

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Robert O. Derrick, a resident of Grosse Pointe, and a member of the architectural firm of Derick and Gamber, has been appointed by the board as architect for the building and is working with the board and Dr. S. M. Brownell, superintendent of schools.

Plans for the building are being submitted to the Public Works Administration in application for a Federal grant of 45 per cent of the costs It is hoped to place the proposal before the citizen of the Grosse Pointe school district for vote early this fall, Charles A. Parcells, president of the board of education, said today.

Mr. Parcells explained that the pheomenal increase in enrollment, especially in the junior and senior high school divisions in Grosse Pointe, has badly overtaxed housing facilities for these pupils and has resulted in requests from numerous citizens that the board do something about the matter. Prelimiary to the decision to condemn the property on Somerset, six different site surveys were made by the superintendent and by school building experts over a period of ten years. Attempts to negotiate the purchase of the property without condemnation proceedings have also been made by the board of education through a committee composed of Charles A. Poupard, treasurer of the district, and Ralph M. Clark, secretary of the board of educa-

"The Grosse Pointe High school, with normal capacity of 1,450 pupils, is jammed with 1,987 students now,' 'Dr. Brownell told the Grosse Pointe Re-"As new homes go up in the school district the enrollment continues to increase. I would be less than fair were I to pretend that this one proposed new junior high school would do more than solve temporarily the problem of housing the secondary school pupils, but it would be a tremendous help for the present at least

Dr. Brownell was appointed this spring to the Professorship of Educational Administration in the Graduate School at Yale University, where he will succeeed Dr. Frank E. Spaulding who went to the Yale position after being superintendent of schools at Cleveland, Ohio.





\$150 per year for each individual hawking of peddling from any vehicle of any kind.

Section 8. Hawkers or peddlers so licensed when engaged in such business must exhibit such license at the request of any citizen.

Section 9. A license may be revoked

by the Clerk for a violation of any law or ordinance or the violation of any of the matters set forth in the application or for any undesirable business practice. The applicant may appeal to the Council from such revocation by filing a written request for an appeal with the Clerk. The Clerk shall thereupon furnish the applicant at the address stated in the application, by mail or otherwise, with a written statement of the reason or reasons for the revocation and the date of the next Council meeting at which he may be heard, which meeting shall be at least five days after the serving of such notice. The matter shall be duly heard by the Council and if it finds the licensee guilty, the revocation shall stand, otherwise it shall be reversed.

Section 10. This ordinance shall not be interpreted as allowing hawking or peddling in any public park in the City of Grosse Pointe.

Section 11. Any person or persons iolating any of the provisions of this ordiance shall upon conviction be punished by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 and costs or by imprisonment not exceedng 60 days or both.

Section 12. This ordinance shall not n any way affect an ordinance entitled Prohibiting entering the premises of another" adopted December 27, 1933, nor an ordinance entitled "Prohibiting solicitors, agents, peddlers, etc." effective June 31, 1934.

This ordinance shall be effective 10 days after the publication thereof.






