To Avoid Rush and Penalty Pay Your Township Taxes Now

There are only a few more days left for you late taxpayers to pay your taxes without penalty. All taxpayers in the City of Grosse Pointe and Grosse Pointe Township have until Jan. 10th to pay taxes without a penalty fee. The Township Treasurer, Adolph L. Damman, will collect taxes at the following places January 4: Lochmoor Village Municipal Hall on Mack avenue and January 5 at the Grosse Pointe Farms Municipal Hall on Kerby road.

Your taxes may be paid any time up till January 10 without a penalty at the Municipal building, Grosse Pointe Park, beginning January 11 until March 1 a penalty of 4 per cent will be added.

The 1938-1939 County and School taxes on property in the City of Grosse Pointe may be paid at 17150 Maumee avenue between the hours of 8:30 a. m. and 4:30 p. m. The office closes at 12:00 noon on Saturday. There will also be a 4 per cent collection fee added after January 11.

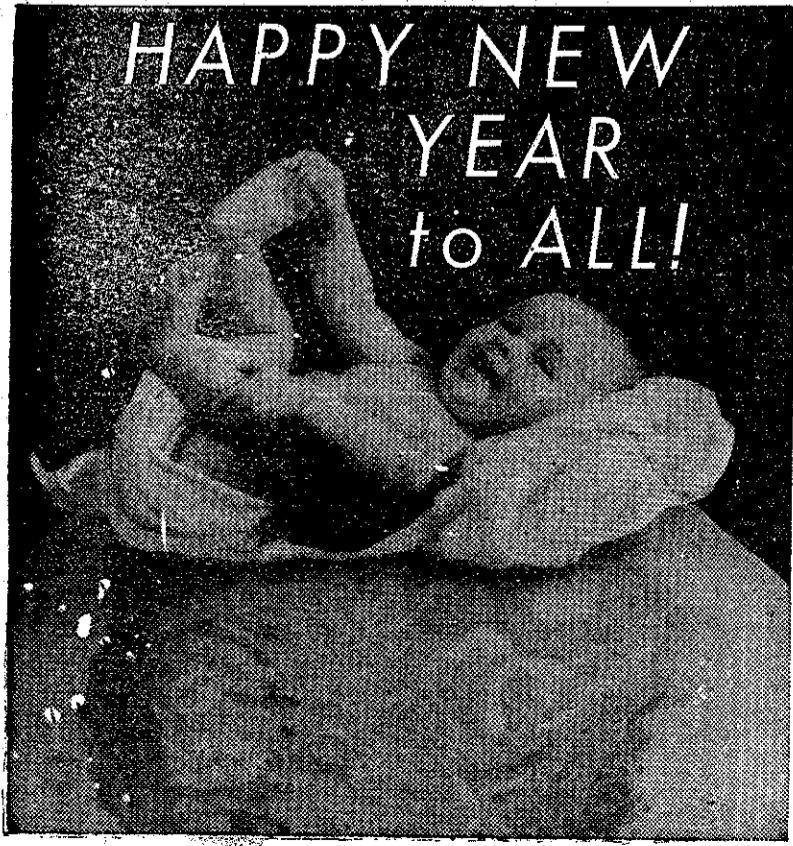
