Voters Should Register Now to Vote at Regular **Election November 8th**

The last day for registration of voters in Grosse Pointe Township and the City of Grosse Pointe will be Saturday, October 29. All voters who have moved since last voting or who have not voted for over two years should register at once in order to vote in the General Election on November 8.

Study these facts:

YOU MUST REGISTER IF:

1—You have never registered.

2—You have not voted for two years or more.

3—You have moved and failed to have the Township Clerk, or the Clerk in the City of Grosse Pointe transfer your voting adress.

4—You will be 21 years old by November 8 and desire to vote in the election on that date. YOU NEED NOT REGISTER IF:

1—You are properly registered and have voted during the last two years. 2—You have moved and notified the City Clerk or

Township Clerk of your change of address. Any American citizen, native-born or naturalized, who is 21

years old and PROPERLY REGISTERED and who has been in the state six months and in the Township or City of Grosse Pointe 20

Michigan law requires the election commission to remove the name of any voter who has failed to vote during any two-year period and THAT PERSON MUST RE-REGISTER to vote. Any person, now under 21, but who will be 21 years old by No-

vember 8, the date of the election, may register now. Naturalized Americans may save time and trouble by having

their citizenship papers with them when they register. Grosse Pointe voters must register at the Township office in

the Municipal Building, 15115 E. Jefferson to vote in the Township, which is open from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., Saturdays from 9 a. m. to 12 noon. To vote in the City of Grosse Pointe you must register at the City Hall, 17150 Maumee avenue between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4:30 p. m., Saturdays, 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

It costs nothing to register.

October 29 is the final day on which voters may register for the general election November 8.

Registering now will save standing in line later. All those wishing absentee voters ballots are urged to file application for same as early as possible.

Welfare Law Is Most Important Issue to Be Voted Upon Nov. 8th

One of the most important issues presented to the people of Michigan in recent years is the Welfare Law, passed by the 1937 Legislature and approved by the Governor, upon which we are to have a referendum at the election November 8th.

It is important because it affects the daily lives and well-being or more than one million Michigan men, women and children, for whose care the public pays over \$50,000.000 a year.

With such a sum as this involved it behooves all of us to see that these funds are administered most economically and with the highest degree of efficiency.

The new law provides such economy efficiency by eliminating costly duplication of effort through consolidating several of th eagencies now administering relief, setting up a non-political, planned and orderly system of state and local public welfare services in place of an unplanned and chaotic jumble of activities. It combines sound organization, economy and efficiency of operation, and gives a reasonable amount of state leadership and state supervision with a large amount of local autonomy.

If the Welfare Law is approved by the voters on November 8, one county department will replace the six to 15 we now have dealing with relief problems, and in the state at large less than 170 local public welfare agencies will do the work of the over 550 we have at present, which will certainly be a worthwhile step toward an economical simplification of one branch of state government.

The result of the Welfare referendum will indicate the progress of Michigan in state-wide social reorganization and a better understanding of her citizens in the fundamental issues of pub-

Urges Adoption of Amendment No. 3

The opening offensive in the campaign for the adoption of Amendment No. 3 on the November 8 election ballot was fired at a luncheon October 20 at the Hotel Statler in Detroit.

Clarence C. Carlton, of Lansing, director for Michigan of the National Association of Manufacturers, characterized the amendment as "another milestone in the development of automotive transportation in Michigan" in delivering the main address on a program broadçast over a nation-wide adio hook-up.

Karl Detzer, the noted Michigan author, said the amendment is particularly important to the tourist industry of the state in another address, while State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner pointed out that the amendment is a "tax-saving and not a tax-raising" proposal.

Amendment 3 guarantees that gasoline and motor vehicle license plate taxes will be used for highways, roads, and streets. A vote on a similar amendment is pending in California, Alabama, New Hampshire, Nevada, and

HEALTH NOTES

In some sections of the state quite near to us there has been an increase in the number of cases of diphtheria during the past month. This disease is absolutely unnecessary. There are people who will not have their children immunized until there is an epidemic, not realizing that their child might be the first to have it if an epidemic occurs. With the facts at hand, the responsibility belongs with the parents. And, if diphtheria does not result heart condition.

It is well to remember to have the schick test given one to three years after the first schick test, to be sure that the child is still immune.

In regard to tuberculosis, we wish to emphasize the fact that death from this disease is unnecessary, if it is recognized in its early stages. which can be done by a simple skin test. This department urges the parents to be sure and have the skin test done by their doctor for their children and themselves. It is better to prevent
