. He was attorney for the Village of Grosse Pointe for a number of terms and has been attorney for the City of Grosse Pointe since its incorporation. He has been interested in the administration of the schools during much of that time.

After graduating from Western High School at Bay City Mr. Meder attended the University of Michigan, receiving a degree from the literary school as well as the law department. For the past 25 years he has been associated with the law firm of Beaumont, Smith and Harris, of which he has been a member for many years.

When asked by the GROSE POINTE REVIEW what changes, if any, he advocated in the school government, Mr. Meder said: "Among other things, I have been impressed for some time past that while we are properly giving the children and young people of Grosse Pointe every opportunity to obtain a good education, there has not been the rigid economy in school administration to which the taxpayers are entitled. I appreciate that since 1932 the school enrollment has increased nine per cent. Nevertheless it does seem to me that the tax levy during those years might have been reduced more than the nine per cent which it has been decreased. There is no reason why the School Board could not have followed the example of the municipalities and the township during the past

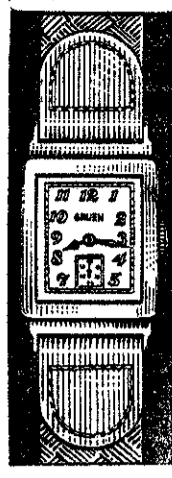

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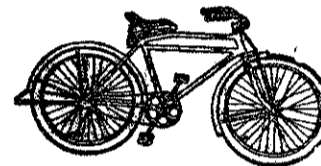

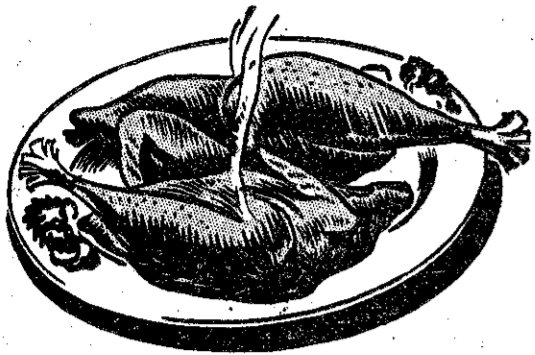
