





### Soccer Saturday At U. of D. Stadium

Soccer football, as played by the best teams in the old country should be seen at the University of Detroit Stadium, Saturday, June 5, when Charlton Athletics, runners-up for the Eng-

lish first divisional league championship play a picked team of Michigan players. Unlike other British teams that have played here Charlton will have a young squad of players available for the Detroit exhibition, and Michigan will have a young one, too. In the past Michi-

gan has fared better than any other American team in opposition to foreign touring teams, and the June 5 contest should not be an exception. Charlton's Detroit game will be the third of its American and Canadian tour. They open in the Polo Grounds, then play at Pittsburgh before coming here. After the Detroit game they leave for a game at Chicago. On the day of the game 8,000 grandstand seats at \$1.10 each will go on sale when the gates open at the U. of D.

### "What About Michigan"

This is the question which the American public is asking today, according to DeLoss Walker, associate editor of Liberty magazine. Mr. Walker spoke recently before a joint luncheon of Detroit commercial and advertising leaders, declaring the public has the prevailing idea that chaos and rebellion prevail in the automobile state.

As a spearhead of an intensive drive to present the truth about Michigan, the Michigan Press association, of which THE GROSSE POINTE REVIEW is a member, will be host next July to a convention and state tour of newspaper editors. The editors are coming to Michigan from all parts of the United States for a three-day business meeting at the Book-Cadillac hotel in Detroit and for a four-day educational tour of the state.

"Not in its 62 years of existence has the Michigan Press association comprising daily and weekly newspapers had such an opportunity for needed public service," reports Philip T. Rich, publisher of the Midland Daily News and chairman of the convention bureau.

"In view of the recent sit-down strike turmoil and the resultant focusing of popular interest in the state, the coming assembly of newspaper editors is like a heaven-sent answer. We are expecting to entertain 350 to 450 newspapermen and their families. An automobile will be awarded to the publisher who writes the best account, published in his own newspaper, of Michigan in 1937."

As Detroit is the recognized world's capitol of motordom, it is fitting that editors should visit a modern automobile plant. Present plans call for an inspection tour of a nearby General Motors factory, probably the Cadillac plant, where editors will have the opportunity of viewing the so-called "speed up" in actual operation.

Editors will probably visit Henry Ford's Greenfield Village at Dearborn. Thursday morning, July 22, editors will leave Detroit on a four-day tour of Michigan. The present itinerary calls for a brief stop at Ann Arbor, home of the University of Michigan, and for noon luncheon on the campus of Michigan State College at East Lansing.

Evening dinner will be in Grand Rapids, the furniture center, after which editors will board a Pullman train leaving shortly after midnight for Traverse City arriving in time for breakfast and a morning's tour of the cherry region.

Leaving Traverse City at noon Friday, the train will proceed to Petoskey where they will be met by 100 to 150 automobiles for their visit through Harbor Springs and resorts and over the Shore Drive to Cross Village. They will be conveyed by ferry to Mackinac Island in time for dinner at the Grand Hotel.

Editors will have two days' time to enjoy an outing at this famous island and resort hotel during the choice period of the entire summer. Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock the editors will board a steamer for a return trip to Detroit. Those publishers who are returning home by way of Chicago may board a Chicago-bound boat.

At Detroit the nation's editors will

learn of Michigan's automobile industry. They will inspect the automobile made city, fourth largest in the United States today.

From Detroit to Mackinac Island, the N. E. A. tour has been planned to afford an attractive picture of Michigan's resort resources.

Realizing the publicity value of the coming convention and state tour, the State of Michigan has appropriated \$10,000 to assist in meeting the expenses of the four-day tour.

**Governor Murphy To Speak At U. of D. Exercises June 8**

Gov. Frank Murphy will address the graduates and will receive the honorary degree of doctor of laws at the 57th annual commencement exercises of the University of Detroit, the Rev. A. H. Poetker, S.J., president of the university, has announced. The exercises will be held in the auditorium of the Masonic Temple, June 8th at 8 p. m. Former Probate Judge Henry S. Hulbert and Herman J. Browe, supervising director in charge of elementary schools

of the Detroit public school system will also receive the doctor of laws degree. Commencement week exercises will open with baccalaureate services in Gesu Church, Sunday, June 6, at 8 p. m. Rev. Joseph R. Byrne of St. Augustine's church, Kalamazoo, who received his bachelor of arts degree from the university in 1923, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon.  
 Gov. Murphy received the bachelor of laws degree from the University of Michigan in 1914 and pursued his graduate studies at Lincoln's Inn, London, and at Trinity College, Dublin. He was a member of the U. of D. law

faculty from 1922 to 1927 during the years that he was judge of the Recorder's court.  
 Hulbert, now vice-president and trust officer of the National Bank of Detroit, was a probate judge of Wayne County in 1934, a position he held since 1909. His work in the organization of the Juvenile court received national attention. He was born in Utica, N. Y., in 1869. His ancestors emigrated from England to America in 1621. He was a student in the Detroit public schools until forced by his father's death to help support the family. He was appointed clerk to Gov. Alger in 1887 and became clerk of probate of Wayne County in 1890. He was registered of probate from 1897 to 1908. He has spent much of his leisure as an amateur astronomer and was one of the founders of the McMath Observatory at Lake Angelus.

Browe was born in Detroit and was graduated from McMillan school of which Frank Cody, now superintendent of schools, was principal. Browe received the bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees from the University of Michigan and bachelor of laws and juris doctor degrees from Detroit College of Law. He also took graduate work at the University of Detroit, Wayne University and Oxford University, England. He is past president of the Exchange Association. He is a veteran of the World War in which he saw overseas service. He has been supervising director of elementary schools since 1934.
