There are only a few more days left for you late taxpayers to pay your taxes without penalty. All taxpayers in the City of Grosse Pointe and Grosse Pointe Township have until Jan. 10th to pay taxes without a penalty fee. The Township Treasurer, Adolph L. Damman, will collect taxes at the following places January 4: Lochmoor Village Municipal Hall on Mack avenue and January 5 at the Grosse Pointe Farms Municipal Hall on Kerby road.

Your taxes may be paid any time up till January 10 without a penalty at the Municipal building, Grosse Pointe Park, Beginning January 11 until March 1 a penalty of 4 per cent will be added.

The 1938-1939 County and School taxes on property in the City of Grosse Pointe may be paid at 17150 Maumee avenue between the hours of 8:30 a. m. and 4:30 p. m. The office closes at 12:00 noon on Saturday. There will also be a 4 per cent collection fee added after January 11.

Michigan employers contributing to Trust Fund on wages paid to workers payment before January 25, 1939.

Abner E. Larned, Executive Director of the Commission called attention to the fact that the United States Treasury Department regulations provide that in order to be entitled to the 90 per credit each employer is allowed against the tax under Title IX of the Social Security Act, the contributions must be "actually paid in to the State Unemployment Trust Fund before the date on which the return for the calendar year is required to be filed."

The Federal return is required to be filed not later than January 31, 1939. Therefore, it is necessary that every employers contribution for the entire year 1938 must be made before that date to entitle the employer to the 90 per cent credit referred to.

"The Unemployment Compensation Commission can do nothing to prevent the application of this penalty," said Mr. Larned.

"Employers should understand that if they fail to forward their contributions to the Unemployment Trust Fund before January 25, they will be subjecting themselves to a 90 per cent penalty which can otherwise be avoided."




