Dear Editor—I am 8 years old.

Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says "If you see it in The Sun it's so."

Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?

Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except

they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours, man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there was no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginians. There would be no child-like faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

Do you know what happens to the money collected from the Grosse Pointe Lions' Goodfellow Newspaper Sale? This drive, which is conducted annually by the Grosse Pointe Lions Club, is for the purpose of immediate relief for the less fortunate. Food, clothing, optical service, hospital care, doctor bills, milk for babies and under-nourished children, are only a few of the many items paid for from the money collected during this sale.

The fund is under the direct supervision of the Lions Club executive committee. This committee meets monthly and carefully analyzes all expenditures. The welfare work is conducted by experienced social workers of the Neighborhood Club of Grosse Pointe, which acts as a clearing house for the prevention of duplication of aid. After a thorough investigation the cases are turned over to the proper authorities. Because of the pride and interest of the members of the Club more than common care is used in the

The opening program at the Vogue will present Martha Raye and Bing Crosby in the hilarious musical comedy "Double or Nothing" and Bette



James Melton on Detroit Exposition Program in January

James Melton, stalwart young American tenor, whose voice is known to millions by way of the radio, stage and screen, will be heard from the stage of the 4th Annual Detroit and Michigan Exposition, January 21-30 at Convention Hall.

Melton has had a brilliant and swift rise to fame within a comparatively short space of time. But a few years back he was the bright star of the University of Florida Glee Club, who was working his way through college by playing the saxophone at odd moments in orchestras. It was while in college that his extraordinarily fine tenor voice first attracted serious attention. No less personage than the University President, A. A. Murphree, recognized it and encouraged Melton to adopt a musical career. At one time, famous as "top tenor" of the Revelers quartet, which counts its admirers in Europe as well as America, Melton has also distinguished himself as a solo artist on many important radio hours. From these successes it was only a step to the concert platform and finally moving pictures. In this latter field he made a spectacular debut in Warner's film, "Stars Over Broadway" and "Sing Me a Love Song."

Melton won his first professional hearing when he came to New York, by singing for Erno Rappe, then musical director of the Roxy Theatre. Today, both he and Rappe are among the most popular artists on the air and in the musical world.

Melton is Georgia born and has the physique of a football hero, and in addition to his remarkable voice, a charming stage and screen presence.

Funds Needed in Tuberculosis Fight

Essential now as ever before is the continued loyal support of every person who has received 1937 tuberculosis Christmas seals, since Thanksgiving Day, Dr. Bruce H. Douglas, president of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association, declared this week. With past progress indicating that tuberculosis eventually can be stamped out, the need for Christmas seal funds is urgent, Dr. Douglas pointed out. Everyone was urged to use as many of the decorative health seals as possible on holiday letters and packages.

"Throwing out a new challenge, tuberculosis last year claimed more than 2,000 Michigan lives. In Michigan, as well as in a number of other states, tuberculosis mortality rates temporarily have been checked. People throughout the state, however, realize that this challenge can be met, as in the past, with tuberculosis Christmas seal funds," Dr. Douglas said.

"One of the greatest of Christmas seal accomplishments has been to lower the death rate more than fifty per cent within thirty years of effort," he pointed out. "This remarkable reduction of deaths from the White Plague has been a direct outgrowth of public interest through the generous purchase each year of the tiny health stamps distributed by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association," Dr. Douglas said.

"Through health education, an important phase of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association's preventive program, Michigan people have been given knowledge about modern weapons to fight tuberculosis. It has been demonstrated to them that tuberculosis is preventable and curable. People everywhere know that the assurance of Christmas seals is protection from the dangers of the White Plague."

New Vogue Theatre to Open Christmas Day

(Continued from Page One) type theatre serving one of Detroit's finest residential districts. Many new innovations in theatre design mark its opening as particularly noteworthy.

Its exterior design and colors are modernistic with cream brown and macotta furnishing the tints. Inside the lobby is blue and silver with modernistic circular striped and paneled doors and interesting mural paintings. The auditorium is blue and silver, shading to violet. Drapes at the side of the proscenium arch are silver and blue in a star shaped design. The Vogue carpeting is feather soft of special acoustical type in fawn and mahogany colors. The theatre's cove ceiling is ivory and blue, and it is the first playhouse in this part of the country to have neon lighting through the interior. The finest type of Western Electric Sound equipment is being installed, and among the theatre's features is a de luxe air conditioning and ventilating system. The theatre was designed by Pereira and Pereira of Chicago with S. Sloan of Detroit as consulting engineer and general contractor.

Cataract Defined
When the lens of the eye becomes clouded the condition is termed a cataract. The lens, not being supplied with blood vessels or nerves, receives its nourishment from the fluids of the eye. The lens is encased in a capsule which acts as a filter to keep out undesirable material. Should this capsule break, the lens is flooded with the eye fluids. It then becomes clouded and the patient has what is known as traumatic cataract. In elderly persons the lens capsule gradually becomes less efficient and the lens, as a result, becomes clouded from the outside toward the center.

"Earth Pig" Native of Africa
The aard-vark, or "earth pig," is found only in Africa. It feeds chiefly on ants.

First Timepieces Used Heavy Weights on Cords

The earliest timepieces were clocks for which the motive power was supplied by weights. The unavoidable dangling of the weights from their cords compelled the limitation of the use of timepieces at first to standing or hanging in one place.

This was the situation from about the year 1300 until about 1500, according to a writer in the Washington Post, when the first portable timepieces were made possible by an invention of Peter Henlein, of Nuremberg, Germany, who first applied spiral steel springs to take the place of weights for motive power. The value of this invention to mankind is incalculable.

At first mainsprings were made comparatively short and thick. In these there was so great a difference between the power when fully wound and partly run down that special mechanical devices had to be used to equalize the power.

The best of these devices was the fusee, which is used in marine chronometers. But for watches the problem of improving the uniformity of power was solved by using longer and thinner mainsprings, helped out also by the development of isochronal adjustment, which makes it less imperative that the extent of vibrations of the balance shall be uniform, as these are affected by the motive power.

Alaska Has Odd Geese

A race of dark-complexioned wild geese reside in the coastal region of British Columbia and southeastern Alaska. They are similar in general appearance and size to their better known relative, the Canada goose or "honker," but differ in being very much darker. They are known as the white-cheeked goose. Apart from the difference in coloration between these two races of geese there are differences in habit also, the most important being that of migration. The Canada goose makes long annual journeys to and from its nesting grounds; some raise their young on James bay and spend the winter on the Gulf of Mexico. The white-cheeked goose, on the other hand, may spend the entire year, or even all its lifetime in the same region.

Law Changes Required Says Judge Cody

Due to the change in economic conditions, there has been a gradual, but steady transition from a tenant's paradise to that of the landlord's watchful

reckoning; in the past three years the problem confronting the Circuit Court Commissioners jurisdiction was the difficulty that the landlord had in collecting rents due from tenants. Whereas, now the landlord is anxious to oust his old tenant because of the fact that an increase in rental will be best served by new tenancy. Then, too, there has been a deluge of repossessions by mortgagors with a specific policy to complete repossession without the option of the mortgagor remaining in possession upon a fair rental basis; and consequently, this new type of eviction has resulted in a continual hardship, even though sympathetic, upon the court.

Because of the very nature of summary proceedings for possession, in

country or, at least until such time birth control will have taken its place in the annals of civilization.

Judge William J. Cody, experienced these hardships, day in and day out confronted with trying problems a while adhering to the strict letter of the law, by which he is bound, he endeavored and did, establish a precedent whereby a tenant should not be evicted over any given week or further, that if it is at all possible within reason, to extend the date of eviction with the consent of the landlord. The situation at hand has been treated successfully to this end.

It is Judge Cody's belief that with the near future the summary proceedings now in vogue, will have to be amended and made flexible in order that some discretion be left with the presiding judicial officer to determine under the given circumstances, as to the repossession of premises as between landlord and tenant, bearing in mind that an act enabling the foregoing would confer reasonable discretion with the change of conditions as they come about, the barometer being fairness to both landlord and tenant



According to Richard Harfst, general manager to the Automobile Club of Michigan... "The U. S. Bureau of Public Roads," Mr. Harfst said, "used such a camera, mounted on a bracket just outside the driver's window, to study widths of highway in relation to the safety and

conveniences of modern vehicles passing in the same and opposite directions, speeds were recorded and road measurements were taken. "The cameraman found that, despite the 'jitters' of backseat drivers, motorists usually allow ample clearance when passing other vehicles. The average clearance of passenger cars overtaking and passing other passenger cars ranges from 3.8 feet on 18-foot wide highways, to 4.9 feet on 22-foot surfaces.

"Speed has a decided effect on the car's position on the pavement. As the speed increases, drivers tend to travel farther away from the right edge of the road. A car passing another car going in the same direction requires more road width than one passing from the opposite direction, for it must travel substantially faster than the car in front. On pavements only 18 feet wide, the last wheels of the passing vehicle are often driven on the shoulder.

"In general, it was found that roads 18 feet wide are too narrow either for passenger cars alone or for mixed passenger car and truck traffic; that pavements 29 feet wide are inadequate for dense traffic involving trucks, but are reasonably satisfactory for the lightly traveled roads with few trucks; and that a road width of 22 feet is entirely adequate for the two-lane movement of modern mixed traffic."

Most women are shod in shoes from sizes 6 to 8.





INSURANCE TIPS

By H. THOMPSON STOCK, M. B. A.
 LOSS OF USE INSURANCE
 In his autobiography "The Story of My Life," Lucien Calvin Warner, the founder of Warner Brothers Company, corset manufacturers, states "Soon after this enlargement was completed on September 6, 1902, the main factory took fire and was completely destroyed. * * * Most of the direct loss was covered by insurance but six months' business was lost and the expenses ran on just the same." Loss of use insurance would have indemnified Warner Brothers Company for their continuing ex-

penses and the loss of their net profits. An investigation by the R. G. Dun & Company of the credit history of one hundred merchants and manufacturers over a period of several years before and after each had a fire showed that 43 per cent did not resume business after the fire and that the credit rating of 31 per cent was impaired. If all of these firms had carried loss of use insurance, continuing expenses would not have leached them of their liquid-

assets. There are various kinds of loss of use insurance. For the manufacturer

retailer or wholesaler, it is called "use and occupancy," or "business interruption" insurance. If a manufacturer has to curtail or cease operations because of inability to get material or power or to ship his finished product on account of fire damaging the property of his supplier or purchaser, he should have "contingent use and occupancy" insurance. If operations must continue regardless of cost, "extra expense" or "contract" insurance should be carried. Loss of profits on stock of finished seasonal goods destroyed by fire while in possession of manufacturer may be insured by means of "profits" insurance.

A landlord should carry rent and/or rental value insurance to protect himself (if the property is occupied by the property is rendered untenable by fire. A tenant holding a favorable lease should be protected with leasehold insurance for the difference between the market rental value and the rent and rental expenses required by the lease as the "fire clause" in the lease permits the landlord to cancel the lease in event fire destroys 25, 50, or 75 per cent of the building. The necessity for leasehold insurance arises when the ground value has increased because of location or when the value of the building has been increased because of additions, new fronts, air conditioning equipment, and so forth, made or installed by the tenant.
