**ANOTHER CARUSO?**

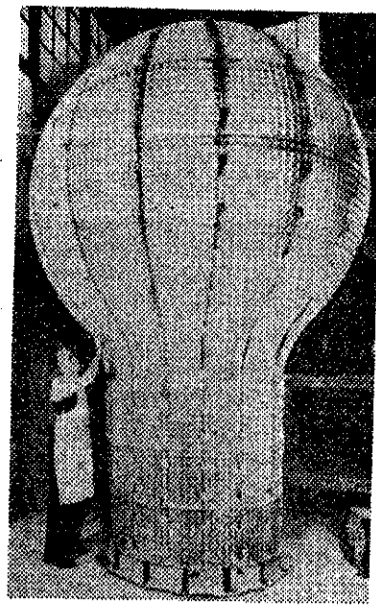

The world seems in a restless impatient mood. We welcome changes—quick changes. We are willing to gamble on chances, and uncertainties, trusting to luck for desired betterments. We joyously hail the new order and forget the old.

As we discard our 1937 for the 1938 calendar it may be worthwhile to calm our restless impatience and trust more in logic and less in luck. We are forced to consider to what extent our own futures can be planned, and what dependable value factors are worthy of objective planning. In individual planning, perhaps home environments, influences and training hold substantial importance. Much of this is subconsciously absorbed—because part of us and is embodied throughout life. Our educational advantages may be planned to become a mighty influence in determining our future. Our civil material factor in life's program. The individual will-power can be a dominant factor in planning the future. The tragedy continues however—how pitifully little of these possibilities and potentialities is given reasonable attention.

Human life planning carries supreme responsibilities. To wisely plan we must retrospect and analyze in order to properly discern what the life values are that are most worthy of planning interest, probably sacrifices and serviceable endeavor. Human values are not measured in dollars and cents but rather in best useful service. To be most useful and serviceable requires the fuller development of each part of the human triune nature—physical, mental and moral. Our interests, pleasures and values in life are directly proportional to our ability and capacity to receive.

Individual and civic values hold close analogy. Luck and chance are not dependable mediums. Past history has amply proven that "laissez-faire" procedure is not dependable but destructive. In each case there is the original loss and waste and, in addition, the resulting loss of time and cost in corrective effort. It is most striking and challenging that so few planning practices have proven their worth and value throughout the ages. More principles than practices have established themselves but these few of both principles and practices are assuredly the most dependable on which to base our long-looked-for planning for individual and civic future.

If this were not true, chemistry, engineering and all branches of modern science would be of no avail. And do not forget that politics is also a science—a science of government perfected since the beginning of the world. Without attempting to be verbose we do believe that what has been accomplished in 1937 is the firmest foundation on which to lay a prediction on what may be accomplished in 1938.

Necessarily in any honest discussion of county government, we must divulge the facts, because facts and facts only speak for themselves. We find that during an era of ups and downs, of unusual adjustments to unusual economic manner. An analysis of the public officers who represent the taxpayers.

**State Tax Returns to Counties Will Be Record High of Over 26 Millions**

State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner reported that returns to the counties from weight and gasoline taxes will reach a record high of more than \$26,000,000 in 1937.

This amount will raise the total returns to the counties to cover \$111,000,000 during the five calendar years that the commissioner has been in office. The five-year total is also the largest on record.

Counties receive the entire amount of the revenue from the sale of automobile license plates in addition to \$6,550,000 a year from the gasoline tax. Of the latter amount, \$4,000,000 is returned to the counties for the maintenance of roads that were formerly on the township highway system. The remaining \$2,550,000 is sent back to the counties as a result of special legislation in 1934 reducing the weight tax by 36 per cent.

In addition the Federal government has made \$1,359,910 available for secondary road improvements on county roads in Michigan. The 1937 legislature also enacted a \$200,000 snow-removal appropriation for 34 counties in northern Michigan.

**Winter Edition of Map of Michigan Highways Ready for Distribution**

The winter edition of the official Michigan Highway Map is off the press ready for free distribution to motorists.

Winter scenes in Michigan, including those depicting snow and ice sports, dominate the reverse side of the map. Nine warning signs commonly seen on Michigan roads are also shown and explained.

The map side contains the largest correction relating to trunkline highways brought about by new construction. Copies of the map may be obtained without cost by writing to State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner.

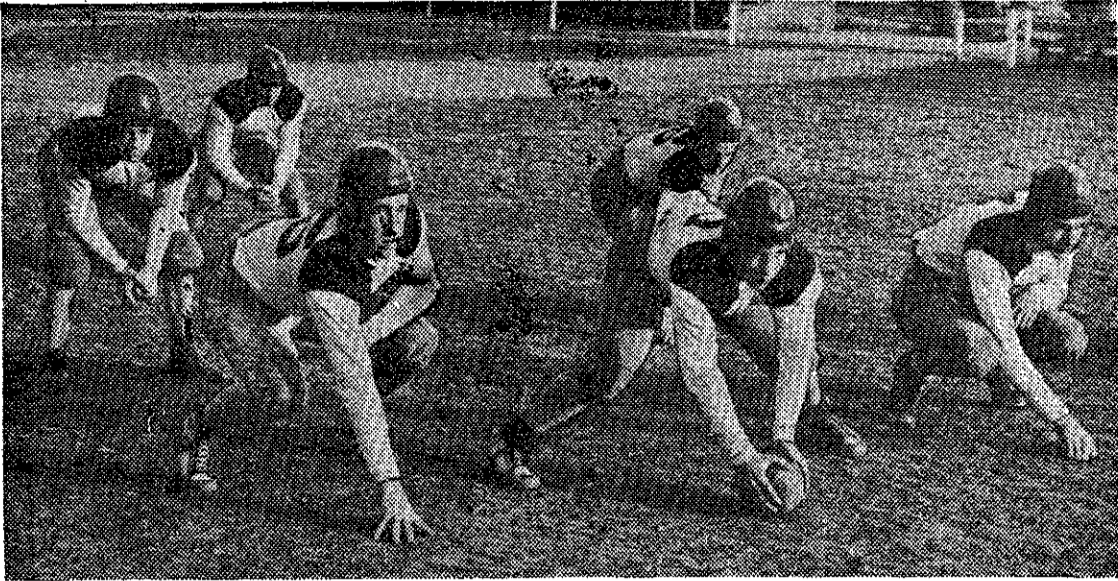

## Japan Demonstrates Man Power in China



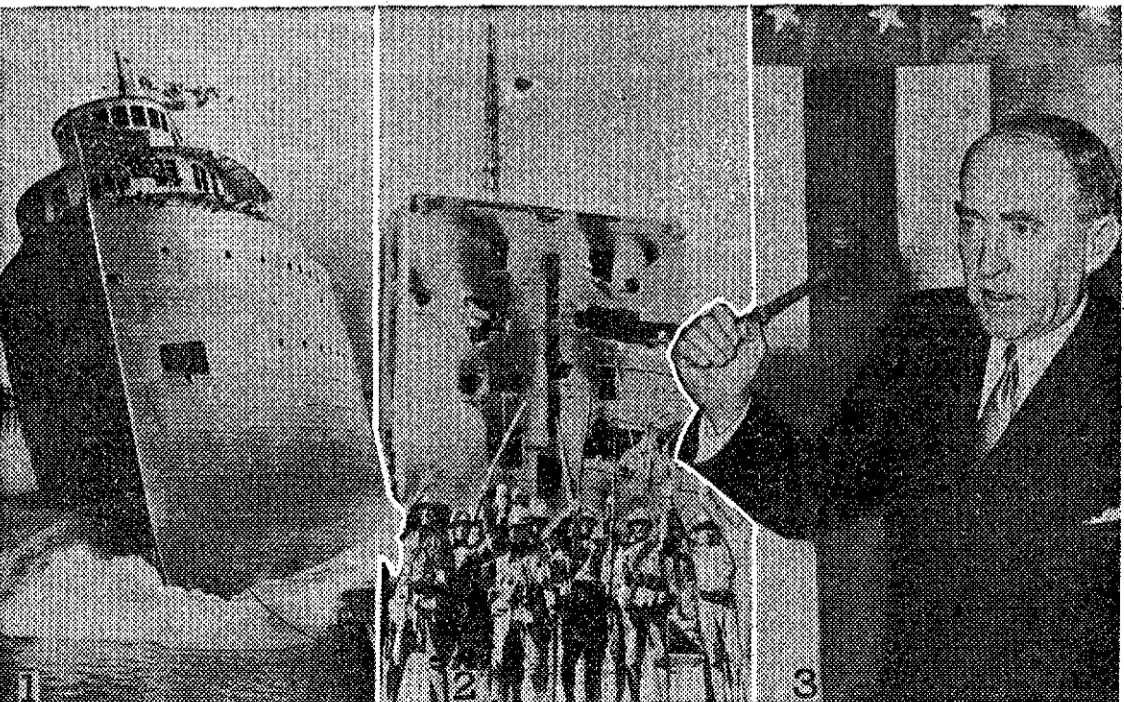

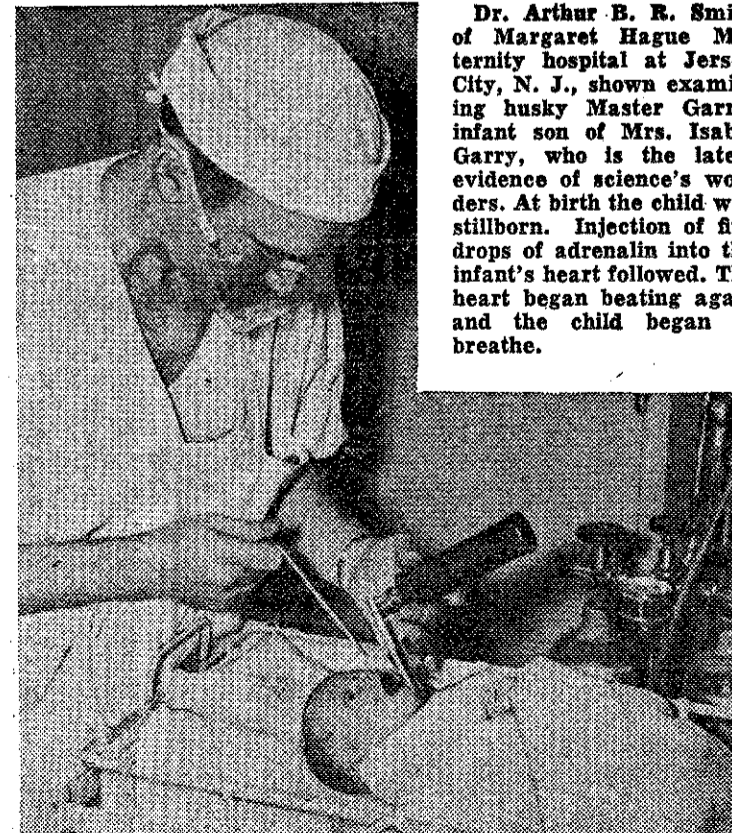

## ASKS RAIL BOOST



John J. Pelley, president of the Association of American Railroads which has applied for a 15 per cent blanket increase in freight rates, points out that during the past four years, due to causes beyond the control of the railroads, there has been an increase of \$663,303,000 per year in the roads' operating costs.

## Cellulose Found in Most Plant Matter Specimen

Most types of plant matter contain large amounts of cellulose. Cellulose, as well as starch, is formed by the linking together of large numbers of molecules of certain sugars known as hexoses. The hexose sugars, which include all of the familiar sugars, are characterized by the fact that they contain a string of six carbon atoms in their molecules.

Corncobs, grain hulls and straw, and bagasse (dried sugar cane stalks) contain in addition a class of compounds known as pentosans. Pentosans are also built up from a large number of sugar molecules, but of a type known as pentoses, containing five instead of six carbon atoms.

When hexoses are heated with dilute acids, says a writer in the Chicago Tribune, extensive decomposition takes place, with the formation of caramel and various organic acids. Similar treatment applied to pentoses results in the formation of a large amount of furfural, a clear, water-insoluble liquid with a characteristic pungent odor.

Furfural, different from all other cheaply produced organic compounds, has its most important use in the refining of petroleum lubricants. Furfural is one of those compounds that do not dissolve in the oil but are capable of washing out from it a large part of the tarry materials that detract from its lubricating properties.

## Blonds Have Most Hair; Brunettes, Redheads Next

It has been found that people with the most abundant body-hair have the least abundant head-hair, and that the proportion varies with the color.

Blonds have from 140,000 to 180,000 hairs, brunettes from 80,000 to 125,000, and red-heads from 25,000 to 55,000.

We all lose about 40 hairs a day, says a writer in Pearson's London Weekly, so that if you had a detective on your track, your head would leave a trail like a paper-chase behind you.

Every time you shave you throw 10,000 clues to your identity down the drain, for beard, eyebrow and eyelash hairs all have their own distinguishing marks.

In special circumstances the scientific expert can tell a male hair from a female hair, and he can cut sections lengthwise to decide from what kind of animal a non-human hair has come.

In section, hairs from dogs and cats are easily distinguishable, and a fiber of wool has a distinctive set of conical joints which can even show the variety of sheep from which it came. Silk and cotton fibers are also different.

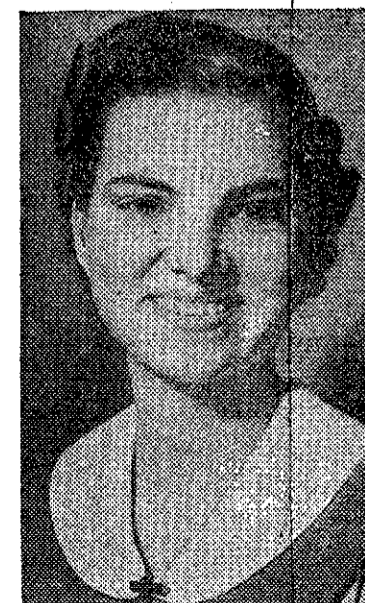
## Table Manners

Manners vary considerably in different parts of the world—especially table manners. What we would consider terribly rude in this country is regarded as excellent in India, says London Tit-Bits Magazine. If you dine with an Indian in his country you are expected to lick the platter clean—to leave anything on your plate is an insult to his food. Be sure to call for a second helping of everything in a loud voice, and a third, if possible. Always praise the items and give the impression that the food is delicious. You are expected to desist when you cannot eat more, not when you have had sufficient. Patting your stomach as proof is one sign. Indians are great eaters, and "strong" and "fat" are synonymous, especially among the "bannia" (shopkeeper) class. Among them it is common practice to tie a length of cotton around their waists and eat until their stomach swells and the cotton snaps. Then they cease immediately.

## Court of Brotherhood

One of the most ancient courts in this country is known officially as "Court of Brotherhood and Guestling," says London Tit-Bits Magazine. It is older than the Doomsday Book, is presided over by the warden of the Cinque Ports, and to it come the port barons clad in their ceremonial coronation robes to renew their ancient oaths ("to maintain their charters, franchises, liberties and customs." Among the traditional ceremonials is the reading aloud of an old order of Queen Elizabeth imposing a fine of three shillings, four pence, "to be paid forthwith," on any member speaking more than once on any subject, and the same penalty for anyone interrupting a speaker.

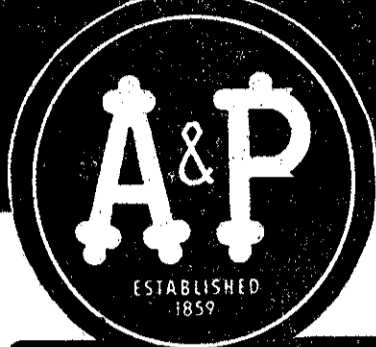
To aid Grosse Pointe High School seniors in selecting their vocations, a group of discussions on various vocations has been arranged for next Tuesday morning.

Oral Wills Are Made by Soldier, Sailor on Duty

A will is final disposition of a person's property which becomes effective after that person's death. A codicil is an amendment, an addition, or a deletion to the original document.

While state laws vary, it may be said generally that any person in the United States may dispose of personal property by will at the age of eighteen and of real estate at twenty-one. The only exceptions are idiots, persons of unsound mind, or infants.

The subsequent marriage of an unmarried woman revokes the will in some states. An unwritten oral will may be made by a soldier in active service or a sailor at sea, but in most states a will must be written, signed by the person making the will, or, at his direction, by some other person in his presence, and attested to by two or three witnesses.

Fourth Dimension Defined The fourth dimension is defined in mathematics as the dimension added to a three-dimensional extent or aggregate to convert the former into a four-dimensional extent. Physical space is sometimes regarded, as in the theory of relativity, as consisting of the ordinary three spatial dimensions plus a fourth dimension, time, and is then known as "space-time continuum."
